Top Citizens Named At Texico Banquet

Texico citizens Maurine Caywood and Vane Doshier were honored as Woman and Man of the Year Monday night at Texico's Chamber of Commerce banquet where guest speaker Stanley White reminded those attending the annual affair that "you gotta have pride in what you do."

Held in the Texico high school gymnasium, the chamber banquet featured a meal of roast beef, baked potato and cherry cobbler. Dinner music was provided by Ed and Juanita Hardage.

Keynote speaker White, of Stephenville, Tex., told his audience that "if you don't know you can't, you can," and reminded people to "put trust in what you do."

White's speech was geared around Americanism and Patriotism and he said he believed that it was time for America "to stand up and be counted. There's nothing sorry about patriotism," he said.

Decorated with the theme of "pulling together" the gym took on a whole new look with banquet sized tables trimmed in blue and white gingham cloths with miniature trains "traveling" down the center.

Honored as Texico's leading citizens at Monday's Texico Chamber of Commerce Banquet, Maurine Caywood and Vane Doshier are both vital parts of the Twin City community.

In introducing her mother, last year's honoree Ann Cooper said, "Our woman for 1981 is an exceptionally talented and untiring community worker."

"She is an accomplished artist, plays the piano and can do any craft she has ever tried, and do them with ease."

"She and her husband moved from Clovis to Texico in 1973. She did not stay a stranger. First she joined the Texico Women's Club and served as historian for several terms and as treasurer for one term."

"She was a devoted and faithful member, helping the club with local projects and bringing home many awards from district and state conventions."

"She has been a member of the Order of Eastern Star for 35 years and has held every office at least once. She now serves as associate matron."

"She has been a member of the Methodist Church most of her adult life, and has taught

classes, sung in the choir, sponsored the Methodist Youth Fellowship, been church pianist, superintendent of Sunday Schools and belongs to the Women's Missionary Society. She and her husband now belong to the Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in Farwell.

"In 1974 she was instrumental in organizing the Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens group in Texico. She has served as their director for six years and still holds that position."

"Devoted to her job, she has seen the small group grow until they have a large membership and are still growing."

benefit in addition to her regular duties.

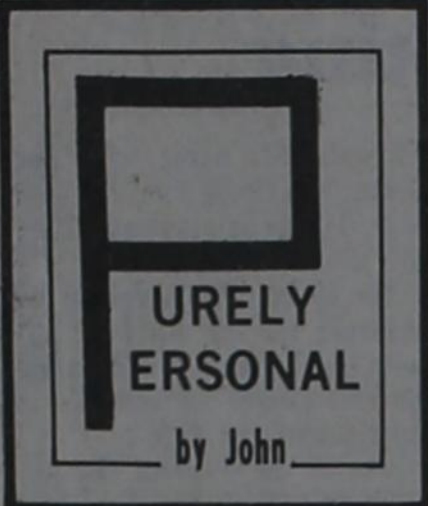
"She was born in Indiana and came to New Mexico at age three months. She attended grade school in Farwell and finished her education in Clovis."

Publishing a newspaper is a two-edged sword. It forces us to go and do when we would rather not. On the other hand it lets us go to so many enjoyable functions that we might otherwise miss. On balance the enjoyable evenings far outweigh the boring ones.

Two of our annual most enjoyable evenings are just past. We were able to attend the Farwell and the Texico Chambers of Commerce annual banquets and came away from both refreshed in body and spirit. In common with most folks we tend not to see the day by day accomplishments of our twin cities. We tend to take for granted the host of great people who compose these towns.

These annual banquets let us see through new eyes the area in which we live and work and to re-appreciate all the wonderful people we see day by day. We will have to be lame, spavined or bedridden to miss a local chamber banquet.

It is sad though to note that both communities suffered from lack of local attendance. We cannot understand why these great opportunities for fellowship are ignored by so many in our communities.

We tell you in all honesty that Farwell and Texico had delightful banquets with top notch speakers. You may travel far and spend lots of money but you will not find better food, better speaking or better fellowship than you will have at home here in the Twin Cities.

Still the debate, if that's the word, goes on about gun control. While this exercise in futility is played out, swift justice has taken a back seat to legal nitpicking. We have done nothing so far to really discourage the next crazy that might decide to look for notoriety by shooting a President. Had this particular person, sane or insane, been hung by now we feel positive that the next "nut" might not let his feelings get so easily out of control.

Wind and sand. We seem to be having our share lately. Yet it sure beats earthquakes, massive floods and typhoons. These old baldies sort of get on a body's nerves occasionally but we still prefer them to most other areas we either know about or have lived in.

It has been several years since we have had even this much wind and dust, so take heart, it will get better and soon our showers will take over and the past several weeks will fade from memory.

Speedy Nieman, the publisher from Hereford, came up with a relatively accurate and inexpensive way to take the census - take the government's own figures from other departments.

Says Speedy, "Almost a year ago, this column writer complained about the high cost of the census count and suggested a simpler and much less-costly method."

We had read a newspaper filler item which stated that Americans consume 3.89 billion pounds of cheese each year - an average of 17.3 pounds per person. We put those figures in our calculator and came up with a population total of 224,855,491.

Death Ruled Suicide

Investigators have ruled the death of David Vargas, 25, of Bovina as a suicide after finding his body hanging in the Farwell County jail last week.

Vargas used a white jail towel to hang himself in taking his own life, according to Farwell County Sheriff Bill Morgan. The towel had been ripped into strips and tied together.

Vargas, who was in Farwell County custody on an unauthorized use of a motor vehicle charge, was to have appeared in criminal court this week. He was also on parole from New Mexico on a burglary charge, Morgan said.

Sheriff Morgan found Vargas' body at 8 a.m. Friday, April 3, hanging in the solitary

cell in which he was confined. He was pronounced dead by Farwell County Justice of the Peace Albert Smith at 8:45 that morning.

Vargas left two notes, one to his family and one to his New Mexico Parole officer.

Morgan said that sounds from Vargas' cell were last heard around 3 or 4 a.m. April 3 when he was taking a shower. No sounds were heard after that time.

His body was transferred to Parson-Ellis Funeral home in Friona, Morgan said.

District attorney investigators and Texas Ranger investigators took statements from all Farwell County sheriff's department employees during their query into the incident,

which Morgan said is routine in prisoner suicide cases.

Services for Mr. Vargas were held April 5 in the First Baptist Church in Friona with Rev. Guadalupe Silva, pastor of Mission Belen Bautista, officiating. Burial was in the Bovina Cemetery.

Mr. Vargas was born in Friona April 11, 1955, and had lived in Farwell County most of his life. He was a member of the Mission Belen Bautista.

Survivors include a daughter, Nancy Vargas of Bovina; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vidal Vargas of Farwell; two sisters, Mrs. Christine Salazar and Mrs. Barbara Olivarez, both of Farwell; and a grandparent, Josie Armijo of Clovis.

Friona Man Charged With Wife Beating

Arrested last Friday by the Farwell County sheriff's officers on the charge of "aggravated assault with serious bodily injury" was Charles Snyder of Friona who is now in custody in the Farwell County jail. He is being held on \$10,000 bond.

Snyder has been charged with the brutal beating of his wife, Cora Snyder, who was hospitalized in Amarillo for treatment of the injuries received early the morning of March 24.

Farwell County Sheriff Bill Morgan said that Snyder and his wife were not living

together at the time of the incident and that Mrs. Snyder was staying with her sister. Morgan said that Snyder allegedly brought his estranged wife to Friona in his car at gunpoint, and before arriving at their destination had apparently beaten her about the head with the weapon after trying to shoot her.

"It appears that when he tried to shoot her the gun wouldn't go off so he hit her with it," the sheriff said.

Mrs. Snyder underwent surgery in Amarillo and was released Friday.

Morgan said that it appears

that Snyder took an overdose of sleeping pills after beating his wife and the two were found in his automobile near the Hub community.

Snyder was unconscious and slumped over the steering wheel when the couple was found and Mrs. Snyder was in the back seat of the car.

The two were transferred to Farwell County Community Hospital by Friona ambulance and Mrs. Snyder was then transferred to an Amarillo hospital.

The gun apparently used in the incident is what Sheriff Morgan refers to as a "replica of an old cap and ball" pistol.

In other action this week with the Farwell County sheriff's department, Maralene McLaughlin, 27, of Bovina was arrested by sheriff's officials on an issuing of worthless checks charge. She was then released to Clovis authorities.

Edmond Drovyn, 33, of Phoenix was arrested for possession of less than two ounces of marijuana and was released on \$200 bond.

Larry Scott of Bovina reported the theft of a transfer pump and motor from his farm located four miles east of Bovina. Scott said the theft is to have occurred sometime during the previous week. Estimated value on the missing items is \$250.

Thomas Rhodes of Bovina reported an irrigation well battery stolen from his property located six miles west of Bovina. Value of the battery was placed at \$50.

County Commissioners Have Called Session

Farwell County Commissioners Court conducted a called meeting March 30 to set straight the legality of the transfer of monies from the Right-of-Way fund to the Farm-to-Market fund.

A question had been raised by county treasurer Benna Felts on this money transfer and County Attorney Johnny Aetkinson mailed a written opinion based on Article 8, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution as amended on November 6, 1956.

The opinion quoted the article as saying "any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax."

Following this explanation, it was approved unanimously to transfer \$100,000 from the Right-of-Way fund to the Farm-to-Market fund divided equally among the four precincts, and to invest general fund monies as follows:

\$100,000 to a CD to mature July 1, 1981; \$25,000 to a CD to mature May 8, 1981; \$25,000 to a CD to mature June 5, 1981; to invest Right-of-Way funds of \$50,000 to a CD to mature June 30, 1981; to invest \$8,000 of Permanent Improvement funds to a CD to mature June 30, 1981.

Other action taken at the called session was the approval for Commissioner Raymond McGehee of precinct (Continued on Page 2)

Petition Requests Marshal

The Tribune has learned that a group of Farwell citizens, referring to themselves as "Concerned Citizens of Farwell," headed by Bill Roberts, have begun circulating a petition for the hiring of a Farwell City Marshal.

The petition, which has been distributed to local businesses, reads: "We, the undersigned wish to recommend to the City Council of Farwell that they hire a city officer. We recommend Charles Lovelace who has agreed to take the job."

The petition is to be presented to the city fathers at a future date, according to the group.

Voter Turnout Light In Farwell Elections

Fifty-two voters cast their ballots in Saturday's Farwell city election, and 122 voters took part in the Farwell School Board/Farwell Hospital District Board election.

In the city election, incumbent mayor Walter Kaltwasser was re-elected with 49 votes and John Getz received 2 write-in votes for the mayor's post.

Incumbent councilmen Fred Chandler and John Curtis were also re-elected, Chandler receiving 48 votes and Curtis 42. Those receiving write-in votes for the councilman position were Karl Gast, 1; John Getz, 1; Joel White, 5; Mike Norris, 1; Tom Nichols, 1; Mike Camp, 1; and Lee Hutchins, 3.

In the school board race, a total of 122 ballots were cast. Elected to a three-year term as school trustees were incumbent Joe Hughes with 95 votes and Edward Corn with 86 votes. Corn replaces Doyle Ford who did not seek re-election.

Also on the ballot was Eddie Winegeart who received 44 votes.

Richard Haseloff, who had been appointed to fill an unexpired two-year term, was elected with 84 votes. His opponent LaVerne Vaughn received 28 votes.

Receiving write-in votes were Darrell Stevens, 2; LaVerne Vaughn, 1; Eva Dean Stephens, 1; and Ronald Byrd, 1.

Elected to the Farwell Hospital District Board were incumbents LaMoin Williams with 109 votes and Pudge Rose with 97 votes; and Jimmy Mace, 111; Mike Norris, 107; and Doyle Johnson, 112. There were 122 ballots cast in that election.

In the Lazbuddie school board election Larry Jesko and Joe Bryan "Hoppy" Jennings were elected to three-year terms.

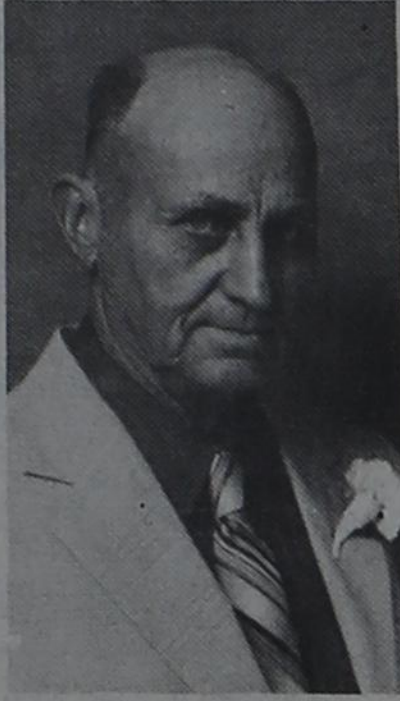
Interment was in the Oklahoma Lane Cemetery under the direction of Steed-Todd Funeral Home of Clovis.

Board Reorganizes At Monday Night Meeting

Farwell School Board met in regular session on Monday night and reorganized the board following canvassing of Saturday's trustee election votes.

Board members canvassed the votes and declared Joe Hughes, incumbent; Richard Haseloff and Edward Corn as duly elected board members.

Officers were then elected with Wilbert Kalbas re-elected as president; Joe Hughes elected as vice-president; and Caroline Anderson re-elected as board secretary.

A letter of resignation submitted by head football coach and athletic director Randy Adrian was accepted by the board to be effective at the close of the 1980-81 school year. Adrian has accepted a position

as head football coach at Tucumcari High School.

Members of the board talked with coach Mike Martin regarding the job as Farwell's athletic director. No decision was made and applicants are still to be investigated for the position of head football coach.

The contracts of Dianne Hernandez, Sandra Turner, Terri Baker, Eva Ancira, Flo Davis and Wanda Gobble were renewed by the board upon the recommendation of elementary school principal David Gobble. The contracts were renewed for the 1981-82 school year at a salary of \$875 above state schedule.

Walter Hughes was appointed to serve as chairman of the Equalization Board for the

Farwell ISD along with Joe Jones, and Doyle Johnson, with R.J. Garner as alternate. They are to meet June 8.

The board voted to renew the contract for the Farwell ISD with the Region XVI Education Service Center for services in curriculum and Title I.

Use of the Farwell Country Club Golf Course by the school golf teams was discussed by the trustees. It was decided that the board negotiate a financial agreement with the County Club for use of its facilities.

In other action, the board voted to allow Ricky Armstrong to work on Fridays without penalty to his grades. This was passed "due to extreme hardship which was documented by a doctor's statement."

Transfer students for 1981-82 were approved.

The board also voted to offer for sale by sealed bids the lights and poles from the football field.

Principals Don Malone, Jerry Owen and David Gobble presented reports on the various activities in their schools, the main topic of the three men was the current and ongoing UIL competitions.

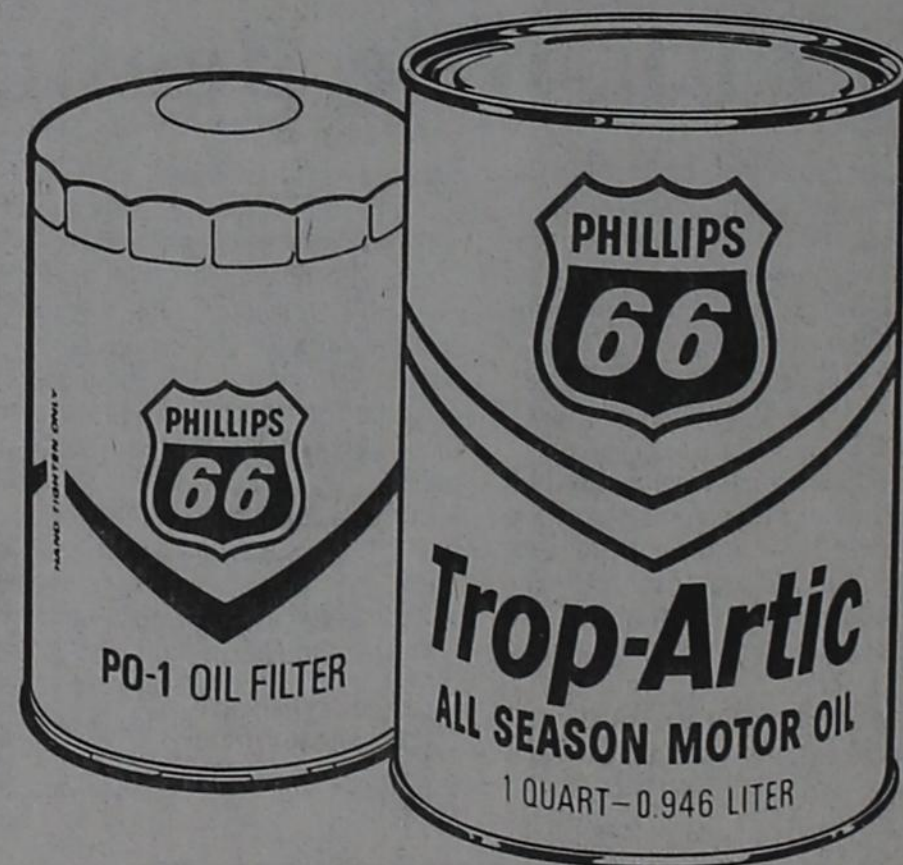

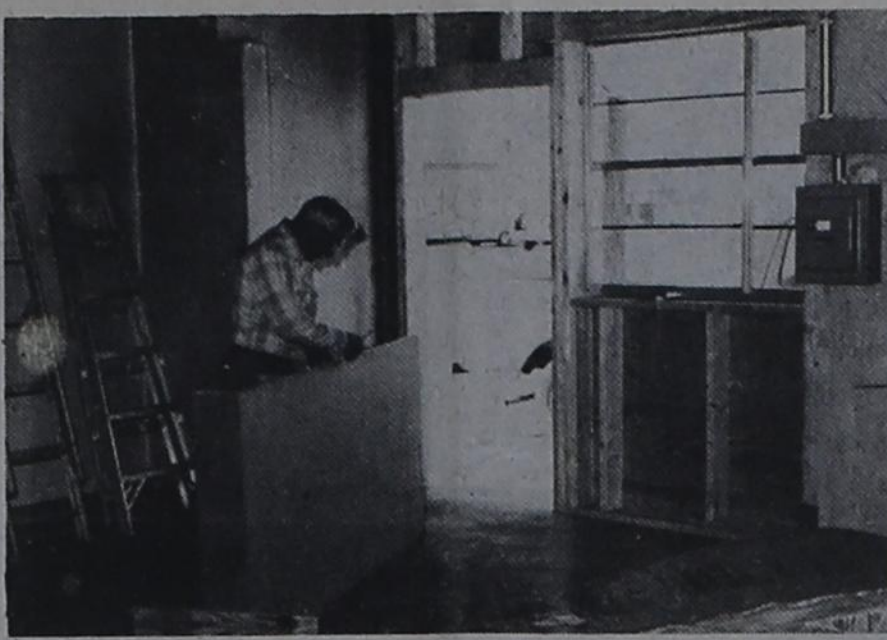
A BTD queen's contest will again be held this year with Joann Getz serving as coordinator assisted by the Farwell Study Club.

At Farwell, the ambulance was called to a residence on First Street at 8:40 a.m. on April 2.

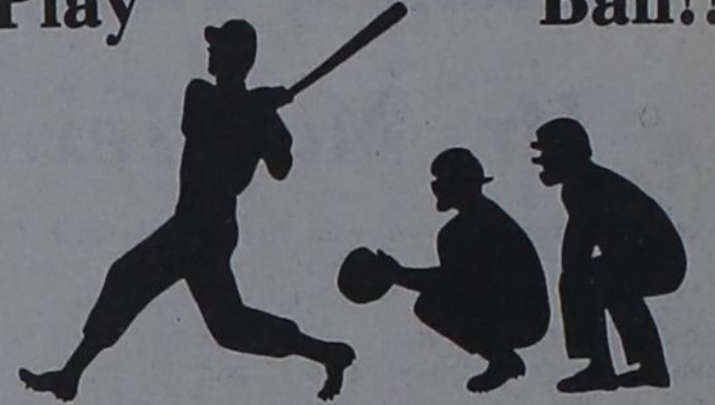

The 25th annual Oasis Shrine Diagnostic Clinic has been scheduled for Saturday, April 25, at the Hereford Medical and Surgical Clinic.

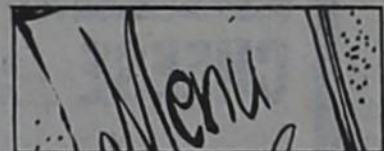

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

GOD IS CENTRAL
Paul's Epistle to the Romans is the foundation book of Christian theology. It brings us face to face with facts we ought to know and must know to be saved.
In the 16th and 17th verses of the first chapter, the apostle declares that he is proud of the gospel because therein is the "righteousness," or rightness of God is revealed.
God had to deal righteously with sin before He could offer salvation to sinners. Sin is not merely an affliction; it is moral wrong and kindles the wrath of a just and holy God.
The wrath of God is too little discussed by modern evangelists and preachers. They like to talk about the love and mercy of God, as though He were a Grand Old Man with a tolerant attitude toward sin. But they never fully appreciate His love and mercy because they do not understand His infinite wrath against sin.
Much evangelism today has become sort of a "try God" gimmick. The pleasures of the world don't satisfy? Try God. You can't shake off some terrible bondage? Try God. When all else fails, Try God!
But this humanistic approach is foreign to Scripture. God, His holiness, His wrath against sin and His love in providing salvation - these are central in Scripture, not man and his condition and his needs.
We are not to look upon God as our servant, who will help us in time of need, but as the Holy One whose justice we have offended but who, in infinite grace, paid for our sins Himself so that we might be redeemed. This is why the Epistle to the Romans begins its mighty argument with almost three chapters on the subject of sin. Then follows the Good News of God's grace in settling the sin question so that we might be "justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).
And thus the same inspired writer declares in Eph. 2:2-4 that we were "the children of disobedience" and therefore "the children of wrath," but then goes on to show how "God, who is rich in mercy" and "great" in "love," saves believers by grace, giving them eternal life in Christ, who died for our sins.

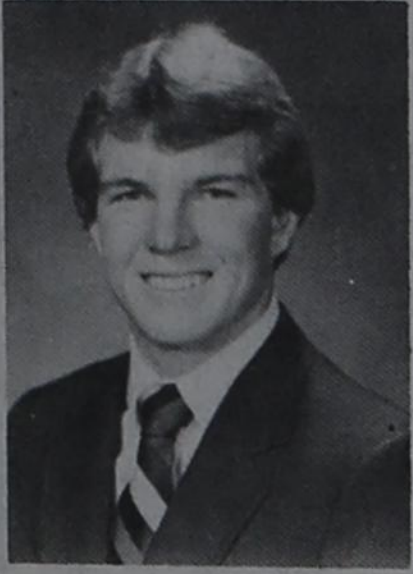
While wearing Steer jersey number 50 this past season, the 195-pound Langford had 101 tackles in the year, eight of those behind the line of scrimmage.

Farwell High School principal Don Malone commented on some changes planned for the 1981-82 school year during a recent interview, and also explained the proposed seven class system, which if passed by the school board, will find students attending classes from 8:25 a.m. to 3:40 p.m.

"We're trying to come up with a schedule so the students will have a better chance of taking the courses they want and need," said the high school administrator.

Malone explained that as it stands now, many times students have a conflict when it comes to scheduling classes, as sometimes a required course falls in at the same time as band or athletics.

The current system of attending school from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. has been on-going for several years, so why the change now? Malone stresses the fact that he is only concerned with offering more

and better courses for his students. "I feel like we can do a better job for the kids than what is offered right now," he explained. "And by adding the extra time, we can arrange the courses around such things as band and athletics," he added.

The educator emphasized that he is only thinking of the students. "I want the courses and electives to work better for them, and us," he said.

Right now, the seven class system is still in the drawing board stage, and won't be "in the works" until the school board approves and gives the go-ahead. Recently the high school student body took part in registration and scheduling of classes for next year, working with the seven class system.

"I have to work it all out and find out what classes everyone wants and then present it to the school board," said Malone.

Whether or not the seven hour day is approved, Malone has added four new courses to the current curriculum.

Next year's students will have a choice of three new electives, and a substitute for English IV.

Speech class is to become an elective, and not a replacement for English IV, as it has been. The new English IV replacement is an added course called Vocational English, designed mainly for those students who are not "college bound."

Another added elective is Architectural Drafting. This

class is to be offered to juniors and seniors first, and then to sophomores on a space available basis, Malone said.

Sociology will be offered only to seniors next year, and also, Library Science.

"Library Science will be directed toward those seniors who are going to college, to teach them how to use a college library," remarked Malone.

The next step in changing the course schedule is to offer more required courses. "To get to the point of going to school to learn, we need to offer more required courses," the principal stated. "As it stands, next year with the seven class system, only 14 of the 28 credits offered are required credits," Malone added.

Many rumors have been spreading throughout the halls of the school, and of course then on to the ears of the parents. The principal took the time to answer the following questions:

Is it true that Farwell may be reclassified to a Class A school due to a decrease in enrollment? "No" says Ma-

lone, "even though our enrollment is down to 138, the classification system is on a two-year average and we won't come up for a reclassification until next year."

Does he think it will happen then? "No, I do not. We're right on the border line for the students needed. I don't think we'll change to a Class A."

With the increased class system, will lunch period be decreased to 15 minutes only? "No."

Is it doubtful that seniors will be allowed to attend classes only half a day? "All of that depends on what kind of scheduling is approved by the school board. We may have one period at the end of the day that will be free to seniors, but nothing is definite," he said.

"We want the parents to get involved in their student's schedule," the principal stressed. "We sent home a planning sheet along with the courses offered for the coming school year in the hopes that the parents would assist their

child in choosing subjects to take."

The administrator stated that he is seeking parental input into the whole scheduling matter, and welcomes comments from parents at any time. "I'd love to talk to any parent. They are welcomed here anytime," he said.

Parents with questions concerning the current school year, their child's grades or the next school year should

call Malone at the high school at 481-3351 or stop by his office during school hours. "They are always welcomed," he said.

Farwell Fire Dept. Receives New Gear

Farwell Volunteer Fire Department has had a recent replenishing of its equipment division, as approximately \$5,500 in fallout gear has been purchased by the City of Farwell for use by its fire fighters.

Fire Chief Joel White was given permission to buy the new gear for his men following his request to the city fathers in late January of this year. White was given authorization to spend \$7500 of the city's money for the new equipment.

White has purchased four new Scott air packs, giving the department a total of 10; four new Bunker coats, four new pairs of boots, four new helmets and three 37-180 radios.

The three new one-channel radios provide for each fire department vehicle to have one installed.

Currently, the department is taking Fire School classes, which began last week and will continue for three more weeks.

Classroom instruction on all types of fires, ventilation, pump operations and reporting fires is being taught to the men on their regular meeting nights, by Billy Marquis of Floydada from the Texas A&M Extension Service.

Basic firefighting skills are being taught in the three-hour class sessions with films and texts. The men will also travel to Lubbock soon for the annual Fire School there.

While in Lubbock the volunteer firemen will learn how to combat butane, pit, garage and house fires, in addition to learning how to rescue automobile accident victims and other rescue operations.

The 31-man volunteer force is on call 24-hours a day answering all local fire and emergency calls. Serving as assistant chief is Mike Camp and as secretary is Robert White.

Chief Joel White says his department is always looking for more "qualified" volunteers. "The main requirement in becoming a fire fighter

volunteer is a person must be willing to attend Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) classes," said White.

Before a person can become a member of the volunteer force he must attend three consecutive meetings of the department, which are held each Thursday night at 7 p.m.

CST at the Farwell fire house. Department members then vote on the acceptance of a new volunteer.

Unlike Texico, Farwell's department is not subsidized by the State and relies solely on funds received from the city or other outside sources. Members are currently considering a fund-raising effort for the purchase of pagers.

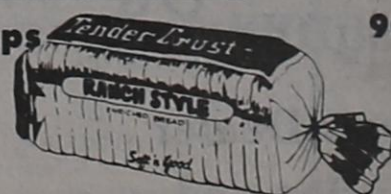
