On June 27, a meeting was held at the Parmer County courthouse that included Bobbye Hill, of Wheeler, Texas, an attorney hired by the county to honcho the redistricting; County Judge Bonnie Clayton; County Commissioners Raymond McGehee, Kirk Frye, Ed Corn and Tom Ware, and redistricting committee members and others -- Richard Carpenter, Joe Santellano, Jim Roy Daniel, Elizabeth McLellan, Leon Schilling, Lois Norwood, Ben Rejino Jr., Nancy Edelman, Esther Steelman, Kay Wil-

Mrs. Hill explained the redistricting process and here is what appears will happen and why:

The county's four precincts need to be redistricted due to the 2000 census and the Voting Rights Act. The census showed Pct. 1 (Frye) losing 70 persons; Pct. 2 (Bovina) gaining 226; Pct. 3 (Corn) losing 22; and Pct. 4 (McGehee) losing 134.

A formula is then used to calculate the deviation between the four precinct populations. If it's more than 10 percent, then the rule of thumb is that redistricting must be done in order to get U.S. Department of Justice approval, explained Mrs. Hill. Parmer County's deviation

was 14.38 percent. Justice Department approval is needed for nine states -- Arizona, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia. This is due to the Voting Rights Act and the Civil Rights

Division that oversees minority voting. Taken into account are federal guidelines that mandate that at least one precinct in Parmer County contain a majority of minority (Hispanic) voters. For the past decade this has been Pct. 4 -- the Lazbuddie area pre-

cinct. This will continue. Since the census showed 10,016 county residents, the "ideal" population for each precinct would be 2,504. But the current populations are:

Pct. 1 -- 2,434.

Pct. 2 -- 2,730.

Pct. 3 -- 2,482.

Pct. 4 -- 2,370.

Thus, it's obvious that the Pct. 2 total must go down and the Pct. 4 and Pct. 1 totals go up. The easiest way to achieve this is to change the precinct boundaries within

There is a second reason to make the changes in Friona, which obviously has a heavier population than the rural areas.

The commissioners want to keep the totals of their roads on a close basis because precincts get tax money based on how much mileage their roads have. Thus, changes within Friona won't affect the road totals as much as if lines were redrawn in rural areas.

During the discussion on how to redraw the Friona map, it was noted that part of the west side of Friona which is in Pct. 2 probably will be put into Pct. 3, and Pct. 4 which also enters into Friona will move even fur-

ther into the city. As a sidenote to the redistricting, Corn said that what also may happen to help equalize mileage in each of the four precincts is for Pct. 303 (which votes at Ridgelea School in Bovina) be moved from Corn's precinct (Pct. 3) into Ware's precinct (Pct. 2).

In looking at the precinct map, Mrs. Hill said it's very likely that Pct. 3 will "pretty much stay the way it is."

Also discussed was the redistricting for the three Justices of the Peace, located in Bovina, Friona and Farwell. This redistricting, if done at all, is not covered by the Voting Rights Act and is completely up to the county commissioners to do, or leave alone. Thus, lines can be drawn without taking into account minority voters. And these lines can be redrawn at any time.

Mrs. Hill noted that the state believes that if there are under 50 registered voters in a precinct, it should be closed. The rationale for this includes that if only a couple of people vote, then their ballots are not really that secret since you can figure out who they voted for. Also, the cost involved in keeping a polling place open for just a few voters was noted. On the other hand, if closing a polling place makes it difficult for voters to go to another polling place (say, 20 miles further away), then it may be best to keep it open.

Parmer County has two small polling places:

Pct. 203, which votes at the Rhea Community Center. In last year's general election, there were 64 registered

voters, with 42 actually voting.

Pct. 303, Ridgelea School in Bovina, had 66 registered voters and 37 actual voters in the 2000 general election.

The county commissioners may take a look at whether to keep these two polling places open, and if closing them would create a hardship for voters.

The next steps are to have a mapper come to Parmer County to help the commissioners make their decisions, and also to meet again with the county advisory committee, which has as its purpose "to advise."

The factors to consider when redistricting are: equality in population, equality in area, equality in road mileage, availability of accessible and appropriate voting places, boundaries of incorporated areas, compactness, geography, and sudden increases in population.

And it is essential that the redistricting comply with the Voting Rights Act so that the Justice Department willapprove it. If the feds don't okay the county's redistricting, then the Justice Department would file suit --

and a judge likely would make the final determination. When the county redistricts, the No. 1 goal is to take into account the Hispanic population, said Mrs. Hill. The redistricting process needs to be completed at least three months before the 2002 primary election in

Texas. Mrs. Hill hopes to wrap up the process in Parmer

CORN: Prices were higher off the USDA Acreage Report, but failed to hold their gains. Still concerns about large crop in the Mid West. China is dropping their estimated corn yields over 30 mmt. Which may have some impact later in the year. Pollination is just around the corner.

WHEAT: Prices are under harvest hedging pressure and some analysts believe that once harvest is over 50% complete, there will be some improvement. Normally, small crops do get somewhat larger as we get into harvest, but so far, prices have taken much of this into account.

SOYBEANS: Demand remains strong and USDA estimates reduced planted acres over 1 million acres. This shot prices up over 25 cents on the open Friday and held up into the close. Demand for crush is expected to hold prices strong into the last quarter.

LIVE CATTLE: Cash cattle prices should be getting close to a summer low? Odds are good that the Futures prices have already seen their lows. August Live Cattle have fairly good support around from \$73.00 73.50. Very strong tendency to rally after 4th of July into early August.




