


Haseloff, Frye win primary battles for county commissioner

Filings going slowly

Although it's time for candidates to file for local elections, none have signed up in the past week.

The filing deadline is Monday.

Election Day is May 15. Each week, the Tribune

updates the filings:

The big news out of Tuesday's primary elections in Parmer County involved the two county commissioner races.

In the Democrat primary, Mike Haseloff topped incumbent county commissioner Ed Corn for Pct. 3 (the Farwell area), 156-84. Haseloff will face Ronald Byrd, the GOP primary winner, in the November elections.

In the Republican primary, Kirk Frye, incumbent county commissioner for Pct. 1 (the Friona area) easily defeated two challengers. Frye scored 345 votes to John Tannahill's 81 and John Mars' 57.

The only other "race" in the GOP primary was for county attorney. Incumbent Charles Aycock announced last week he was resigning because he had received a state prison board position. He still received 278 votes to Jeff Actkinson's 445. Actkinson is unopposed in the November election.

Other primary results were:

Republican

Sheriff -- Randy Geries got 737 votes (the leading county vote-getter) and is unopposed in the November election.

District Attorney -- Johnny Actkinson got 613 votes

Drager's 'Big Dawg' wins top honors

Zane Drager, 19, of Texico, and his crossbred steer "Big Dawg" earned top dog honors at the National Western Stock Show in Denver, Colorado on Jan. 22.

Zane and "Big Dawg" won Grand Champion and earned \$91,000 from the title.

"Big Dawg" was sold to Del Frisco's Double Eagle Steakhouse in Denver at auction. The \$91,000 paid was less than the record breaking \$110,000 paid to the 2003 winner, but it was a major coup for the Texico High School graduate and his family.

"It wasn't so much about the money," Zane commented. "It was really more about the accomplishment

and the experience for me."

"Big Dawg" was purchased from Joaquin and Josh
Lesky of Durango, Colo., when he was 8 months old.

"We knew pretty quickly that he was going to be an

animal to be reckoned with" Zane stated.


The steer was an Angus and Shorthorn crossbred.

The Drager's have been raising Shorthorns for quite some time and have had great success with the breed at the local, county and state stock show levels. Now, the

National title can be added to their resume.

"Big Dawg" weighed in at 1,316 pounds and was 53" tall. He was 22 months old. Zane and "Big Dawg" entered the show as one of 95 other steers and showmen.

Texico votes continuation in Ute Lake water project

The Texico City Council Tuesday continued its involvement in the Ute Lake water project by voting to spend about \$1,500 to buy water through it.

Previously, money was asked to "reserve" Ute Lake

water. This has been changed to purchases.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper, the city's representative to the project, said the project is estimated to cost about \$300 million -- with the federal government paying 80 percent, the state 10 percent, and the nine cities involved 10 percent.

Texico's portion would be 1.4 percent of that 10 percent for construction. Texico has 258 acre feet of water reserved per year, and it's estimated the first year it would cost Texico \$6 per acre feet.

The graduated scale would then go to \$7.50 per acre feet the second year, and continue upward.

Cooper said that the project won't happen if the federal government doesn't come up with its 80 per cent

In other business, the council:

-- Heard City Clerk Teresa Harth report that the new city hall is virtually finished, awaiting a permanent certificate of occupancy. City workers likely will move in after the parking lot is completed.

-- Accepted an asbestos removal bid (for the current city hall, which then would be demolished) for \$9.750.

-- Okayed an emergency request from Cooper to buy medical supplies for the EMS. He said the department has run low on supplies due to a large number of transports recently.

-- Held an executive session on personnel at councilwoman Sharon Askew's request.

-- Agreed to Brown well repairs.

-- At the next meeting, will act on two requests dealing with the community center:

1) Mrs. Harth asked that persons using the center forfeit their deposits if they didn't either return the building key promptly after usage (or exchange it with the next person to use it). She said this has been a real problem getting the key back or exchanged.

2) Ann Cooper, a resident, asked that the policy of not being able to rent the center be moved from the current 90 days to between 6 months and a year. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said he supported this.

-- Purchased a burn trailer for the fire department for \$83,550 (including options). A FEMA grant is providing \$67,500, and the fire department has funds to cover the rest, said Cooper. It will arrive in about 15 weeks.

-- Adopted a cemetery ordinance without discussion.

-- Once again tabled the heavy vehicle ordinance. City building inspector Terry Martin was not present. City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter said he is still waiting to get an updated ordinance proposal from Martin.

-- Okayed sending the two street department personnel to a 3-day vector control seminar.

-- Purchased a new phone system for the new city

hall from Plateau Telecommunications. Accepted the resignation of city assistant clerk have Spring Break March

LIVE CATTLE: Futures prices traded to both extremes this week with news that the Canadian Border may open soon, which dropped prices over 200 points on Wednesday to the opening of the Mexican Border the next day which shot prices back up 200 points higher, cash traded at \$85 this week and numbers remain tight. Technically, long term trends should re main higher into August.

FEEDER CATTLE: Cash prices were higher this week though futures prices have been reluctant to follow. The news and emotion have been more than this market can decipher. Either way, numbers are tight which should be supportive and long term trends remain higher as well. Targets for the March contract should be closer to the \$90 level in coming weeks.

CORN: Prices broke early this week for a day when the U.S. Dollar broke out to the upside. This created some fear that export demand may dwindle? Short term trends turned down, but with some of the tightest world stocks seen in 30 years, the market will remain vulnerable for another run back up to re-test contract highs. Any problems into planting may drive

SOYBEANS: This market dropped on fears of a rising U.S. Dollar this week but so far, prices have held inside a tight trading range. A move below \$9.24 basis the May contract will turn short term trends down and possibly take prices down to lower levels until a Spring planting rally occurs. Tight supplies and a strong demand will turn all eyes on the U.S. as we get closer to planting.

WHEAT: This market is still on the decline even in the face of Chinese buying which should have helped to support prices. Most of the trade is now focused on improving weather conditions throughout the major wheat growing areas and the fact that most analysts are raising their world production estimates for this coming crop year. There is some support at current levels. COTTON: Prices have traded up and down inside a

300 point range all week. Once prices broke, apparently because of fears the U.S. Dollar is on the rise, prices have become extremely volatile. Most of the attention has now turned away for any future business with China and is now focused on increased world production. Improving weather conditions are also being blamed for the drop.

Texico to offer more activities

The Texico School Board Tuesday continued assessing its student programs.

What the board seeks is to have more school activities offered for students who are not currently involved in them. Next year, new activities may be offered, such as a mechanics club and a drama club.

Supt. R.L. Richards and his staff are continuing to work on the ideas presented by students and staff, that were reported in previous issues of the Tribune. Also, the "Seniors Helping Seniors" program, whereby 12th graders help elderly folks in the community, will be kept.

In other business, the board:

-- Heard that the current student enrollment is 536. This compares to 530 on the first day of school.

-- Heard Supt. Richards report that the state has

given two major grants to Texico: \$81,000 for kindergarten renovation, and \$80,000 for auditorium renovation. Other state funds that have been received will go toward a lot of remodeling and renovation this summer, including resurfacing the track, work on the academic learning lab, and installing sprinklers in grassy areas around the buildings. -- Discussed ways to memorialize former School

Supt. A.D. McDonald, who died recently. A monument may be built. Or, as it appears the board is leaning, a premier Texico scholarship would be offered in his name. Then a plaque would be placed on a school wall acknowledging the recipients of this top honor. A final decision may be made next month.

-- The annual academic awards programs in the high school and junior high were discussed. A couple of changes were made. In the high school, the students with the highest grade point average will be again honored, along with the "most improved" in each class. At the junior high, the students with the highest grade point average will again be honored, along with students who score highest on a 10-point scale rated by teachers. The 10 points would include categories like character.

-- Head that the principals have been rehired - Buddy Little, high school; Wayne Anderson, elementary; and

Rick Stanley, junior high.

-- Discussed a policy involving out-of-district students. The board is trying to decide if they should allow Texas students to enroll. This has been discussed for several months, and there are some questions they will need answered by an attorney before a decision is

-- Still waiting to hear from the state if funds are available to buy another activity bus. To and From Bus Co. needs another bus. They are using their spare bus

-- Heard Supt. Richards say that due to the increased \$ enrollment over last year, two or three teachers will need to be hired. Last year, teaching cutbacks were made. Interviews will begin shortly.

-- Hired three persons as substitutes.

-- Said that dancers from Clovis will no longer be allowed to participate during games. There have been some concerns in this area.

· The food, horticulture and fiber industry is the 2nd largest industry in the state, and generates \$73 billion a year for the economy.

· Eighty percent of the land in Texas is in some form of ag production.

· Ninety-two percent of Texas' ag operations are still run by individuals or families.

 Twenty-nine percent of ag producers were women in 2002; the number of women who were principal operators increased 7 percent from 1997

 Although ag employs 1 out of 5 working Texans, less than 2 percent of the population is involved in day-to-day farming or ranching.

· Texas farmers grow more than 60 different commercial fruit and veggie crops.

 Texas ranks 1st in the nation in the number of cattle and calves, accounting for 15 percent of the U.S. total. Texas is the top producer of cotton, sheep, wool, goats, mohair and horses. The state's top crops also include veggies, citrus, corn, wheat, peanuts, pecans, grain sorghum, hay and rice.

· Besides livestock and crops, the state's ag industry includes timber/forestry, aquaculture, bess/honey, and nursery/greenhouse.

· Texas is one of the leading exporters of ag

commodities. Texas' top ag exports are live animals and meat; cotton cottonseed; and feed grains and products; hides and skins; wheat and products; and feeds and fodder.

· Each Texas farmer grows enough food and fiber for 128 people -- 94.3 in the U.S. and 33.7 abroad.

 Texas' 1 million horses, representing about 15 percent of all horses nationwide, makes the state a leader in the U.S. Texas also leads the nation in the number of registered American Quarter Horses, American Paint Horses, Appaloosa horses and American Miniature Horses.

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
