The \$2.6 million is divvied up

Parmer County law enforcement agencies have received quite a windfall:

First the background:

Last September, Texas State Trooper Isabel Carrasco made the largest cash seizure in the history of the Texas Panhandle (and the largest in the U.S. last year by an individual) -- \$2,660,649.

He had stopped a truck just outside the Bovina city limits because the driver was not wearing a seat belt. After interviewing the driver and co-driver, he called for police backup. Then after getting permission to search the truck, he opened the back door and found eight cardboard boxes with the money.

Then-Parmer County Sheriff Gary Blair said the two men -- Noe Ferreira and Rigoberto Soriano -- in the truck disclaimed any knowledge of the money and signed a waiver giving it

Texico okays baseball program for 2002

The Texico School Board on Tuesday unanimously approved a baseball program, to begin in the spring of 2002.

Two coaches will be hired. The school will buy uniforms and supplies.

When Texico plays baseball in 2002, the games will be non-district and there will be no state playoffs. They must wait one year. Then in 2003, the state will put Texico into a district and there would be playoffs.

In other business, the board:

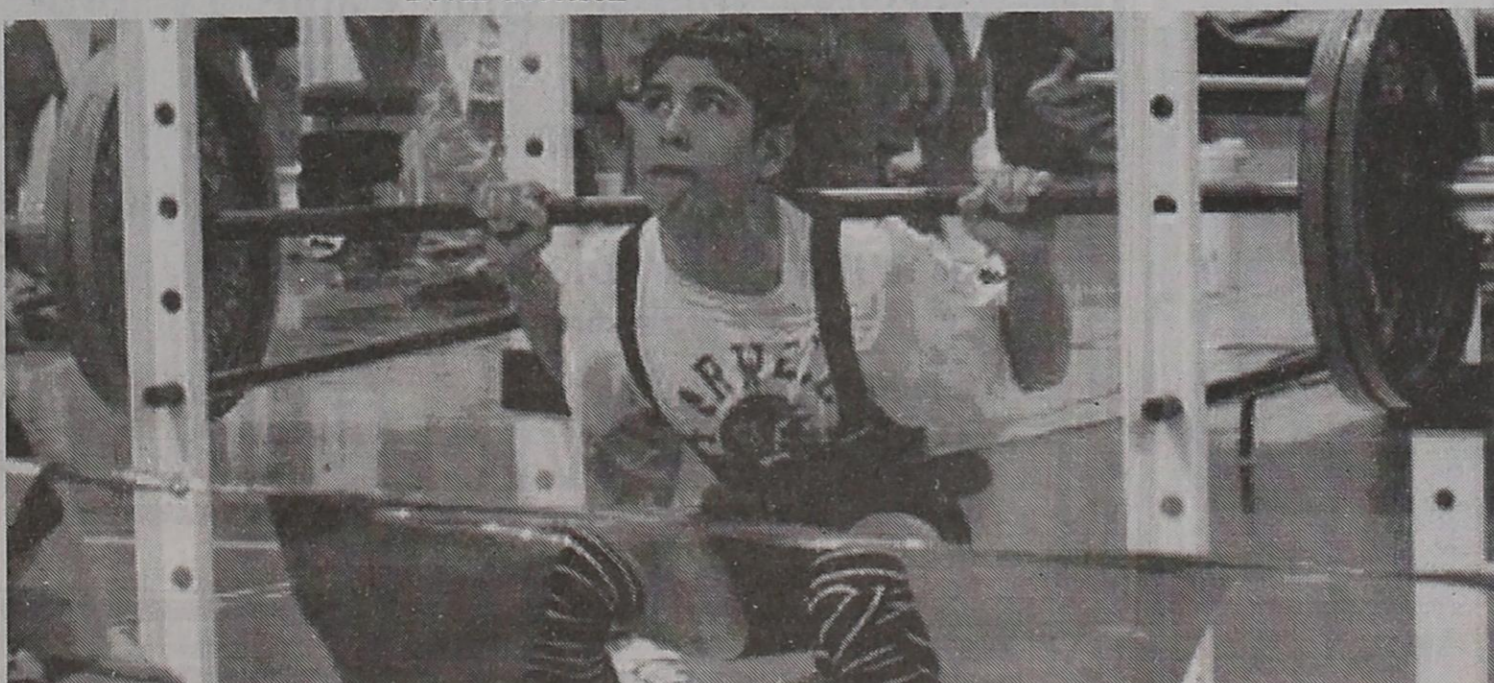

away.

That meant the money would be divvied up by governmental agencies, explained District Attorney Johnny Actkinson. Well, that has been accomplished.

On Feb. 6, a Judgment of Forfeiture was made in 287th District Court here. The court, after considering the evidence, decided that the "currency was contraband that was used or was intended to be used in the commission of a felony prohibited by the Texas Controlled Substance Act and should be forfeited to the State of Texas."

The funds were divvied up this way:
 * Texas Department of Public Safety got 70 percent -- \$1,862,314.30.

* Four police agencies -- Friona Police Department, Bovina Police Department, Farwell Police Department and Parmer County Sheriff's Office -- each got 2 percent -- \$53,212 apiece.

* The Parmer County Attorney's Office got 2 percent -- \$53,212.

* The Parmer County District Attorney's Office got 20 percent -- \$532,129.80.

Signing the court agreement were Actkinson, County attorney Charles Aycock, Friona Police Chief Scott Given, Bovina Police Chief Leon Saddler, Farwell Police Chief Robert Achterberg and Capt. Russell Davis, of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Actkinson further explained how this decision was reached in a letter to the Tribune:

"By way of background, there is a specific statute allowing for forfeiture of contraband which is used, or intended to be used, in the commission of a felony crime, or is the proceeds from the result of a felony crime. This means that any money, cars, houses, guns, knives or any other instrument which is used to help commit a crime can be forfeited. Our statutes provide that forfeiture of assets will result in money being paid to the state treasury unless there is a local agreement in regard to handling of the forfeiture. In Parmer County, each local agency has an agreement.

"The District Attorney's office is designated as the attorney to represent any and all law enforcement agencies in the county for forfeiture. As I mentioned, there are local agreements in place with each agency that the seizing agency will receive 70 percent of the total forfeited assets, and the District Attorney's Office will receive 30 percent.

"We have actively sought forfeitures in all drug cases. This is generally limited to the car which the criminal is driving at the time he commits the crime. It could also result in the forfeiture of a house. In Parmer County and Bailey County, there have been forfeited two different houses and, probably, 10 to 15 cars in the last two years. We aggressively follow the forfeiture policy, as I believe this is a deterrent to criminal activity and it is also a source of extra funds for law enforcement.

"The statute on use of forfeited property provides that the forfeited money must be used solely for law enforcement purposes, such as salaries, overtime pay for officers, officer training, specialized investigative equipment, supplies, etc.

"Our Parmer County Commissioners Court and the City Councils of Friona, Bovina and Farwell are very responsive to the needs of law enforcement. Each one does a very good job of funding their law enforcement agency. However, there is always a good cause which can be funded with the forfeited money.

"With the recent forfeiture of \$2,660,649, there will be a significant addition of funds available to each agency of law enforcement in this country. We have decided to divide the funds between all the agencies as shown in the court judgment."

Actkinson said he plans to use the funds his office will receive to hire an assistant district attorney, who also will serve in an investigative capacity. There has been no investigator in

the office since Julian Dominguez resigned last year. Actkinson plans to use the interest from the monetary amount for the assistant's annual salary in years to come.

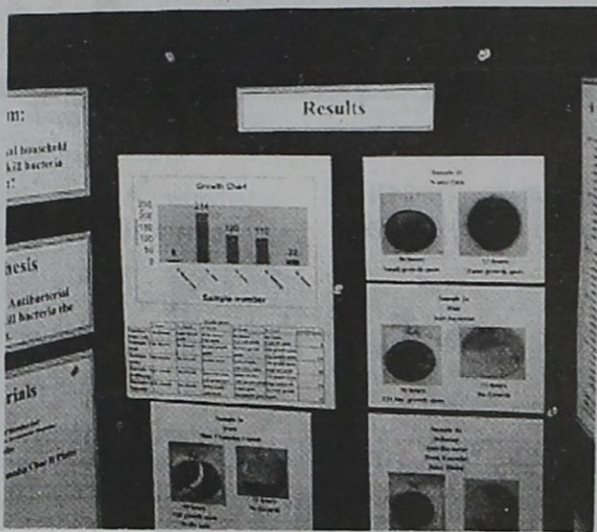
The 4-H officer training workshop was announced.

The Farwell Lady Blue fell to the Smyer Lady Cats in the state playoff Bi-District game at Lubbock on Tuesday, 51-41.

Farwell ended the campaign with an 18-11 record, while Smyer went to 27-2.

The youthful Farwell team came on strong during the season and played an excellent game against the heavily-favored Lady Cats. But Smyer hit three key 3-pointers late in the 3rd quarter, which turned out to be their margin of victory.

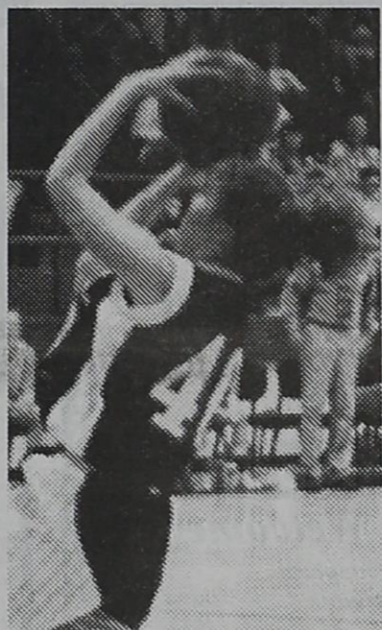
Scoring for Farwell were Jessica Chandler, 9; Brandi Bailey, 6; Lacey Actkinson, 3; Cassie Street, 6; Mindi Roberts, 10, and Kacey Gast, 7.

The game opened on a positive note as Bailey hit two quick buckets. After Actkinson's 3 pointer, Farwell led 7-4. But Smyer caught up and took a 13-11 lead at the end of the first quarter. Meanwhile, the Farwell defense proved strong and Chandler had three steals.

The Lady Blue regained the lead in the second quarter on a 3-pointer by Chandler, followed by a Gast layup, to make it 16-13. But Smyer reeled off 7 straight points, and went into halftime with a 24-20 margin. Smyer had a 6-ft. center who began using her height to hit short shots.
