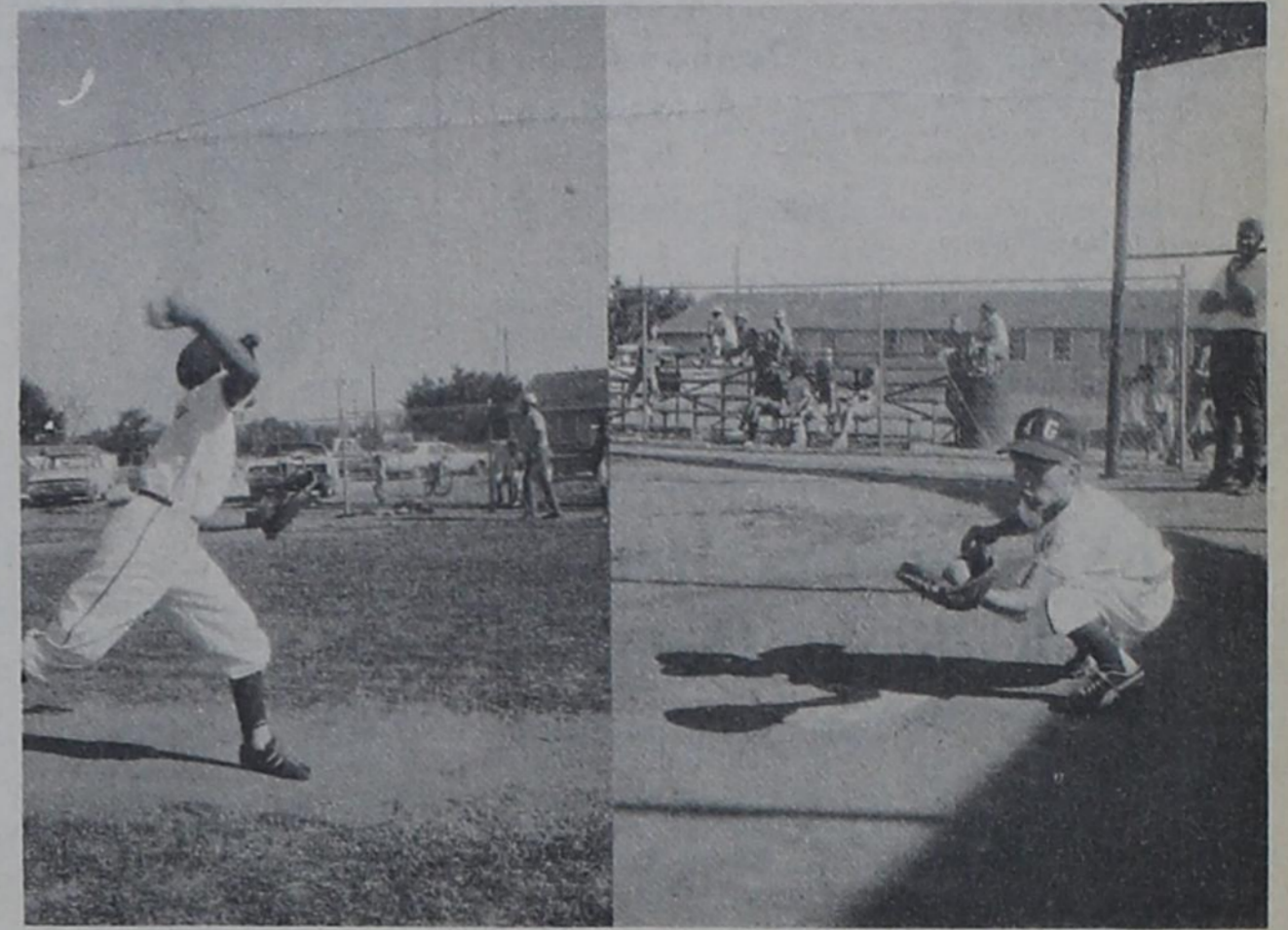

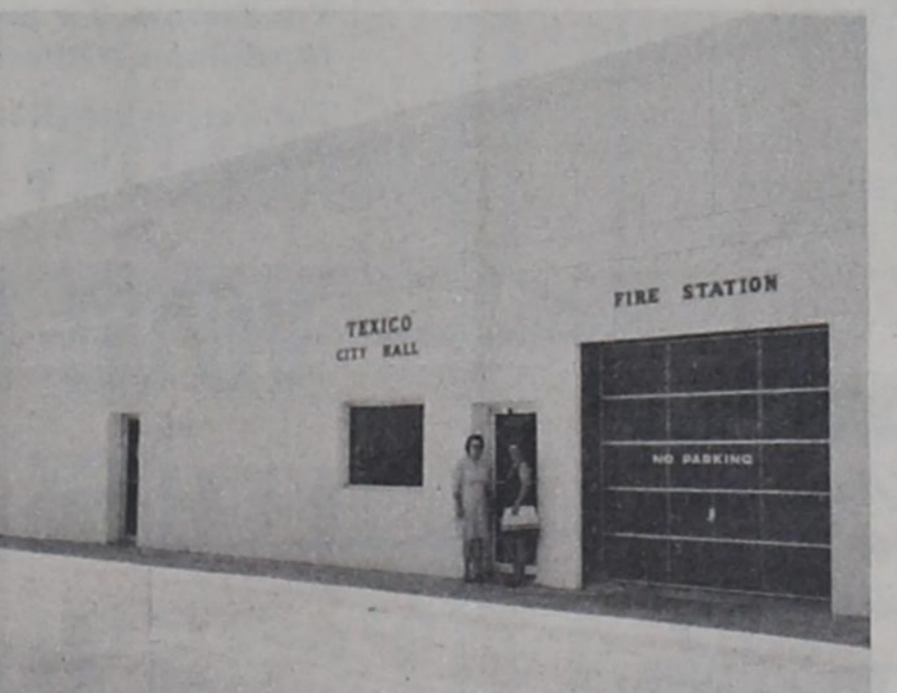

## City Halls Make Noticeable Changes

Both Farwell and Texico City Halls have recently undergone noticeable changes which city officials hope are pleasing to the eyes of their citizens.

Farwell City Hall moved into the former Security State Bank building at the corner of First Street and Avenue A, and opened their doors February 22. They had previously used the former American Legion building for city offices since 1956.

Included in the improvements to the newly-acquired building were carpeting, new drapes and painting. The floor of the building is now covered with a gold, burnt orange, green and brown industrial carpet. Drapes, made by Mrs. Janie Bowery, city clerk, are dark green to blend with light green walls.

Just recently, two signs were put up on the front and side of the building, declaring in black "City of Farwell". Future plans call for making the back rooms of the building into a com-

munity center with kitchen facilities, and re-finishing furniture brought from the old building.

The new building houses all city offices including city tax office, water department, clerk's office, and other departments dealing with city business.

Mrs. Bowery says she enjoys the spaciousness of the new building in which there is "lots of room". "We have a vault now where we can store records. We never had anything like that before," she added.

Funds which had been set aside year after year to construct a new City Hall were used partly to re-decorate the newly-acquired building, but the rest of the money will be used in other city improvements such as a new water pump and more water lines.

Texico City Hall received a totally new look on the outside when improvements were made

recently. The entire front of the building was stuccoed and re-painted and a new door was installed in the community building which adjoins City Hall. Windows of the community building were sealed off and stuccoed over to help keep out the sand and cold air.

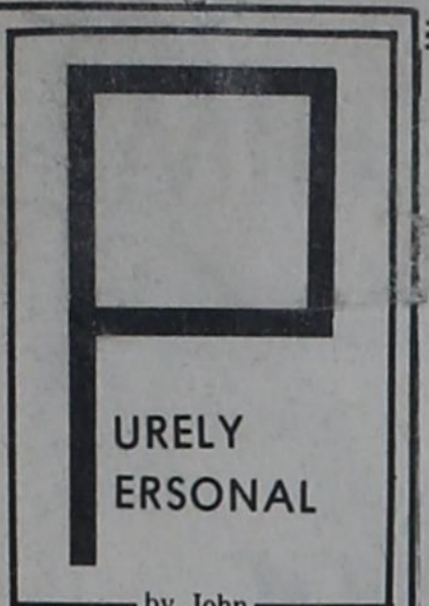
A very recent addition to the front of the building is a sign in red over the front door reading "Texico City Hall". Another sign identifies the fire station. The front of the building was painted white.

Future plans include painting and paneling the inside of the hall. Water works, fire department, police and clerk's office, as well as other city business is handled in City Hall.

Mrs. Clara Wiehl, city clerk, said she knew of no other building which had been used as the city hall. "We have been incorporated since 1908, but I don't know whether we've been in any other building.

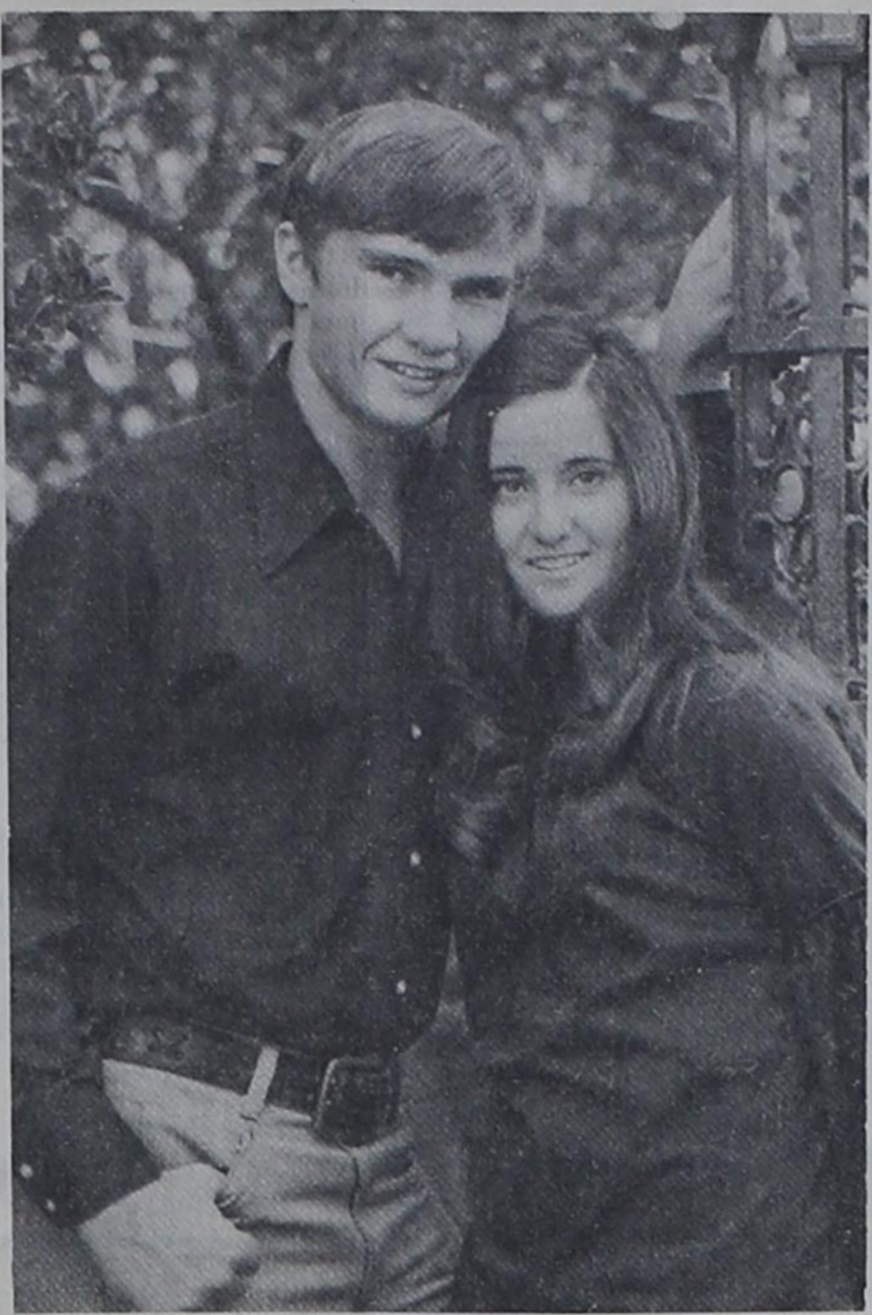

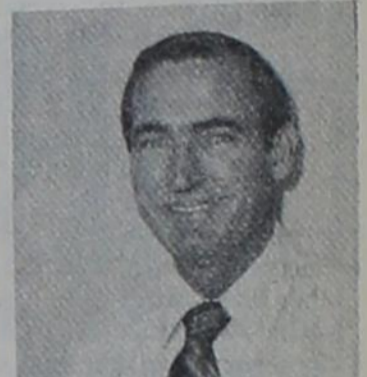

**GOD'S REVELATION OF HIMSELF**

Romans 1:18-20 declares that God has revealed Himself to man in creation. Not that we can learn His plan of salvation from creation--far from it. But the creation: the beauty of its flowers and sunsets, the sun and rain and crops to supply us with food, the unchangeable laws of nature, all show forth, not only the existence of God, but His power, His love, His justice, so that man is a responsible being and, as Verse 20 says, "Without excuse" for the deplorable condition in which he finds himself.

A believer, talking with an atheistic evolutionist one day, took out his watch, looked at it and put it back into his pocket, saying: "I have a wonderful watch. I never have to do anything to it, yet it keeps perfect time; never misses a second."

"What make is it?" the atheist asked. "Oh, no make," answered the Christian. "Well, who manufactured it?" "Oh, nobody; it just put itself together somehow."

"Nonsense," said the atheist. "A watch can't just come into existence. Somebody had to design it and somebody had to manufacture it."

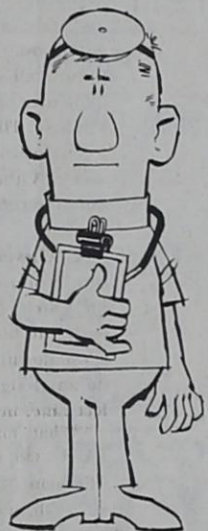

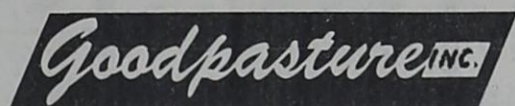

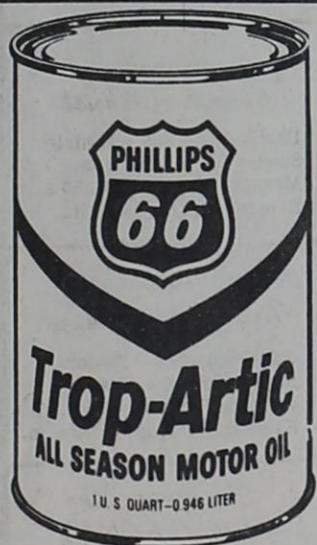
