Proposition 17 -- Allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. It applies to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state giving clear title to the land was
ever issued.
Proposition 18 -- Create a program to consolidate and
standardize the collection, deposit, reporting and pay standardize the collection, deposit,
ment of criminal and civil court fees.
Proposition 19 -- Allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to $\$ 2$ billion of additional general obligation bonds to pay for water projects. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the board can issue.
