Phelps makes a good point

With this being National Cooperative Month, I read a column by Tom Phelps, CEO of ENMR • Plateau Telecommunications that was very well done.

Here's what Tom had to say in the column that appeared in ENMR's October newsletter, "The Netlink":

In a sea of bankruptcies and allegations of fraudulent business practices, rural independent companies have emerged unscathed.

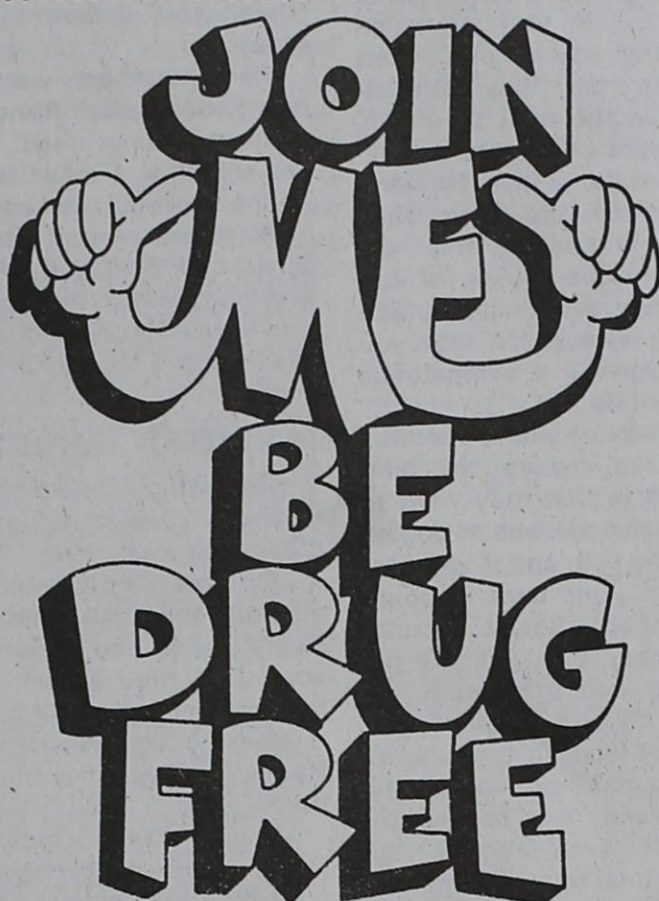
Through excellent accounting practices, internal and external audits, and sound financial advice from Board members and others, ENMR has and will continue to thrive.

Red Ribbon Week activities are scheduled at our area schools, emphasizing the need to be drug free.

While Texico School has its activities planned for next week, Farwell and Lazbuddie schools will have their special days starting Oct. 28.

Texico

Texico will be celebrating the "Drug Free Week" by sending a message to students that it is possible to have fun without using recreational drugs.

All three campuses -- elementary, junior high and high school -- will have dress-up days, called "Dressing Up for a Drug Free Land."

Those days will be:

Monday, Oct. 21 -- Wear Red Day, to kick off Red Ribbon Week.

Tuesday, Oct. 22 - Sock It to Drugs Day. Students are asked to wear mismatched socks.

Wednesday, Oct. 23 -- Team Up Against Drugs Day. Students are asked to wear their favorite team jerseys.

Thursday, Oct. 24 -- Tie One On Against Drugs. Students will wear neckties to school.

Friday, Oct. 25 -- Mighty Wolverine Day. Each student who participated in the dress-up day program will receive a small prize. This day's theme is "School pride is better than drugs."

Also on Friday, a book mark contest will be sponsored for elementary students. The winner's bookmark will be printed and distributed to the entire student body.

A poster contest will be sponsored for junior high and high school students. Winners from each school will receive prizes.

The emphasis at Texico Schools this year will be on the problems of tobacco, drinking and marijuana. The theme to fight these problems is "Knowledge Is Power." Educational videos will be available for classroom use. The school counselor, Robbie Allred, will schedule classroom presentations. And other special events are being planned.

Red Ribbon Week coordinator is Mrs. Allred.

To go along with Red Ribbon Week, will be "Helping Hands," a community service component. "People who give to others feel better about themselves. Therefore, they are more likely not to do drugs," said Mrs. Allred. "This is also a community prevention initiative. Students will help other people under tremendous life stress. If we help them in times of need, these victims are less likely to do drugs."

Along these lines:

- The junior high school will collect shampoo and toiletry articles.
- The high school will donate new or good, used towels and soap.

All the items collected will be donated to Texico churches and the Center for Domestic Violence in Clovis.

Monday, Oct. 28 -- Paint the Town Red Day. Students and teachers are to wear red and red ribbons. Students will tie red ribbons on street signs (with the mayor's permission!), stop signs, etc. And local businesses will be encouraged to have window displays in red as well.

Here are the week's events:

Monday, Oct. 28

Pre-k -- 12th grade: Red ribbons will be distributed during 1st period by the National Honor Society. In the 1st quarter, Matt Barnes recovered a fumble.


Coach Clint Conkin

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Nazareth defeats Farwell in district opener

The Nazareth Swifts showed why they are considered to have one of the most explosive offenses in Texas football when they downed the Farwell Steers in a district match last Friday here, 33-0.

The Swifts used some big plays to overcome the Steers, 0-1 in district and 2-4 overall. Farwell plays at Hart at 7:30 p.m. Friday in their second district game.

Statistically, the game was rather close. Farwell pounded the ball on the ground successfully, led by Carlos Garcia who gained over 100 yards. But 6 Farwell turnovers made the difference.

The game opened with Farwell starting at its 24. Garcia ran 4 times in a row, for gains of 6, 5, 6 and 3 yards. Farwell Coach Jacob Thompson, knowing how excellent

the Swifts' offense was, attempted to control the clock by using his running game.

Farwell's drive stalled at midfield and Lonnie McFarland boomed a 43-yard punt. On defense, Carlos Garcia had a good tackle. But Nazareth, using a shotgun formation most of the game, hit on a 75-yard TD pass at 4:34. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell got the ball back at its 27. Garcia ran for 13, then Cale Stevenson for 11. The two combined for another 19 yards as the Steers moved downfield as the first quarter ended.

Stevenson gained another 7, and Garcia 4. But Nazareth intercepted a tipped ball at its goal line. Nazareth was held and punted to its 37. Then Nazareth intercepted again, with a 63-yard TD return at 3:02. The kick was wide and it was 13-0.

Farwell started at its 34 and lost a fumble. On defense, Rowdy Mitchell had a strong tackle. Nazareth scored on a 20-yard pass, off a reverse run, at 2:00. The two-point conversion try was stopped short by a Robbie Tabb hard hit.

The 3rd quarter opened with Josh Curtis tackling the kick returner at the Swifts 33. QB hurries were made by

Gaby Garcia, Mitchell and Randy Armstrong. Zac Schilling had a tackle for a 5-yard loss, forcing a punt.

A McFarland pass to Stevenson gained 9 but Farwell lost a fumble at its 30. Nazareth scored on a 9-yard run at 6:25. The pass for extra points made it 27-0.

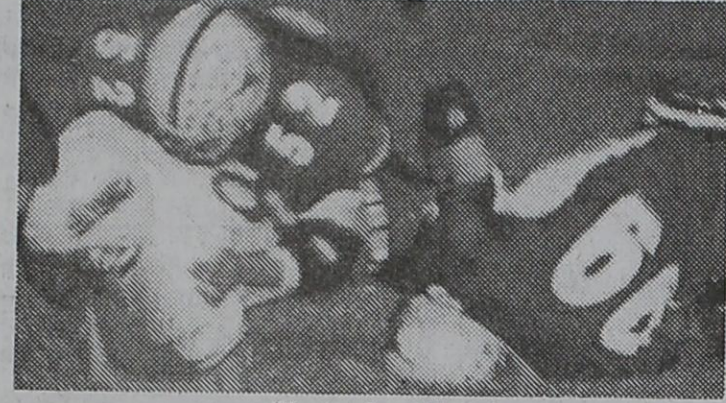
Farwell was held and punted. On defense, Curt Christian had a good tackle, as did Armstrong. Curtis had good pass defense.

On offense, passes to Schilling and Stevenson gained 22 yards. Garcia ran for 7 more. But Nazareth scored on a 93-yard pass interception at the end of the 3rd quarter. The kick was wide.

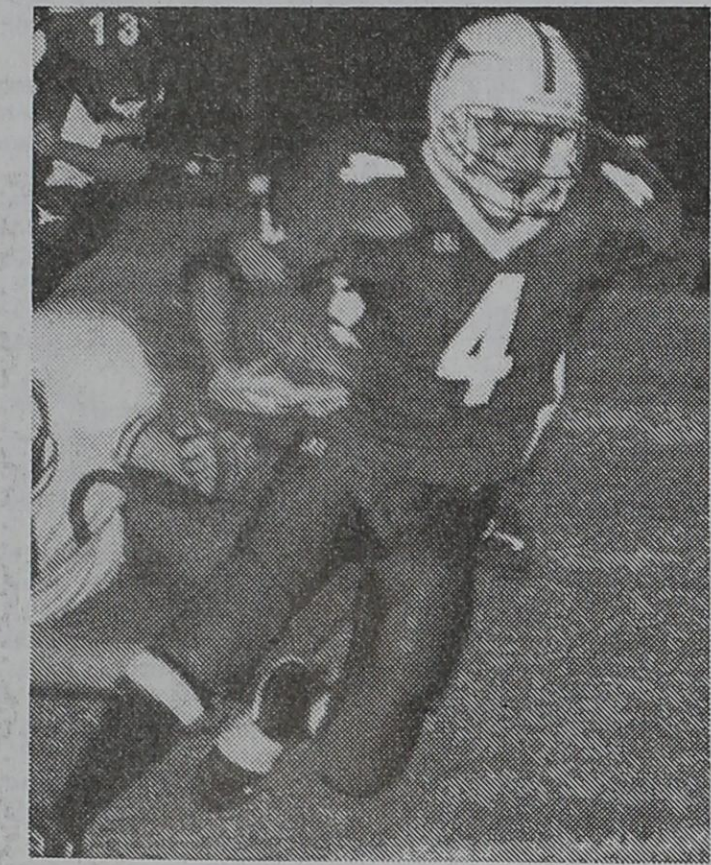

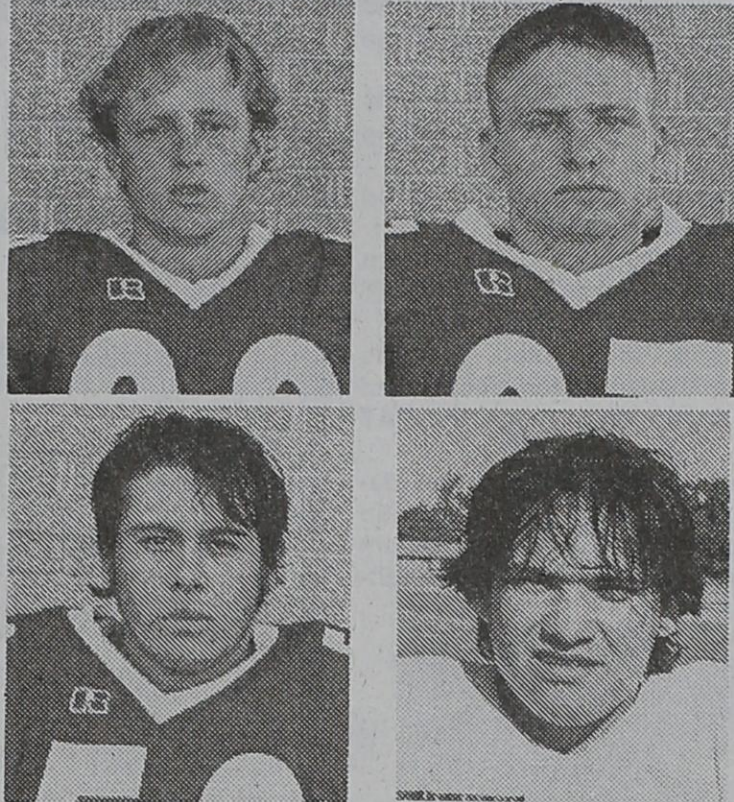

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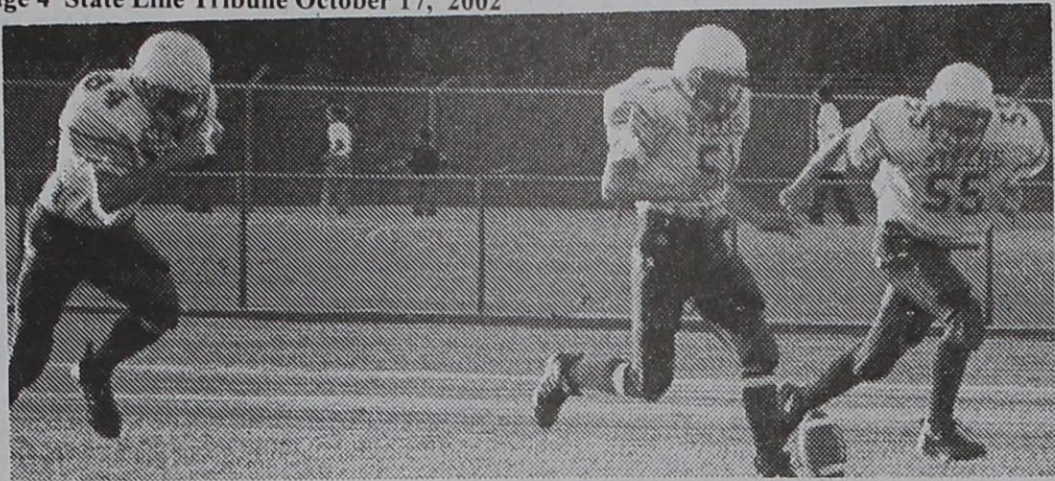

In the 2nd half, the Steers' offense came to life behind great blocking from its offensive line, exploding for three rushing TDs from 3 different running backs.

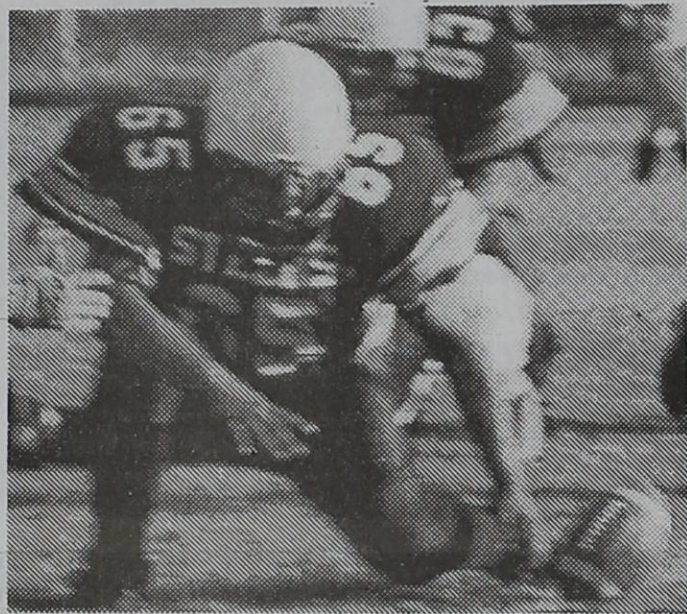
The first was a 10-yard run by Matthew Edwards. Logan McFarland added the 2-point conversion, making Farwell's lead 14-0.

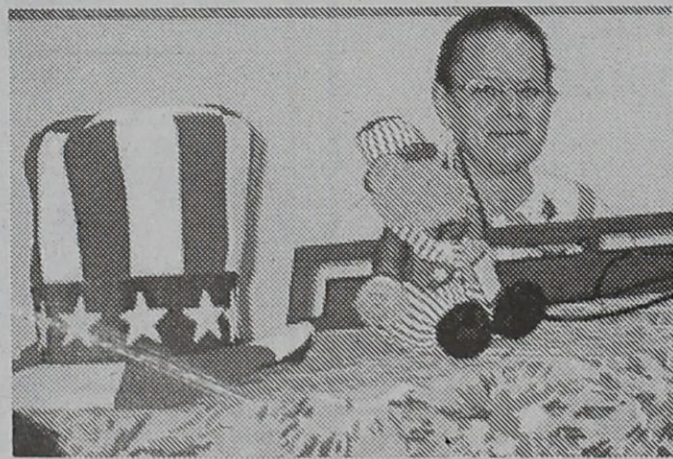
School board meeting with supt. applicants

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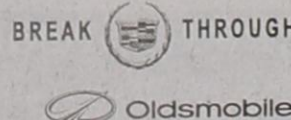

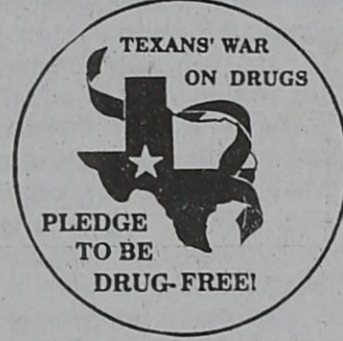

The Fillpot Report

LIVE CATTLE: December is now lead month and prices bottomed on time during the first week of October. First major resistance stopped prices at \$71.30 early this week, but broke above this level on Friday. Hedgers should be using this rally to add to shorts while looking for another drop into early November. Still looking for a long term low due in early December before major move up.

FEEDER CATTLE: November Feeders should also be sold on this rally? About the only thing which would change the picture from this point would be a close above the September high of \$82.00. Even though we expect this high to be taken out in January, there should be some choppy to lower prices between now and the end of November. Looking for a bottom over the next 7 weeks.

CORN: Had been expecting the December contract to test the \$2.65-2.70 level before turning back down, but highs made 3 weeks ago around \$2.62 stopped the market. Downside targets range from \$2.35-2.42 which \$2.42 the most likely short term target. Once this market confirms a harvest low, look for higher prices. The USDA raised ending stocks and production this week.

SOYBEANS: Trends are still down, but should be looking for a harvest low at anytime? Major support is \$5.00 basis the November contract and should hold. USDA estimates were friendly this week even though market reacted very little. Short term resistance is \$5.35 and a close above this level should turn price trends back higher. Beans are still relatively "cheap" at these levels.

WHEAT: December Kansas City Wheat is still holding strong even though the Chicago soft wheat is under pressure. Market is still holding support between \$4.40-4.55 and trading sideways. Demand remains strong and production along with ending stocks remain at historically low levels. There could possibly be another test of the contract highs by year end? Market is still strong.

COTTON: This market is still trending lower overall. Prices have held support at 42 cents basis the December contract, but long term targets still point towards the 38-40 cents level before harvest lows would be confirmed. Cash demand is weak unless sellers want to take much lower prices. Once this crop is in, harvest lows should be confirmed and a move back higher is possible.
