


Texico FFA members who competed at the state contest show off their awards, including the top Production Sweepstakes honor.

I'm writing this column last week so I have my fingers crossed that our successes in Iraq will continue.

But it puffed up my chest a bit the last two weeks to see on the TV broadcasts how the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division has spearheaded the assault.

I served in the 3<sup>rd</sup> ID for 24 months, 1966-1968.

I finished my 3-year tour with the 32<sup>nd</sup> Army Air Defense Command in New York; this unit was disbanded.

Thus, the 3<sup>rd</sup> ID will always be "my" unit. I served with the 504<sup>th</sup> Administration Co.

We had 500 members in that company. My 1<sup>st</sup> Sergeant once eyed my clothes and told me that I "was the worst looking trooper in the entire company."

I guess that says I wasn't one of the best around...

Actually, just before my duty there ended, my commanding officer wanted to give me the Army Commendation Medal for my work.

But I turned it down; I didn't feel deserving.

I was stationed in Wurzburg, Germany. The 3<sup>rd</sup> ID also had units in Schweinfurt, Aschaffenburg, Kitzingen and Wildflecken.

If memory serves me correctly, the 3<sup>rd</sup> of the 7<sup>th</sup> Cavalry, which you have heard so much about, was in Aschaffenburg at the time.

-- Chocolate bars and candles only during cold weather.

-- Microwave popcorn.

-- Peanuts, pretzels and other snack foods.

-- Sweetened Kool-Aid, Gatorade and other sweetened drink mixes.

-- Coffee, sugar, creamer, tea bags, hot chocolate, hot cider.

-- Toiletry items such as shaving cream, razors, toothbrushes, toothpaste and shower soap/gel.

-- Hand sanitizer, hand lotion.

-- Wet wipes.

-- Wet wipes. -- Sunscreen.

-- Wrap-around sunglasses.

-- Batteries (assorted sizes).

-- Blank greeting cards (birthday, anniversary, get well, miss you, Mother's Day, Father's Day, etc.).

-- Videos, DVDs, music CDs and cassettes (pack separately).

-- Small board games such as chess, checkers, dominoes, parcheesi, yahtze, uno, cribbage and jigsaw puzzles, playing cards.

-- Recent paperback books (mysteries, action, drama and science fiction are highly read).

-- Puzzle books, comic books.

-- Holiday decorations (St. Patrick's Day, Easter, Passover, patriotic holidays, etc.).

# up to 29<sup>th</sup> place. But the problem is that the state will provide little extra funds for local school districts. This means that either local districts raise taxes to cover the additional salaries or make staff reductions.

The changes include:
-- 6 percent pay hikes
starting in December.

-- The minimum salary will be \$30,000 in New Mexico (this won't affect Texico because its minimum salary is \$31,000).

-- After 3 years, teachers will be paid a minimum \$40,000. Currently, Texico's schedule is just under \$35,000, so this will be a major change.

-- After teachers reach
Level 3 (in their 7<sup>th</sup> year
usually), the minimum
salary will be \$50,000.
This also will impact on
Texico Schools.



LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices broke out of a tight trading range and moved up toward a major resistance at the \$77.20 area basis the April contract. This level equates to about a two-thirds retracement level. The market may have reached levels this week which will halt the advance. The 15 year seasonal tendency is to see lower prices into late April, bottom, and then move

FEEDER CATTLE: The May contract also stopped on resistance at \$79.20 which was roughly a 50 percent retracement from the December high into the March low. Lows made in mid March should mark the bottom of the move even though we expect to see some downward pressure during this month. Once a low can be confirmed in the Live Cattle, odds favor higher prices into July/August.

CORN: Short term trends turned higher this week after the USDA dropped planted acre estimates almost 1 million acres. Prices reached long term support levels at \$2.27 last week basis the July contract, and held. Odds are that a major low is complete and higher prices should continue into the May time frame. We still look for a further reduction in planted acres from the point forward.

SOYBEANS: Short term trends have remained higher and prices were able to break out to new high territory this week. The July Beans closed at their highest level in over a year. Demand remains strong and harvest pressure coming out of South America is having very little effect. Prices now project toward the \$6.25 level due sometime over the next couple of months.

WHEAT: KC Wheat prices have held just above the \$3.00 level for more than a week, but short term trends have been reluctant to turn higher. Although domestic stocks are now below 1 billion bushels for the first time since 1997, there has been little impact on prices. Exports have remained very weak and anticipated increases in production from Australia and Canada have not helped.

COTTON: Short term trends turned back higher this week, but prices have stopped their advance at a twothirds retracement level at the \$59.35 level basis the July contract. Prices seem to be trapped between last week's lows of \$56.80 and this week's high. The seasonal tendency is to top in March and move sideways to lower into April before taking another shot back higher into the summer.







The first three items on my list fall victim to the clutter that is piled on a very convenient drop-off site in my kitchen. It's a countertop area that has been dubbed "Stackville."



### Texico council approves summer lunch program

The Texico City Council on Tuesday approved the summer lunch program being held at Lions Park.

Johnny Chavez, representing Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Clovis which operates the area program, noted that it has been serving Texico-Farwell youths since 1991. About 100 to 150 youngsters are fed free lunches for 48 days.

The major problem discussed was whose responsibility for the safety of the kids. Some parents drop off their kids at the park. Last year, there was an incident of youths being hurt on the merry-go-round.

Councilmen Oran Jay Autrey, Sharon Askew and Doug Scioli said parents need to take responsibility for their children.

Chavez said his group was not responsible for the kids except those in the area where lunch was served.

The program serves about 3,000 youths a day in the Clovis area, Chavez said.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard City Clerk Teresa Harth report that the final plans for the new city hall are expected to be ready for the next council meeting.

-- Okayed the annual application for funds for the DWI task force, which includes Texico, Clovis and Curry

-- Plans to hire summer help. Street Supt. Clarence Smith said they will be needed at the end of May.

-- Gave city inspector Terry Martin authority to issue business licenses. Until now, the council has been approving them.

-- Allowed Fire Chief Lewis Cooper to buy about \$600 worth of EMS supplies.

-- Heard that the cemetery board wants to place a sign at the Texico Cemetery, noting the origin of the city in 1902. Tedson Trailers will make the sign and donate the labor, Mrs. Harth reported.

The cost is estimated about \$700, The council approved spending a maximum of \$850 from the city's cemetery fund for the project.

-- Okayed a project by High Plains Pediatric, of Clovis, to place a tree with a plaque at KKR Park honoring the late Jerry Garcia, a Texico School youth who recently died from illness.

-- Discussed a request from the cemetery board to move a stacking pile of caliche, currently stacked near the cemetery well. Vehicles are having to drive over graves because of its location. The cemetery board wants to plant trees so the pile is removed from view.

At the suggestion of Smith, the council approved moving the stacking pile to the northeast corner of the cemetery, as long as the cemetery board agrees.

### Faced with money shortfall, Texico School makes cuts

\$150,000 for the coming school year, Texico School Supt. R.L. Richards told the school board on Tuesday of the cutbacks necessary. Three positions are being eliminated. Thus, staffers

Faced with an impending deficit of \$130,000 to
