

LIVE CATTLE: Prices have continued to move higher over the last couple of days. Beef prices dropped about \$4 and futures prices rallied about \$4. Technically, the market broke out to new territory this week, but this is the first time in almost a year that we've seen futures go premium to cash. There are changes taking place which may change the market into June.

FEEDER CATTLE: Cash feeders remain strong and although the board was up over the last couple of days, the market did not show as much strength as seen in the Live Cattle prices. There are some adjustments being made mostly likely because the spread between the nearby feeder and fed cattle prices is the widest ever seen this week. The spread is trading about \$22.00 at this time.

CORN: The market took a dip after showing some strength early this week, but was able to recover into Friday's close. The long Holiday weekend may have generated some of the selling pressure along with lower soybean prices. A move above the \$3.06 level next week would indicate higher prices. Pressure from cheap soybeans may keep prices under the gun for a while longer?

SOYBEANS: Looking at the recent collapse in prices makes most everyone question the "beans in the teens" phrase? The trends are still down and are not likely to change until something fundamentally changes. Weather may be a factor, but at this time weather seems to be adding some of the pressure? Chinese demand dried up fast above \$10 and down the market goes!

WHEAT: Short term trends turned back down this week after making several attempts to trade back higher. Improved weather conditions and reports of very good yields down south have brought about another round of selling. The 15 year seasonal tendency is down into mid July and prices should move down into the \$3.50 area before making a bottom.

COTTON: Prices tested some major support again this week and held. It seems like every time something positive gives prices a boost, the next day is hit with another round of selling! The general consensus at this time is that acres are down substantially from earlier USDA estimates. This should eventually support the market. Crop conditions at this time look very good.
