Presentation of awards will be made by Jack Williams, high school principal. Harold Travis and Billy Mayfield, school board members, will present diplomas.

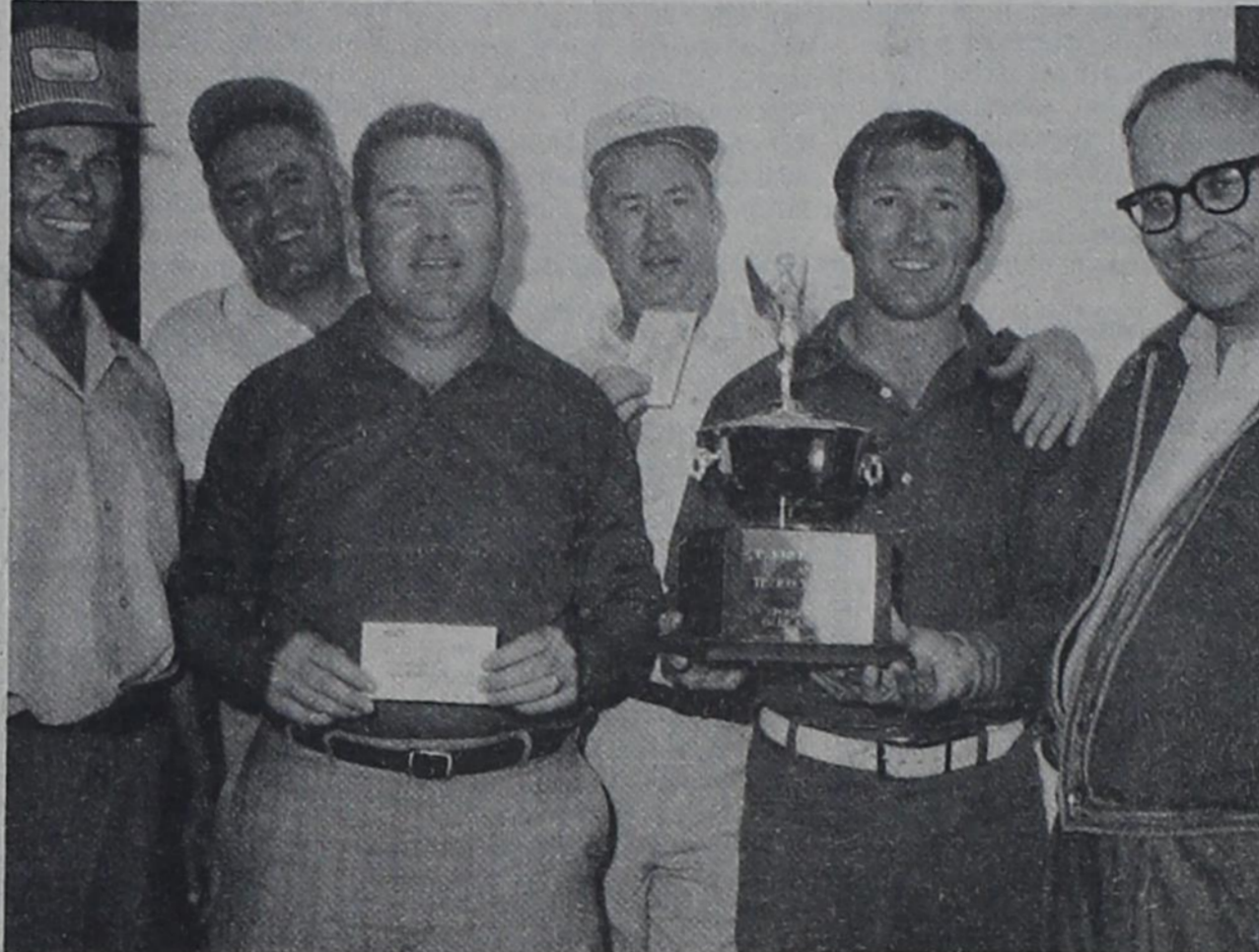

Lions Beat Rotarians -- Finally, Score 16 - 14



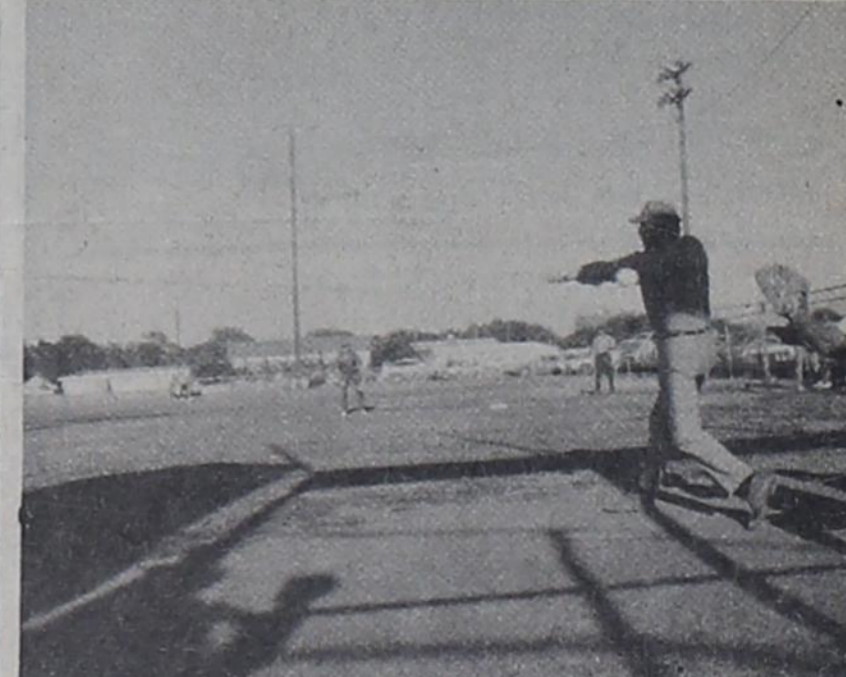

On The Farm In Palmer County

The screwworm, which at one time was one of the most economically damaging pests to livestock and wildlife, still poses a threat to the southwest.

Screwworm flies have a long flight range and it is very important to determine where infestations are occurring.

At the present time the Screwworm Eradication Program is releasing sterile screwworm flies in a band of 500-600 per square mile 100 miles ahead of the last confirmed report.

Hog cholera is still on the loose in Texas, and unless farmers and others use certain precautions, the situation could get much worse.

The most recent case of hog cholera has come up in Nueces County. That county was placed under a state quarantine on May 6.

Several steps that producers can take to prevent a bad outbreak in West Texas include:

1. Inspect animals regularly for cuts, scratches and wounds. Pay special attention to the navel region on newborn calves.

2. Manage livestock to reduce injuries. Avoid surgery or any treatment that may create a wound.

3. Collect larvae and egg masses for identification. Search deep in wounds for screwworms.

4. Treat all wounds with a wound dressing. Follow directions on the label.

5. Spray or dip herds with approved pesticides. Follow directions on the label.

6. Know positively that purchased animals are screwworm-free at point of origin.

7. Tell your neighbors about the screwworm threat. Encourage them to follow these precautions.

There is one major point regarding the hog cholera quarantine that relates particularly to those buying hogs. This is that any hogs bought in a quarantined area are confined to the buyer's premise for a period of 30 days.

Of the record 8.7 million hogs sold in the U.S. last year, 3 1/2 million were lightweight models.

At Home In Parmer County

With school almost out and most of the college set home or on their way, we are already thinking about that long awaited summer trip, whether it is to Europe or just camping for the weekend or church or band camp or that trip with the Scouts or 4-H. No matter where we're going we like to be prepared for the occasion. So here are some packing tips that might help.

Clothes unpacked from a suitcase needn't look like you slept in them.

There's a way to pack that minimizes wrinkles.

The traveler who's carefree, fresh and unrumpled has mastered packing comfortable clothes -- both neatly and sensibly. Good packing begins with planning ahead. You determine all the clothes and accessories needed for the climates and activities your trip will include. Visualize every outfit from head to toe, inside to outside. Also itemize the cosmetics and drugs you usually rely on.

For a greater variety with a minimum of bulk, choose a basic color scheme and garments that serve more than one purpose. Pack clothes that you enjoy wearing and that can "Take it". Easy-care fabrics are ideal for travel. These include such materials as jerseys, no-wrinkle synthetics and blends and knits--garments that are washable as well as packable.

Prints that camouflage spots and wrinkles are also good traveling companions.

Whether using the "roll-up" or "fold-it-flat" method, pack tightly, but without crushing clothes. Too much room allows clothes to roll and shift, thus forming unnecessary wrinkles. Pad out needed folds with crumpled tissue paper or soft garments.

Use plastic bags for laundry, damp swimsuits, or anything you want to protect. Tissue paper and plastic bags are the tools of good packing.

Pack heavier items such as shoes and less used garments in the bottom of the suitcase. Lighter, frequently used items should be placed near the top.

Carry cosmetics in a separate case. A good method of arranging cosmetics is to pack go-togethers individually. For example, put hair setting items together and soaps and cleaning supplies in another area or package.

Plastic bottles and jars make ideal containers because of their light-weightness. Leave room at the top to allow for expansion of liquids; then seal

with tape.

Do not forget the many small gadgets on the market that make life easier for the traveler. Consider such things as folding inflatable hang-up miniature clotheslines and pins, sewing and repair kits, spot remover, shoe shine pads and plug-in hot cups.

It's wise to make allowances for an unexpected separation of you and your luggage by labeling both inside and outside with your name and address. An unusual decal or strip of colored tape on the outside of your luggage will cut time spent at baggage claim areas to a minimum. The chance of someone picking up your bag by mistake will also be reduced.

Planning ahead for your travel needs will give you that extra amount of confidence as you open your luggage for the first time. When miles from home, you'll find that you DID bring that oh-so-important item.

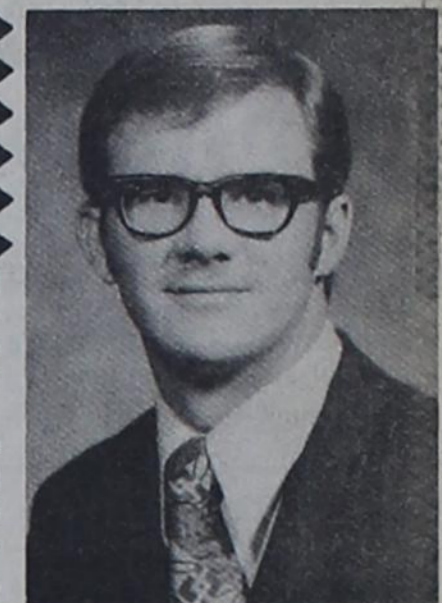

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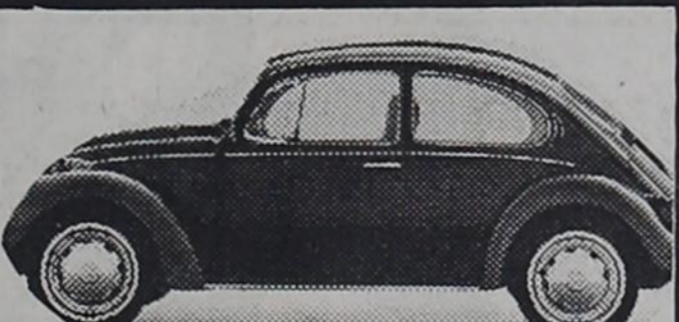

MAY WHAT A MONTH

May is a month which boasts anniversaries of many special events. Some have been widely celebrated, others dutifully memorized by school children, and still others remembered only in recorded statistics.

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proclamation establishing the celebration of Mother's Day. On May 10, 1869, Governor Leland Stanford of California drove a golden spike into the last railway tie at Promontory Point, Utah to complete the first transcontinental railway in America; the first regularly scheduled television programs began, on May 11, 1928, in Schenectady, N.Y.; and, on May 25, 1935, Babe Ruth swatted the last home run of his career at Forbes Field, Pittsburgh.

MAYBE WE OUGHT TO CALL IT CONTROVERSY DAY

Memorial Day, also known as Decoration Day, is one of this country's most solemn holidays. Custom has come to recognize it also as a day for enjoying the first long weekend of summer.

But perhaps no national holiday has been the subject of disagreement approaching that surrounding the day we celebrate on May 29.

ORIGIN

The actual origin of the holiday lies in the custom of decorating graves during ancient festivals in Europe and Asia. Most nearly parallel to the U. S. observance is Germany's *Heldengedenktag* (Heroes' Memory Day) which is celebrated on March 12.

In 1866, a group of women from Columbus, Miss., a small town near the site of the Battle of Shiloh, made a pilgrimage to Friendship Cemetery, an 18-acre tract on the edge of the village. The ladies went despite urging to the contrary from their husbands. "The memories are too bitter," they said. "Emotions are still inflamed."

Their act of kindness became a symbol of the attempt to bring about amity after the bitterness of the Civil War. An article in the New York Tribune described the activities of the Southern ladies:

"The women of Columbus, Miss., have shown themselves impartial in their offerings made to the memory of the dead. They strewed flowers alike on graves of the Confederate and the National soldiers."

In a way, the men of Columbus were right. The bitterness resulting from the Civil War has through the years interfered with the universal observance of Memorial Day.

Army of the Republic, an organization of Union veterans, designated May 30 "for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion."

Official designation by Union veterans caused Southerners, embittered anew by the excesses of Reconstruction, to consider the holiday a day to honor only Union dead. Southern states first ignored the holiday and then set aside a different day as "Confederate Memorial Day," a practice that still persists.

Controversy over the holiday continues even as to its very name. Intended to be known as "Memorial Day," reference to the day as "Decoration Day" began early. So popular was the name "Decoration Day" that its use prompted the Grand Army to urge that the "proper designation of May 30 is Memorial Day"—not "Decoration Day." Yet, the official name of the holiday in three states is "Memorial Day or Decoration Day." In Tennessee it is officially "Decoration Day."

OFFICIAL RECOGNITION Recognition of Memorial Day as a holiday came in 1873 when New York designated it a legal holiday. Rhode Island followed in 1874 and Vermont in 1876. The U. S. Congress made it an official holiday for federal employees in 1887. By 1910 it was a legal holiday in all states except nine Southern states, including Texas.

The state of Texas never officially adopted a statewide day of recognition until the day was re-legislated by the U. S. Congress in 1971. Individual communities had their own decoration days, a practice that still exists in many rural areas.

In 1971 Congress changed the date of the nationwide observance of Memorial Day from May 31, to the last Monday in May, which this year falls on May 29. All states except

four adopted the change. Arizona observes the holiday on May 31 and Alabama, Mississippi and South Carolina do not recognize it at all.

CELEBRATING THE DAY

The day is celebrated in various ways throughout the nation. The main feature of most observances is a military or veterans parade to cemeteries for memorial exercises. At military installations a ceremony at noon generally marks the day with a 21-gun salute. Garlands of flowers are cast upon the seas from military ships.

The national focus is on an observance at Arlington National Cemetery, near Washington. The President generally participates in this ceremony. Theodore Roosevelt was the first president to participate in Memorial Day celebrations. He spoke at Gettysburg National Military Park in 1904.

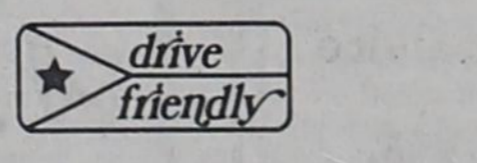
FAMILY OUTINGS

Because the day falls just after the close of public schools for the summer, the holiday is seized as an opportunity for family outings. Parks and recreational facilities overflow each year on this first holiday of the summer. Highways are crowded with traffic carrying Texans to an abundant variety of recreational pursuits.

DRIVE FRIENDLY

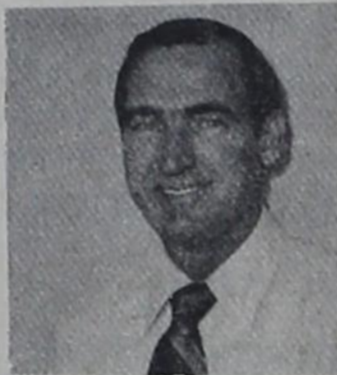

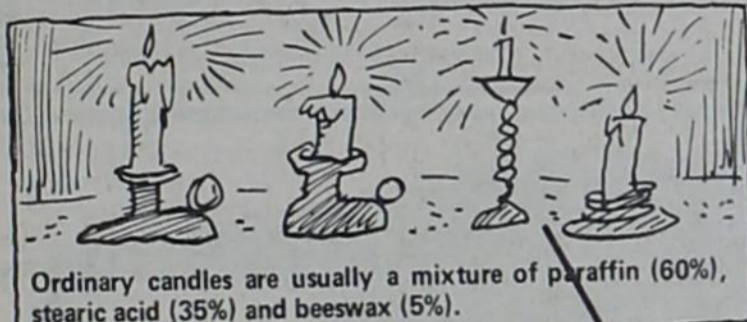
