



The 1st quarter was a defensive struggle, with no one



The hard hitting of Logan Clemmer, Fermin Reyes and Roper Fulcher in the 1st quarter stopped some key drives for the Cowboys.


Plains opened the scoring in the 2nd quarter on a 59yard pass, but the extra point kick failed.



Bailey County Co-op re-elects Stephens, Hicks

Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association held its 64th annual meeting in Muleshoe on Tuesday night.

Two board members were up for re-election: Darrell Stephens, of Farwell, representing District 1; and Keith Hicks, of Lazbuddie, representing District 2. Stephens has been a director since 1988, and is the current board chairman. Hicks has been a director since 2000.

Both were re-elected. Stephens won over Coby Baldwin, and Hicks won over Terry Jesko.

The committee on nominations had included Gloria Herington, committeeman at large; Kirby Burch and Jerry Don Glover, District 2; and Clinton Rogers and Phil Garrett, District 2.

The cooperative has a new attorney, Jamey Laney Phillips, daughter of state Rep. Pete Laney, who represented Bailey and Parmer counties in the Texas House of Representatives for many years before redistricting.

Mrs. Phillips replaced Johnny Actkinson, who had been the cooperative's attorney for 30 years.

Speaking at the meeting were two high school students who had been sent by the cooperative to a tour of Washington, D.C., recently. One of the students was

Shonnah Black, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ricky Black, of Lazbuddie. All told, 94 students took the trip.

Shonnah said the group spent 60 hours on the bus, six days of seeing the nation's landscape. During their seven days in Washington, they visitied museums, the Pentagon City, memorials, the zoo, the White House and the National Cathedral -- which Shonnah said was her

During the visit, Shonnah said she met with Parmer County's new representative to the U.S. House, Randy Neugebauer. And she said she "learned to play the ka-

Shonnah told one fun story about talking with the other students on the trip. Also representing Bailey County Electric Cooperative was a student from Muleshoe High School.

One of the kids asked the Muleshoe girl where Muleshoe was. The girl's response was "18 miles from Earth." So when Shonnah was asked where Lazbuddie was, she replied that it was near Muleshoe -- 18 miles from Earth.

In the financial part of the meeting, cooperative President and CEO David Marricle said it was a tough year for the co-op because two major storms caused their operating and maintenance expenses to be higher than normal.

He continued: "Our power costs increased partly due to the fact that we lost Mustang Station for a portion of the year. We had to purchase higher priced energy and lost the ability to make sales to other utilities that help to lower our costs. These events were the main reasons costs were up and margins down."

The co-op owns a portion of Mustang Station located near Denver City through its membership in Golden

However, even though the overall margins were lower, they were still on the positive side. Almost \$335,000 of capital credits were returned to members this year. This marked the 7th year in a row that the cooperative has paid back capital credits to the membership.

The net margin for 2002 was \$44,792. The revenue for the cooperative is broken down this way: irrigation, 70 percent; commercial, 16 percent; and residential, 14 percent.

And this is how each dollar is spent: consumer accounts and customer service, 3 percent; administrative and general expenses, 7 percent; operations and maintenance, 10 percent; depreciation, 6 percent; taxes and interest, 3 percent; and wholesale power costs, 71 percent.

Looking ahead to 2003's finances, Marricle said the year began on a promising note. "We were well ahead of last year until June came with all the storms. Most of you were affected in some way or another. Even though the cooperative energy sales have returned to normal levels, we won't know the impact that this will have on us and the farming community until the end of the year, since we rely heavily on irrigation sales, and sales to our area cotton gins."

Board Chairman Stephens also noted how extremes in weather, energy costs and insurance premiums have impacted the economy. Speaking on a positive note, he pointed out how the cooperative has benefited from the Mustang Station generating facility. "Off system sales of electricity from this plant have provided additional revenues to our cooperative," he said.


measured in how well they scored against a group of students of their same age and school year. "Norm reference testing" will end with the 2003-2004 school year.

Students in the 4th, 8th and 11th grades were administered additional tests in reading, language arts, and math. These new "criterion referenced" tests are designed to measure how well the students know and understand the state's prescribed curriculum. This new test asked children to write in short answers, fill in the blanks, and explain why answers were chosen. Student scores indicate depth of knowledge. They are not a comparison to other students. Each student was rated on whether they met proficiency or were nearing proficiency of the curriculum standards taught at each grade level.

This school year the testing program will not change. For the 2003-2004 school year, grades 4, 8 and 11 will take "criterion-referenced" tests while grade 3, 5, 7 and 9 will take the "norm-referenced" test.

Next school year (2004-20055), these new "criterion-referenced tests" will be given in grades 3-9 and in grade 11.

New Mexico schools are now required to show students' academic achievement in several categories: each ethnic group, gender, disability status, language proficiency, and economic disadvantage.






