At Special Session - -

Farwell City Council Approves Water Line

Farwell City Council, meeting in special session Monday night, approved the city's paying for one-half of the cost of laying a six-inch water line to the Farwell FFA Ag Barn, with the school paying for the other half.

Last week at the council's regular monthly meeting, Farwell school administrative assistant, James Craig, and Lee Hutchins, Farwell volunteer fireman, met with the city commissioners for discussion on the proposed line for water to the ag barn and pasture.

Although it has been the policy of the city never to build any water lines outside the city

limits, the city fathers agreed to paying for one-half of the cost of 710 feet of six-inch water line, with the stipulation that the easement and deed to the water line be given to the city.

Farwell Cotton Gin had also requested to tie into this line for added fire protection at the gin, which also was agreed upon by the council, with the above stipulation.

In other action by the city council at the special session, members approved the re-submitting of asking for bids on the upcoming street paving project, on a corrected specification sheet.

The previously submitted bid proposals were declared invalid, as it was discovered during last week's meeting that the specifications given to the prospective bidders were incorrect.

The city council also passed an ordinance Monday night agreeing for the Farmer County Tax Appraisal District to hire an attorney to handle the city's delinquent taxes.

Present for the special session were commissioners Jerry Monk and Fred Chandler; Dee Hammit, water superintendent; and Janie Bowery, city clerk.

Scott, Harding, Gerries Texico's Top Athletes

Ruth Scott, Kent Harding, and Todd Gerries were named the Best All-Around Athletes for Texico High School at the Texico Booster Club Athletic Awards Program last Saturday.

James Harding, high school principal and athletic director, presented these athletes with plaques, and named the recipients of the 1982 Sportsmanship Awards, Lisa Crooks and Craig Horne.

Well known across the state, Miss Scott, a junior, was named the Class A Basketball Player of the Year for the second year in a row. She led her volleyball and basketball teams to second place finishes in state but could only compete in two track meets because of a knee injury. She was also named to the all-tournament team in every tournament in which she played.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Scott.

Harding and Gerries, both seniors, have also received statewide recognition for their talents in football, basketball, and track, including receiving all-state honors in football and

participating in this year's state basketball tournament, and track meet.

Harding, the son of James Harding, was named to both the AP and UPI All-State lists of outstanding football players, and was a driving force on the basketball and track squads.

Co-winner Todd Gerries, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Gerries, was described by Coach David Lynn as an athlete who sets out to meet his goals and either reaches or beats them.

To be eligible for the title of Best All-Around Athlete a student must have participated in three sports.

Coaches Mike Littlejohn, Roy King and David Lynn agreed they enjoyed giving the Sportsmanship Award because "it is given to an athlete who gave 110 percent, never opened his/her mouth to the officials and set a good example for the underclassmen."

Recipients Lisa Crooks and Craig Horne, both seniors, each participated in three sports. Lisa is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arlye Crooks, and Craig's parents are Rev.

and Mrs. Joel Horne.

Coach King recognized Lisa for her willingness to compete in track. "Although she was the only senior," he said, "she was always the first one out to run, and was an excellent example for the underclassmen."

Horne was commended by Lynn for coming back after a knee injury and giving his best effort.

We always reserve a special page of praise for the month of October, and comment on its "Bright Blue Weather." This time of the year runs a close second in our weather world. We like to refer to it as the "Green Scene."

Spring is well advanced and all the trees have donned their summer finery along with the grasses and of course the hardy weeds. The winter wheat is green and lush with the spring crops pushing up their green shoots and covering the brown earth and hiding that stark vista.

For the next few weeks, almost everywhere a body chooses to gaze, the lush look of growing greenery is evident. In a few weeks the wheat fields will ripen and change color, and unless we have lots more moisture, many of the grasses and weeds will brown off and we shall return to the mottled semi-arid look that is common to the great Southwest. In the meantime let's enjoy the "Green Scene."

We also take this time to remind the motoring public that soon the schools will turn out for their summer hiatus and a gaggle of tads will be on the streets. This will call for more than usual alertness on the driver's part as the kiddoes will be thinking of most anything but safety. Be safe, not sorry.

The battle of the budget rages onward in a fog of words and emotion. At every turn somebody is screaming that their future is in jeopardy because of some projected budget cut. A question left unanswered is how did the people and the country get along in the dim dark ages of just few years ago before all these programs came into existence.

Looking behind the howls of grief, we find that the savings projected at \$63 billion in the next few years are only savings in the projected rate of increased expenditures. More money will be doled out in the future than has been spent in the past.

This is the sad, sad history of all government "do good" programs. A case in point is the food stamp deal. In 1964 this worthy plan expended \$34 million to serve one out of every 492 Americans. Well sir, in July of this year it will have grown to a \$10.3 BILLION program serving one out of every TEN Americans.

We think it reasonable to assume that significant savings could be found in this program and not bring mass starvation upon this country. Sorry Tip and Teddy and assorted Congressional dingbats, we do not think that paring the social welfare tree will ruin us. We believe that continued reckless spending and continued crushing taxation will.

The federal judiciary is running amok. Last week a judge shut down the Texas Department of Corrections, and also last week another federal judge dismissed the conviction of one Richard Kelly, a former Congressman, caught in the Abscam investigation of corruption in Congress.

All this is not lost on the crooks of the country. They see a lenient court system turning people loose at the drop of a hat, and immediately go out and prey on the long suffering public.

A few comic strips contain more truth than comic. Several weeks ago the Wizard of Id was one such. Sir Rodney tells the King that the prisoners are rioting. The King asked why and is told that they feel overcrowded. The King replies, "Tell them the cemetery is only half full."

Too bad some judges do not understand either truth or comedy.

He also welcomed the new officers, Dean Smith, president; Junior Foreman, vice-president; Margie Thornton, secretary; and Gardys Johnson, who kept her job as treasurer.

Diane Parker, representing the Texico Women's Club, presented awards to Tracy Dobbs and Jeff Dunsworth. These recipients were voted on by the club members from a list of the top three female and male athletes with the highest academic averages and who participated in at least two sports.

Each coach gave his impressions of the year, making reference to the vast array of trophies which were displayed across the stage, representing an excellent year athletically. Coaches Littlejohn and King gave special recognition to seniors Tracy Dobbs, Jill Jesko and Lisa Crooks who served "as excellent examples to the underclassmen." Tracy was also recognized for having played on the Golden Spread All-Star Team in Amarillo. The girls team finished second in state with a 22-5 record.

Valda Cavallero received the "Hustle Award" for junior varsity girls basketball and Christie Barfield was named

the "best manager around". Special recognition certificates were presented by Coach Lynn to football players who were named to either the Associated Press or United Press International All-State teams, including Earl Bibbs, Jeff Dunsworth, John Gallegos, Todd Gerles, Kent Harding, Dale Johnson, James Kelley, James Robinson and Lynn Tubbs. Willie Bibbs was also cited for his All-District honors. He also received the "Fighting Heart" award in boys track.

Elias Orozco received a special award "Most Courageous" in track. Elias competed in the mile run, and Coach Lynn said, "He bettered his time at each meet . . . he didn't win any medals, but he won my heart."

Coach Lynn also expressed high hopes for the football team next year—hopefully to win state, and also said they plan to finish better than sixth place in track.

This year's football team finished the season with an impressive 9-1 season, losing only in the state finals to Reserve.

The boys junior varsity basketball team finished the season with an impressive record of 12-0, and Coach Scott Parker presented Joe Steward with the "Hustle Award."

Parker, who will be head basketball coach next year, expressed confidence in the young men who will be moving up to varsity next year.

Coach Ken Shaw recapped the varsity basketball year which ended in a third place finish in the state and a 22-6 record. "I had to make the choice of whether to delay the game or play it out...I decided to delay and we got behind...I guess I'll carry that with me the rest of my life," he said.

The end of the season was disheartening but was a light in the darkness for the Texico boys basketball program. It had been 22 years since the Wolverines had been to the state tourney and the first time in history that the team made it past the first round of play.

Shaw also recognized his seniors whom he "would really miss" including Jeff Day, Jeff Dunsworth, Kent Harding, Mike Arnold, Willie Bibbs, Todd Gerles and Craig Horne.

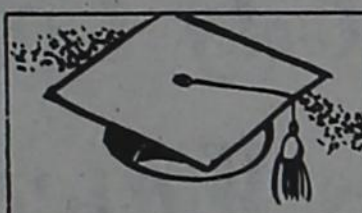

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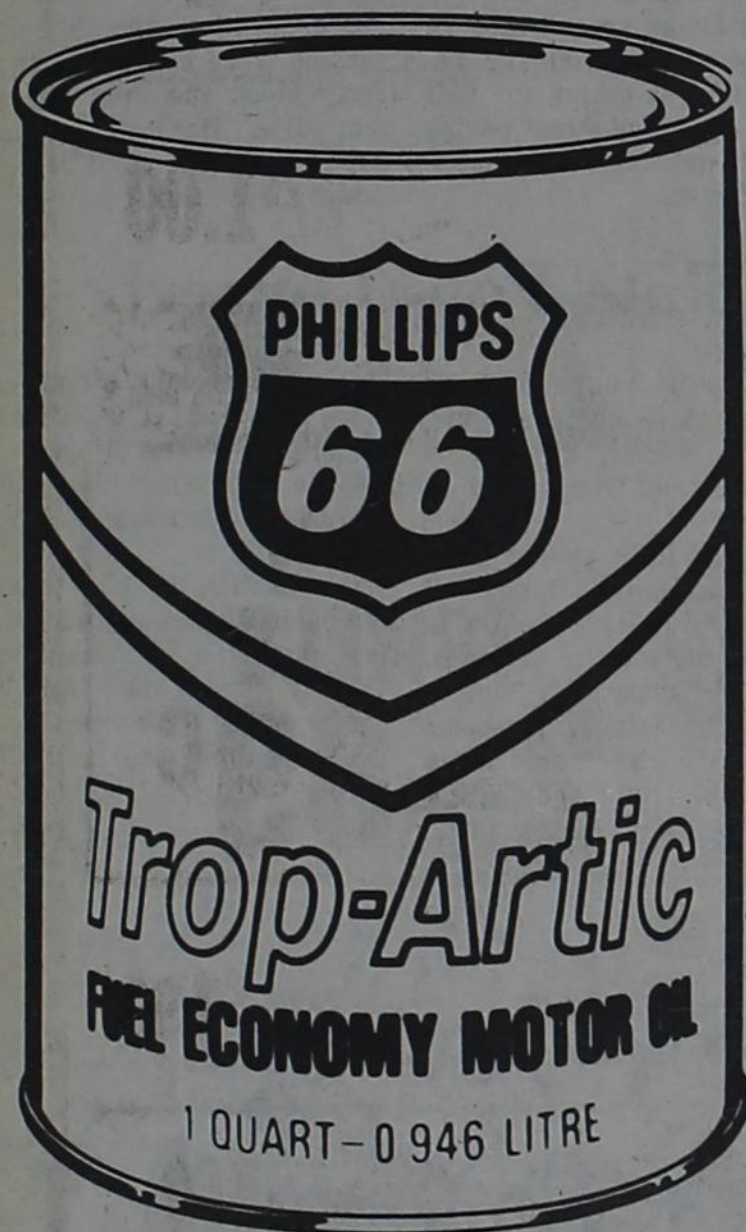
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Sheriff's Department Has Rash Of Burglaries

Parmer County Sheriff's Department has been plagued by several burglaries this past week, reported by Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Jackie Stowers of Friona reported that his house was burglarized on May 8. Guns and tools, valued at approximately \$2,800, were taken.

On Saturday night, May 15, People's Gasohol, Inc. of Summerfield reported that their office which is located just inside Parmer County, was burglarized. Taken were adding machine, typewriter, and other office equipment valued at approximately \$5,000.

All of the office equipment taken in the burglary has been

recovered, according to Sheriff Morgan, saying it was found in a ditch south of Hereford. He said that apparently the office machines were thrown off a bridge into the ditch.

Two men were arrested at the scene of a burglary at Hi-Pro Feeds Inc. of Friona on Monday night, May 17, by sheriff's deputy Bob Davis of Friona. The men had broken into a coin-operated snack machine.

In custody in Parmer County jail are Kenneth Frieden, 21, and Jimmy Jennings, 20, both of Curryville, Missouri.

Gilbert Knapp, 42, and his

wife Generosa, 29, both of Friona, were arrested Friday, May 14, by the Friona Police Department for possession and selling alcoholic beverages in a dry area. They pleaded not guilty before Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts, and were released on bonds of \$500 each, pending county court actions.

Bryan Kube, 23, of Texico was arrested on May 15 by Texas DPS officer Craig Hunt for driving while intoxicated. He appeared before Judge Roberts, was charged with DWI, and was fined \$150 plus court costs. He was given a six-month deferred adjudication.

Texico Schools Budget Approved

Texico Public Schools conducted its budget hearing Tuesday morning in the Texico High School library. The total operational budget of \$1,667,000 for next year was approved, according to Jim Pierce, school superintendent. He said this included a salary increase of 11.7 percent over last year's salary outlay.

Bonnie Brock Wood of the Public School Finance Division of the State Department of Education toured the Texico facilities to determine the need for capital outlay money from the state for construction of three classrooms, offices, and a multi-purpose room. The bond issue for this construction was passed in February.

The representative from the finance division will make her report back to the state committee as to the need for the capital outlay money. 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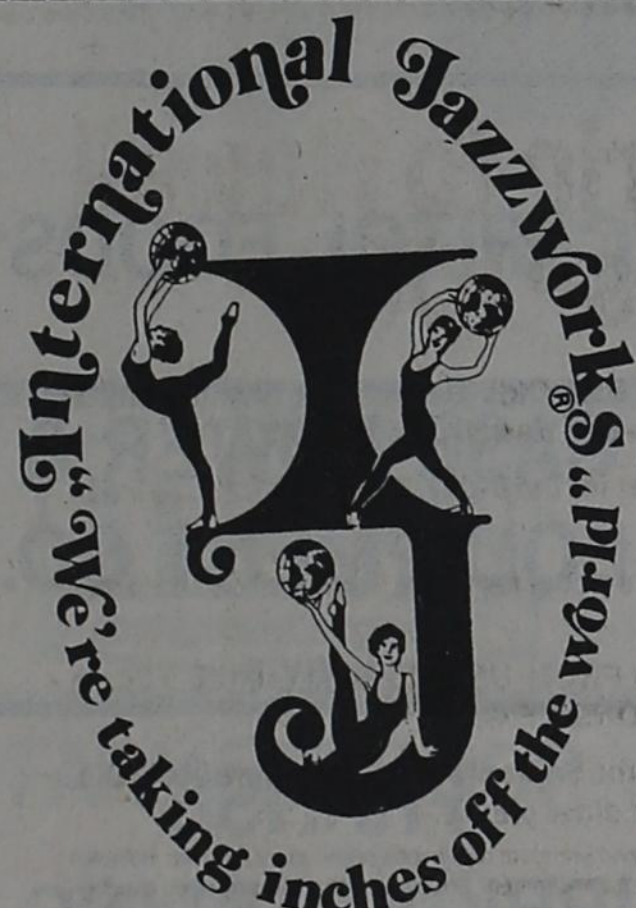

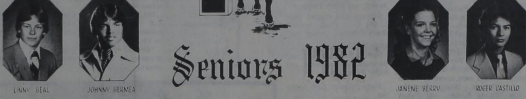

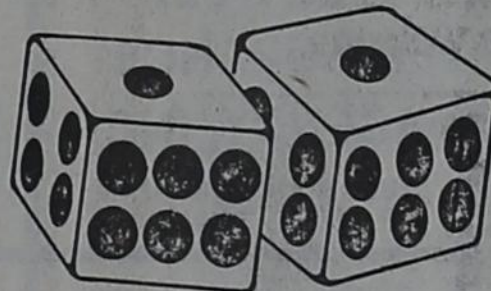

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

I HAVE SET THEE A WATCHMAN

"For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle?" (I Cor. 14:8).

The Prophet Ezekiel was appointed by God as a "watchman" over the house of Israel (Ezek. 33:7). He was held responsible to warn the wicked from their way, for while God must deal justly with sin, He had declared: "I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked; but that the wicked turn from his way and live" (Ver. 11).

If Ezekiel failed to warn the wicked, they would die in their sins, but their blood would be required at his hand. If he faithfully warned them, however, and they refused to heed the warning, they would die in their sins, but he would be absolved of all responsibility (See verses 8,9).

Would some Christian reader remind us that we are living under another dispensation and that our message is one of grace? True enough, but this does not diminish, it increases our responsibility toward the lost.

If we believers carelessly allow the lost to go to Christless graves, are we not morally responsible for their doom? Will we not be held accountable at the Judgment Seat of Christ? (See II Corinthians 5:10,11). This is why we find Paul reminding the Ephesian elders that he had not ceased to "warn" men "night and day with tears" (Acts 20:31).

As the apostle looked back over his ministry among the Ephesians he could say: "I take you to record this day that I am pure from the blood of all men" (Ver. 26). And this had been so of his ministry in general. Indeed, it was now his desire that whatever the cost, he "might finish his course with joy, and the ministry which he had received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God" (Ver. 24).

May Ezekiel and the Apostle Paul, that great warrior for the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, be memorials to us—of our great responsibility toward the lost!

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Producers Invited To Insect Scouting Workshop

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Parmer County are receiving a special invitation this year to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, June 1-2, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Seth Ralston, County Extension agent said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield and hold down production costs.

The June 1 session opens at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Pat Morrison outlining the scope of the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program

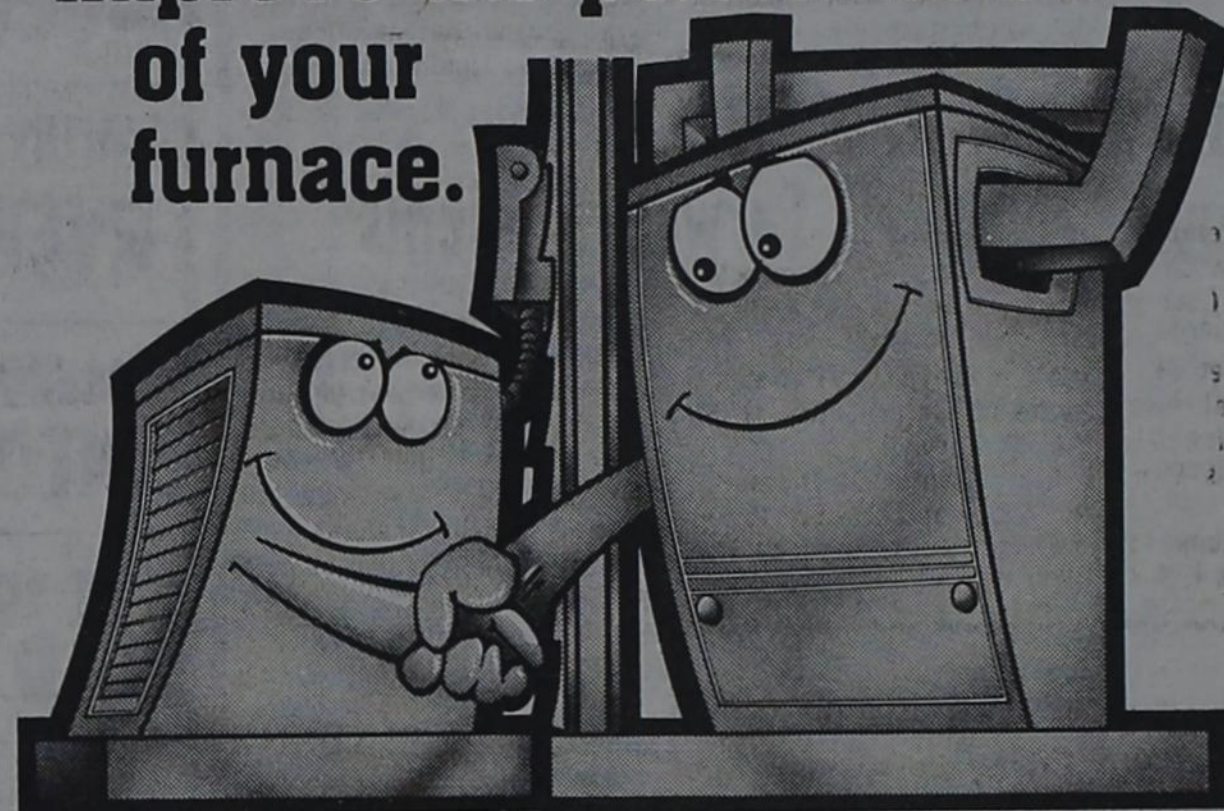
are Dr. Dale Pennington, Extension soil chemist; Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist; Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist; and Dr. Jim Leser, cotton Extension Entomologist.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Kirby W. Huffman, Extension agronomist; Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist; and Allen E. Knutson, Castro County Extension agent-entomology, who will discuss corn and sorghum pests.

The June 2 session, beginning at 9:00 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures and reports. Instructors will be county Extension agents - entomology Greg Cronholm of Hale County and Allen Knutson.

During the afternoon, participants will receive practical training on insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session.

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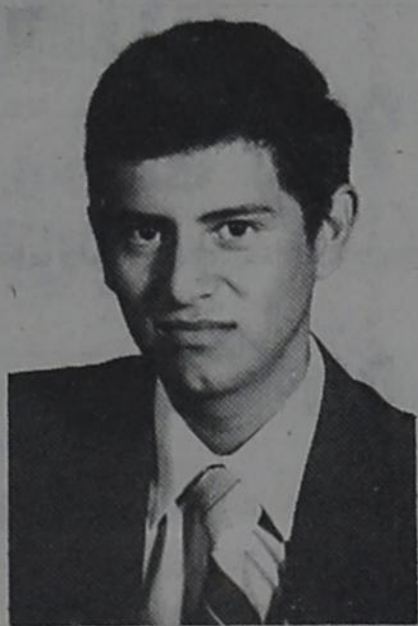
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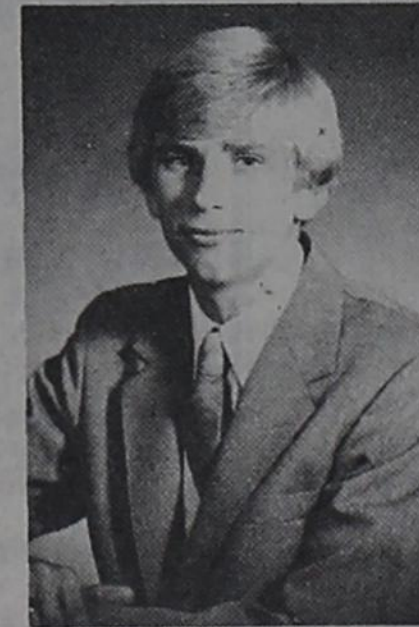
