Pianist will be Mike Teague; song leader will be Beth Kelley; and working in the nursery will be Lisa Reid and Mark Teague.

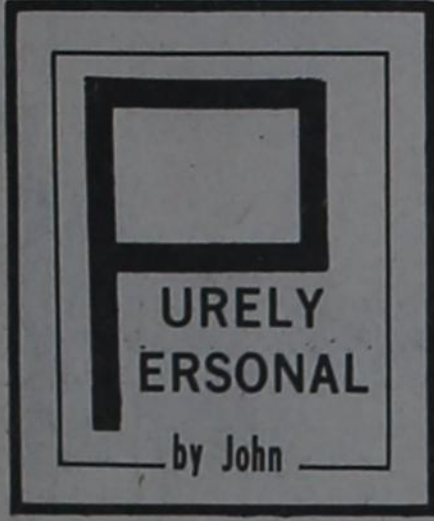
A jointly sponsored VBS will take place in the Oklahoma Lane community conducted by

If you watched the Indy 500 on television Sunday night you watched more commercials than racing. The FCC sets a time on the amount of commercials that can be crammed into a 30 or 60 minute program. It must not set rules on special broadcasts such as the re-run of the 500 later in the day. In our humble opinion "it stunk."

This week the Texas Legislature will act on a bill very important to us in this area. In fact, we believe that it is very important to all Texans. It is the bill to take the state fuel tax off of alcohol containing fuels. At this writing, the House of Representatives has passed the bill overwhelmingly. It now awaits the action of the State Senate.

This is the vulnerable spot. At this late date in the session of the legislature there cannot be any delays or other parliamentary maneuvers. The bill must be passed as the House of Representatives passed it. An amendment or even a delay in floor consideration could kill it this session.

As we are told, a combination of "good roads" interest and the State Farm Bureau stand a big chance of getting it K.O.'ed for this legislative session.

We do not think that the bill will work a long term hardship on the ability of the state to care for its highway system. We do think that the bill will enable a fledgling industry to get started. As it now stands all the states abutting Texas have passed laws taking their respective state tax off of gasohol. If Texas does not go along, the alcohol production industry in Texas may never get off the ground.

As we have often stated we firmly believe that the use of alcohol to supplement the gasoline supply is going to be essential in the years ahead. We believe that without the alcohol market for our farm grains our area will soon see irrigated farming severely curtailed. For a sinking feeling just contemplate what a return to a dry land economy would be for the Golden Spread.

As with all things there are two sides. Yet we think that the long term good for all segments of the Texas economy require the passage of this bill - at this session of the legislature.

Well, it didn't take the Turks long to deal with the plane hijackers who asked for release of terrorists in their Turkish prisons. They just said NO and that they would execute those terrorists they now held if any of the plane hostages were harmed. How refreshing.

There are ten good things for which no one has ever been sorry; for doing good to all; for speaking evil to no one; for hearing before judging; for thinking before speaking; for holding an angry tongue; for being kind to the distressed; for asking pardon for all wrongs; for being patient toward everybody; for stopping the ear to the tale bearer; for disbelieving the most of the evil reports.

## 1931 THS Graduate Speaks At Texico Commencement

Numerous "firsts" highlighted the commencement exercises for 42 Texico seniors last Thursday night.

For the "first" time, the graduation exercises were scheduled for a Thursday evening, a departure from the traditional Friday exercises in the past.

Co-valedictorians and co-salutatorians spoke during the commencement, for another "first." Tying scholastically for the valedictorian honors were Nikie McDaniel and Lisa Coffey, while Carletta Fitz and Schree Rucker also tied scholastically for the salutatorian honor.

Gary Mitchell who ranked "third" academically presented the class history.

It was also the first time a graduating class was address-

ed by a THS graduate who had been involved in his own graduation exercises only 50 years ago.

Tom Langston, a 1931 Texico graduate, returned to the school to share with the class of 1981 some of his personal reminiscences about his own high school days, and to reveal the challenges that awaited each of the 42 seniors in the future.

Langston, who has taught at West Texas State University and holds a bachelor's degree from the University of New Mexico and a master's degree from WTSU, cautioned the seniors not to look at graduation as a sad, tearful event but instead to recognize it as a new beginning for their future.

For their final "first," the 42

seniors did not end their recessional at the back of the Wolverine Gymnasium as other graduating classes had done, but instead, class president Rhonda Tharp and other class officers invited the audience to participate in the recessional by joining the seniors as they continued their recessional to the east end of the high school where they held a brief unveiling and presentation ceremony for the class gift.

The seniors stopped the recessional briefly to ask Mrs. W.B. Walters to share with them their final march.

Outdoors, Mrs. Walters assisted the seniors as they unveiled a large white granite monument inscribed with the words, "Texico Municipal

## Thirty-Two Receive Diplomas At Farwell

Farwell High School graduated one of its smaller classes in recent years Tuesday night when 32 seniors received their diplomas in commencement exercises in the school auditorium.

Clay Williams, valedictorian of the class, also received the top two awards, the Loving Cup and the Cecil Dykes Citizenship Award. The Loving Cup, presented to the best all-around senior each year since 1928, carries with it a \$50 Savings Bond from Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Cooper. Their son, Dr. Larry Cooper, had a new base put on the original cup in 1968 in honor of the class of that year so that additional names might be added to the coveted trophy.

The Cecil Dykes award annually goes to the senior who has displayed the best citizenship in and out of the classroom during his high school career.

Judith Schilling was recipient of the Farwell Jaycees \$500 scholarship to be used at a college of her choice. It was presented by Delton Wilhite,

vice-president of the organization, who said that financial need and grades are not the main things considered in choosing the scholarship recipient; it is given on the basis of a resume written by the applicant to the organization when seeking the scholarship.

Presidential awards of \$100 each from West Texas State University were presented to the top three ranked students in the class, Clay Williams, Robin Vinton and Lawrence Gobble. Miss Vinton also received a scholarship to church-related colleges in Texas as while Williams received the top ranking student scholarship to state supported colleges in Texas as well as the church related schools. He also received offers of scholarships from East Texas State University and South Plains College.

High School Principal Don Malone presented the awards and diplomas were presented by Doyle Ford, Billy Mayfield and David Gobble.

W.M. Roberts, school superintendent, announced that five

members of the staff and faculty were to receive service pins. To receive a five-year pin is Coach Royce Baker. Nancy Burch and Edith Martin, teachers, qualified for 10-year pins; Foster Watkins, custodian, will receive a 15-year pin; and Robbie Johnson, cafeteria manager, will also receive a 10-year pin.

Following the processional, played by Eunice Schilling and Peggy Sudderth, Ralph Gates, minister of the Farwell Church of Christ, gave the invocation.

Robin Vinton presented the salutatory address and Lawrence Gobble read the class history. Clay Williams presented the valedictory speech prior to presentation of the awards.

Howard Rhodes, pastor of Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church, gave the benediction, and after the recessional the graduates sang the school song, ending their days as students at Farwell High.

# City Hears Plans For ESA Memorial Fountain

Farwell city councilmen conducted a brief session Tuesday night where a new city office employee was hired and a report on the Judy Jones memorial water fountain was given by Theta Rho ESA sorority member Robin Gregory.

Hired to assist City Clerk Janie Bowery at city hall was Debra Long of Texico. She was selected over four other applicants.

ESA member Robin Gregory reported to the council on the progress of the local sorority's plans to erect a water fountain in Farwell City Park in the

memory of the late Judy Jones.

Mrs. Gregory said that the fountain would be brick with a stone slab and have two fountains, one tall and one short for the children's use.

She explained that the stone had been ordered and the brick work had been checked into. Council members were told that an existing slab which once housed a barbecue pit may be used for the new fountain.

Mrs. Gregory reported that she had met with Farwell's water superintendent Dee Hammit and discussed drain-

age, insulation and upkeep with him.

The estimated cost of the fountain is expected to be \$470, (to be paid by the sorority), she said, adding, "and we're going to get right to work on it."

She said that the sorority has hopes of beginning work on the project immediately after the first of June.

Once completed, a special dedication ceremony is planned, and Mrs. Gregory invited the city fathers to take part in the ceremony.

In other city business, the council voted to renew two CD's which are set to mature Friday, May 29. City clerk Bowery was instructed to renew the CD's at the current interest rates. One of the CD's is \$10,000 and the other is \$11,071.38.

The council also voted to call a public variance hearing for Bill Prince who is requesting the placement of a mobile home in an area not zoned for mobile homes. The hearing is to take place at the next City Council meeting, set for June 15 at city hall beginning at 5:15 p.m. CDT.

Prince has requested permission to place a mobile home on Ninth Street in Farwell just north of the ASCS office.

Attending the Tuesday night meeting were Mayor Walter Kaltwasser and city council member Fred Chandler; city clerk Janie Bowery; city employees Jackie Doshier and Steve Long; and visitors Debra Long and Robin Gregory.

Absent was city councilman Johnny Curtis.

## Bovina Man Dies In Wed. Accident

A Bovina man was killed and one was injured in a one-car accident Wednesday morning just outside the Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply on highway 1731.

David Steelman, 20, of Bovina was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident after he was thrown from the vehicle in which he was riding.

Driver Kevin Hughes, 18, of Bovina was transferred to Muleshoe hospital with facial lacerations and chest injuries.

According to investigating officer Craig Hunt, of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the accident occurred at approximately 4:44 a.m. CDT Wednesday morning.

Hughes was headed north on

1731 towards Bovina when his vehicle, a 1981 Camaro Z28, left the road allegedly on the left hand side. The vehicle then hit a culvert and became airborne.

The vehicle came to rest 127 feet down the road after turning several times end-over-end in mid air, according to the officer.

Officer Hunt stated that in his opinion if the two had been wearing seatbelts the death and injuries would not have occurred. "The inside of the car was still intact. If they had been wearing the belts they wouldn't have been killed or seriously injured, in my opinion," the DPS officer said.

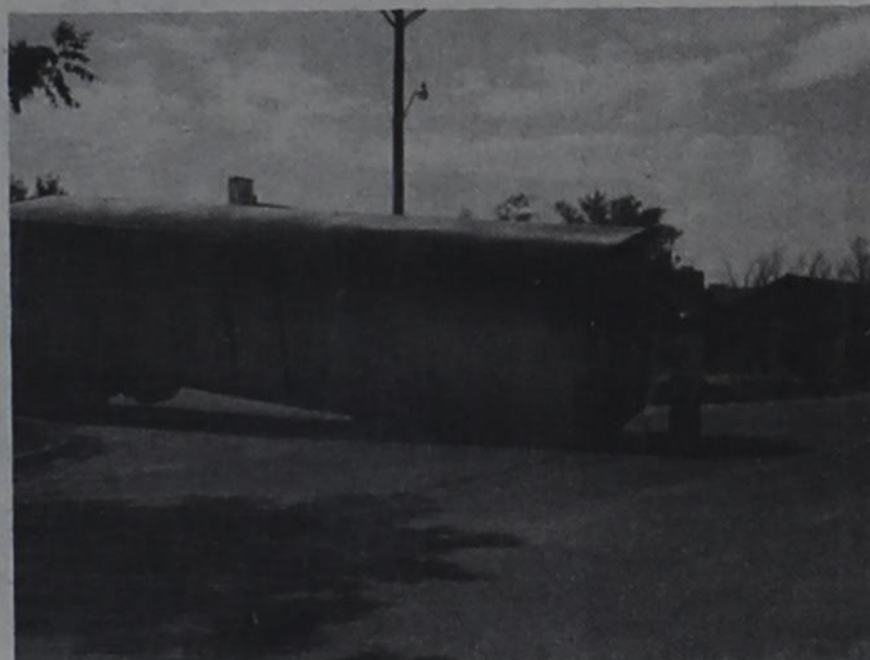
## Report Cards Ready At Texico Schools

"With our own population at 220 million and growing, and with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses on

"Society's Pressure Points" as its theme and covers such topics as soil and water conservation, urbanization, and loss of prime farmland.

Information and materials for the 1981 observance of Soil Stewardship Week have been made available to local churches from Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

football coach. "Always remember to set your goals high and apply the three D's."

Roanhaus spoke to the audience about three famous physically handicapped people, Glen Cunningham, a boy who was injured in a fire and was told he would never walk again, but nonetheless went on to win a silver medal at the 1936 olympics in track; President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who even though had been struck with paralyzing polio went on to become President of the United States; and Helen Keller, a woman who was deaf and blind but who still lived a full life traveling the world for the aid and benefit of handicapped people.

"Your goals should be no less important to you than theirs were to them," said Roanhaus, "and remember, you have to be willing to sacrifice to achieve your goals."

Roanhaus concluded his talk by saying, "The only obstacle between us and our goals is

In an effort to cope with the high cost of living, many families have adopted the old philosophy of "use it up, make it do, do without it."

It is in this spirit that the following hints are offered. Often the small savings add up to big ones!

**Stain Removal** - Don't let stains ruin your clothing, replacing clothing is a big expense! Treat stains while they are fresh, so they don't become permanent.

First read all information on the garments' care label.

In general, if a stain is not greasy--and if the garment is washable--you can remove the stain with a little water and blotting.

For oily stains, use a grease solvent or a spot remover before washing the garment.

**Food Mixes** - Can you save money by making your own convenience foods? Are they worth the trouble you have to go to?

For this salad dressing mix you could save 33 cents by doing it yourself!

**SALAD DRESSING MIX**  
2 tablespoons salt

1 tablespoon parsley flakes  
3/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
3/4 teaspoon white pepper  
1 tablespoon oregano  
1 1/2 teaspoons powdered onion  
Combine all ingredients in a jar and mix well. To use, add 2 1/2 teaspoons mix to 1/2 cup vinegar and 2/3 cups of salad oil and shake well.

For creamy salad dressing, add 2 teaspoons seasoning mix to 3/4 cup mayonnaise, 1/4 cup sour cream and 2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice and stir well. This makes enough mix to season six cups of salad dressing at 6 cents per cup.

**Make-up** - is one of the high price items in a budget. To make lipstick go further, scoop the last bit from the tube and mix with petroleum jelly. Put in a small container and use as a tinted lip gloss.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

On April 16, 1981, Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an application for tariff changes as follows:

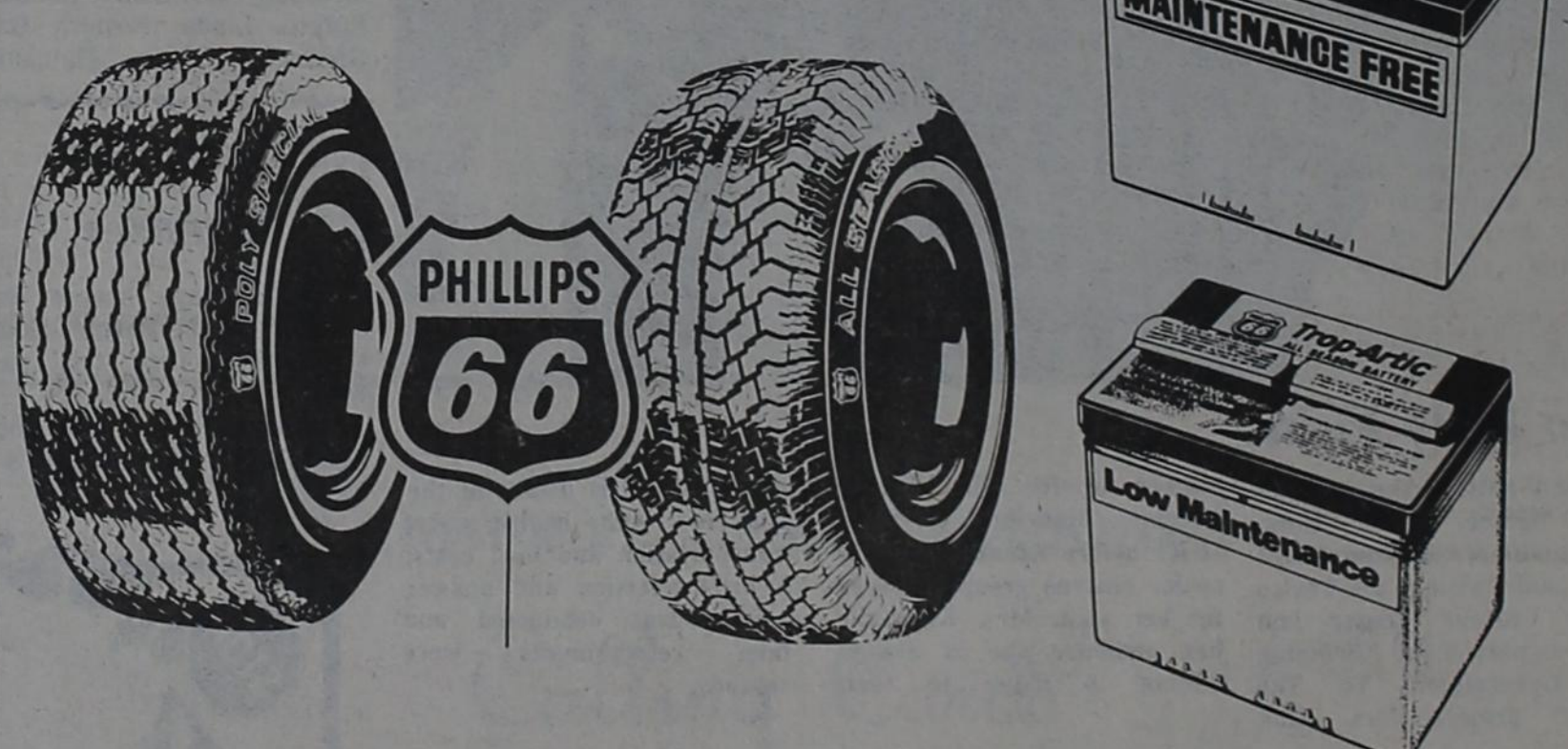

## Plan Better Water Use Before Drilling

"We've had several complaints recently," say officials of High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1. "Folks developing new irrigation wells for production have been pumping their water down the county road bar ditch. This is not only a waste of valuable water and energy, but it is a violation of the rules of the Water District."

Many irrigators who allow

their water to escape during the development of a new well most often have not planned how they can conveniently use the water before they begin the drilling of the new well.

An excellent example of groundwater conservation was observed in Parmer County awhile back. During the process of pumping out a new irrigation well, overflow from

the slush pit was used to prewater 25 rows or about five acres on a farm near Lazbuddie. Said the operator, "I would value that salvaged water at approximately thirty dollars an acre."

Operators planning to develop new wells or rework old ones should plan ahead and put that potential waste water to good use, advise District officials.

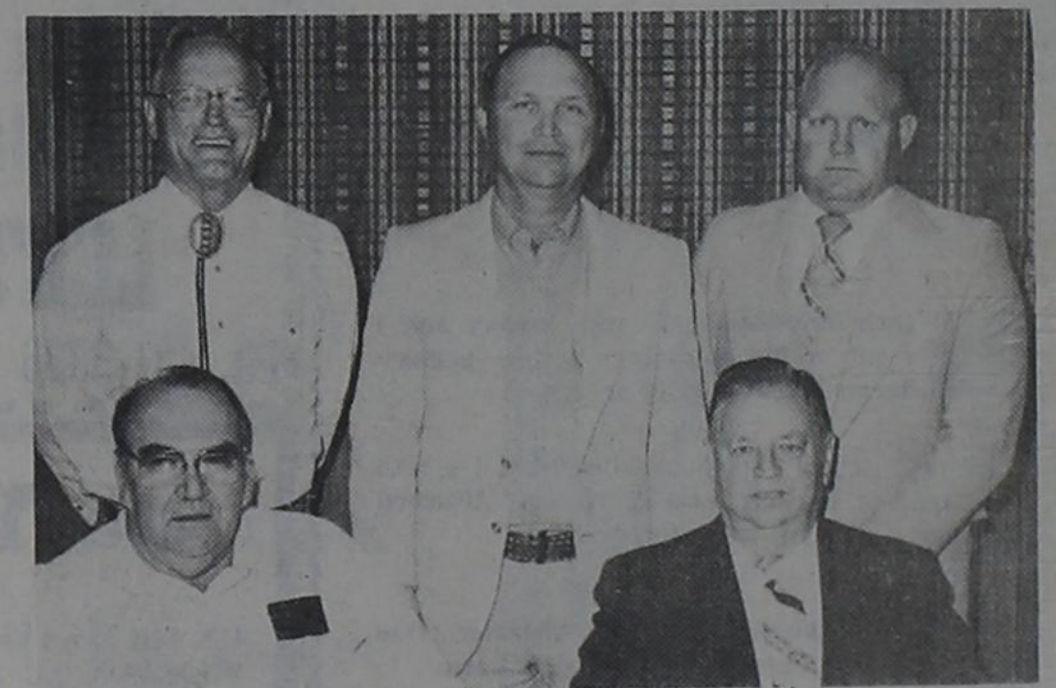

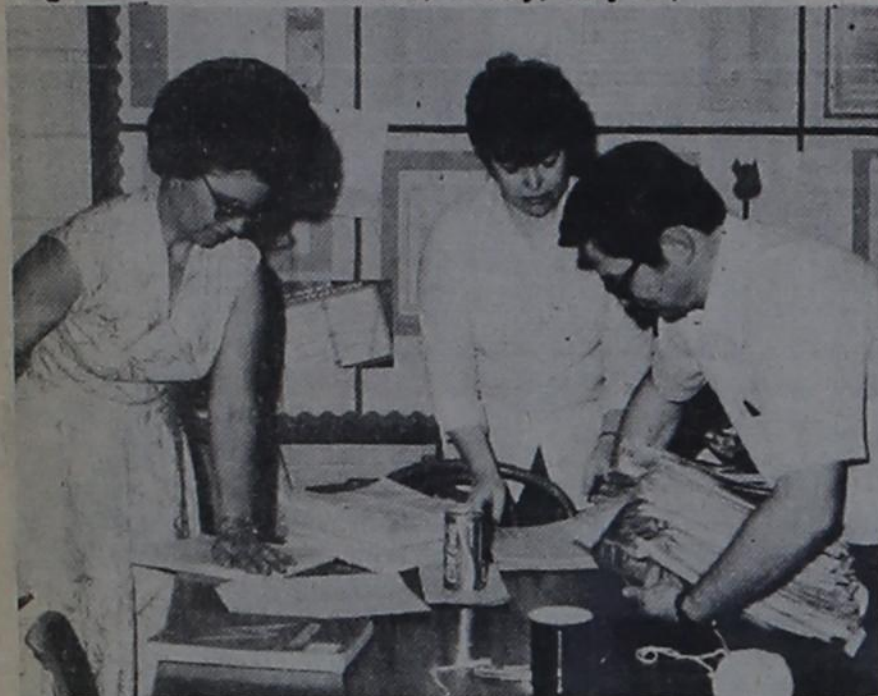

Dear Food Focus:

How can bacon be bacon when it tastes like bacon but doesn't look or cook like bacon? Is the new kind of bacon real bacon?

No More Bacon Drippings

Dear Drippings:  
I think you are referring to a new breakfast pork that is cured, chopped and formed into slabs, then thinly sliced. It includes more lean meat than regular bacon and may or may not be made from the same cuts as regular bacon.

The dictionary defines bacon as salted and smoked meat from the back or sides of a hog. By this definition - yes, the new product is bacon.

A similar beef product - flaked steak - has been developed and may show up at the market soon. It is made by flaking the beef rather than grinding it. The flakes are pressed into the desired shape - usually a steak shape.

The process uses less expensive cuts of beef and the result is the texture and consistency of a steak rather than a hamburger - but closer to hamburger prices.

The new product is being test-marketed at this time.

Dear Food Focus:

I have a new microwave oven and I just can't seem to

cook vegetables to the degree of doneness we like. Can you help me?

Hate Crunchy Vegetables

Dear Crunchy:  
Probably one of the best ways to get vegetables "just right" is to increase the standing time of the vegetables at the end of the cooking period. Cook them to a slightly underdone stage, then allow them to stand, covered, for several minutes.

Food continues to cook after being removed from the microwave oven and if this extra cooking time is not taken into consideration, food may be over cooked.

Because microwaves cook the outside of the food first, push the vegetables against the sides of the container leaving a hollow in the middle.

Microwave cooking takes less water than conventional cooking. Some high-moisture vegetables, such as summer squash or frozen vegetables, will not need any additional liquid. Always cover the dish to completely utilize the water. Add salt after the vegetables are cooked to prevent drying.

### DEAD WORKS

Twice in Paul's epistles he refers to "dead works." In Heb. 6:1 he writes about "repentance from dead works," while in Heb. 9:14 he declares that the blood of Christ avails to "purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God."

Mark well, these references are not to wicked works but to dead works. These "dead works" are the so-called "good works" (whether moral or ceremonial) which men did - and still do - to make themselves acceptable to God. They are "dead" because they are not the product of regeneration or spiritual life, but the mere attempt on the part of unregenerate sinners to justify themselves before God.

Paul himself, once zealously religious but wholly unsaved, had to repudiate his "dead works" and count them "loss" to find salvation in Christ, through whom alone he could produce good works which God could accept (Phil. 3:4-9).

This is why he later declared by divine inspiration: "For by grace are ye saved, through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast, for we are His workmanship,

created in Christ Jesus unto good works." (Eph. 2:8-10).

"Dead works" are not only unacceptable to God, but an evil substitute for the faith He desires, "for without faith it is impossible to please God" (Heb. 11:6). But "he that believeth on the Son of God hath life" and this life is bound to bear fruit - the good works with which God is truly pleased.

The difference between the "good works" of the unregenerate man and the "good works" of a true believer, then, is that the former are "dead works" while the latter are the precious fruit of life possessed.

No man can please God while he denies the truth of His Word or rejects His Son, so graciously given to die on the cross as our Savior. To try to win His favor by "good works" is like sending a gift to a man whose beloved son you spurn and despise.

"The Father loveth the Son, and hath given all things into His hand. He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life: but the wrath of God abideth on him" (John 3:35,36).

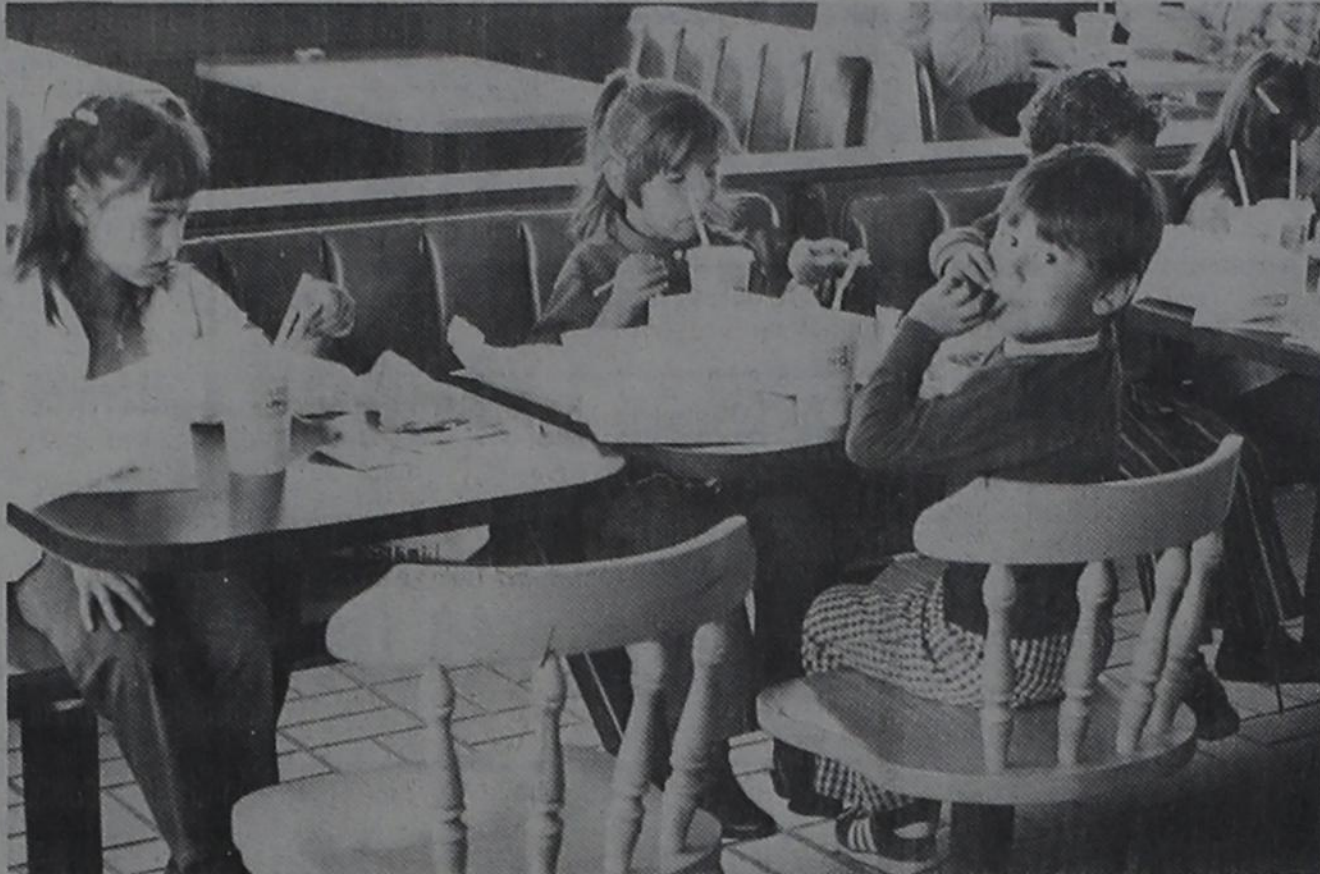

L.E. "Pete" Davis, president of New Mexico Farm & Livestock Bureau, reported on his recent trip to Washington, D.C. While there, he worked on the new farm program which was being written at that time. He said basically the bill was what Farm Bureau has been advocating. Members of Farm Bureau were urged to write

their congressman and also to support Secretary of Interior Watts and Secretary of Agriculture Block in their endeavors.

In regard to the MX Missile being deployed in Eastern New Mexico, Davis said he didn't think it would come to this area but the expansion of Cannon Air Force Base and the Melrose Bombing Range were still in the mill.

The air force is moving forward on plans that are a carry over from the Carter administration and until President Reagan has a Summit meeting with other world powers little will be changed, commented Davis.

Hubert Qualls, president of CCFBL, asked about the 40 sections being explored for CAFB expansion. Davis said the Air Force has the authority to ask the Army Corp of Engineers for this survey.

James Williams, who served as chairman of the CCFBL MX-EIS review committee, said there is still a lot of activity going on in the area.

Williams said he had met with the state wheat advisory committee which is working to develop something that will protect the farmers grain in case of elevators going bankrupt. Higher bonding requirements for elevators is one

thing being considered, said Williams.

Davis said he would be attending a grain meeting in Chicago in August. One thing to be considered at this meeting will be warehouse receipts, how good are they?

Barbara Downey reported on Farm Festival activities. She said she was assisted by Nancy Barnes, Elna Beth Grau and Carol Pierce.

The Curry County Young Farmers and Ranchers will be promoting the Crime Prevention Program during Pioneer Days, said Butch Priest, state president of the YF&R.

State and local membership quotas have nearly reached their goals, according to Andy Norton, Roswell, field man for NMF&LB.

Basic dues for 1981-82 will be raised to \$43, said Norton, with the organization taking voluntary contributions in any amounts above that.

The increases in dues will help finance the state Farm Bureau legal defense fund which is used to fight legislation which Farm Bureau considers to be against their best interests.

Norton told directors that all members should be alert for labor bills that will continue to pop up and for animal welfare bills.

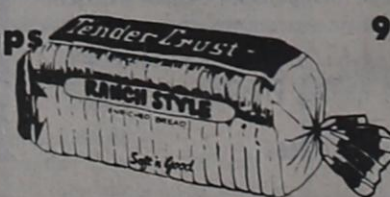
