Bumper Crops Possible --

Maize Harvest Due To Start Soon

Harvesting of maize, the county's leading money crop, is expected to start somewhere around the last of September or the first of October, according to Fred Chandler of Sherry-Anderson-Pitman Elevator in Farwell.

Elevator operators are discussing the possibility of a bumper crop this year. There has been an increase in acreage -- 180,000 plus acres, approximately 20 per cent higher than last year -- and farmers have had a more favorable growing season, says Mack Heald, Farmer County agricultural agent.

"The rain helped a lot in making the crop produce as well as it has," he said. There is more milo produced here (in Farmer County) than in any other place in the world, according to Heald. Farmer County is the leading grain sorghum county in the United States.

Asa Smith, manager of Sherry-Anderson Grain Co. in Lar-

iat, said, "It looks like a real good crop; yields might be better than last year. We should also have a good corn crop." Smith declined to comment on prices saying that they were not well established as yet. He did say if everything goes well, the prices should be good for both crops.

Bill Thigpen, manager of Worley Grain, commented that "up until the moisture this past week, the milo was the best crop in the county in years considering the amount of acreage." Thigpen predicted 8000 to 9000 lbs. per acre yields if things keep looking good. "I don't feel like the milo will be hurt by the moisture, but the cotton sure won't be helped," he said. "If there is an early freeze, all the crops will suffer," he added. Thigpen said he is already receiving some yellow corn which is producing 8500-9500 lbs. per acre yields.

Another bumper crop prospect this year will be corn and silage. Harvest of these

crops is in progress. Approximately 34,000 plus acres have been planted. "It is yielding more than 20 tons per acre," Heald said.

An increase in acreage and August rains helped further the opinion of grain elevator operators that the corn could be a bumper crop. Insect damage to the crops was light due to frequent spraying, but they were a big problem this year, he said.

A good cotton crop could be possible if the weather stays warm through September. More than 44,000 acres have been planted. Early or late frosts will contribute to the failure or success of the crop. "If we have a late frost, there will be a

good chance for a really good cotton crop. On the other hand, if we have an early frost, the cotton will suffer a setback," continued Heald.

Sugarbeets and soybeans have several weeks to go before they are ready for harvest. There might be a bumper crop on sugarbeets depending on the sugar content of the beets.

Most of the vegetables raised by Farmer County farmers have been harvested or are in the process of being harvested. Some carrots and pumpkins are due to be harvested in the next few weeks. Approximately 6,000 acres in vegetables were planted in Farmer County this year.

Public Invited To Clinic Open House

The public is invited to attend an open house at Gregory Medical Clinic at 301 Third Street in Farwell Sunday afternoon, Sept. 26, from 2 p.m. until 5 p.m.

Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is spon-

soring the open house for the newly-remodeled and painted medical clinic. Hosts and hostesses will be members of the Chamber and their wives. Refreshments will be served and a tour of the clinic will be conducted.

Dr. Jerry Gregory moved into the clinic the first of September to begin practice here. The clinic was refurbished by Nance Construction Co. of Clovis who repainted and repaired the entire building.

The building includes a doctor's office, library and study, laboratory, waiting room, bed patient room, x-ray room, two examining rooms, an obstetrics room and storage room.

The clinic has several machines including a diathermy machine for use in treating minor injuries, an EMS and ultra-sound machine used in treating injuries such as those sustained in sports, a spinalator for back rubs and a paraffin bath for arthritis.

One x-ray machine was in the clinic when the Gregorys arrived. All of the other equipment was brought from Gregory's previous practice.

Diagnostic equipment in the lab can be used to detect diabetes, gout, hepatitis, mononucleosis, cholesterol and many other diseases. All types of blood tests and urine tests are performed in the lab.

Minor surgery and obstetric surgery can be performed with the surgical equipment available in the clinic.

Mrs. Frances King serves as clinic receptionist. Presently helping her husband out as nurse is Charline Gregory.

Scattered Rains Cool Plains Area

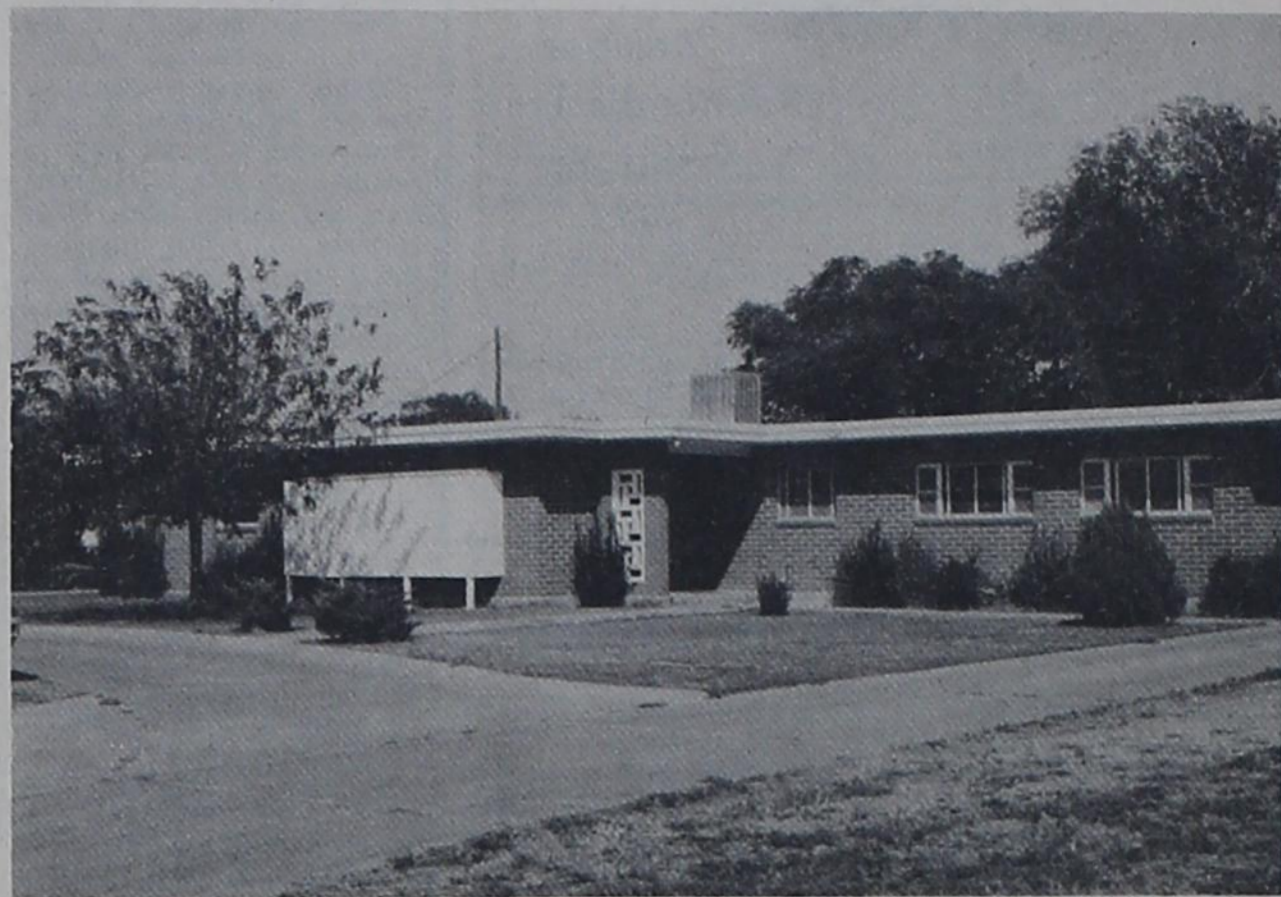
Scattered rains accompanied by cool temperatures gave the area around the Twin Cities a slight relief Thursday night and Friday morning from the recent unusually warm temperatures.

Although maize, cotton and corn crops need warm weather to assure farmers of a good yield and bountiful harvest, farmers still welcome rain if it doesn't last too long.

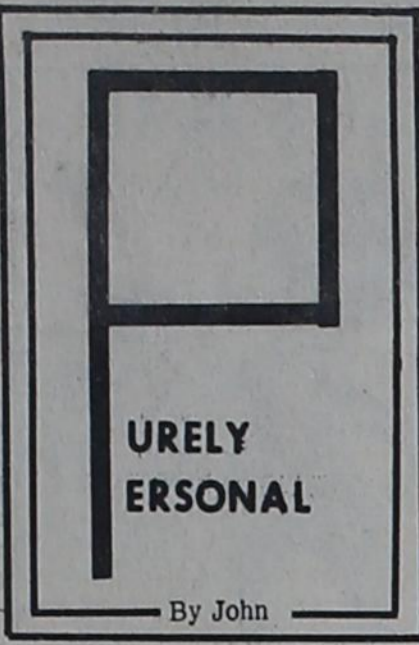
More wind and electricity came out of the clouds Thursday night than rain, but an area south of Texico received approximately one inch of moisture.

Around Lariat, .3 inch was reported. Only sprinkles of rain were received in an area northeast of Farwell. South of Farwell, one rain gauge showed .52 inch.

Only a trace of moisture was reported for the Oklahoma Lane area. In Texico-Farwell approximately .1 inch fell. Everyone surveyed reported a large amount of electricity in the air during the rain and considerably high winds.

Members of the Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, Leon Grissom, Dick Rocky, Alton Morris, Jimmie Cockerham and A. L. Black, met in a special called meeting with the County Commissioners' Court recently.

Purpose of the meeting was to amend the Running Water Draw Watershed work plan. The amendment as approved sets up procedures for relocation of improvements as needed at the sites of the planned floodwater dams. This will expedite the construction of the dams.

At the regular meeting Tuesday, Sept. 7, the District Board took action on the regular business of the District. Highlights of the session included approval of a request to store additional water to allow irrigation from the Lazbuddie site of the Running Water Draw Wa-

tershed Project; reviewing the priorities for application for Great Plains Contracts submitted by A. L. Reznik, Leon Billington and John Hays; and discussion of the upcoming director's election for zone three.

It was also decided the Farmer County District's representatives to the State Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts Convention at McAllen in October will be A. L. Black, Dick Rocky and Alton Morris.

Business conducted each month by the district board is of vital interest to all Farmer County residents. Each and every person is invited to meet with the board at its regular scheduled sessions.

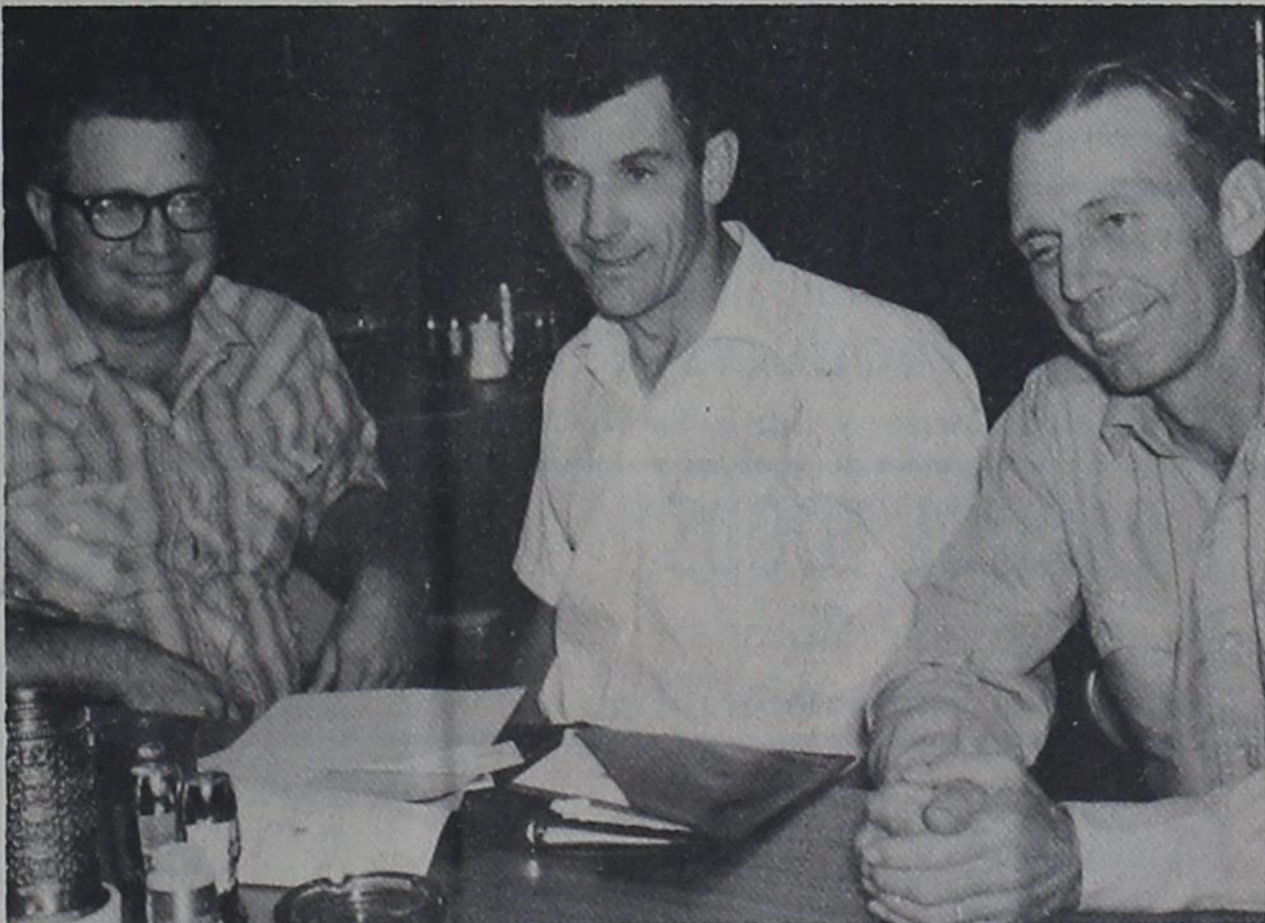

Chili Supper Set Friday

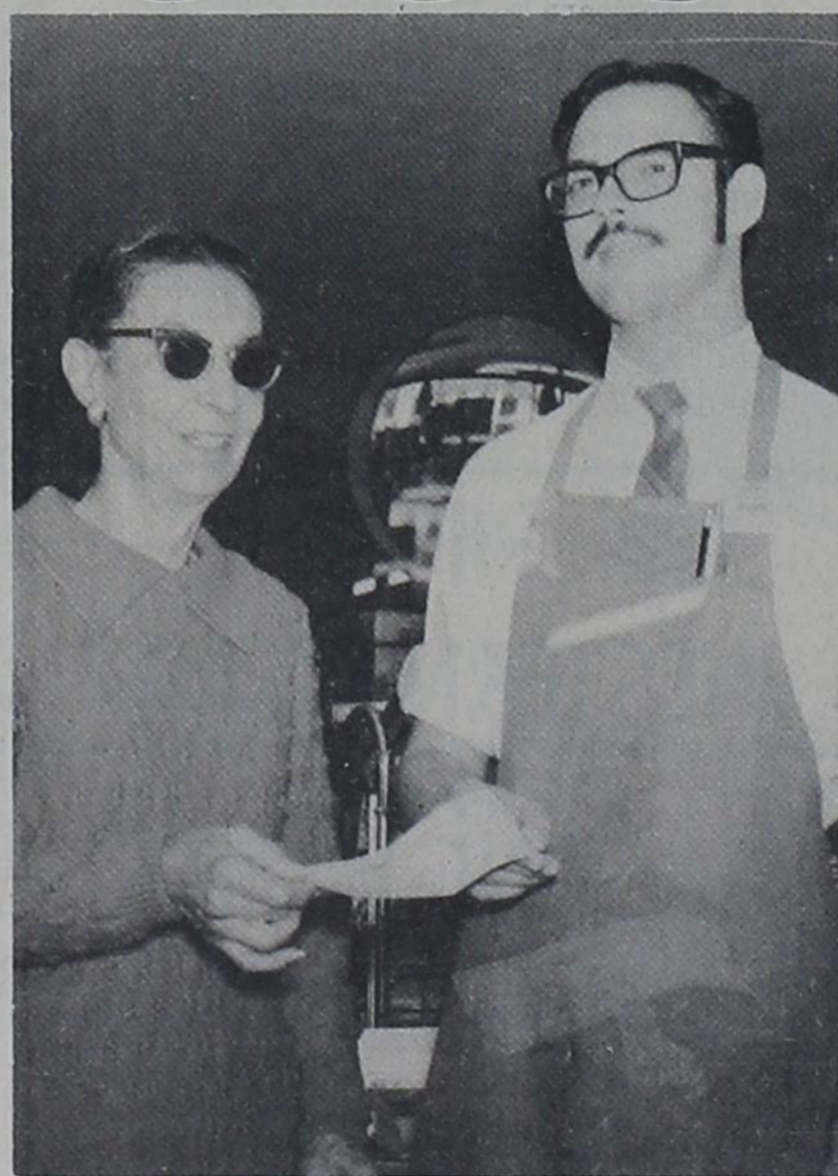

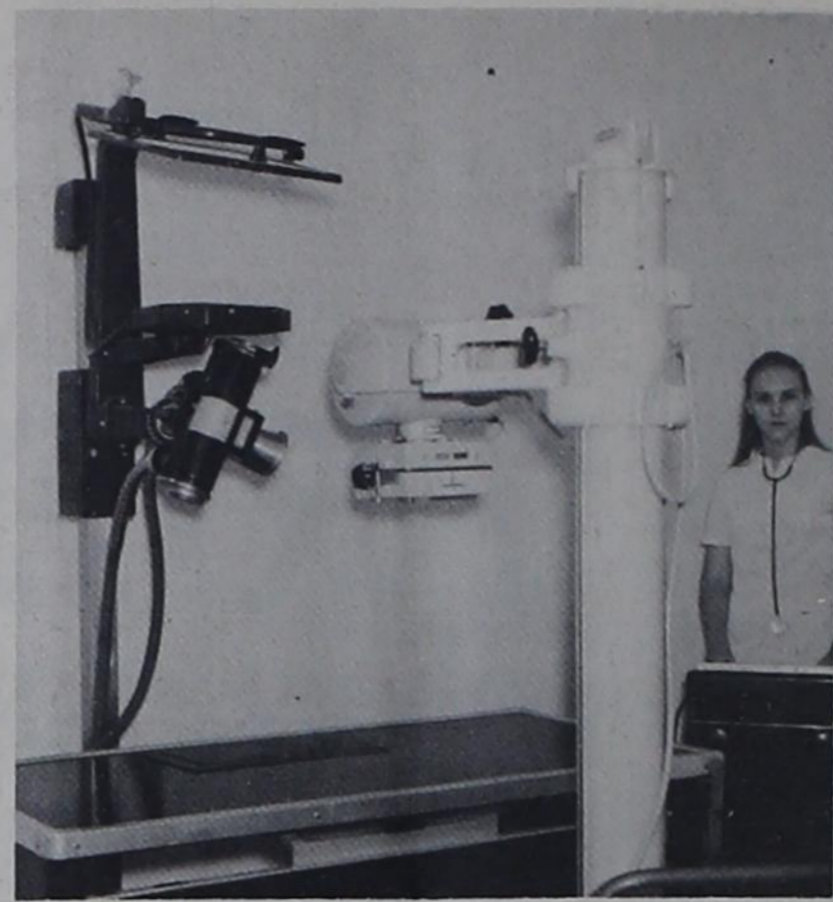

Texico Blanks Vaughn In 20-0 District Win

Texico Wolverines ran three touchdowns and a two-point conversion to blank their first district opponent, Vaughn, 20-0, last Friday night in Vaughn.

Albert Steward, the Wolverine's rushing fullback, ran 45 yards for a TD in the first quarter of the game. The conversion attempt failed. He came back in the second quarter to slip across the line from five yards out and added a two-point conversion.

Randy Harrison, sophomore quarterback, made the Wolverine's first score when he ran 15 yards to give the Texico team their initial score in the first quarter. The score was then 6-0. By the half, the Wolverine's had a total victory with a score of 20-0 over Vaughn.

Head Coach Jim Wynne said his defense looked good the entire game. In the first quarter, they controlled the ball and didn't make many mistakes," he said.

"We had more than one opportunity to score in the second quarter when we didn't, but we started fumbling the ball," he stated. Bad weather began to plague both teams by the second quarter.

"By the time we started the second half, the field was slicker and the weather was worse. We didn't have very good blocking but did make some yardage. They (Vaughn) couldn't move the ball either," reported the coach.

"By the time we reached the fourth quarter, you couldn't see the field for the rain and fog. Nobody could control the ball at this time," he said. "We made an outstanding effort under the conditions. Dimmitt Skunks Farwell In Second Season Game

Farwell Steers dropped their second game of the season to the Dimmitt Bobcats in Dimmitt last Friday night by a score of 26-0 in a very wet encounter. Most of the game was played in a frigid mist, but this was not the main cause of discomfort on the field.

After the pouring rains began during the second quarter, most of the players weren't so worried about freezing to death as they were about drowning. With the exception of four break-away runs by the Bobcats, the game was a pretty even affair, each side gaining a total of 10 first downs.

Andy Bowers kicked off for Farwell and the Bobcats began the first series of the game on the 20 after the ball rolled out of the end zone. But, after three plays and five yards, the Cats were forced to punt to the Steers on the 40.

After three more plays and only six yards, the Steers very courteously punted back to the Bobcats. Obviously touched by the Steers' kindness, Dimmitt drove from the 20 to within 35 yards of the goal line.

There, Nati Anes broke through the Steer left, found some running room, and fled in the general direction of the still-distant goal line with three or four Steers in hot pursuit. Obviously inspired by this fact, Anes turned it on and crossed over the goal line into the promised land for the first points of the game. After the two-point conversion attempt failed, the score was 6-0.

The rest of the half, Farwell defense, led by Johnny Franse, Larry Erwin and Micky Lunsford, again turned in a fine performance, never allowing Dim-

mitt more than four consecutive plays.

The Steer offense, on the running abilities of Ray Norton and Larry Erwin ran to within 30 yards of the goal line, but never could quite hit the winning combination that would put them over this line. And so it was that the half ended, a series of fruitless exchanges in a very cold rain.

The second half began in much the same way that the first half ended, trading possession of the ball in the rain. This rain, which made the footing treacherous, the ball slippery, and everything sort of miserable, contributed a lot to this situation.

Then, Dimmitt, finding themselves faced with a third and five on their own 30, sent Daniel Frierson charging through the line. Frierson broke a tackle and raced away to paydirt 70 yards away. Once again, a two-point conversion attempt was smashed and the score stood 12-0.

On their next possession, Dimmitt drove to a first and ten 29 yards from the goal. From here, Jerry Matthews broke through the tenacious Steer defense and legged it to the goal line. After Nati Anes's two-point conversion, the score rose to 20-0.

When Dimmitt regained possession of the ball, they drove to the 38 against the dogged Farwell defense, despite the efforts of Mike Travis, Ty Phillips and Terry Craft. Charles Stewart smashed his way to pay-dirt from there, and, after another unsuccessful extra point attempt, the tally rose

to 26-0. The game ended, a defensive struggle.

Head Coach Toby Booth said his defense was 100 per cent better than last week. "I received more effort on offense than last week, also. We moved the ball much better than we previously had," he stated.

"We still have two many mistakes and we could't score. Ray Norton and Larry Erwin showed up much better this week with their running. We know we're improving and we hope to be ready to play our district games," said Coach Booth.

"The whole team looked real good last week," he said.

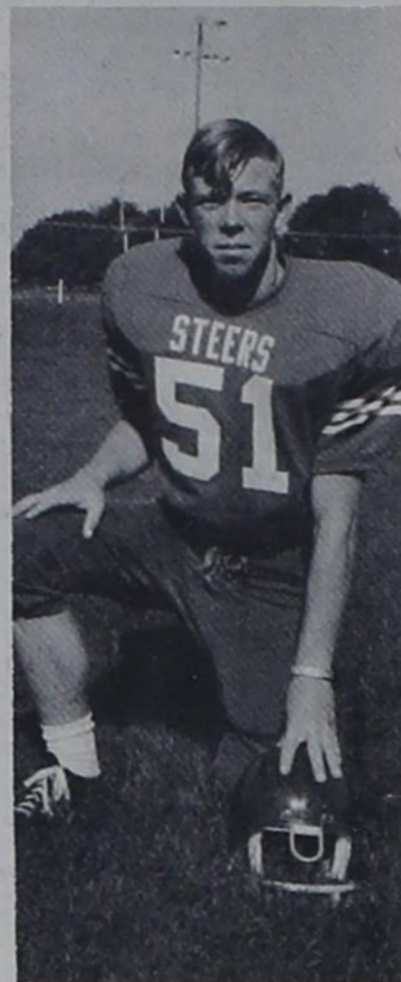

THE WATER OF LIFE

For almost twenty-four hours, Chicagoans had to boil their drinking water! Millions of small fish had jammed the water intakes far out in Lake Michigan, and had died there. It was, of course, a major operation to clear them all away and make sure that Chicago's drinking water was uncontaminated.

It is of the utmost importance, always, that the water we drink is pure and fresh, and this is no less so where spiritual matters are concerned. The Bible has much to say about stagnant water, and foul water, and poisoned water, but the spiritual life of those who trust in Christ for salvation is called "the pure water of life," doubtless because it is so wholesome and refreshing.

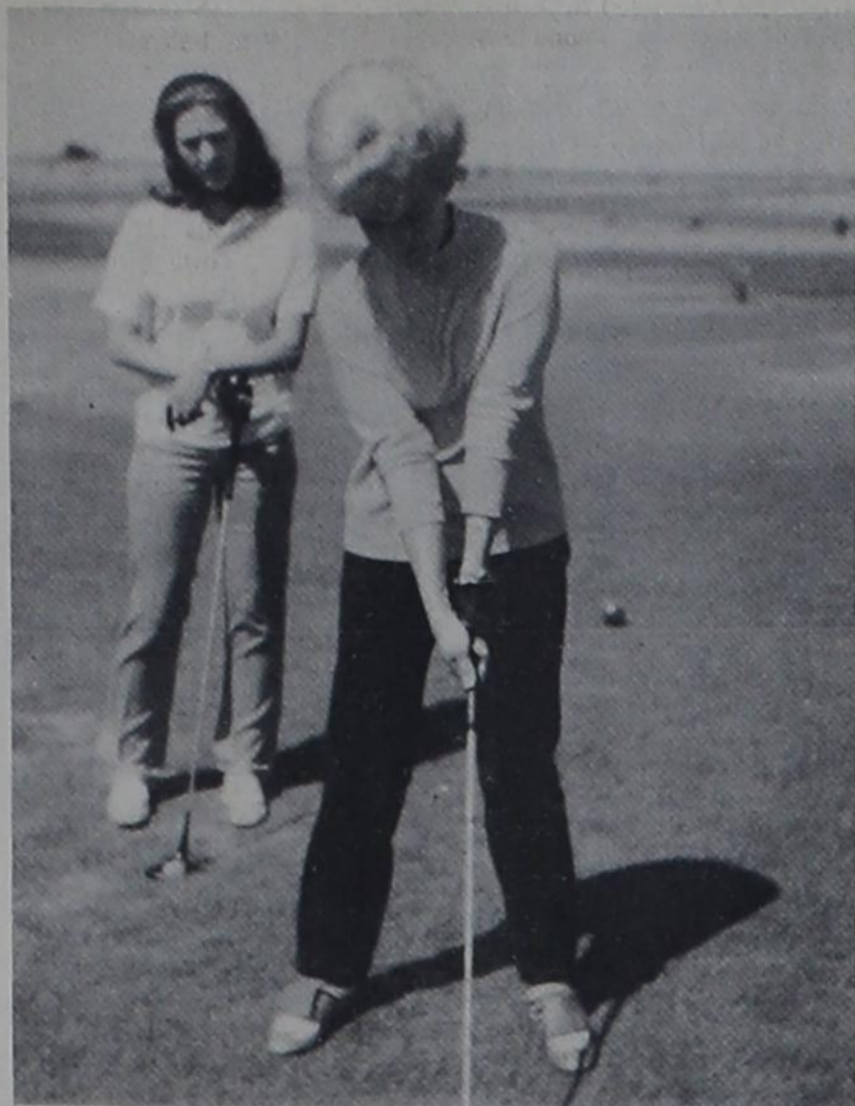
Perhaps the reader will recall the picture our Lord drew for that sinful Samaritan woman at the well of Sychar. John 4:10-14 tells how He and the Samaritan woman discussed Jacob's well. Somehow she seemed to sense that He was contrasting her vain pursuit of pleasure with eternal life when He said:

"Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again, but whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him, a fountain of water, springing up into everlasting life" (Vers. 13,14).

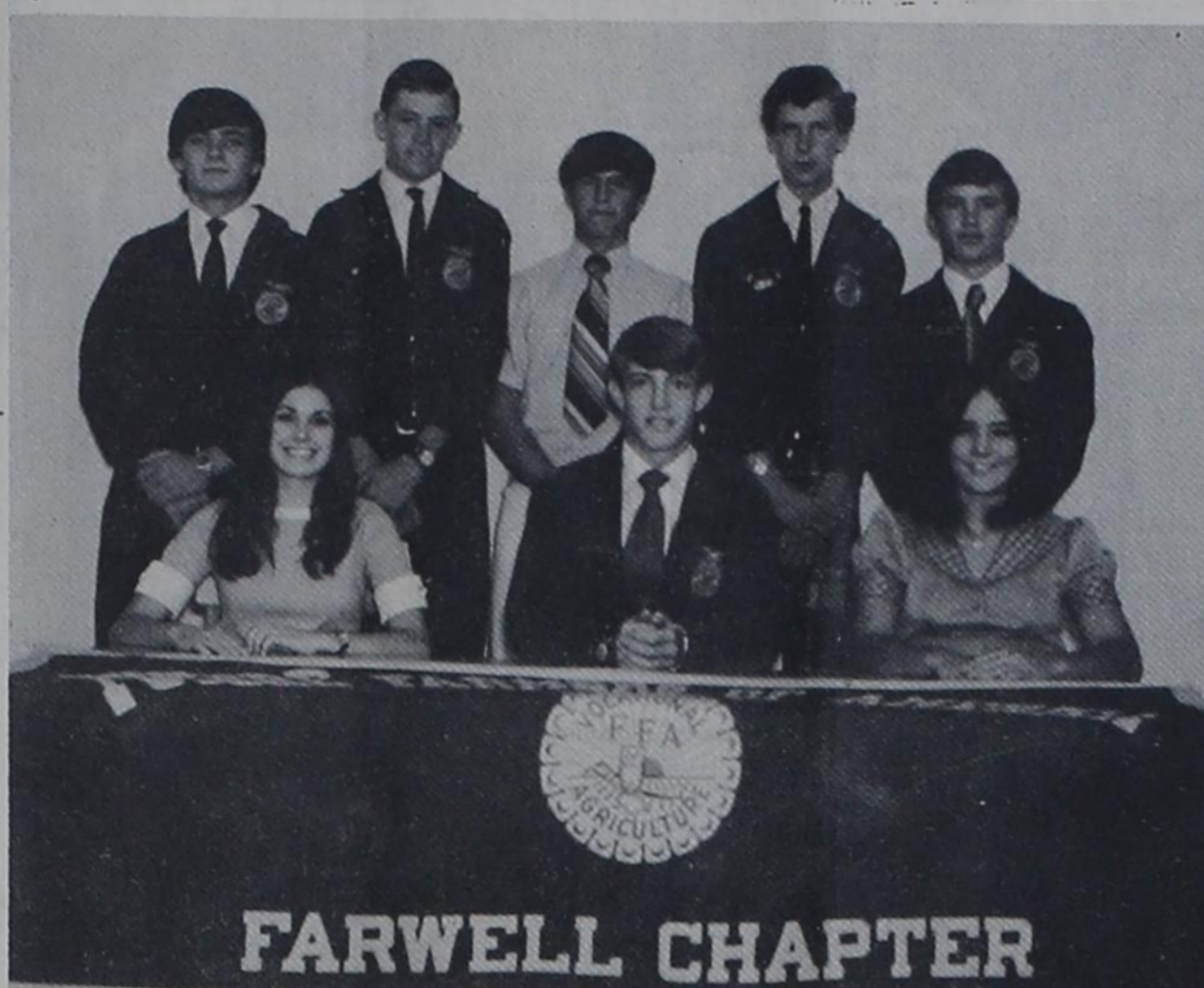

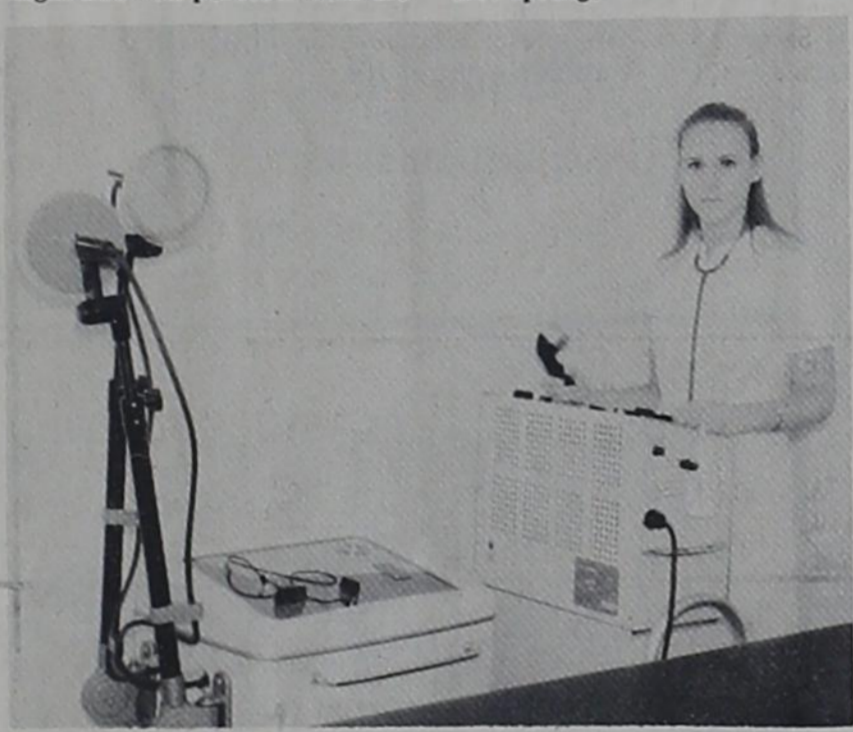
Farwell Girl Named Alternate Twirler
