

Area farmers and ranchers have been waiting and watching for finalization of the Farm Bill.

At last, it seems to be coming together with a framework that gives overall support to the national farming infrastructure and national food security.

An announcement was made last Friday that the bill was virtually complete and that the six-year bill was being sent to the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate for approval. The next step will be to the President for his signature into law.

The House and Senate Farm Bill conference committee had been working very hard to frame a bill that supported all crops, commodities and producers across the board. It appears that the bill has done away with many of the more onerous provisions contained in the Senate bill and reestablishes a safety net for U.S. Agriculture that has been missing for a very long time.

Area farmers seem to be pleased with the Farm Bill and what it defines.

Mark Williams, of Farwell, was glad to see it finally passed. He feels that Texas farmers in particular and U.S. farmers as a whole owe a lot to Chairman Larry

Combest R-Texas. "I feel that he was in the right place at the right time to do the best for us," Mark stated.

Mark was also quick to point out that he feels there has been some confusion among farmers over the issue of payment limitations.

"The wording was a little unclear, but the bill actually added a counter-cyclical payment that takes place of emergency payments that were the norm over the last several years," he commented. "This bill definitely gives a much better safety net which had been severely lacking in years past.

Another point that all farmers in the region are glad for is the considerable amount of money being put towards conservation efforts.

"This aspect of the bill will be of added benefit to this area and people here will see results from the conservation efforts," Mark said.

Mark commented on the status of the farming yields in this area. He explained that this bill will favor farmers in this region because of how, most, have increased their yields over the last 15 years. This is due to the fact of the bill providing producers the option to update base acreage and payment yields.

"Farmers around here have increased their cotton and corn yields and will definitely see more benefit from this bill," Mark stated.

Vick Christian is another large operation farmer that feels area farmers will come out fairly well with the new

"The three-entity rule being retained sure helps us all," he said. "And the fact that it has kept the marketing loan, the LDP, let's us compete with other countries

when the value of the dollar is up." The issue of the Loan Deficiency Payments and a rumored "deal" to have a national dairy counter-cyclical program that will provide a monthly payment to dairy farmers equal to 45 percent of the positive difference between \$16.94 and the Boston Class I price has area

dairy farmers in discussion. Art Schaap, a large dairy owner/operator and crop farmer with operations in both Texas and New Mexico feels that the new Farm Bill sounds relatively good on paper, but in actuality, is of detriment to dairy farms in this region.

"The new bill appears to help the dairy industry in the ways of loan structures and price floors and supports. But it actually hinders growth of dairy farms in this region, because the supports are structured to pay for a limited number of cows." Art stated. "This may be well and fine for the Northeastern and Eastern producers, but it doesn't help the larger operations in the Southwest."

Farmers shipping 2.4 million pounds of milk per year, or less, will qualify for 100 percent of the payment outlined in the bill.

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Texas, whose district includes Parmer County, was pleased with the finalized version of the Farm Bill. He chaired the House and Senate Farm Bill conference committee and was instrumen-

tal in getting the bill done. The six-year bill will be sent to the House and Senate for approval, then to the president to be signed into law.

He said the major provisions that will be beneficial for Panhandle farmers and ranchers include:


-- Eliminating Senate payment limitations that discriminated against area farmers.

-- Commodity target prices that provide long-term stability for farmers and lenders to finance their opera-

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices basically traded down the limit early Thursday and traded up the \$1.50 limit by the end of the day. This is very unusual, but the most recent decline has been a little on the unusual side as well? Either way, long term indicators are trying to bottom. Short term trends have confirmed a bottom for the first time since turning down in early April. Still needs work.


FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders also experienced the same situation on Thursday as did the Live Cattle. Prices saw significant improvements in just the last couple of days. Resistance levels overhead may stop prices over the short term and correct back down. Once a correction is out of the way and prices prove they can hold, then higher prices into the July/August time frame are expected.

CORN: This market remains directionless with fundamentals basically status quo. Exports remain in good shape, weather was of some concern, but plantings were last reported to be running just a little ahead of a 5 year average. Acres may be a problem as trend line yields could pressure the market even more? Any change in weather over the next 60 days could move

SOYBEANS: The July contract failed to make new highs on the last rally. Prices made it back to test old highs at \$4.83 made during late March, but failed. Short term trends are on the verge of turning back down. A close below \$4.69 would probably mean lower prices over the near term. If support at April's lows of \$4.56 hold, then there could possibly be another rally to follow into May?

WHEAT: Trends remain down as continued selling pressure has remained fairly strong. The likelihood of a rally after April is slim to none? There have been roughly 3 rallies during the May/July time frame over the last 20 years and they have all been huge, but the odds don't favor these types of moves. Either way, crop will be short this year, but will imports come in to

COTTON: Prices fell through support levels after a compromise was reached on the new Farm Bill. Analysts expect more increases in planted acres which may lead to another test of last year's lows? At this time, all trends are down although short term trends are oversold and could see a little bounce over the next few days. Nothing really positive over the near

There was a surprise edifice at Texico Schools recently, and, no, we aren't talking about the new gymnasium.


U.S. Army personnel installed a 25-ft. rock climbing wall with hydraulic beams on four climbing faces.


It's a mobile version of a simulated rock climbing surface found in many gymnasiums today.


The purpose is to foster relations between Army personnel and the public. The climbing wall is used to build confidence in an individual's abilities and sometimes to overcome a fear of heights.



-- Replacing current farm policy that lacks adequate safety net by putting the new Farm Bill in place for this crop year.

-- Making area peanut growers now eligible for commodity program benefits similar to those available to cotton and corn producers.

-- Significantly increasing the historic baseline spending for voluntary conservation programs like the Conservation Reserve Program and the Environmental Quality Incentives Program.

-- Providing producers with the option to update base acreage and payment yields.

Donald Patman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, said he is cautiously optimistic that the Farm Bill will provide relief to financially pressed farmers in Texas.

Patman, a grain, cotton and cattle producer from Waxahachie, stressed that the legislation is more about national food security than farmer assistance.

"Agriculture is supported by the government of virtually every major economic power in the world, and failure to do so here would eventually make us dependant on foreign food supplies, much as we are with oil to- Elmer day," said Patman.

The farm bill will boost payments to farmers by \$4.8 billion, preserve loan rates and re-establish the concept of target prices, in which farmers would receive a "deficiency payment" amounting to the difference between the target price and the actual market price.

The pact also contains a \$2 billion Conservation Security Program providing payments for setting certain conservation practices.

Patman said Texas agriculture was "very fortunate to have the leadership of House Agriculture Chairman Larry Combest and Ranking Member Charlie Stenholm. Their leadership was critical to getting a farm bill that will help ensure the survival of many family farmers."

In the coming months, the Farwell School Board will be taking a hard look at the 2002-2003 budget.

This is because major cutbacks are needed because of declining enrollment.

Supt. Larry Gregory told the board on Tuesday that the school district lost about 140 students in the past four years.

This has caused a budget deficit for the coming school year of more than \$250,000.

Gregory has proposed across the board cuts to make up this deficit and keep the school district "in the black."

He stressed that one area that will not be touched involves teachers' supplies and staff development. In fact, staff development will be increased.

Staff positions: Greghas proposed a \$71,600 cutback here. This is being accomplished by fewer posts.

Construction: \$98,500 will be cut. This year, a new roof was put on the elementary school; such major work is not needed in the coming year.

\$50,000 Vehicles: would be cut here. This year, a suburban and a pickup for the transportation department were purchased. No new buses are expected to be needed next year.

Natural gas and electricity: \$16,000. Since gas prices went down from last year's "spike", the school will have some money coming back (since the school pays a set amount each month -which has been higher than necessary).

Vending supplies and Clovis Community College tuition: \$10,000 cuts here. This is due to overbudgeting this year.

Athletic supplies: \$7,000. This amount was included this year due to building a pole vaulting pit, which has been done.

Custodial uniform cleaning: \$4,200. This is being eliminated.

Other areas proposed cutbacks include travel expenses, administrative discretionary funds some equipment (which was purchased this year and thus doesn't have to be budgeted Shelly, of Portales. He will begin working this summer to 4 again next year).

> Gregory emphasized that some proposed cutbacks may not be needed if the revenue picture improves. Thus, some areas cut back could be reinstated later.

One major impact on budget includes changes in how health insurance is handled.

As of Sept. 1, the school will spend \$1,800 per employee on health insurance (if the employees wish to sign up).

Farwell will get some state financial help for awhile, but within five years will have to pick up the full tab.

It was announced that on-line billing will be available in the next three to four months.

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

Nitrates are a natural by-product of cow manure and fertilizer. The EPA has set the MCL (Maximum Contaminant Level) for nitrates in drinking water at 10 mg/l.

Large-scale, industrial dairies in New Mexico are impacting our water supply.

According to NM Environment Department records:

220 mg/l nitrate + nitrite levels (22 times the drinking water standard) were recorded in a monitoring well for Queso Grande Dairy in Dexter (Roswell area) in March 2001.

200 mg/l nitrate levels were recorded in a monitoring well for McCatharn Dairy, South Albuquerque in June 2000.

Sun Valley Dairy in Berino (Las Cruces area) registered a nitrate level of 292 mg/l (almost 30 times the drinking water standard) in June 1999.

In the summer, lawn watering and other outside water uses can account for 50 to 80 percent of home water use. Studies have shown as much as 50 percent outdoor water use is wasted due to inefficient watering prac-

So efficiency is highly encouraged. For example, use native, drought-tolerant plants whenever possible. Don't water unless the plants need it. When watering, give plants a deep soaking, rather than a shallow sprinkling.








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
