

Bovina to use federal funds for emergency generator

From City Manager Ernest Terry:

The City of Bovina just received authorization to spend the Homeland Security money, \$19,872, that is designated for emergency generators.

Some time ago, in February 2002, I started asking the question: "How long will our water supply last if we lost electrical power?"

The answer was four to six hours, and our water storage tank would run dry. I looked at several scenarios from a mechanical failure to a natural disaster causing the electrical power to be out in all or a part of the city. If you add a fire to any scenario, we had a recipe for a very serious problem.

Homeland Security came along with available money through a TEEX program, and I applied for a grant. Bovina was one of the first Panhandle cities to receive funding, and we got an allotment based on our population.

Okay, how to solve the energy problem? Natural gas looked like the answer, so I contacted Atmos Energy. They sell generators that run on natural gas. If the electricity goes out for whatever reason and for however long, the natural gas generators kick in and supply the emergency power. No one has to maintain and feed them; they are automatic. And, when was the last time the electricity AND natural gas was out of service?

A look at a water and sewer system map of Bovina shows a few vulnerable spots; the pump that supplies water to the system, the above ground tank that supplies water pressure, and the list station that lifts the sewage from low residential areas into the gravity flow system.

The new water well, funded by another grant, will have an emergency generator installed on it. That takes care of the first need. The TEEX's money will buy a 3phase generator for the lift station and a single phase generator for the water storage tower. That takes care of the second and third needs.

The generators purchased with TEEX's money will be portable, so in an emergency where power is lost in another location for whatever reason, the generators could be moved, installed and operated.

Future plans are being evaluated for more generators for city buildings, such as the maintenance barn and fire station and EMS building. Contingency plans would allow for emergency heating and lighting of those emergency services and emergency, temporary-housing areas. These are plans that I hope we will never use, but ones that we must prepare for.



The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed requiring headstones for all cemetery plots.

The current code says "students must be clean shaven. Sideburns must be neatly trimmer and can be no longer than the bottom of the ear."

The students asked that this paragraph be replaced with:

"Facial hair is permitted. Facial hair must be worn in good taste. Facial hair length shall not exceed 1/4 inch in length. The school principal shall determine appropriateness. If at any time, the school principal determines a student has violated this facial hair policy, he or she will lose their privilege to wear facial hair."

The board said it would not change the current policy.

In other business, the school board:

-- Accepted the retireelementary ment of teacher Carolyn Ferrell.

-- Heard Richards report that it has been suggested that a memorial be placed on school property to honor former school Supt. A.D. McDonald, who died recently.

Also suggested was renaming the street going by the school as "A.D. McDonald Avenue."

-- Heard that the state will provide \$127,000 to Texico School for construction work to correct deficiencies.

This includes work such as new heating units, and addresses fire code and safety concerns.

The main difference involves the Christmas vacation dates, with elementary school closing a day earlier than the other two campuses.

-- Approved four persons to be placed on the substitute's list.

-- Discussed the idea of using To and From Bus Co. (Brent and Jeff Queener) to drive the activity buses. This relieves coaches and school personnel from that job.

The board seemed amenable to the idea.

The Queeners will get back to the board with cost figures before a decision is finalized.

-- Continued discussions on providing more activities for students.

No decisions were made on this as school officials look to perhaps implement some ideas for the next school year.

A survey was taken of students, with "clubs" and "events" leading the way.

Top clubs proposed were for: 1) drama and theater; 2) video games; 3) robot wars; 4) mechanical; and 5) rodeo and riding.

Top single events suggested were: 1) movie night; 2) lock-ins; and 3) karaoke.

-- Heard business manager Cheryl Whitener say that a 17 percent hike in health insurance costs is expected for the next school year, on top of a 25 percent hike this year.

-- Discussed proposed projects including buying a washer/dryer for the Texico Sports Arena; a pole vault pit; a new riding lawnmower; some new cafeteria tables; and more sprinklers.

-- Was told about a recent meeting between **Clovis and Texico school** concerning officials sports play between the schools.

The board was told that Yucca School, in particular, was unhappy about

Texico High Principal Buddy Little responded that he had stats showing Clovis junior highs winning many one-sided games, and that the situation was really a two-way street.

Also, the board was told that some Clovis school officials feel that Texico School is playing older kids on some of its teams than it should.

In New Mexico, in some sports, students can play on teams of different grade levels. For example, a Texico 9th grader can be on the varsity football team (since there is no Texico JV football team), yet play on a 8th grade (junior high) basketball team.

But the reality of the situation is that few 9th graders get much playing time on varsity teams.

Regardless, some **Clovis School officials are** upset and said it might be better if Texico not play Clovis teams for a few years.

This is being called a "cooling off" period by Clovis officials.

So, Texico plans to play more Texas teams in basketball and football during this period.

Grant allows city to buy an ambulance

The City of Bovina and the Bovina EMS have received a \$39,900 grant from the Meadows Foundation for buying a new ambulance.

Last summer, the Bovina EMS had to replace their aging and failing ambulance. With the backing of the City Council, a new, state of the art ambulance was ordered, received, and placed into operation.

It cost \$126,900. The city received \$7,000 as a trade-in on the old ambulance. That left \$119,900 to finance, explained City Manager Ernest Terry. The city had \$35,000 in the Ambulance Savings Fund. Then EMS Directo Larry Mitchell obtained TDH grants for \$35,000 plus \$10,000 in donations. That left \$39,900 to be funded.

The City of Bovina applied for a grant from The Meadows Foundation, of Dallas. After exhausting all of our resources and providing financial statements to Meadows, the Meadows Foundation came through, said Terry.

This completes the funding and purchase of the city's new ambulance. Terry said the city owes a big "than you" to everyone who helped with the project.

"Small towns like Bovina, which exist on limited budgets, couldn't get everything done without the help of volunteers and the donations and assistance of organizations like Meadows," he added.


