### Higher vehicle inspection fee put on hold

Last summer, the Tribune published articles about the Texas legislature approving a bill that will increase first-inspection fees on out-of-state vehicles from \$1 to \$225.

This was to go into effect on Nov. 1.

But the Texas Department of Public Safety has notified counties that on Oct. 4, Judge Livingston, of the Travis County District Court, issued a court order temporarily halting implementation of the \$225 fee.

This means that vehicle inspection facilities will continue to issue a "Green Sheet" to out of state vehicle owners after the vehicle passes the inspection, and is issued an inspection certificate. The inspection facility may charge a fee of \$1 for this service.

This will be in effect until the court makes a final decision on the new law.

The Texas Automobile Dealers Association had filed an injunction on Aug. 15 to block initiation of the \$225 fee. TADA is basing its suit on how it gives preferential treatment, and inhibits interstate commerce.

### Lazbuddie robotics team captures regional contest

For the fourth consecutive year, the Lazbuddie robotics team took the first place "Best Team" honors at regional competition in Lubbock on Saturday. Lazbuddie now heads to the state contest at Texas A&M University Nov. 15-17.

There was tougher competition for Lazbuddie this year, as 25 teams entered the regional, with 16 competing in the "Best Team" category. In second place behind Lazbuddie was Lubbock High School, reported team sponsor Debbie Weir, the driving force behind Lazbuddie's ongoing success.

To compete for the "Best Team", a team must have active participation in all four contest categories: a project summary notebook, an oral presentation including a power point presentation and explanation of the engineering process, a table exhibit and interviews, and a spirit and sportsmanship review.

Team members are Tobin Redwine, Trevor Gartin, Cody Meiwes, Eric Magby, Jeffrey Phillips, Andy Martin, Dustin Bartlett, Shannon Redwine, Jake Loudder, Kelsey Jones, Jodie Coker, Kayla Kimbrough, Katy Loudder, Kayla Parham, Savannah Black, Triston Thorn, Brittany Brakebill, Robby Martin, Jay Seaton, Trey Nickels, Steven Juarez and Mat Goe.

Members of the oral presentation team are: seniors Savannah Black, Jodie Coker, Jeffrey Phillips; junior Tobin Redwine; sophomore Robby Martin; freshman Kayla Parham; 5th grader Jacob Schacher, and 4th grader Kayle Jesko.

The 4th and 5th graders work on designing and engineering a robot project every year in conjunction with the high school project. The team has a speaker from the 4th and 5th graders help the oral presentation team show school promotion in several grades. Lazbuddie had several grades represented, which was a criteria for extra points.

The 50 top placing teams, from at least eight states, head to the championship at College Station.

How does the contest work? Each school team gets an identical box of odd parts and materials and a radio controller for motors. Thus, they build their robot with those parts. In the contest, each team gets a detailed game task description.

### It's voting time

Parmer County voters head to the polls on Nov. 6 for the constitutional amendment election.

Here are the precinct polling places:

Here's a synopsis of the propositions to be voted on:  
Proposition 1 -- Involves relinquishing the state's claim to some disputed land in Bastrop County.

Proposition 2 -- For issuing \$175 million of state obligation bonds to help counties with access road projects to serve border colonias (economically distressed geographic areas with inadequate public services).

Proposition 3 -- Exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes to help them become an exchange port for the New York Board of Trade.

Proposition 4 -- Set the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years.

Proposition 5 -- Allow a municipality to donate outdated or surplus equipment used in fighting fires to an underdeveloped country.

Proposition 6 -- Requires the governor to call a special session of the legislature so it can appoint presidential electors if the governor determines that an election for president is so tight that the regular electors cannot be picked in the time determined by federal law for the electors to cast their votes.

Proposition 7 -- Allow the Veterans Land Board to sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance more home mortgage loans to veterans. And it would allow the Land Board to create, operate and improve veterans' cemeteries with its assets.

Proposition 8 -- Authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds to pay for construction and repair projects by more than a dozen state agencies, including the De-

partment of Agriculture, Department of Health and Department of Criminal Justice.

Proposition 9 -- Allow the legislature, without an election, to fill a vacancy in the legislature. Currently, a special election must be held even if there is only one qualified candidate.

Proposition 10 -- Exempt certain items from property taxes if the items are warehoused in one part of Texas, then forwarded to another site.

Proposition 11 -- Allow certain state employees, such as teachers and retired teachers, plus school administrators, to get paid for serving on governing bodies such as school boards, city councils, water districts, etc.

Proposition 12 -- Amend, repeal or relocate several sections of the state constitution to improve its clarity, organization and clarity.

Proposition 13 -- Allow a school board to donate property and improvements to preserve that property even though it's no longer needed for the school district (helps with historical areas).

Proposition 14 -- Allow a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxes as long as the travel trailers are registered with the state and not used for income.

Proposition 15 -- Create the Texas Mobility Fund to finance more state highways. It would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission.

Proposition 16 -- Reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days.

Proposition 17 -- Allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. It applies to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state giving clear title to the land was ever issued.

Proposition 18 -- Create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting and payment of criminal and civil court fees.

Proposition 19 -- Allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds to pay for water projects. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the board can issue.

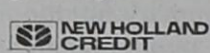

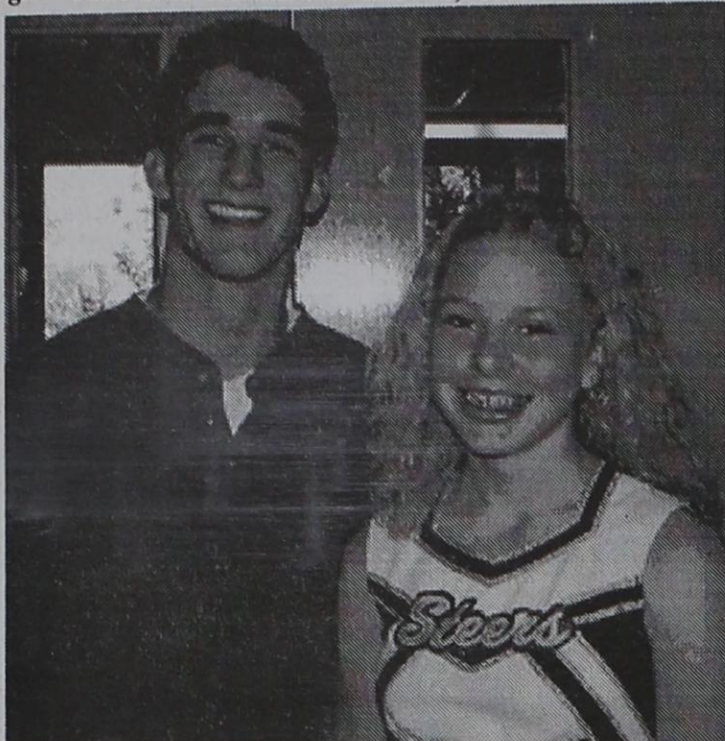

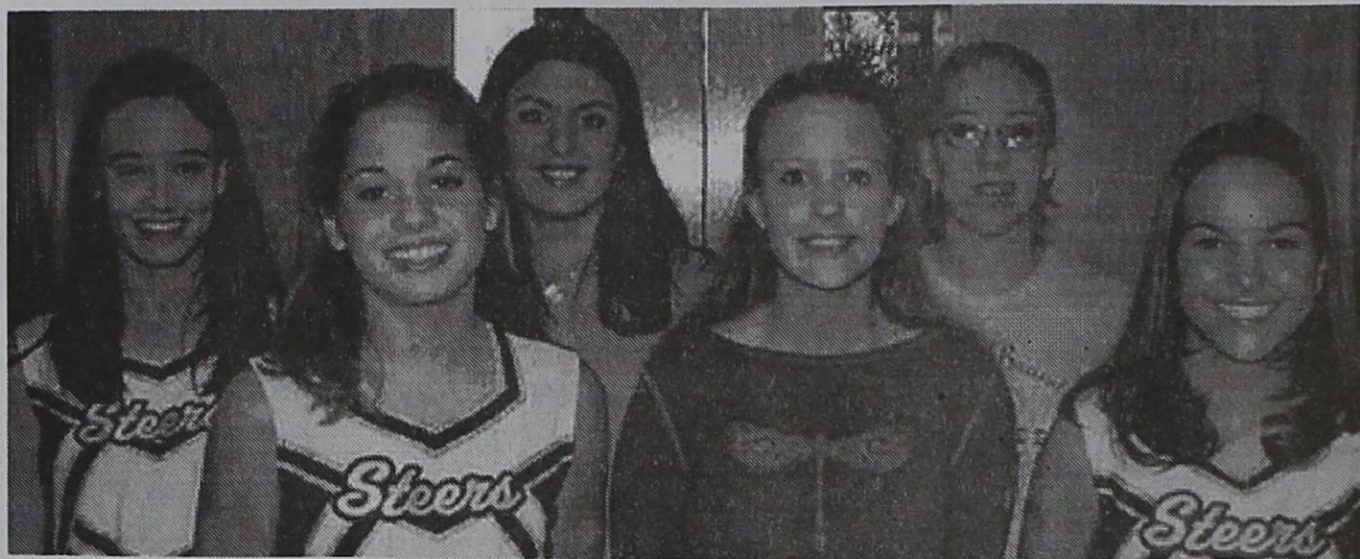
Farwell Scholastic Book Fair chairperson Cindy Littlejohn said the fair was a great success, and credited it to the parents, school support and volunteer aid.

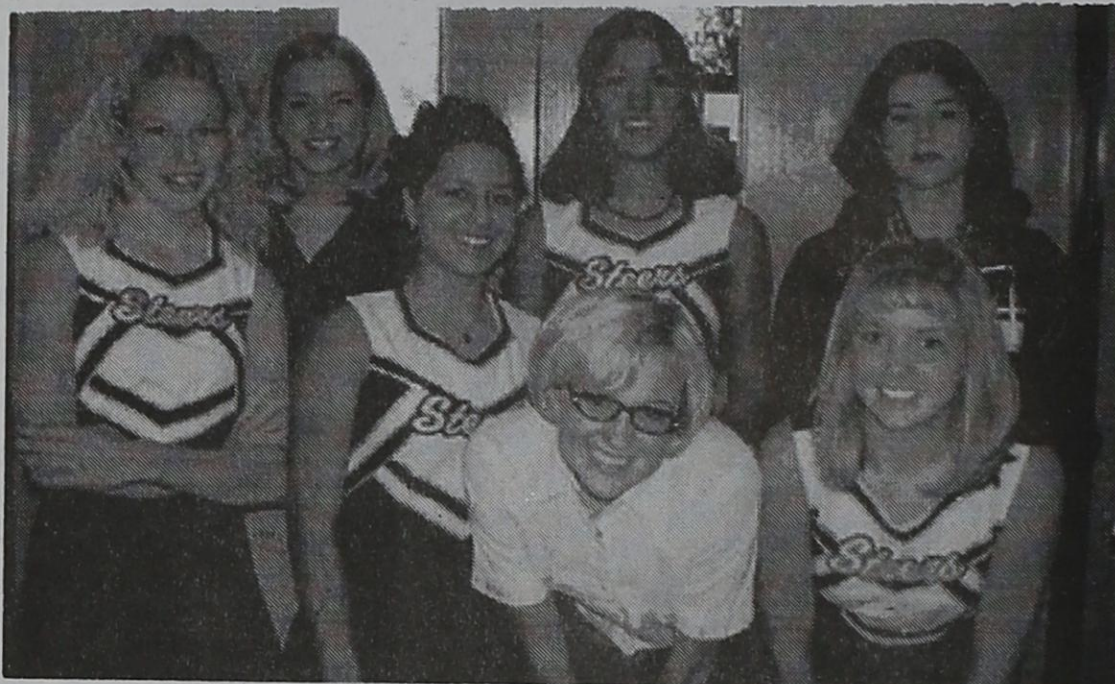

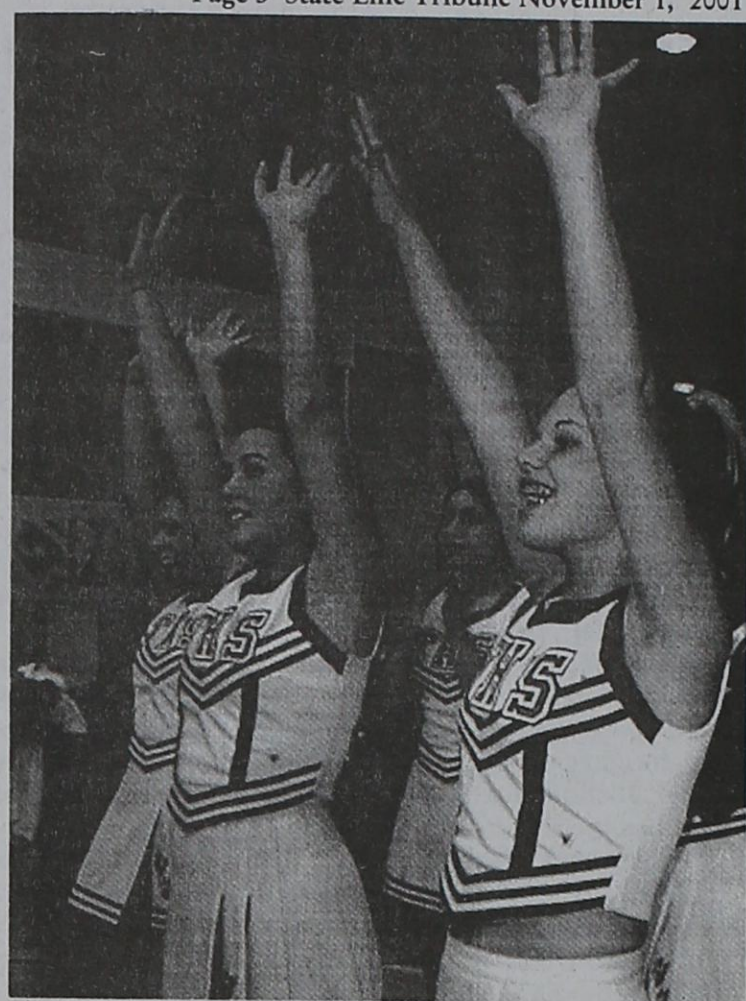

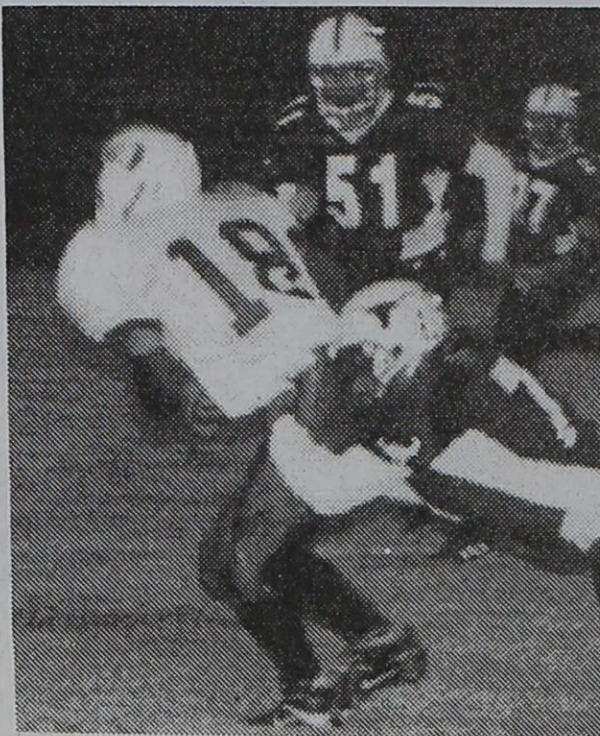

Students from Lazbuddie Junior High's gifted and talented program learned something about 'Our Archeological Heritage' recently in a workshop at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon, Texas.

Assisted by museum personnel, students "worked a grid" employing the methods archeologists would use on a dig site to locate and identify artifacts. Students then went to the Alternative Energy Institute at WTAMU where they saw the Renewable Energy Demonstration Project. The group saw working examples of solar energy panels, solar hot water collectors and windmills. They were able to see the various components of the type of windmills currently constructed and used in power plants today.

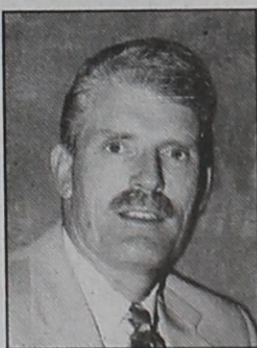

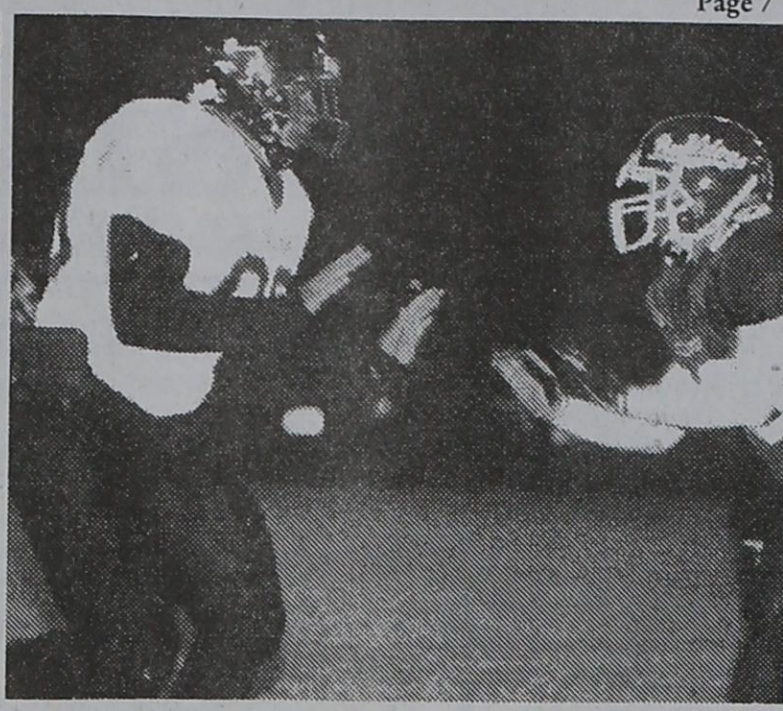

The Texico Wolverines, ranked No. 3 in the state, put away the Jal Panthers, 14-6, at home last Friday.

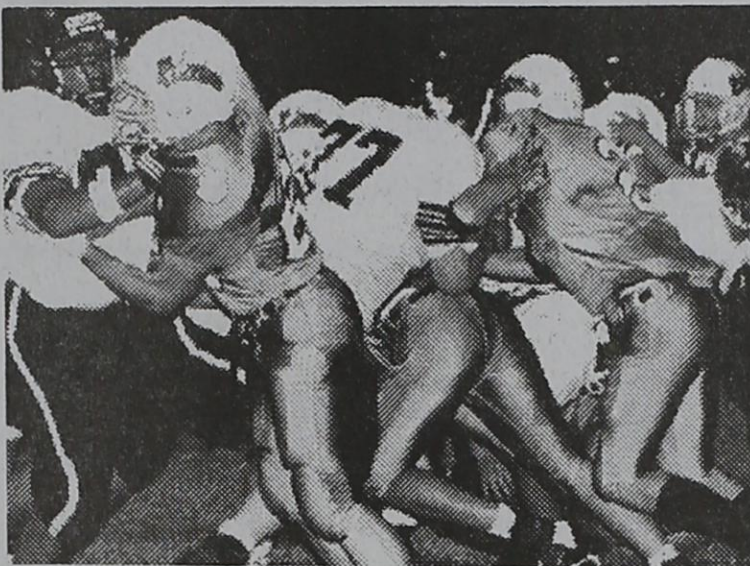


