This week we were recipients of an annual check that has been coming to the Tribune office for a long, long time. We received the subscription renewal check for the Tribune from the E. A. Hromases of Bovina.

In an enclosed note they say that they have been Tribune subscribers since December of 1919. In a nostalgic vein the note says that there aren't many folks around Farwell and Oklahoma Lane that they know--just the old folks, and there are not many of them left.

The Tribune has been an institution in Parmer County for a long time, and we wonder if there is anybody with a longer record of subscribing to the paper than the Hromases. If so, we would be glad to hear from them and find out where they are living.

The flu bug seems to have taken a healthy bite out of the Twin Cities. A goodly number of our acquaintances are currently fighting the aches and the sniffles. The Farwell school had over 40 absentees one day last week. However, proportionately, the Texico school does not seem to be hit as severely. Inasmuch as the flu is a contagious disease, it does run through families and other close groups, while often leaving others unaffected.

The intensity of this year's flu also seems to vary with some folks getting plumb down in bed with the pesky bug while others just continue to go around doing the daily chores a-sniffing and a-sneezing without having to pile in between the covers for a day or two. Officers Discover Stolen Drugs In Clovis Motel Room

Parmer County Sheriff Chas. Lovelace and Bovina City Marshal Ronnie Mitchell were instrumental Friday in discovering a large amount of drugs which had been taken in the

reported burglary of Don's Medicine Chest in Bovina Monday night, Jan. 24, and also a quantity which was discovered to be taken from the Bovina Medical Clinic.

The officers found the drugs and \$89 in cash in a motel room occupied by Ronnie Wines, 28, of Bovina. Wines was spotted Thursday night in Clovis by Mitchell. When Lovelace and Mitchell returned to Clovis on Friday, they sighted Wines' car at a motel.

Lovelace and Mitchell were joined by Mickey Fenn of the Clovis Police Department before they entered the motel room where Wines was registered as Don Johnson. After receiving written permission to search the premises, the officers found approximately \$400-\$500 worth of drugs which had been reported taken from Don's Medicine Chest. The officers also found an undetermined amount of drugs which Wines is alleged to have admitted

taking from the Bovina Medical Clinic. The latter burglary had not been reported to Parmer County officers.

After his arrest on two charges of burglary, Wines was held in the Clovis jail until Monday when he was extradited to Texas and placed in Parmer County jail.

Wines, who had returned from Vietnam about eight or nine months ago, was known to have a drug problem. He had spent some time in the hospital in recent months as a result of the problem. In 1962, he received a four-year probated sentence for burglary.

Lovelace acknowledged the help of Bovina Deputy Henry Minter in investigating the burglary and apprehending the suspect.

Murder-Suicide Monday In County

Parmer County Sheriff's officers investigated an apparent murder-suicide which took place at approximately 9 a.m. Monday morning. Justice of the Peace Mrs. Frances Euler pronounced Margarito Cuellar, 28, and his wife, Marcellina, 29, dead at the scene.

Officers found the bodies of the couple on a bed in the bedroom of their home about a mile and a half west of Summerfield at approximately 10:30 a.m. Monday morning.

Officers thought the deaths had taken place after 8:30 a.m. because Cuellar had telephoned his brother about that time. Cuellar had taken his three school-age children out of school and taken them and another younger child to his brother's home before returning to his home, officers surmised.

Sheriff Charlie Lovelace said the man had apparently shot his wife in the head with a .22-caliber rifle before turning it on himself. Mrs. Euler ruled the deaths a combination murder-suicide.

The bodies were found by Cuellar's brother who went with the Cuellar children to their home where the eldest son discovered the bodies. Cuellar was an employee of Big Tex Seed

Co. in Hereford and a part-time laborer, according to the sheriff.

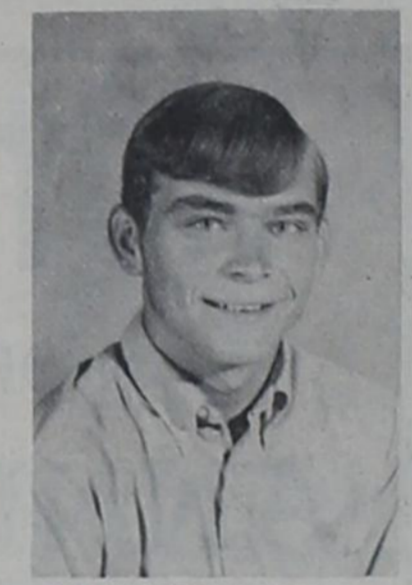

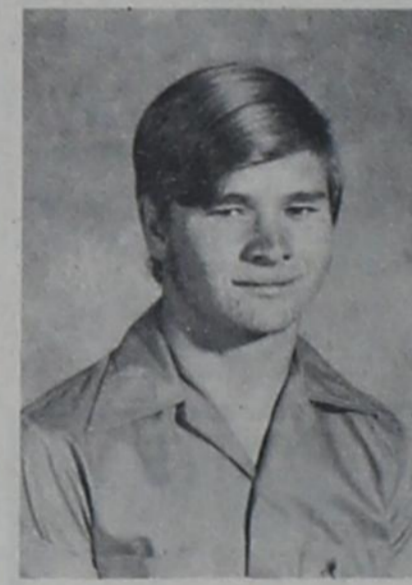

On The Farm In Farmer County

Fertilizing time is just around the corner and a soil test is a good idea in order to know exactly what the soil needs. If you haven't taken a soil sample yet, it might be a good investment to do so before you apply your fertilizer. Test forms and shipping boxes are available in my office.

There are several new products on the market this year that are supposed to replace our present fertilization program. They are called soil conditioners and their purpose is to keep the soil in a natural state of being. Before using these products altogether, a producer should make sure they are supplying the nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium needed by all living plants.

decreases below. We had no wind but other places in the State had winds in excess of 100 miles per hour. There is another storm predicted for tonight and tomorrow but am guessing we will miss the worst of it too.

There is little or no farm work done in the winter time except taking care of the livestock. When the ground freezes in the fall it stays frozen until spring. The land that is to be planted in barley is prepared in the fall, then when it has thawed enough in the spring the barley is planted. Beet and corn land is prepared in the spring as usual. There is no winter irrigation. The water is shut off of the canals and they are allowed to dry out during the winter. It's just as well for they would be frozen solid anyway.

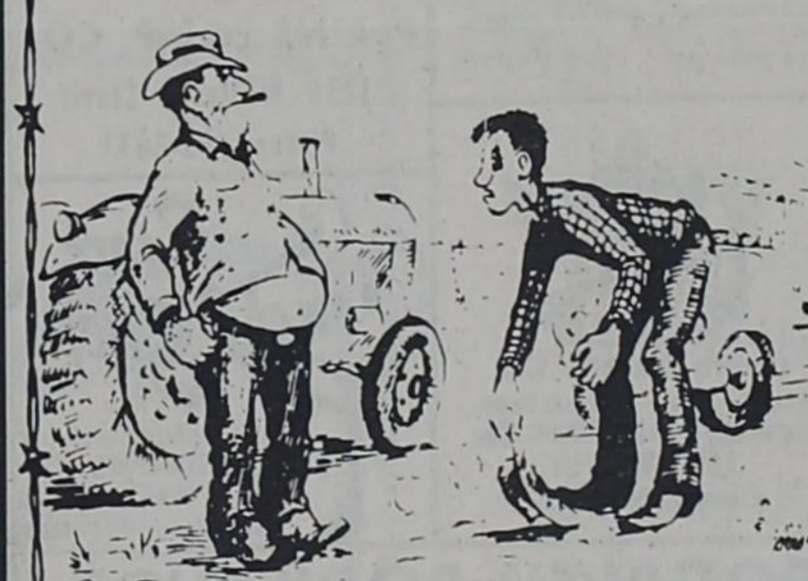

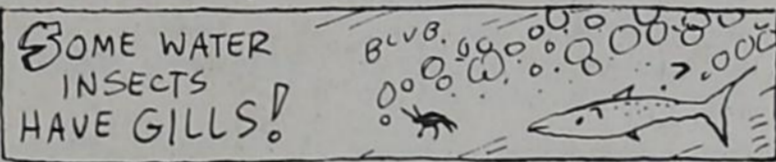

CREATION AND REDEMPTION

In Romans 1:18 the Apostle Paul declares that ungodly men are "without excuse" because they are surrounded by the evidences of the Creator's "eternal power and Godhead."
Our Authorized Version calls the creation, in this passage, "the things that are made," but in the Greek it is called literally "the *poieema*," from which we get our word *poem*.
The apostle refers, of course, to the harmony of God's creation. And is it not indeed amazing how billions of heavenly bodies can continually revolve in the vastness of space and never collide! And are not the flowers, the seasons, the sunsets all part of a harmonious creation, which God alone could have conceived and set to music?
But very interestingly, this word *poieema* is used just once more in Scripture. We find it in Eph. 2:10, where it is translated "workmanship." Let's consider this passage in its context:
"For by grace are ye saved, through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast."
"For we are His workmanship (Gr. *poieema*), created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:8-10).
Romans speaks of the poem of creation, Ephesians of the poem of redemption, and the latter is the more wonderful. An old hymn says: "Twas great to speak a world from naught; 'tis greater to redeem."
In this poem of redemption which God has composed, we believers too often want to change some word or phrase. We would like this or that in our circumstances to be different. Ah, but this would destroy the meter and the meaning of God's new creation.
Thank God, when we who trust Christ some day go to be with Him, we will see the beauty and glory of the poem of redemption. Then we will rejoice that He did indeed "work all things together for good" for us.


