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Polls Open 7 To 7 --

Democratic Runoff Election Set Saturday

Parmer County voters will join others from throughout the state of Texas tomorrow (Saturday) in the Democratic Primary Runoff election.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. CDT, with voters deciding the fate of four statewide contested positions.

The Democratic runoff election was necessary because the candidates running for the offices did not receive 50 percent of the votes cast in the primary on May 1. There will be

no Republican runoff election. The Democratic polling places are as follows:

Precinct One, polling spot No. 1, old Tri-County elevator office; No. 8, J. Dee Willard residence; and No. 2-1, Calvary Baptist Church in Friona;

Precinct Two, polling spot No. 3, Bovina American Legion Hall; No. 7, the Lutheran Church Parish Hall in Rhea; and No. 2-2, the Community Center Show Barn in Friona;

Precinct Three, No. 4, Parmer County Courthouse; and No. 6, Oklahoma Lane Community Center;

Precinct Four, voting place No. 2, Friona Fire Station; and No. 5, Lazbuddie School.

Candidates listed on the Democratic runoff election ballot seeking the four statewide offices are as follows:

Attorney General: Jim Mattox and John Hannah.
Commissioner of General

Land Office: Pete Snelson and Garry Mauro.

Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1: John E. Humphreys and Charles F. "Chuck" Campbell, Jr.

Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2: Bill Black and Chuck Miller.

Only Democratic registered voters may cast their ballots in the runoff election. Registered Republicans may not vote in the Democratic runoff.

Voters Decide Statewide, County Races

Voters in New Mexico went to the polls Tuesday, to decide the Democratic and Republican nominees in a variety of statewide and county races.

Voters chose candidates for U.S. Senate, three congressional districts, the governor's seat, lieutenant governor, and five other executive offices, two Corporation Commission seats, a state Supreme Court post, and two Court of Appeals positions.

In the Democratic Primary, Jeff Bingaman defeated his opponents Jerry Apodaca and Virginia Keehan for the position of U.S. Senator. He will face incumbent Senator Harrison Schmitt in the general election this November.

For the position of U.S. Representative for District 2, Caleb Chandler was victorious over State Senator Ben Al-

tamirano of Silver City. Chandler will be squaring off against incumbent Joe Skeen in the general election.

Toney Anaya, won his bid for nomination by defeating candidates Aubrey Dunn, Fabian Chaves, Jr., and Les Houston, for the New Mexico gubernatorial seat.

Mike Rannels defeated his opponents Bob McNeill and Kathy Roybal for the position of Lieutenant Governor.

Official voting tallies were not available for the statewide election at press time.

In the Democratic County races the position for County Commissioner for District 1 was won by Claude Burkett. Burkett received 2058 votes to John Drager's 682 votes, Roy Woodard's 846 votes, and Perry Mills' 624 votes.

The District 2 seat for County Commissioner was won by Cullen Williams. Williams received 3025 votes and ran unopposed.

Travis Stovall defeated his opponent Albert Matlock for the position of County Commissioner for District 3. Stovall defeated Matlock with a total of 2363 votes to 2064 votes.

For County Clerk post, Florine Hawkins was nominated with a total of 3308.

Anita Zachrel was nominated for the position of County Treasurer. She received a total of 2859 votes.

Alyce "Pat" Littlejohn was nominated for the position of County Assessor with a total of 3224 votes.

In the Sheriff's race, incumbent Wesley Myers defeated his three other op-

ponents. Myers got 3369 votes to R.B. Boney's 1029 votes, Albert Rubio's 780 votes, and Ken Petree's 215 votes.

The nomination for Probate Judge was won by Richard Burke. Burke defeated his opponent Frank Garcia Jr. with 2451 votes to 1587 votes.

In the Republican Primary election, John Irick defeated his opponents, William Sego and James Allen Caudell, for the state gubernatorial position. Irick will face Democratic nominee Toney Anaya in the November general election.

Other winners in the statewide Republican primaries were: Colin McMillan for Lieutenant Governor, Fran Hill for Secretary of State, C. Jack Emmons for State Auditor, William McBroom for State Treasurer, Paul J. Kennedy for Attorney General, Herb H. Hughes for Corporation Commissioner for a six-year term, Lloyd Payne for Corporation Commissioner for a two-year term, and Kenneth Wilson for Justice of the Supreme Court.

In the Republican district and county races, Enzy W. Gordon was nominated for District Magistrate. Gordon received 836 votes.

The County Commissioner's post for District 2 was won by Anita Merrill, who received 643 votes.

The Probate Judge's nomination was won by Douglas C. Williams who got 821 total votes.

The results for the positions of Secretary of State, State Auditor, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Commissioner of Public Lands, Corporation Commissioner, Justice of the Supreme Court, Judge of the Court of Appeals, and District Magistrate for the Democratic Primary were unavailable at press time.

The positions for Lieutenant Governor and Commissioner of Public Lands for the Republican Primary were also unavailable at press time.

All voting results and tallies are as of yet unofficial.

BTD Committee To Meet Monday

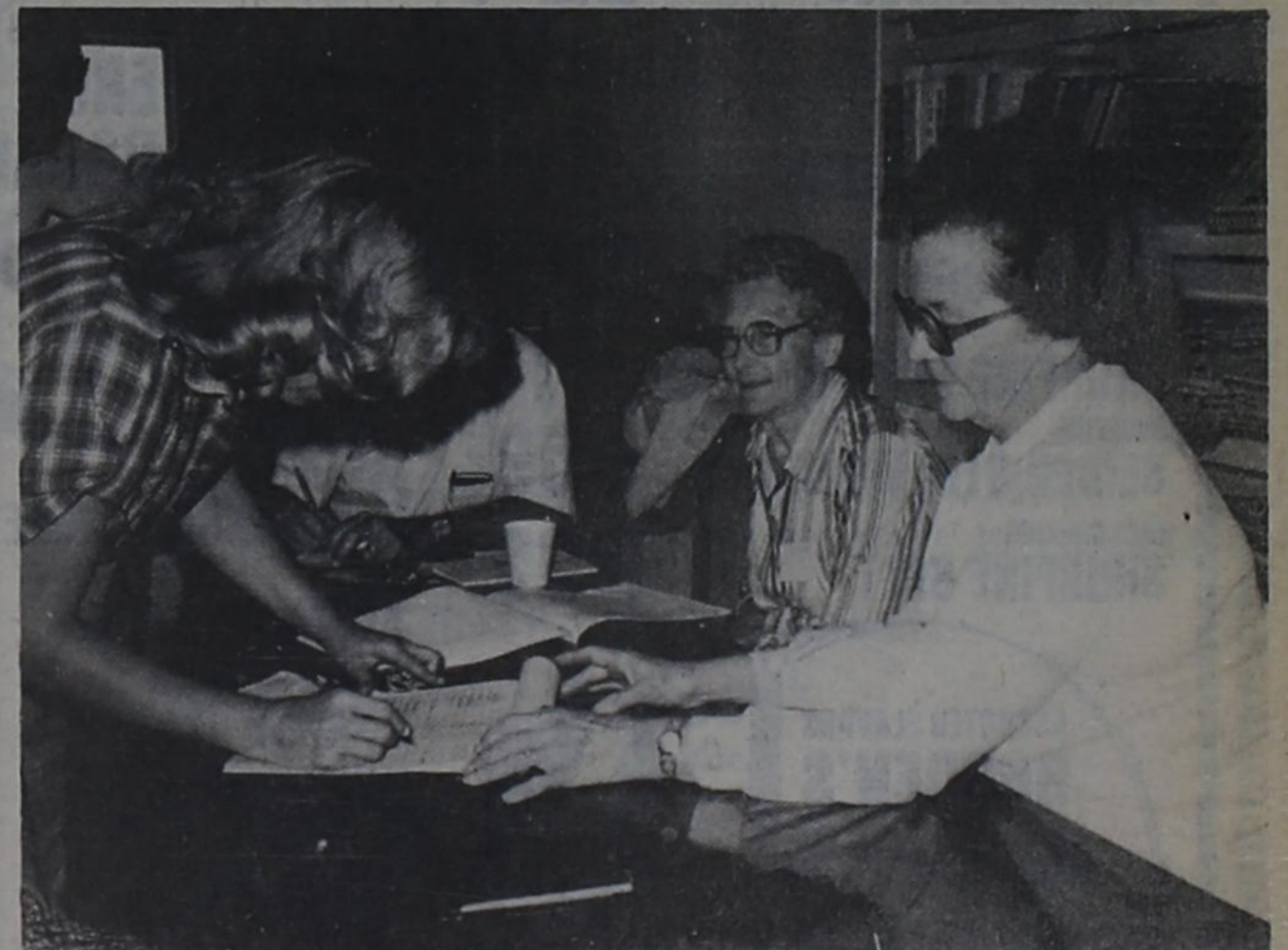
Members of the Border Town Days Committee will meet Monday, June 7, at Luce's restaurant at 8 p.m. CDT.

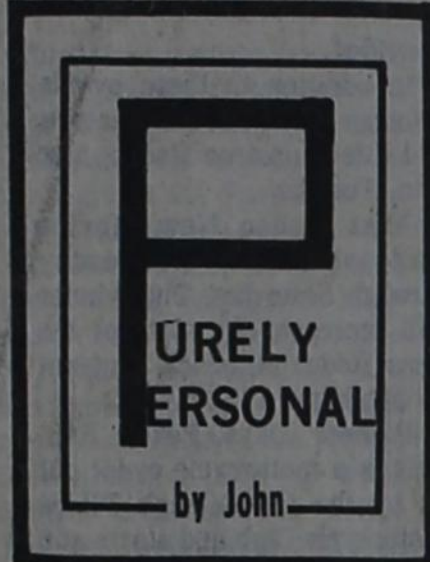


New Mexico Voter

There always has been and there will always be a conflict between the demands of an orderly society and personal freedoms. This conflict has, of course, resulted in laws. The trick has been to enact laws that allow the maximum of personal freedom within the constraints of civilization.

What we are saying is that everyone cannot choose and pick the laws they will or will not obey. All laws must be obeyed by everyone, or we head down the road to anarchy.

An unpopular law, an unfair law, or whatever, needs to be repealed, not ignored or defied. The proper way for sincere citizens is to work within the framework of the law and strive to have the "bad" laws stricken from the books.

These words are not pearly words of great wisdom, only common sense observations. It always flabbergasts us when we read of educated and intelligent people who deliberately flout the law for their personal principals. Shucks man, we all got personal principals, ours don't always agree with yours, but you and I cannot just go off in different directions because of these differences.

Now comes the Rev. John Schwiebert and his wife Pat in Portland, Oregon, who have withheld 41 percent of their total 1981 income tax as a "personal statement of peace." They estimate that this is the percentage of their income tax that went for our military spending.

Well now, Buster and Mrs. Buster, we do not like our hard earned money squandered on wasteful, frivolous, abasing, social programs. When we think of the fat neer-do-wells who live off the sweat of our brow, we feel like issuing a "personal statement."

However, we know that we cannot substitute our personal judgements for the law of the land and expect to have a safe, sane, and happy country.

This Reverend is practicing "selective giving." Good grief, this is the very practice that his particular denomination squalls about. The big fuzz in the church tells the members to accept their apportionments and be happy with the way it is spent. When a local church refuses to pay a certain apportionment, the egg hits the episcopal fan, but good.

Somehow we cannot help but feel that the laws of the land and the church should apply to the Rev. Schwiebert and this poor dependant alike.

There has to be a lot of uneasy Admirals floating around on the oceans of the world. Argentina may not keep the Falkland Islands but they may well have sunk an untold number of not yet built naval vessels.

Here we have Argentina, not a world power by a very long shot. A country that has not been in a war within memory of living man. A country that has bought all of her armaments from other nations. These weapons may be good but not in the class of weapons in the United States and Russian armories. By any world standards, a poorly equipped military establishment.

Here is Great Britain, if not much else she is a first class naval power. A country that is a leader in high technology and well versed in warfare. Britain has the very latest in naval vessels and anti-missile technology.

Yet Argentina is sinking British ships with frightening regularity with its inferior planes and missiles. The inescapable conclusion is that surface vessels are sitting ducks for missile-equipped planes.

General Billy Mitchell, the shades of your presence is badly needed in the Pentagon today.

Timothy Jones Killed In San Juan, Puerto Rico

Funeral services for Timothy Patrick Jones, 23, were conducted in Claude, Tx., on Wednesday, May 26, at the Methodist Church there. Burial was in the Claude cemetery.

Mr. Jones is a former Farwell resident and attended Farwell schools for three years, graduating from Alamo High in Amarillo.

He died May 21 in San Juan, Puerto Rico, as a result of a beating suffered about a week earlier. Mr. Jones was a navyman stationed at Norfolk, VA., and was on a cruise ship which docked in San Juan. He was on shore leave in San Juan when he was killed. Investigation is continuing into his death.

Survivors include his wife of only one month, Cheryl, of the

home in Amarillo; his mother, Dorothy Jones of Canyon Cita Ranch, south of Amarillo; one brother, Mike Jones, in the navy at Norfolk, VA.; and two sisters, Cindy Whitaker of Claude and Phyllis Lunsford of Lubbock.

James Banton Christesson, 53, of Carlsbad, NM, was arrested on May 27 in Plains, TX, and charged with swindling with worthless checks and theft by check. Christesson is being held in Parmer County jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond on each count, and is awaiting district court action.

The 12th annual Clovis Pioneer Days festivities began last weekend in Clovis with the Pioneer Days Chile Cookoff kicking off a variety of week-long activities. Theme for this year's celebration is "75 Years Progress-It's Still Happening."

The Chile Cookoff which was held on Saturday featured a host of cooks prepared to brew up the best chile in the west.

Cooks came from the surrounding area including Portales, Texico, Farwell, Amarillo, Lubbock, and Wichita Falls. Bennie Barrow of Clovis and the Cowchip Chile booth was named the overall winner, while Ted Magness of Farwell and the Sidewinders Chile booth received fourth place.

Other events scheduled for Pioneer Days include the Pioneer Days parade, rodeo, and balloon fiesta.

The balloon fiesta is scheduled for 6 a.m. MDT on Saturday and Sunday. The take off will be from a field next to the Clovis High Plains Hospital. Admission is free, and traffic and parking direction will be

long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Bailey and Parmer.

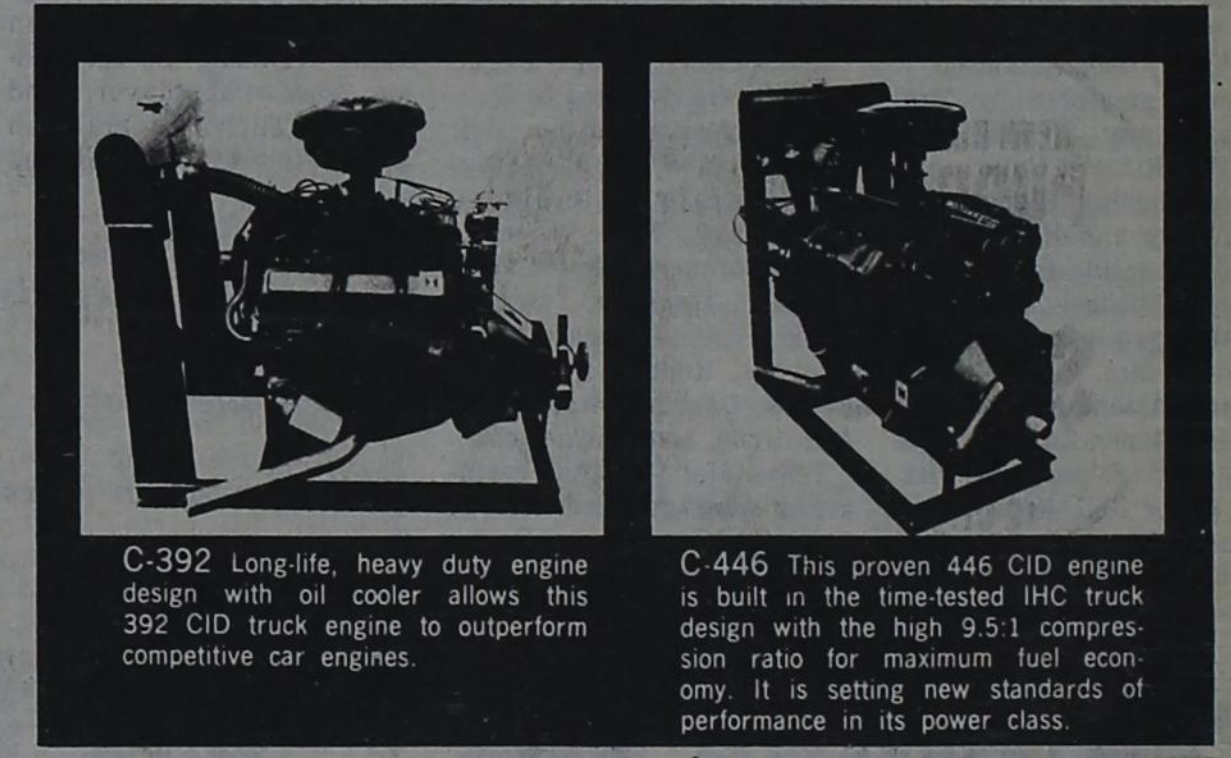
Texas Trooper Reports Parmer County Accidents

Dear Mr. and Mrs. John Getz, To Whom It May Concern:

In the Spring of 1977, the late Mr. H.Y. Overstreet asked the City if they would take over the old, South Farwell, Cemetery. They refused, not wanting the responsibility.

He asked me if I would - I said yes! And did so. In late winter and early spring of 1978, I worked Saturdays and Sundays and on still nights. I worked 137 hours - never received enough donations to keep the lawnmower in gas and sharp blades.

Last July, Mr. Overstreet came several times to visit about the cemetery. The last time he came, he made a three-fold bequest. When he left, he said, "I'm leaving you in full charge of the cemetery."

I worked last Saturday, Sunday and Monday in the cemetery. I'm really glad I was there. The letter that was in last week's paper really had its day.

I've had calls, personal visits here at home, and had the pleasure of visiting with 17 property holders - 14 of them were very disturbed over such actions as "hiring persons to maintain the cemetery as needed; the burning down or poisoning the weeds that have infested the area; and enclosing a flock of sheep in the cemetery to keep the weeds down."

A former resident who now lives in El Paso, and is visiting in Clovis, called and said, "Take the vegetation off that ground and every monument would have its own sand pile."

I think an elderly man gave each of us food for thought. Question: "I wonder how many people ever go to a lawyer, one skilled in legal matters, for advise before making a decision?"

Who was the Prophet who said "knowledge comes but wisdom remains?"

One man bluntly said, "The humane society would be on anyone's neck before the sheep were unloaded on poison grounds."

Again may I thank each one for your personal thoughts, calls and visits.

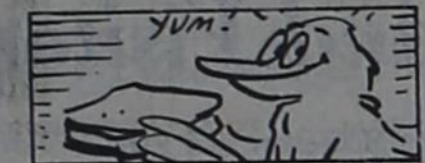
Fire Safety Tips

MAJORITIES CAN BE WRONG

When St. Paul was at Ephesus his proclamation of the gospel caused such a stir that the idol makers, who were losing money, protested until "the whole city was filled with confusion." Soon somebody started a chant: "Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" Others joined and the chorus swelled until "all with one voice, about the space of two hours, cried out, Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" (Acts 19:34) and the town clerk, referring to the religion which surrounded this pagan goddess, said confidently: "THESE THINGS CANNOT BE SPOKEN AGAINST" (Ver. 36).

But later at Rome, the apostle was informed, with reference to those who had accepted the truths he had been proclaiming: "As concerning this sect, we know that EVERYWHERE IT IS SPOKEN AGAINST" (Acts 28:22).

We wonder which side our readers would now prefer to be on: that

of the superstitious multitude or that of the minority who place their faith in the Bible.

Millions worshipped the goddess Diana from a thousand years before Christ to two centuries after, but who knows her today? Where is the evidence of all the miracles she is supposed to have wrought? Her glory is little more than a memory and the religion which involved around her name is a thing of the past.

But the Bible, for all these centuries and more, has stood unchanged and unchangeable. It has weathered, not barely, but handsomely, all the storms of criticism and opposition and has proved to be indeed the Word of God. Read the Bible and especially the part meant for us today: the Epistles of Paul. Depend upon it, act upon it, and don't hesitate to stand for it, even when in the minority; for where the most vital truths are concerned, majorities have often been wrong.

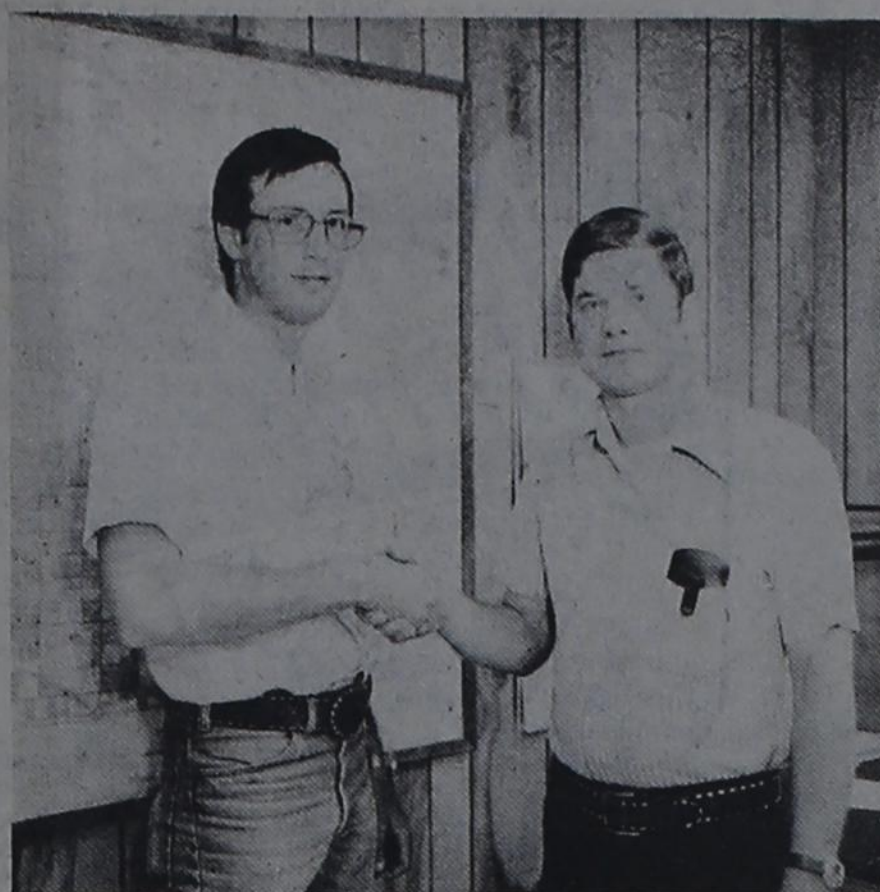

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Refund Checks Mailed To Texas Taxpayers

AUSTIN, Tex. - State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently mailed the state's first tax refund checks paying taxpayers the same rate of interest as the state charges for delinquent taxes.

"For the first time, the state and the taxpayer get the same interest on overpayments and delinquent taxes-10 percent," Bullock said.

Before the Legislature set the 10 percent rate last year, taxpayers were charged 7 percent on delinquent taxes but received only 6 percent on protested payments, and no interest on overpayments, Bullock explained.

The higher interest rate on overpayments will cause an

estimated \$28 million to be paid taxpayers over the next four fiscal years, Bullock said. Estimates attached to Senate Bill 196, which raised both delinquent and overpayment interest rates, projected \$694,000 will be paid taxpayers in interest during the current state fiscal year; \$3.8 million in fiscal 1983; \$6.3 million in 1984; \$8.3 million in 1985 and \$9.4 million in 1986.

The warrants mailed May 10 represented nearly \$60,000 in refunds and interest on motor vehicle, motor fuel and sales taxes overpaid by 24 Texas taxpayers in January.

Future refund payments will be processed and mailed daily by the Comptroller.
