The opening ceremony starts at 1 p.m. at the gazebo. Nancy Miller and her students will sing the National Anthem. Then folks will be welcomed by the Twin City mayors or their representatives.

Representatives of the state championship basketball boys and girls teams from Texico will be asked to say a few words, too.

Then float contest, antique tractor contest, bicycle contest and animal unit contest winners will be announced and cash prizes handed out. Providing funds for these awards were Security State Bank, the Texico branch of Citizens Bank, the Texico and Farwell Chambers of Commerce, and an anonymous donor.

- 4 p.m., Lupe Vidaurri.
- 4:15 p.m., Janet Denton.

This year's BTD will have a lot of fun things for kids, including carnival rides, pony rides, face painting, a pet-

ting zoo, a dunking booth, and the BTD Express train.

Also going on throughout the day is the arts and crafts fair, on the courthouse lawn. All participants feature homemade products.

At 3 p.m., the 9th annual volleyball tournament will begin at the south end of the park. Ryan Williams and Greg Actkinson are in charge.

The day ends with special giveaways, from Parmer County Crime Stoppers and the Farwell Educational Foundation, starting at 4:30 p.m.

Commemorative buttons are sold as the key fundraiser for BTD. Each button has a number on the back. The person whose name is called wins \$50 if he or she is present at 4:30 p.m.

A few special notes:

- It's urged that you bring a lawn chair or blanket along with you to the park on Saturday.
- An area for handicapped parking is located in back of the county courthouse at its south side (4th Street). Ramps have been added to the park for persons in wheelchairs.
- Senior citizens are invited to park their vehicles in the parking lot at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church on 5th Street to watch the parade.
- When the National Anthem is sung, it's always important to stand, and be respectful.

The 35th annual Border Town Days celebration kicks off Saturday and it promises to be another superb family event for the Twin Cities of Texico and Farwell.

The day begins with the decorated bicycle and tricycle contest at 9:45 a.m. (all times in this article are cdt -- Texas time). It will be held adjacent to the Texico branch of Citizens Bank on Anderson Street.

The deadline for entering these contest is Friday, July 27, at noon. You need to sign up at Texico City Hall. The theme is "Wild and Wacky West." Brand-new bicycles and a tricycle will be given to grand champions, and cash prizes also will be awarded to the top placers.

The judging starts promptly at 10 a.m., with three judges picked by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce serving in that capacity.

At 11 a.m., the Big Parade kicks off from Griffin Street. A map showing where participants need to line up is elsewhere in today's Tribune. This year's parade will feature an especially large contingent of antique tractors and cool vehicles. Hal Helton and Linda Porter will be the parade marshals, lining up the entries. Participants are urged to be at the parade start by 10:30 a.m.

The parade proceeds down the highway, which will be closed off to traffic both ways. A bypass has been set

Cassie Street liked to swim, ride bicycles, and to eat strawberries. She didn't like hamburgers.

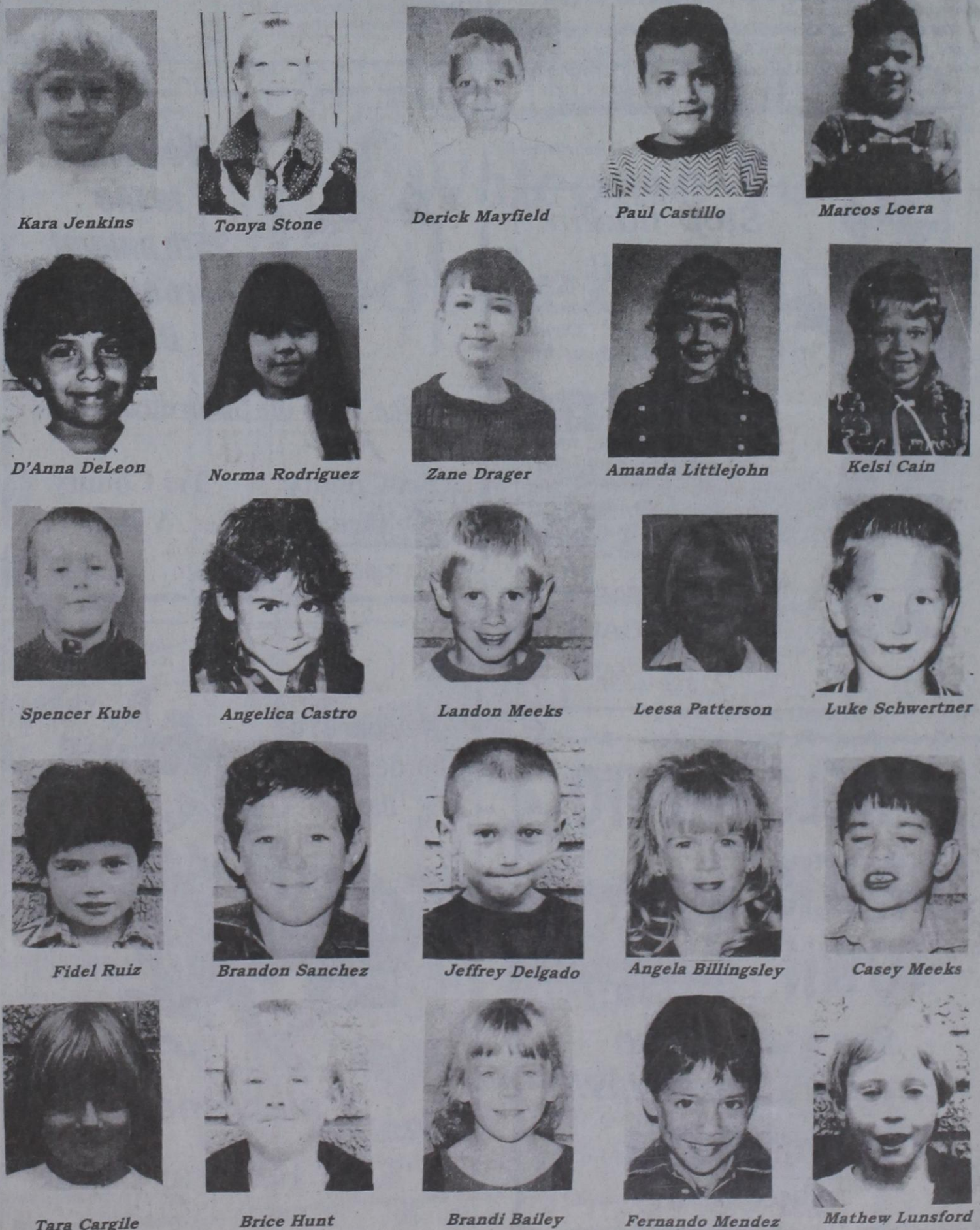

The parade goes to 5th Street in Farwell, turning south and ending just past the Farwell Convalescent Center at the Farwell City Park.

J'Dan Sudderth will be at the end point in the parade to direct participants where to park. Fourth Street heading into the park will be closed to southbound traffic for a short time to allow parade participants to exit more efficiently.

After the parade, which normally takes about 45 to 50 minutes, folks will congregate at the Farwell City Park for a large variety of food and refreshment, highlighted by the annual Texico-Farwell Rotary Club barbeque, honcho'd by Walter Hughes and his Assistants.

At 12:30 p.m., the Merchants Giveaway drawings commence. Twenty-eight local businesses are participating. Jerry Adams is in charge. Announcements of winners will be made by emcee Fred Chandler periodically throughout the day. Folks have a few minutes to get to the gazebo and collect their winnings -- or new names are called.

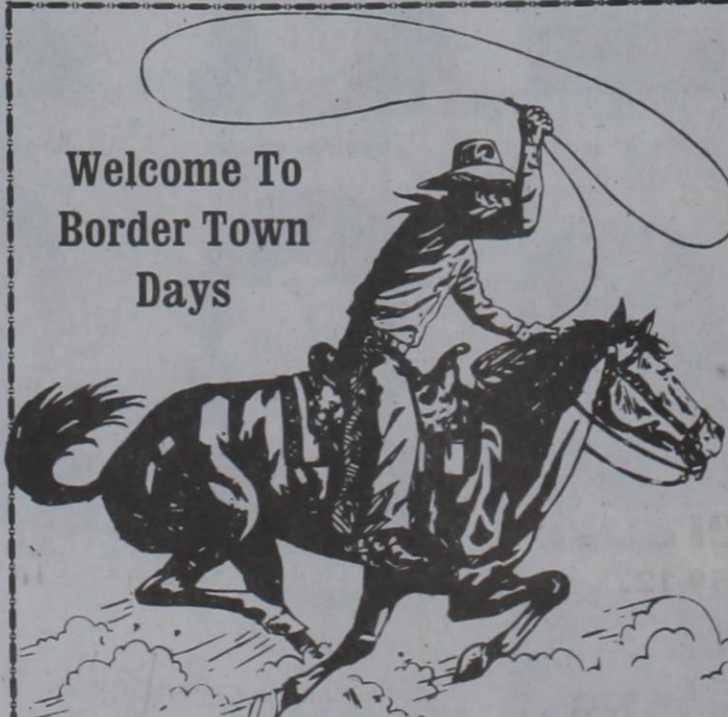

Farwell may change its curfew

The Farwell City Council on July 19 discussed moving up the curfew for youths.

Farwell Police Chief Robert Achterberg recommended earlier curfews, which will be discussed at the next meeting.

The current curfews are 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday nights, and midnight Sunday through Thursdays nights.

In other business, the council:

— Heard Debra Williams

complain about a neighbor's pit bull running loose.

The council plans to review its animal ordinance and change language which would allow the city police officer to declare a dog dangerous if it shows aggressive nature.

If so, then the dog would have to be confined in a house or in an outside cage.

This also will be brought up at the next meeting for action.

— Looked at revising the weed/rubbish ordinance to include "objectionable unsightly materials."

This also will be brought up again.

— Discussed problems during the 4th of July with fireworks going off into the night, and being shot onto neighbors' roofs and

in their yards.

Also, it was reported that some youths were driving in pickup trucks, shooting fireworks at each other.

— Plans to seek bids for seal coating 12 or 31 city blocks, including portions of 7th Street, Avenue B and Avenue E.

— Heard street Supt. Dee Hammit report that trees near the gazebo will be trimmed, with other trees in the park worked on next year.

— Approved the request by Parmer County Crime Stoppers to place a sign on the old theater building in the 100 block of Avenue A.

— Reviewed next year's budget. Only small changes are anticipated. The council is looking at pay raises of 3 percent for city employees.

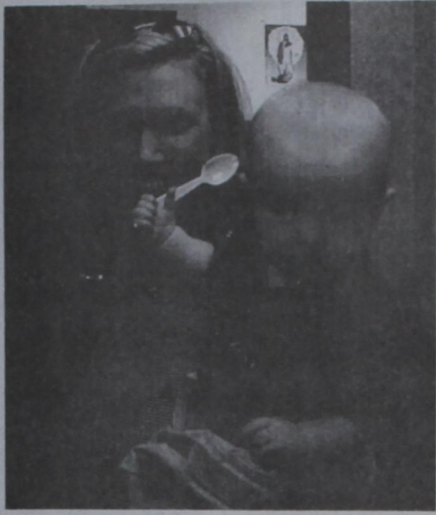
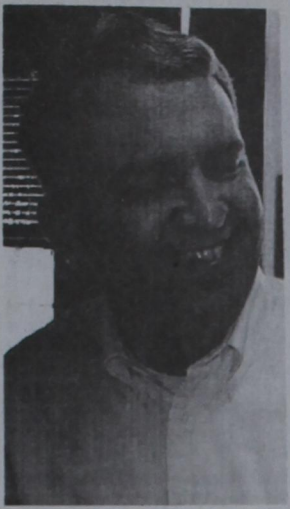

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County gets \$\$ windfall

Parmer County chief deputy sheriff Michael Howard stopped a Ford SUV for speeding near the Excel Plant on Highway 60 on the night of July 14.

It resulted in a windfall for Parmer County.

Here's a look back at Avenue A

This historical photo of the 200 block of Main Street (Avenue A) in Farwell was taken about 1940.

Its negative was found in the Tribune's basement along with many others by local history buff J.R. Ivins.

With help from Bob Anderson, here is what he found:

The City Cafe was located at the southwest corner of Avenue A and 3rd Street (the site of the Piggly Wiggly in the

1950s-1970s), then Stewart Motor Co. in the 1980s-1990s. The City Cafe was run by Mrs. Newton.

The next building to the right was also a cafe, run by Dick Doshier and Orville Frances. The building served also was a real estate office and farm equipment office.

The next small building was B.N. Graham's insur-

ance agency.


West of Graham's agency was the Greenfly Cafe, run by Greenfly Floyd. That building was

later Billingsley's Barber and Beauty Shop, run by Sterlyn Billingsley, Estel-line Billingsley and Bob Kiker.

To the west was the Ford Motor Co. The site is now the home for the Winners Touch, a gaming business.

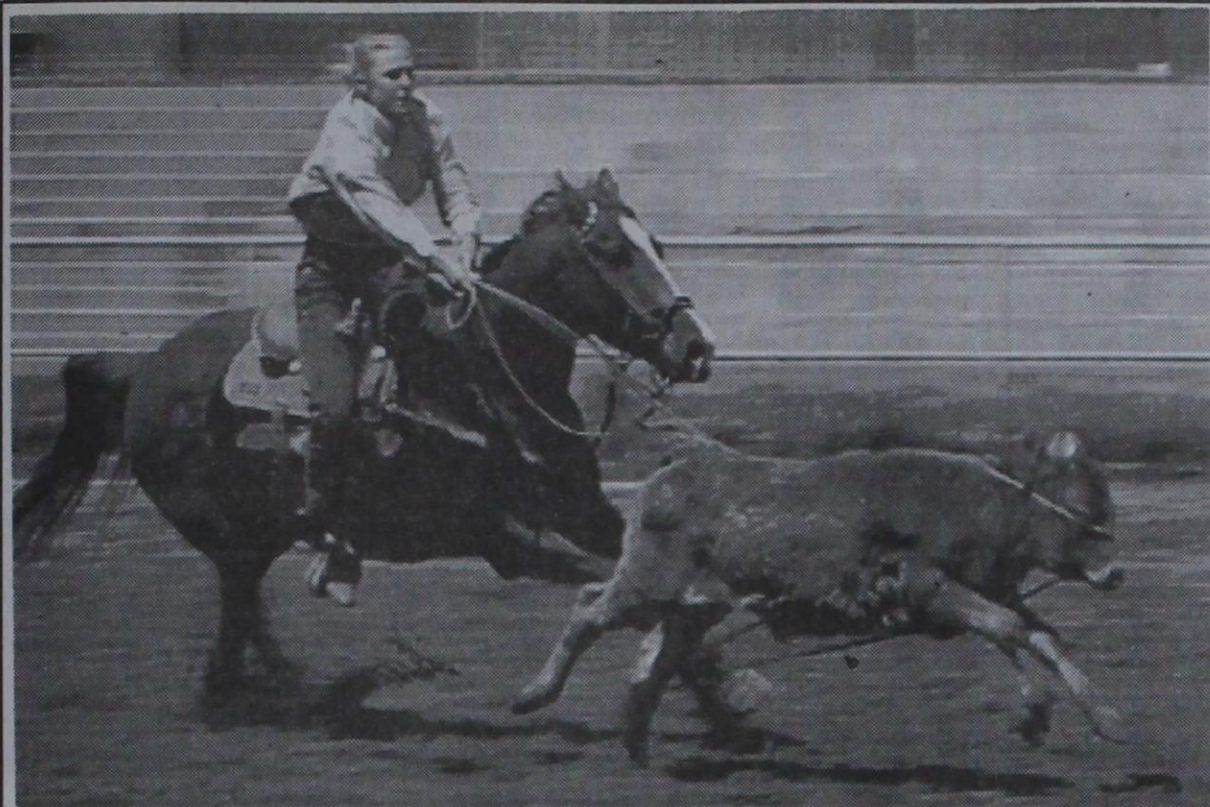

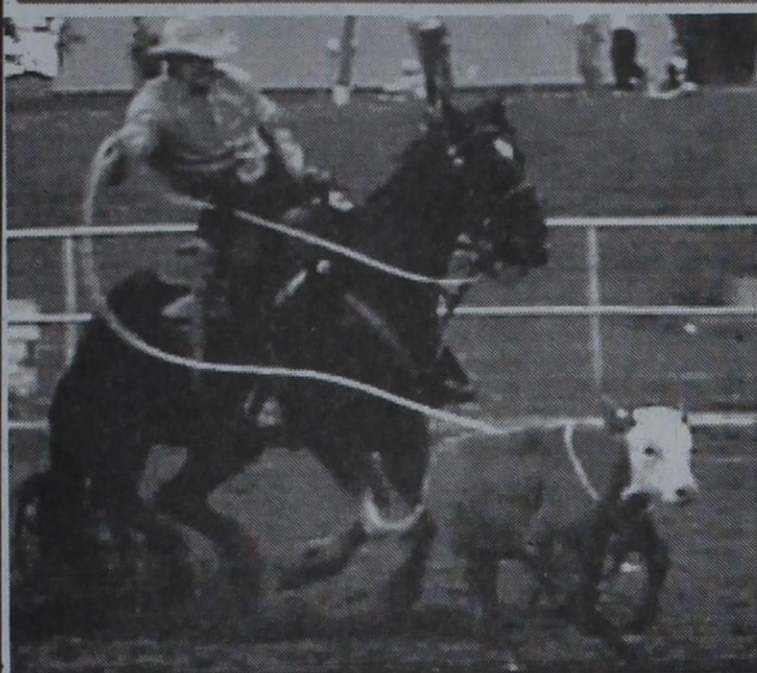

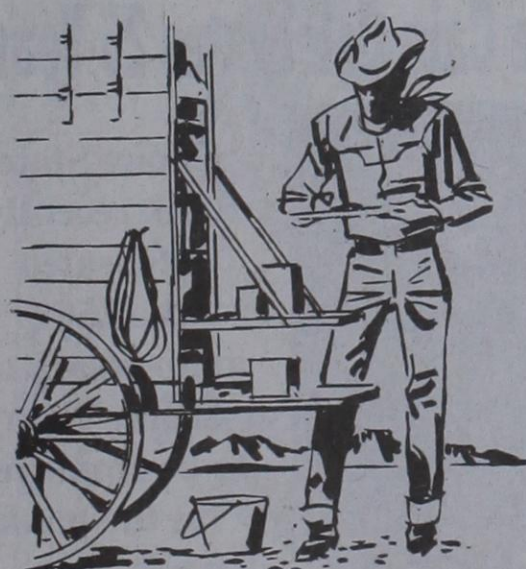

The Mansfield tragedy recalled

(Editor's note: The following information comes from articles written by Don McAlavy. It is reprinted with permission from McAlavy and the Clovis News Journal.)

Besides the Hassell murders that marked the worst tragedy in the Farwell area history, there also was another tragedy from that era.

It involved Montell (Monty) Mansfield, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Mansfield, of Farwell. And it happened in 1929.

Mansfield was a land agent connected with the Capitol Freehold Land Trust Co., a remnant of the old XIT Ranch syndicate.

He was born in Kentucky in 1882, came to Clovis in 1907 (where he was one of the first city aldermen), then to Farwell in 1916. He and his family lived in the house with the tall sloping roof adjacent to the State Line Tribune on 3rd Street. It is now occupied by Gene and Sherry Christian and their family.

On Aug. 14, 1929, Monty, 23, and Gail Hamilton, 39, both then living in New York state, were found dead together.

Monty was the youngest of two daughters of Mansfield and was living near Poughkeepsie at the time.

Gail, a close friend of Monty's, was a great-grandson of Alexander Hamilton, the first treasurer of the United States.

Officially, the deaths were reported as a double suicide. The guess is that

this was done to protect the Hamilton family name.

But later Mansfield received an anonymous letter, presumably from a housekeeper, that said Gail and Monty had quarreled in her bedroom.

In the heat of the argument, Gail shot Monty, then unsuccessfully tried to revive her. When he saw she was dead, he ordered everyone out of the room (there were other guests present in the house), then shot himself dead.

Gail had apparently been in love with Monty and was jealous of her popularity with her other friends. Monty was a beautiful woman.

The Mansfields also received other letters to the effect that Gail had indeed shot Monty.

Mansfield built a private mausoleum at Mission Garden of Memories Cemetery in Clovis, that had fallen into disrepair over the years.

Recently, Virgil Reed, who owns the building housing Barb's Cafe in Farwell, began renovating the 72-year-old, 10'x14' structure.

Folks wanting to help with the mausoleum restoration can send money to its fund at the Citizens Bank, Box 1629, Clovis, NM 88102.

Mansfield died in 1945 at age 62 in a hospital in Wichita Falls. At his funeral was his widow, "Bess" Mansfield and his other daughter, Reuel Reeves, of Cleveland.

Bess, Mansfield's second wife, continued to live in Farwell. She worked at the Southern Union Gas

Co. office in Farwell, and also for Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace.

She died in 1976 and is buried in Farwell Cemetery.



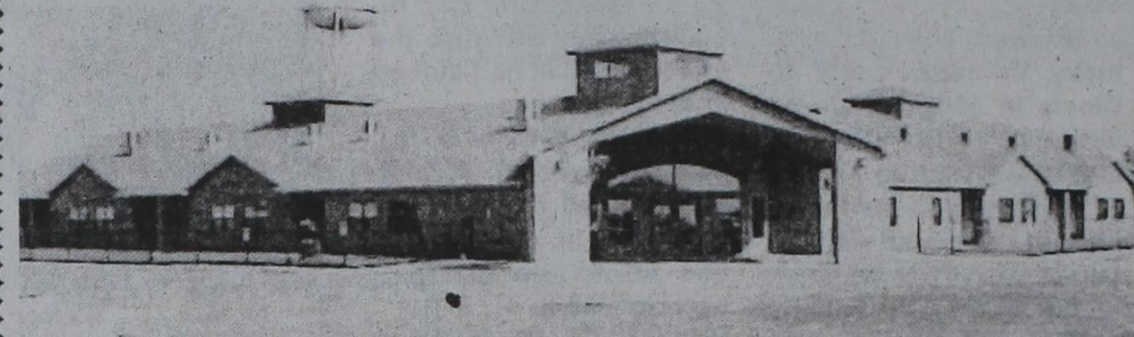

My family and I recently went camping and fishing at Red River, New Mexico. The scenery was awesome, the weather wonderful and the smells and sounds of the river and cool mountain wilderness were most relaxing.

The "relaxing" part was much needed after all the hard work you have to do in order to put up an appropriate camp site.

"No, we're just going up the road to the Fish-N-Sticks campground," we answered.

"Oh," she replied blushing. "I usually just take a backpack."

We enjoy the great outdoors and the so-called "getting back to nature." However, the one wilderness feature that we could all do without are the porta-potties, one-holers...the outhouses.

Call us spoiled, but we do like modern plumbing. In all reality, the modern one-holers that the National Parks provide at campsites are clean and well kept. After this last camping excursion, I came to the conclusion that, if all businesses would go back to the outhouse restroom, corporate productivity would increase two-fold. No more lengthy bathroom breaks.

Do you think this measure would fail politically?

Not having easy access to warm, running water and modern conveniences tends to make one think about how spoiled and fortunate we are.

And talk about spoiled...let me tell you about the horses that we rented for a two-hour trail

ride through the mining area of Red River.

The wrangler sized up our small group. A family of true city slickers from Ft. Worth and us.

This was on day three of our camping trip. We had spit washed in a bucket with river water and quickly washed our hair. I don't think we got the soap rinsed from our hair too well because the flies were gathering. Of course it could have also been that, one of us, was unknowingly standing in a pile of horse apples.

Who could tell? After three days of no shower and campfire smoke who could smell anything different?

We looked pretty crusty and "broke-in" to the wrangler. We were given these horses in this order: Reno - because it was a gamble for what kind of mood he was in; Cassidy - named after Hopalong Cassidy, a little slow in the head, but with lots of energy, "spit and cuss"; and finally, my horse - Custer.

Custer was huge and had to always go at the end of the group. He would otherwise take-off and try to get back to the good water and oats at the stables. He towered over me. I'm 5 ft. 3 1/4 inches (and don't forget the quarter!). I could stand in the shade of this horse and never see daylight.

We were prepared for how dusty the ride would be and had covered our clothes with jackets. However, our faces were sandblasted by dust and our sunshades made interesting shapes on our dusty faces. Following this two-hour tour, we truly looked crusty, but smelled a bit better after being so windblown.

As we made our way back to our campsite, I realized that we needed a few groceries for the evening meal. I didn't even think about what we looked like as we walked into the grocery store.

The groceries we needed were one package of hot dog wieners, 10 cans of Vienna sausages

(for our dog...all he would eat at the time) and a twelve-pack of bottled water.

The dirt, the grime, the hair and fingernails must have been a shocking site. Pair this with our strange food purchase and perhaps the remarks made by the cashier will paint the picture for you:

"And how are you folks today? Oh my, back from a mission trip to like a third world country?" she stammered.

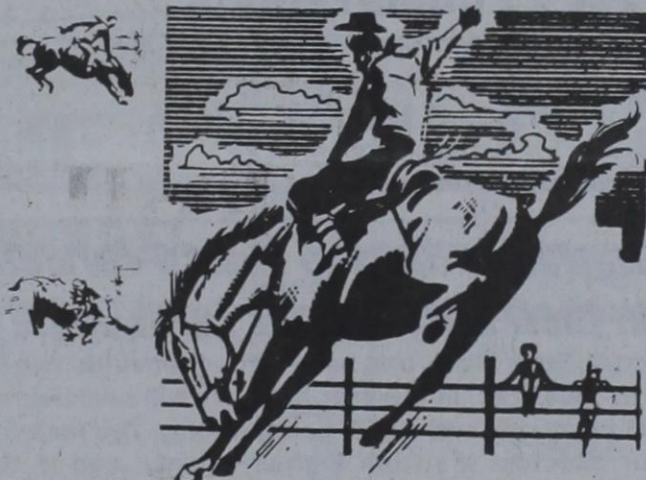

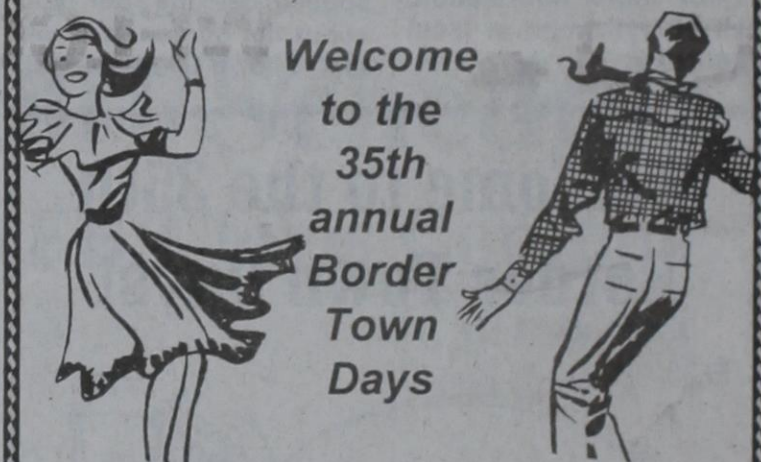

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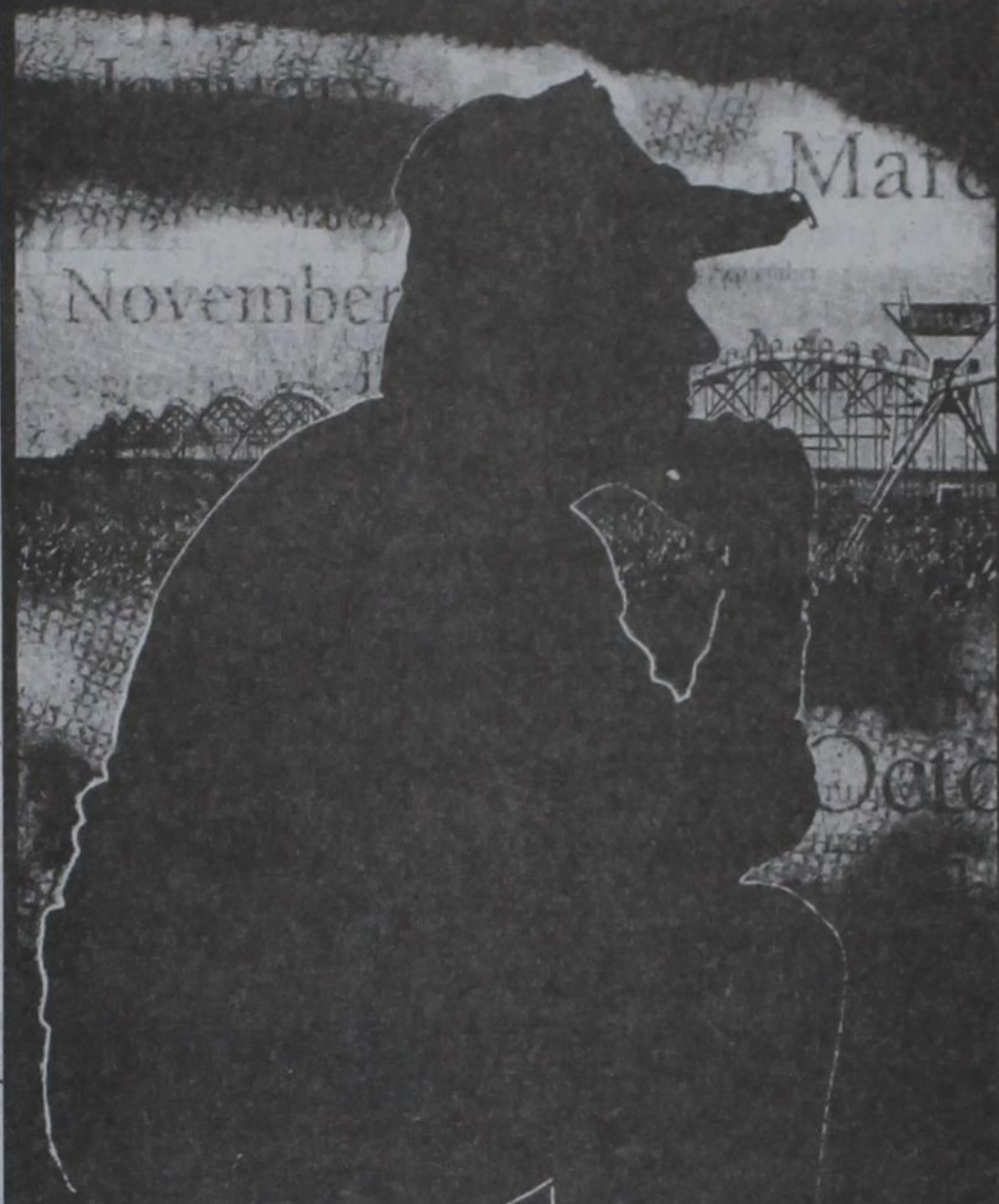

EPCOG pulls out of managing planned Texico apartment project

Texico councilman Oran Jay Autrey announced at Tuesday's City Council meeting that Eastern Plains Council of Governments (EPCOG) has backed out of managing the proposed apartment complex on the Burrows property.

It was said that the federal government has pulled away some money, causing it. Autrey said developer Jonathon Reed plans to find a manager for the project, which is a "go."

The council will ask Reed to attend a council meeting and discuss the change. One of the reasons that the council felt comfortable with the proposed development was knowing that EPCOG would manage it.

Also, at the previous council meeting, EPCOG had asked Texico to pay \$4,000 for a market study for the project. Although many folks have applied for the apartments, the government requires such a study. Autrey reported that he has found that the study already had been paid for but "someone was trying to pass (the cost) on to us."

In other business, the council:

-- Appointed Dean Henninger municipal judge. He had been acting in this capacity after being named by Rick Queener, who recently resigned the post. City ordinance says that the mayor must appoint the judge, with the consent of the council.

Autrey, acting as mayor pro tem, recommended Henninger, and the vote was unanimous. Mayor Marie Christian has missed the past couple of meetings because she has been taking care of an ill brother.

-- Still waiting to hear from SPS on adding street lights.

-- Still waiting to hear from the state before moving ahead with City Hall plans.

-- Scheduled a special meeting at 5 p.m. on Aug. 14 to discuss the city's water and sewer rates. An early planned meeting on this had been cancelled.

-- Scheduled a special meeting at 4 p.m. on Aug. 14 to meet with city employees on getting their views of withholding Social Security taxes and paying for health insurance.

-- Received a request from Dardanella Helton to sweep the city's streets. This will be done.

-- Heard that the committee to look into the problem of water pressure on State Street hasn't met yet on it.

-- Plans to add language to the city's personnel policy to the effect that if a city employee has an accident in a city vehicle or while on city business, an outside agency will write up the report (especially if city police are involved in the mishap). But city police can also investi-

gate the problem if the mishap doesn't involve city police.

-- Agreed to spend about \$500 to get the city pool open again. It was closed 3 weeks ago when the wind storm knocked down the pump house. Autrey is in charge of the project of getting the pool open again. And the city plans to keep the pool open a couple of weeks after school starts.

-- Agreed to spend about \$300 to get new sprinkler heads for the system at KKR Park. It was found that some of the sprinkler heads were the wrong kind and spewing water into the streets. An exchange is planned.

-- Agreed to close City Hall the morning of July 25 so city employees can attend the funeral service for the mother of Glenda Mosier.

-- Was told that Curry County might get a youth employment grant that could involve Texico kids. The year-round project would pay up to 20 hours a week, minimum wage, and city employees must supervise the youths. This will be looked into.

-- Called an executive session (dealing with personnel) at the request of Councilman Doug Scioli before the 2001-2002 budget would be acted on.

-- Will seek bids for air conditioning the city shop building.

-- Allowed Police Chief Kelley Brophy's request to buy badges, costing about \$265, for uniform hats.

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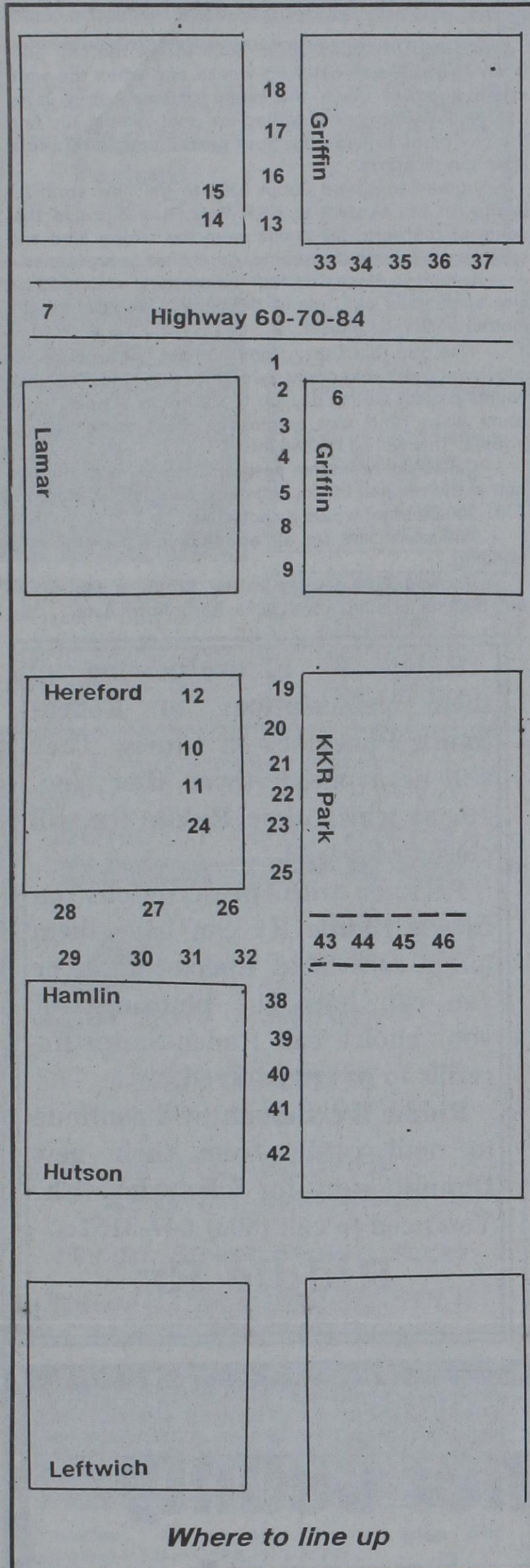

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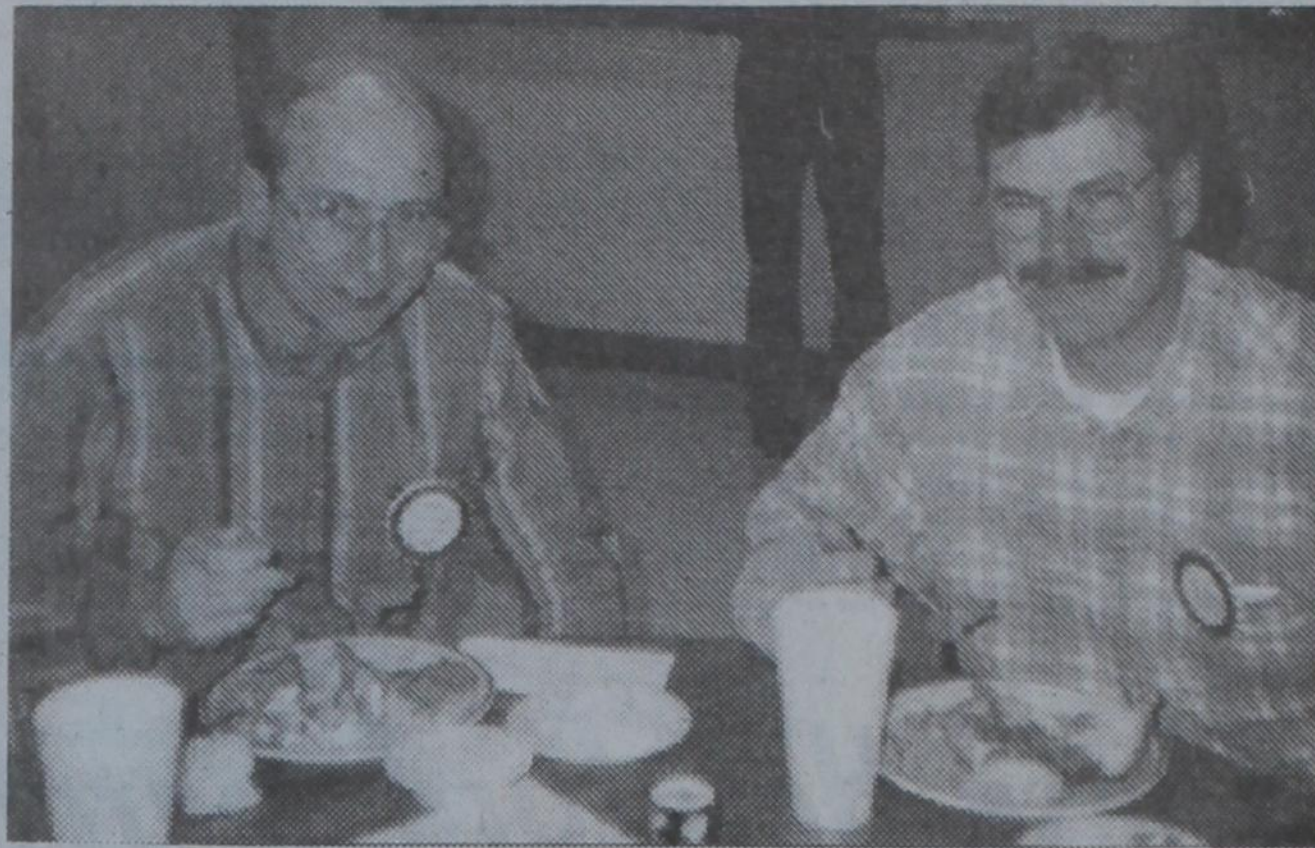

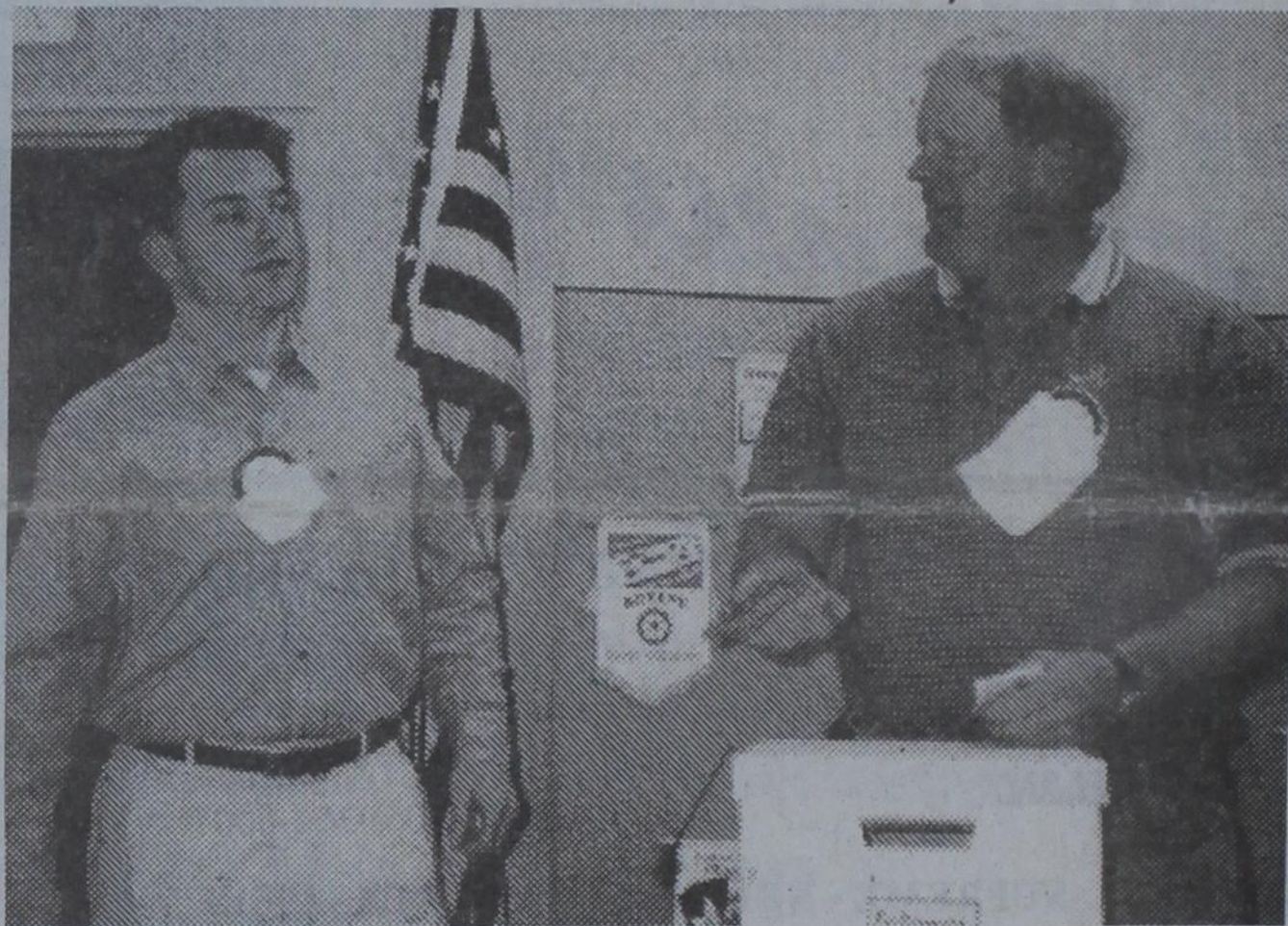

A Will Anderson adventure

(Editor's note: U.S. Naval Commander Will Anderson, son of Bob and Carrie Anderson of Farwell, periodically sends the Tribune stories and photos from his various ports of call. Currently, he is serving as an attache with the U.S. Embassy in Quito, Ecuador.)

The Sucumbios Province of Ecuador's rainforests is a pretty rough and tumble part of the world, unique in a lot of ways. Always sparsely populated, these vast expanses of rolling jungle and broad rivers are the location of Ecuador's petroleum deposits, drawing oilmen from all over the world for

years and years.

These rainforests and the few scattered oil-towns and cities remain filled with the dangers of nature, disease, snakes, caiman alligators, and a variety of venomous insects to choose from.

There are perils of man too, with bands of narcoterrorists, murderers, thieves, and various indigenous tribes roaming the rainforests. Thanks to the years that missionaries worked with these tribes, almost none of them are head-hunters anymore, which is a relief. However, a number of them are now Methodists.

It was to this rollicking part of the country that the Em-

bassy sent a team of us to gather information on daily life in Sucumbios. (which beside oil rigs, seems to pretty much revolve around gunfights, bombings, and kidnappings.)

Its oil-towns are like something out of a novel of the Old West, particularly its capital city of Nuevo Loja (which the Texas oilmen in this part of the world prefer to call "Lago Agrio" because it is said to resemble that Texas community.) And every time we go there, we eat at a very special restaurant, special for more reasons than I thought!

The name of the restaurant if "La Piragu," which can be translated in this part of the world as the canoe, the snow-

cone, or the prostitute, depending on the crowd you keep. It sits on the main drag in Lago Agrio (which is nowhere near as pretty as Main in Clovis, I tell you what) and there is nothing particularly noticeable about it from the outside.

But when you go in, the aromas are marvelous and across the concrete floor skitters a collection of exotic creatures (some of which are on the menu). La Piragu is a friendly kind of place which enjoys a varied and loyal clientele so customers don't even have to check their firearms at the door.

Outside the open arches, the street is noisy a wile collection of people, motorcycles, jeeps, and oil trucks, all engaged in something like a big dance. But inside, it is dark and relatively quiet with fans slowly stirring the air overhead.

The Proprietor recognized my Texas Aggie ballcap and boots as soon as we walked in through the door, and he immediately wanted to congratulate me that the Texan in the just-finished U.S. presidential race had been the winner.

He then proudly proclaimed that La Piragu had been the favorite restaurant in all of Ecuador of the future American president, years ago, in the days that George W. Bush was living in Lago Agrio, working for an oil company, and exploring the surrounding rainforests to establish new oil rigs.

He took us to a table that he said had been George W. Bush's customary table in the old days, and then he took us through the kitchen to choose our fresh meat right out of the pens. The selection included anaconda snake, various types of turtles, little monkeys, parrots, and other rainforest creatures that I could not identify.

La Piragu prides itself on two things, the hottest anaconda chili in the rainforest, and its deep-fried filets of capivara, which is kind of a free-range rat about the size of a small dog.

I always go for the chili, anaconda can be tasty, and the 5-alarm chili recipe they use makes it absolutely delicious. The owner assured me that this chili had been the plate that George W. Bush frequently chose as well (which indicates to me that he is clearly a man of discerning taste, I would say.)

I've tried the capivara and it's absolutely delicious too! (Please, Mom, don't be offended, you know I love it when you cook free-range rat, but La Piragu's chefs are going to be real hard to beat on this entree, I'll swear!)

Following that meal, the owner asked a favor of us, that if President Bush visits Ecuador anytime in the next few years, to please remind him of La Piragu and invite him to come back to "his favorite restaurant."

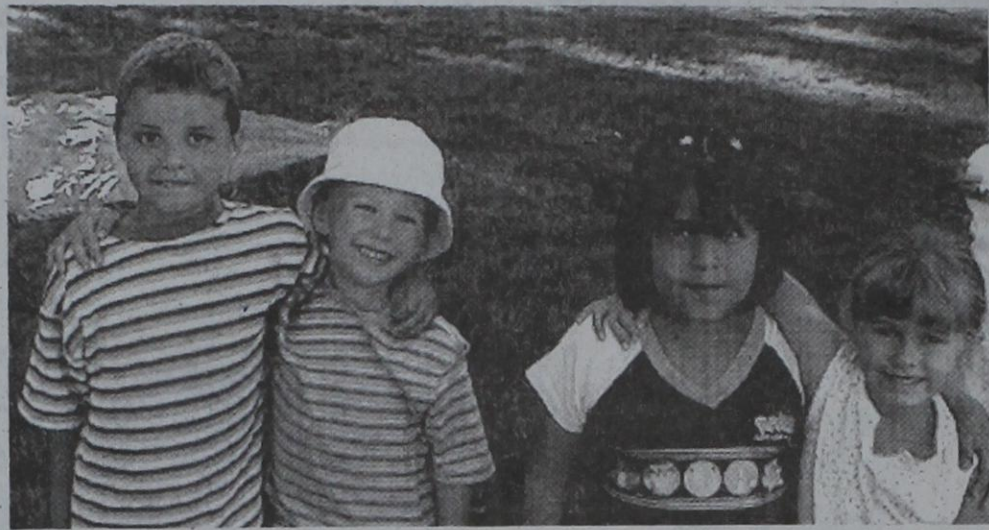
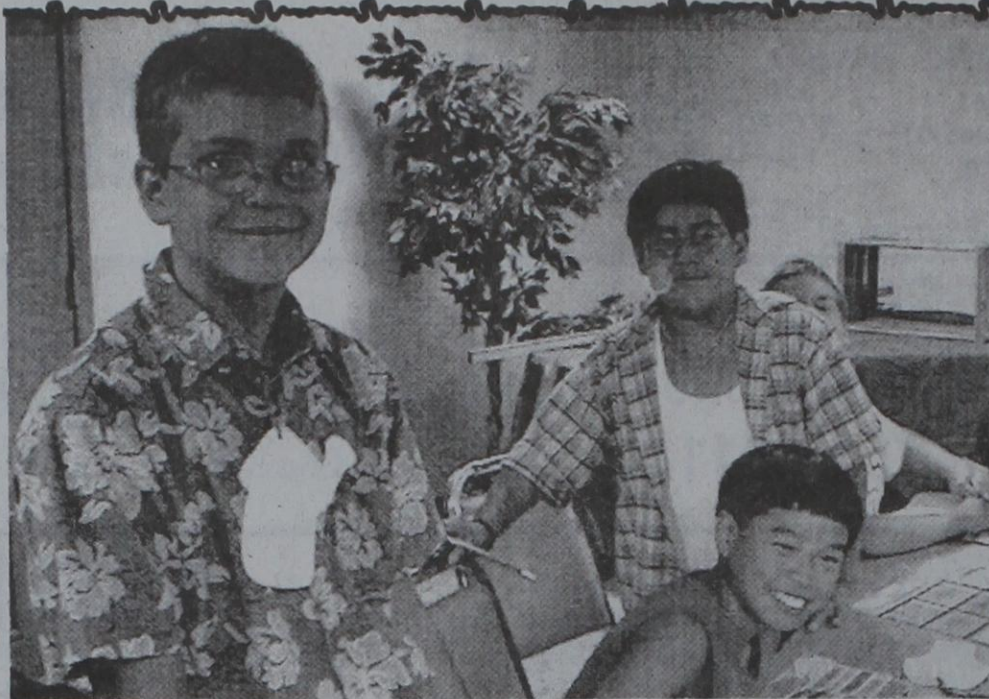
Special guests were Mildred Geherls and Jim Bowman, who were the couple's maid of honor and best man 50 years ago.

Remember back when....



The 100 block of Avenue A in Farwell ... circa 1940

This historical photo of the 100 block of Main Street (Avenue A) in Farwell was taken about 1940. Its negative was found in the basement of the State Line Tribune along with many others by local historian J.R. Ivins.

With help from Bob Anderson, here is what Dr. Ivins says of this photo:

The building shown stood between the post office (now Dickie Magness' art shop) and the theater (now empty, and adjacent to Lee Hutchins Electric).

C.G. Davis Mercantile was owned by Carl Davis, who died in 1994. He moved his business from this building to the new Piggly Wiggly at Ave. A and Third Street in 1951. After the business moved, the mercantile building became a hardware store run by Mr. Sproul, father of Pat Owen.

The smaller store shown, the C.G. Davis Hardware and Appliances, later became the Midget Cafe, run by Floyd Trantham Sr.

The small storefront at far left was the law office of Ernest Lokey. His wife was the postmaster, and the post office was adjacent to this building at that time. Her name was Norma Lokey and they lived at 600 3rd St.

Norma died in Vernon, Texas. Their daughter was Jane Clair Overstreet, of Little Rock, Ark. Their son, Ernest, was a dentist in New Orleans.

'Sugartime' Phillips to be honored at *BTD*

Charlie "Sugartime" Phillips will be honored as Parade Marshal at Border Town Days. He is being honored for giving benefits for the past 13 years as fund-raisers for the Farwell Convalescent Center.

He will ride in the parade, chauffeured by Vonnie McIntosh, then receive a special plaque during the opening ceremonies at 1 p.m. in the gazebo in Farwell City Park.

Phillips and his band also will entertain from about 1:20 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the gazebo.

Phillips is a local legend in the music and broadcasting industry. Two years ago, he was inducted into the Panhandle Broadcasting Hall of Fame.

He became famous for writing and recording the No. 1 hit of 1958 -- "Sugartime." His original version was recorded at the Norman Petty Studios in Clovis. Buddy Holly played the lead guitar on that recording.

It hit the top of the country and western charts, but the McGuire Sisters' pop cover gave it worldwide recognition. An HBO movie, called "Sugartime", was released in 1995, and was about the life of Phyllis McGuire, the youngest of the McGuire Sisters singing group. The movie was named after the song title.

Phillips was still attending Farwell High School when he wrote "Sugartime." Since then, he has recorded a number of country and western hits. In the 1960s, every record he made was on the national charts.

He has performed at the Grand Ole Opry and toured the country with singers like Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Brenda Lee, Jim Reeves and Marty Robbins.



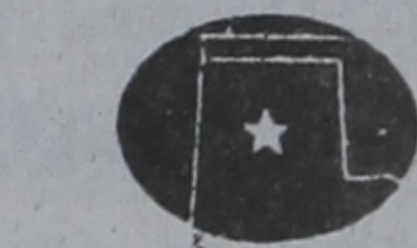
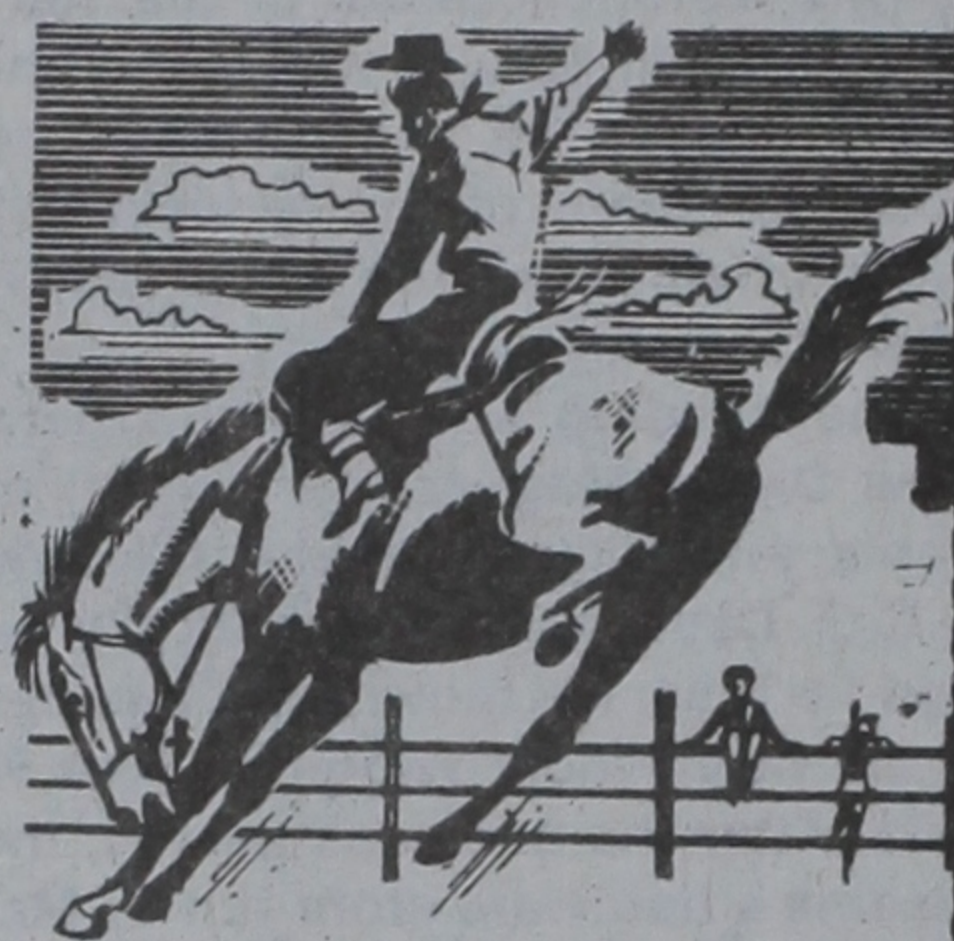
