Jake Loudder and Savannah Black were named Athletes of the Year at the Lazbuddie School athletic banquet on Saturday in the school cafeteria.







Farwell Water Supt. Dee Hammit warns folks that heavy water usage means high bills.

Last year, Farwell increased its water fees.

Hammit said, for example, that if you use 49,000 gallons of water in a month, it will cost you \$87 -- plus sewer and trash pickup fees.

"And we're reading a lot of meters that have hit the 50,000 gallon mark," he added.

So he warns folks that unless they watch their water usage, they better get ready for some high bills.

**Repair loans** available

Federal funds are available for USDA Rural Development's Section 504 Repair Loan and Grant program.



Alas, that's not usually


area. That's when I found that many government folks only cared about No. 1 (themselves) and didn't give a hoot or holler about folks in the rest of the country.





Before being shipped back, the books can be reviewed by seniors in the library on May 24.


