## April 5 Is Final Date For Book Material

Businesses are also urged to submit their histories whether or not they have been contacted by a commission member. Histories and pictures should be mailed to Parmer County History Book, Box 577, Friona, Tex., 79035. Members of the commission say that if you cannot type your story or history, send it in and it will be typed for you.

Rates for business histories are \$180 for a full page; which will accommodate 1500 words; \$100 for one-half page which will be 750 words; or \$60 for one-quarter page or 325 words. Deadline for ordering the history books is May 1. Price of the books is \$35 each and must be prepaid when ordered. The historical commission will have its regular meeting April 2 at 3 p.m. at the fellowship hall of the Congregational Church in Friona. The public is invited.

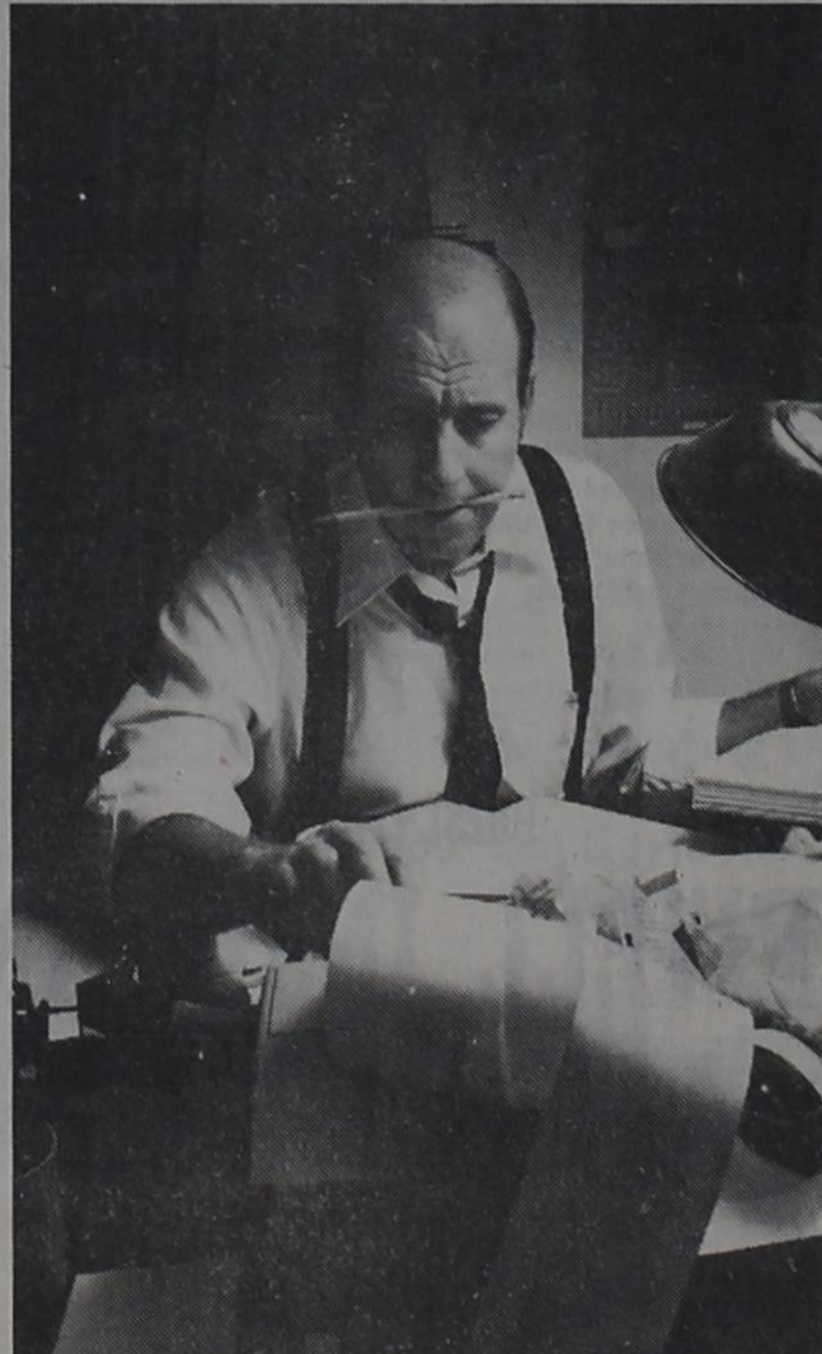

dispatch service. Nadine Edge has served as full time dispatcher for five years, taking all fire and emergency calls night and day, and keeping a log of these calls. 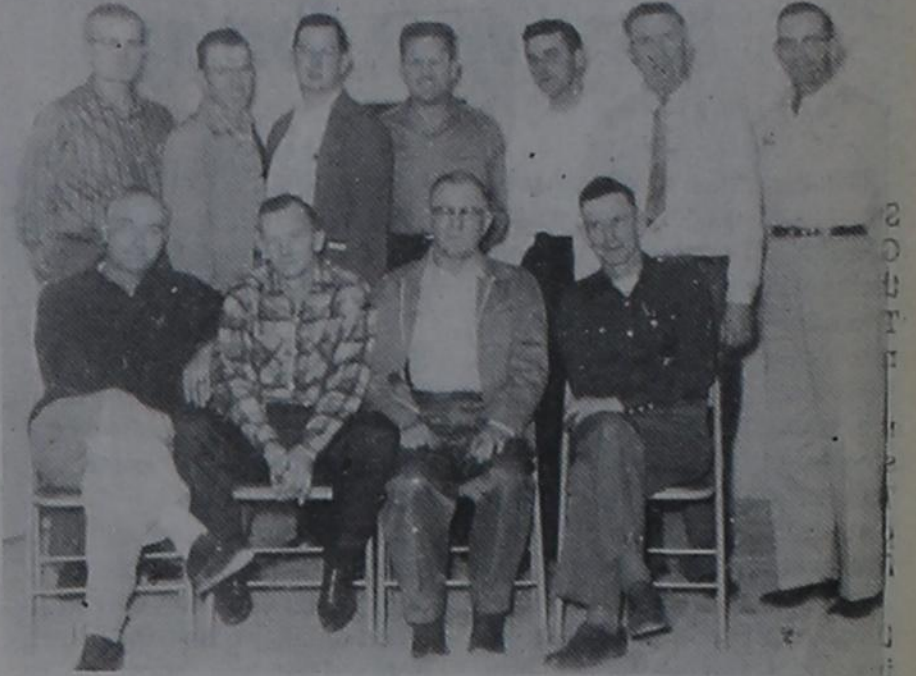
Besides their new building, the fireboys also acquired another new addition to their regiment in late September of 1980, the Firemen's Auxiliary Service Team, or FAST.

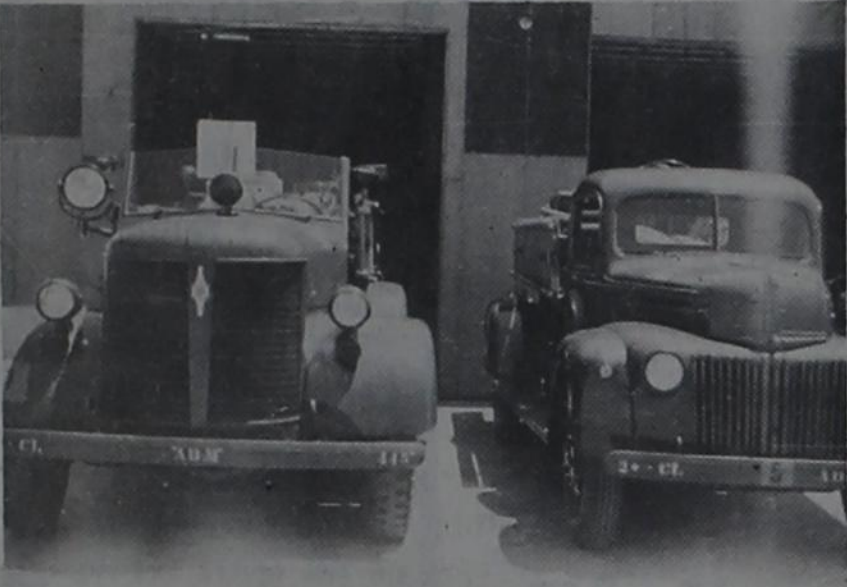

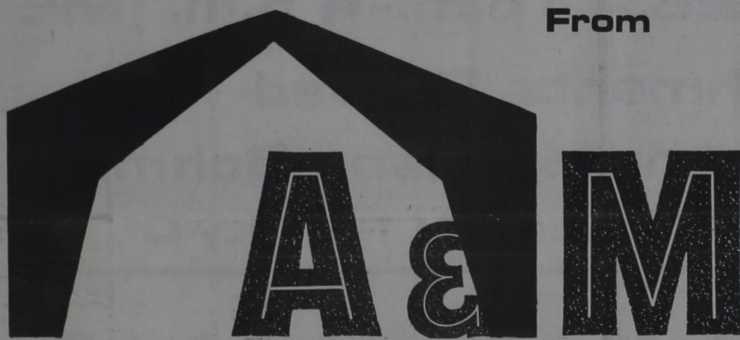


