Getting a good seat in the TV room is like getting a good seat at a state championship basketball game. There just aren't any good seats for those who arrive on time.

If you are not thoroughly supplied with a cache of necessary provisions for a morning's "entertainment," and find it necessary to get a drink, pick up a snack, or attend to some other necessary assignment, you will discover that your good vantage point is no permanent item.

\$4,000 Is Hoped For In County MOD Drive

Citizens of Texico-Farwell and all communities of Parmer County will be digging down next week to help the annual March of Dimes drive that will be launched on a nation-wide scale.

In Parmer County, chairman Raymond Euler says he hopes residents will be able to attain a \$4,000 mark before the month is ended, although he added that no quota has been given the county.

A total of around \$2400' was collected last year, he said, and now that doctors report that the end to the polio battle is in sight, everyone is being called upon to be extra generous to bring the fight to a successful conclusion.

"About sixty" persons from all over the county will attend a meeting at the Friona Club House tonight (Thursday) to lay plans for the January offensive.

Euler is hopeful that from 40 to 50 persons will be active in canvassing the county this year, although the number usually runs around 25.

Of major importance on a na-

tion-wide scope will be the experiment in 1955 to vaccinate 9,000,000 persons in an attempt to stop the dreaded disease.

Euler says it does not take much imagination to see how expensive a project this will be, and the American people are being called upon for an even greater effort to provide for this new venture.

The National Foundation con-

siders 1955 the "year of trial" in its quest for an effective polio vaccine.

Schools are expected to be enlisted again this year, and Euler said that more supplies and material than ever before will be used in the campaign.

Large cardboard "test tubes" telling the story of the fight will serve as coin containers, and cards

with slots cut in them to accommodate coins also will be used.

Only one common opponent is available for comparison of the two teams, that one being Texico. Bovina beat the Wolverines 64-45, and the Steers edged them 50-37.

Game time is 7 o'clock Tuesday evening and both boys and girls games are scheduled.

Farwell will have two warm-up sessions previous to the Bovina tilts, meeting Rosedale on the local court tonight (Thursday) with two games on docket. Play will begin at 7 o'clock in the evening when the girls meet Springlake.

Two boys games are planned on the Steer court Saturday night, when the locals play host to the Elida, N. M., teams in non-conference play.

Annual Farwell basketball tournament will be an event of next week. A more detailed account on teams entered and game time, is included elsewhere in this issue.

By 7:30 it had risen to 11, and was really coming up fast as the sun peeked over the horizon to smile on a windless, sparkling setting.

FM Road Contract Goes To J. O. Boswell

A contract in the amount of \$87,894.60 has been let to the J. O. Boswell company of Lubbock by Parmer County.

That amount will cover cost for the construction of 8 1/2 miles of paved farm-to-market road, FM 690, beginning near the old Twin Houses location near Lazbuddie and extending eastward.

The contract, let Dec. 15, calls for completion with 100 working days.

Texico Paving Fuss Is Back in Court

The struggle over whether Texico will or will not have residential paving went through another phase Wednesday morning of this week, as District Judge E. T. Hensley Jr. heard testimony from both plaintiffs and defendants in the case.

Interested parties are anxiously awaiting his verdict, which is expected by this weekend, and will be presented by letter to counsel for the parties involved.

The argument was tossed out of the Supreme Court a couple of months ago because it was ordered that insufficient evidence on the part of the defendants had been presented.

Eventually, the case made its way back onto the docket of the district court at Clovis, and Wednesday morning was taken to hear witnesses.

The burden of proof in the case, said the Supreme Court, fell to the defendants, who were called to show that the benefit which would be derived from paving would result in an increase in valuation greater than the present value of the property plus the improvement.

To show this, Attorney Lewis Cox, representing the defendants, called upon 21 witnesses for testimony. Very little time was consumed in questioning by Cox or Otto Smith, counsel for the plaintiff, and the course of the trial was taken within a period of only slightly over two hours.

The plaintiffs, who had produced witnesses in the first trial held in district court several months ago, used four persons to show their side of the case.

Judge Hensley, after hearing all testimony, announced that his

JONES, AFTER QUICK LOOK AT TRAIN, DECIDES NECK WORTH MORE THAN CAR

A late model Mercury two-tone automobile, pride of the Paul Jones of Bovina, hitched a ride on a mile-a-minute Santa Fe passenger train about 11:30 Tuesday morning, and what's left of the pretty car isn't much.

Jones, about to cross the track in eastern Bovina, decided that he had plenty of time to make it, but failed to take into account the snow that had drifted about a foot deep on the crossing.

His speed was insufficient to

carry him across, and he went through the frightening experience of realizing that although his wheels were spinning, the car was not moving, and the train was fast bearing down.

There wasn't much choice to be made, observed Jones, so he stepped out of the car and watched as the train crashed into and demolished the auto in a split second.

After the impact, the body shell was reduced to a crumpled mass, the engine was resting 55 feet away, and the transmission was setting by itself a little further down the track. No one was injured, and the train ground to a halt about the time it got to Sherley Elevator.

Jones, questioned about 2:30, readily admitted that he got "a little bit nervous" over the mishap, although his loss was covered by insurance.

West-bound trains are fabled for their dazzling speed through Bovina. Coming off of Parmerton hill into a straight-away through the little town, they cause many a spectator to catch his breath at the sight of them.

Ending eight years of office as county and district clerk in Parmer County, Loyde Brewer this week announced that he and Mrs. Brewer and Mrs. Lucy Vestal, his wife's mother, will purchase and take over the operation of Welch-Blackburn Hardware in Friona.

It is the intention of the Brewer family to make their home in Friona, but until residence there can be obtained, he said this week that it might be necessary for them to commute from Farwell.

A decision as to the new name for the business has not been made.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Let's Take A Peek At The Coming Year

Everybody wishes they could have a crystal ball to see what's ahead for themselves in the coming year. The truth is, of course, that such a useful invention is extinct in the modern day, but that shouldn't deter us from plotting our course along the soundest lines in evidence at the moment. The fellow who attempts to interpret trends in the economy and adjusts his activity to a harmonious association with these trends most often turns out to be the man ahead.

It may turn out to be more entertainment than education by time next year passes, but just for the exercise here is what we feel is in store for the Parmer County area in 1955:

A WHEAT CROP. Long-range weather forecasters already are advising that another dry year may be in store for this part of the Southwest, but the western High Plains is a tough nut to crack when it comes to figuring out the weather. Our hunch is that we finally will have a return of enough winter and spring moisture to bring forth the first wheat crop of any consequence in five years. It won't likely be a real record-breaker, because there just isn't enough subsurface moisture to do the job, but we feel that wheat will once again return to a place of prominence in the area's farming economy.

STABLE, PERHAPS RISING, FARM INCOME. Even with another serious reduction in cotton acreage, a reduction in wheat acreage, and a lower price for sorghum grains, we foresee a level as high as, perhaps higher than, the agricultural income of \$25 million for Parmer County in 1954. Dryland will play an important part in this.

A trend toward a return of the old "cow, sow, and hen" farm philosophy will make its appearance, for the simple reason that some farmers will be obliged to look for new avenues of income because of acreage controls.

Dairying will not likely look any more attractive than it has during the past year, but a renewed interest in swine and beef cattle seems imminent. Specialized poultry production setups such as broiler programs or caged hens will attract the interest of more farmers in 1955.

MINOR CROP SHIFTING. Certainly, it would be foolhardy to predict that any large scale movement will take place in the area's cropping program, as changes such as these do not take place overnight. Yet, we may see more farmers display interest in small acreages of potatoes, soybeans, and perhaps sugar beets. Other commercial vegetables such as lettuce, tomatoes, and the like will show up in a lot of farm gardens, but that is about the only place.

Sudan, a seed crop which paid off handsomely this year, will likely receive a much greater acreage in the county next year, but the old adage that a poor year always follows a good one (for the price, not yield) will likely remain intact.

MORE MECHANIZATION. Power will continue to replace sweat in the area's farming. This trend is more evident each year. Take a look at the land that is being broken by use of furrow guides this winter. Farmers also will invest in other equipment to take some of the work out of rural life.

INCREASING POPULATION. The breaking up of large farms and the development of methods of farming requiring more labor (irrigation, of course) will continue to attract larger and larger numbers of semi-permanent and transient workers into the area.

Farm homesteads will continue to be vacated by rural landowners and the move to town will not



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abate, but in spite of this, rural population will increase next year. The towns of Texico-Farwell, Bovina, and Friona should all enjoy substantial increases in population and continued activity in new home building.

SCHOOLS WILL GROW, TOO. Hand in hand with an increase in population will come growth problems for the area's schools. The reason will not be so much the fact that there are more families, as it will be true that there will be more BIG families moving in. For some reason, laboring classes nearly always have larger families than those who own their own businesses.

ECONOMY WILL LOOK UP. The debt against land which resulted overnight from a tremendous amount of money which was invested in irrigation, is being slowly but steadily reduced. With each passing year, more and more wells are paid off and mortgages are removed.

Optimism will be felt among those persons who previously have not felt able to spend money because of large fixed obligations. This will result in a general upturn for our small-town businesses. Christmas spending already has pointed toward this trend. Small town merchants in the area report better Christmas sales this year than any other in recent years.

With a more stable economy, new businesses are likely to spring up in the communities which serve as retail centers for the Parmer County area. Irrigation and increasing levels of income will look attractive to businessmen in less fortunate areas. Just as land investors are flocking to this country from the southern and eastern plains areas, business investors in quest of better opportunities will come on their heels.

NO WAR IN SIGHT. We are hopeful, along with the millions of other Americans, that our government will succeed in avoiding any involvement in a war during 1955. Because of a return to peacetime and a more competitive economy, we are not finding the going as easy when it comes to making a fast buck any more, but we are sure that you will agree this is certainly a small sacrifice to make when it means that the young men and women of the area will not have to go marching off to war to be maimed or killed on some foreign shore.

It's been fun making these strictly amateur predictions, and we hope you have enjoyed following us along. Perhaps the year ahead will make these sooth-sayings ridiculous, but as Clyde Warwick, veteran editorialist at Canyon so often writes, "We shall see what we shall see."

9 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/3 cup double-acting baking powder
1 tablespoon salt
2 teaspoons cream of tartar
1/4 cup sugar
2 cups shortening or 1 2/3 cups

lard
Stir baking powder, salt, cream of tartar and sugar into flour. Sift together three times into large mixing bowl or onto a large square of plain paper. Cut in shortening until Mix is consistency of corn-meal. Store in covered containers at room temperature. To measure the Master Mix, pile it lightly into cup and level off with a spatula.

Biscuits
3 cups Master Mix
1 cup milk
Add milk to the Mix all at once, stirring 25 strokes. Knead 15 to 18 times on lightly floured board. Roll 1/2 inch thick. Cut. Bake on baking sheet in a hot oven (450°F) from 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 18 two-inch biscuits.

Pancakes or Waffles
3 cups Master Mix
1/2 cup milk
2 eggs
Stir the combined milk and beaten egg into the Mix until blended. Bake on hot griddle or in waffle iron. Use the best equipment for the job.

Drop Cookies
3 cups Master Mix
1 cup sugar
1/3 cup milk
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
Stir sugar into the Mix. Combine milk, beaten egg and vanilla. Stir into the Mix until well blended. Drop by teaspoon on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 10 to 12 minutes.

-1954 IN REVIEW-

Many changes have been made in the past year as is evidenced by a resume of news events. Improvements have been made, with many new businesses and changes in personnel and ownership reported in towns.

Irrigation wells have been on the increase, and farmers are becoming more and more adept at producing maximum crops on land; home demonstration clubs have been organized throughout Parmer County to assist women in better homemaking.

Tragedies that touched the entire area were listed in the news, but there were happinesses, too. Births, weddings, and fiftieth wedding anniversaries were reported each week, as were items of personal interest—parties, visitors, and trips.

Listed below are events as they occurred each month—1954 in review.

JANUARY

January of 1954 brought with it the same buoyant hope and expectancy that comes with the beginning of each new year.

Six local men started the new year off right for the cotton growers in Parmer County. They attended the meeting of the House committee on agriculture, in Waco, and explained the serious plight of cotton growers in the area.

Making the trip were A. L. Hartzog, president of the County Cotton Growers; Joe Jones, county agent; H. A. Fleming, ginnee; and Tod Long, W. L. Edelman, and Edgar Walters, directors of the county group.

Something new for the farmers were "robot" tractors, used for landbreaking, begun in January. Many found the furrow-guided tractors to be ideal for their situations, and it left them free time for additional farming operations.

Another "first" for 1954 was the addition of drivers education to the curriculum of Farwell High School. And, a new group, called the Young Democrats, was organized. Robert E. Wilson of Bovina was elected to head the group.

Several couples marked important anniversaries in their married lives, with the Tom Fosters celebrating 25 years of wedded bliss, and the Sam Justices marked off their first 50 years of being married. In the Lazbuddie community, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Gammon also marked their "golden" year of marriage.

Among all the happiness, people of the area took time out to think of the nation's polio sufferers, and made an all-out effort to meet the March of Dimes quotas. Among the affairs given during the drive were a quilting party at Rhea, box and pie suppers, and the Mothers' March. Reports showed that the county cooperated in the drive better than ever before.

Lavoyda Billington, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sterling Billington, was installed as Worthy Advisor of the Rainbow Assembly for girls. Loyde Brewer, who held the office of County and District Clerk for four consecutive terms, announced that he would not run for reelection.

Sadness came to the community when Lawson Lambert, 53-year-old Friona man, was drawn into, and killed by a mechanical cotton stripper which he was attempting to unclog.

Winter made its presence known on January 20, when high north winds whipped snow into the area, dropping the mercury to 2° above zero.

And, the Farwell FFA boys had a very successful livestock show at the end of the month. Seventy-nine head of livestock were exhibited in the first annual show, and James Roberts, Eddie Smith, and Gerald Hardage topped the show with their three Grand Champion animals.

FEBRUARY

A lot of things took place during the shortest month of 1954, among which was the purchase of the Farwell Elevator by Worley Mills. Plans were begun for a 500,000 bushel addition to the storage facilities.

A rabies scare hit Texico, and all dogs were ordered to be vaccinated or destroyed within two weeks. Cotton farmers beamed when the President signed a bill making the cotton acreage allotment boost a reality, almost doubling the county's allotment. A kick-off banquet at Friona launched a drive to finance a new building for the Parmer County Community Hospital. \$50,000 in cash was set as the goal for the drive.

Bovina's Methodist Men received their charter on February 15, inaugurating a tie-up of the local group with the national organization. The Texico-Farwell Lions entertained the "fireboys" at a banquet, in appreciation of their unselfish service to the community. Construction was begun on three natural gas pipelines in the county, during the month; and the contract for the Bovina school building was let to Sanders Construction Co., which submitted the lowest of 14 bids. The contract called for 365 calendar days for completion of the project.

The W. H. Aldersons of Rhea

were honored with a surprise party on their 40th wedding anniversary; and Mr. and Mrs. Gene Coffman made an expense-paid vacation trip to Mexico City. Coffman was top Ford salesman in this district.

The young people of the community made their share of the headlines, with Denise Magness, Gay Ann McFarland, and Don Edwin Lewis going to Dallas to participate in All-State Choir activities; and Jean Rogers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Rogers, Texico, was named vocalist for the opera, "Naughty Marietta," presented on the ENMU campus. Roxie Henson, daughter of the Milton Hensons, was named DAR pilgrim for Texico School.

Bovina Mustangs and the Friona Squaws were crowned District Basketball Champions, after winning the final games of the tourney held in Bovina. February 22-27 found the girls paying the bills and being "perfect gentlemen" during Farwell's Twirp Week.

Hardage Motor Company held its grand opening in Muleshoe, and Rose Drug and Gift Store had a different type opening—burglars opened a back door and took some \$3,000 worth of merchandise.

Hearts in the community went out to the relatives of Tom Foster, who was killed in a tragic firearms mishap. Foster had been a long-time resident of the Oklahoma Lane area.

Belvin Freeman, son of the W. L. Freemans of Texico, visited his parents, after a 40-month tour of duty in the Far East.

Otis Huggins was re-elected president of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, and later in the month some 200 people turned out for the annual banquet of that group. Dr. D. M. Wiggins, former president of Texas Tech, was speaker at the affair, and he made a plea to "have less leaning on the government."

MARCH

March came in like a lion, and stayed that way most of the month, giving us some of the most violent windstorms on record. Considerable erosion damage was done, due to the prolonged drought conditions.

And, J. W. Crim predicted that 1954 would be another bone-dry year. Crim, who uses an Indian method of forecasting the year's weather, has not missed a prediction in the 30 years he has been using the traditional method.

The First Baptist Church of Farwell celebrated its first anniversary, with an all-day service and a basket luncheon, with a large crowd present for the occasion.

Tragedy, in the form of fire, struck the Triplett Cattle Co. in Bovina and completely destroyed the mill, and a new supply of feed, with only the cattle being saved. A change in the direction of the wind could have endangered the entire town, but luckily, this did not occur.

Burglars again did some "opening" in the area, with both the Bovina Drug and Lariat Grain and Seed Company-burglarized. Firms were encouraged, however, by the finding of "about half" the loot taken from the Rose Drug in February.

Oklahoma Lane people really proved what good neighbors are for, when Mrs. Eph Young was injured in a fall from a truck, and all farm work had to be suspended on the Young farm. Six neighbors lined up their tractors and set to work, and in a short time the land had been twice chisled and listed.

Eighty-five farmers gathered in Bovina for the annual County Irrigation and Soil Fertility Day, sponsored by the Extension Service and the Soil Conservation District, with several outstanding farmers, scientists, and water experts on hand to speak to them.

Texico FFA boys, under the direction of Cecil Dykes, brought home the Sweepstakes award from the Area FFA Judging Contest. And, two Parmer County girls were named to offices at the Area FFA convention. Deann Buske, Friona, was elected corresponding secretary, and Margaret Verner was named Song Leader for the area.

On the musical side of school life, Tim Magness, Friona, was cast as Gilhooly in Texas Tech's production of George Gershwin's musical, "Of Thee I Sing." And, Shirley Smith and Dudley Hughes sang the leads in Farwell's opera, "Hold That Curtain." Other featured vocalists were Jerry Allison, Dick Feltz, Gloria Dial, Darlene Sprawls, Dan Hammonds, and Jo Ann Cochran. Along the dramatic line, Texico's junior class presented "M'Liss" by Bret Hart. They were directed by Mrs. Jimmy Allman.

Banquets were prevalent in the latter part of the month, with the Baptist churches feasting the classes in their respective cities. The Texico WMU chose a western theme for their banquet honoring the seniors; Dean Bryan Robinson of Wayland College was guest speaker at the Farwell banquet; and a Mexican theme was carried out by the Friona church group.

APRIL

"April Showers," lauded by song

and poem, appeared on the plains on April 12, when a slow, steady rain fell throughout the area. This was the first rain of appreciable amount to visit the county since October of 1953.

The Farwell High School baseball team started their first season as a formally organized unit, thanks to 19 local firms which bought uniforms for the boys.

Another boost to the youth of the twin cities was given by the Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha. The ESA sponsored a Slave Auction, which contributed \$250 to the fund of the summer youth program, and contributed some rose muscles to some of the "slaves" who hadn't had any exercise in a great while.

People in the Bovina vicinity are still laughing about the antics of the Flying Flappers in the basketball game at the Bovina Lions Club Athletic Night. The Flappers were none other than a group of Lions, dressed "fit to kill" in ladies apparel.

Friona carried off honors in the Interscholastic League events, with 165 points. Farwell placed third, with 65 points, and Bovina was 5th with 61.

Miss Corinne Stinson began her work as county Home Demonstration agent during April, and the O. W. Pairs joined the ranks of those who have been married 25 years.

Five elections saw prominent local men named to several positions. Ira S. Levins was named Mayor of Texico; and Charles Allen was elected Mayor of Friona. Loyde Brewer was renamed head of the Parmer County Polio Foundations, and new presidents Foundation, and new presidents Clubs were A. L. Hartzog and J. G. McFarland.

The Farwell Steers gashed to a triumphant win in the District Track Meet, in the senior, junior and grade school divisions. Texico High School named its honor students, with Phyllis Tucker and Roxie Henson being chosen co-valedictorians. Bobby Patterson was valedictorian of the eighth grade graduating class, with Jerry King giving the salutatory address.

Receiving the honor of representing Farwell High School at Boys' and Girls' State were Jerry Poteet, son of the M. H. Poteets, and Gloria Dial, daughter of the Murray Dials. And, Bobby Richardson, daughter of the Jess Richardson and Kenneth Reid, son of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Reid, won corresponding honors at Texico High.

Three local senior classes presented their plays in April, with the Bovina class giving, "Quit Your Kidding," the Farwell group doing "For Me and My Shadow," and Lazbuddie seniors enacting "Auntie Goes to College." Honors for dramatic efforts were won by the cast of the Friona School one-act contest play. The group won first at the Berger contest with their play, "Trifles," and came in second at Lubbock.

Local college students were also in the news, with Nancy Aldridge being chosen from the Stephens College Concert Chorus to make a 6-day tour of three states, along with other outstanding members of the chorus. Jo Sondra Magerus was named Outstanding 4-H Club Girl in Curry County and received a piece of Samsonite luggage as her prize.

MAY

During May, E. F. "Archie" McCutchan was named best conservation farmer in the Parmer County Soil Conservation District.

McCutchan received the honor for making use of water which would normally be of no useful purpose and for conserving and making proper use of irrigation water. ASC Secretary, Joe Camp, announced that Parmer County would receive \$48,900 of the \$15 million in federal funds designated by President Eisenhower to combat wind erosion.

Plans were begun for two new buildings on the Farwell School campus. A new gymnasium was planned, to seat 1150 people, at a cost of \$85,000, and a new band hall, to measure 36 x 60 feet, was to cost \$35,000.

Honor students were named at four schools in the county. Gay Ann McFarland and Clyde Hayes were chosen valedictorian and salutatorian at Friona High; and Wanda Roberts and Eddie Gale Steelman received like honors at Bovina School. Mary Joyce Rolland was valedictorian of the Farwell class, and Betty Lovvorn was salutatorian. In the Farwell eighth grade class, Doug Tucker was the student with the highest average, and Donald Ray Thomas was second. Betty Waggoner gave the valedictory for the Lazbuddie class, and co-salutatorians were Barbara Hinkson and Jerry Gleason.

Darlene Sprawls, daughter of Aubrey Sprawls, received the coveted cup, awarded annually to the outstanding senior of Farwell High School.

Deniese Magness was chosen to represent Friona Girls' State; and Don Edwin Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona was asked to audition for a role with the Starlight Operetta Association in Dallas.

Carmen Roth, daughter of Mrs. T. E. Roth, Texico, received a \$100 scholarship, awarded by the University of New Mexico Faculty Woman's Clubs; and Peggy Hardage, daughter of the Walter Hardages, was installed as Worthy Advisor of the Assembly of Rainbow for girls.

High school trackmen from Texico, Farwell, Bovina, and Friona qualified to go to the state meets. Bovina's qualifiers were Leon Ware, Neil Smith, and Bobbie Calaway; the Friona man was Virgil Phipps; and Farwell's men were Truitt Hardage, Don Pool, Don Geries, and Robbie Foster. Coach Stockton's six Texico tracksters were Jimmy L. Moss, Allen Kelley, Paul Crooks, Kenneth Doolittle, J. B. Taylor, and Jimmy D. Moss.

JUNE

Early in June, wheat harvest began in Parmer County. The first loads of the golden grain were brought into the various elevators by: R. F. Talley, Friona; Jerry Paul, Texico; Leland Ivy, Lazbuddie; E. V. Isham, Bovina; O. B. Robertson, Black; and Sam Rundell, Lariat.

Ladies of the area, under the direction of Mrs. M. C. Roberts, began plans to seed the park areas north and south of the Court House with bermuda grass. Residents of the twin cities were asked to contribute extra bermuda sprigs from their yards, and the women, with the help of the youngsters enrolled in the youth program, were to set them out. Later, a water shortage stymied the plans of the group.

The youth program, under the direction of Curtis Miller and Calvin Murray, got into full swing, early in the month. It offered handicraft, swimming, tennis, pony league baseball, little league baseball, basketball, and ping pong to the local young people.

Radar equipped cars stationed along the highways became "traps" for speeding motorists. On one afternoon, 13 speedsters were caught near Texico, with the aid of the device, within a three-hour period.

On June 19 a bond election was held to approve bonds for the proposed gymnasium and band hall for Farwell School. The bonds were endorsed by a vote of 216-118. This authorized the sale of bonds amounting to \$115,000 for building the new structures.

People in the Pleasant Hill area proved that they, too, were good neighbors. Nine men, seven combines, and two trucks assembled at the O. L. Winkles farm north of Pleasant Hill, and harvested his 260 acres of wheat, as Winkles watched, on crutches necessitated by his broken leg.

Also in June, a 300,000 bushel addition to storage facilities was begun by the Macon Elevator in Bovina. By the end of the month, the total wheat cut in the county was estimated at a million bushels.

And, in a special installation ceremony, John Getz was installed as new president of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club.

The Tribune placed third in the sweepstakes division in Texas newspaper contests, and was given first place recognition for editorial writing.

JULY

Plans for a \$30,000 clinic to be built in Farwell were announced in July. Dr. M. F. Green of Muleshoe moved to Farwell and opened an office.

After a lapse of eleven years, Home Demonstration Clubs were organized over the county, with the aid of Miss Corinne Stinson, new HD agent. Some 14 clubs were organized.

Several changes were made in businesses in the area. Reed's Texaco Station in Farwell conducted a formal opening; Aubrey Brock of Cicero-Smith Lumber Co. in Bovina was succeeded by J. E. Sherrill; the Truck Cafe was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Shorty Milstead and Floyd Milstead; construction was begun on the L. & H. Gin southwest of Friona; a new business in Bovina was Ed and Bills Auto Service, which conducted a successful open house. Tragedy struck, early in the month, when three Bovina people were killed in a truck-car collision between Bovina and Farwell. Dead were Mrs. A. G. White, 53, Mrs. G. D. Anderson Jr., 32, and John Hilliard Anderson, 4. A fourth tragedy in Bovina, with the death of Curtis Huggins, prominent citizen.

People in the Oklahoma Lane community celebrated the 4th of July with an all-community picnic, with about 200 present. The festivities planned in the Bovina area were called off, due to the before mentioned tragedies.

Wendol Christian, Oklahoma Lane farmer, was injured while working on a hay baler. He received a broken nose and cheekbone, and deep lacerations of the face. Freddy Neely, 19-year-old Negro, was critically injured in a tractor-train crash near Progress. LaVon Rogers of Bovina also was injured in an auto accident in July. Boyd Jones, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Jones, broke his arm in a motor scooter accident. J. T. Hammonds was named as mayor of Bovina to succeed Steve

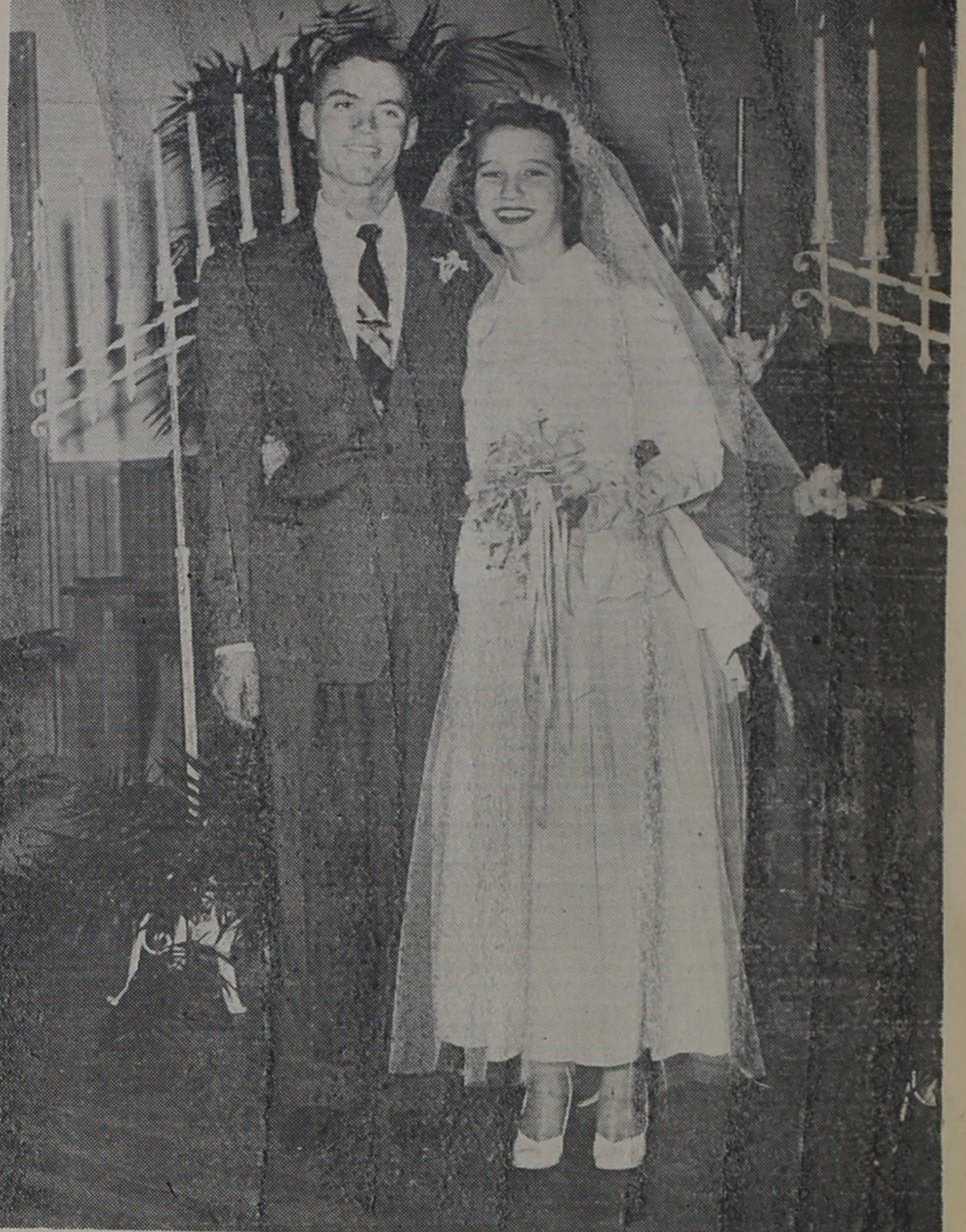

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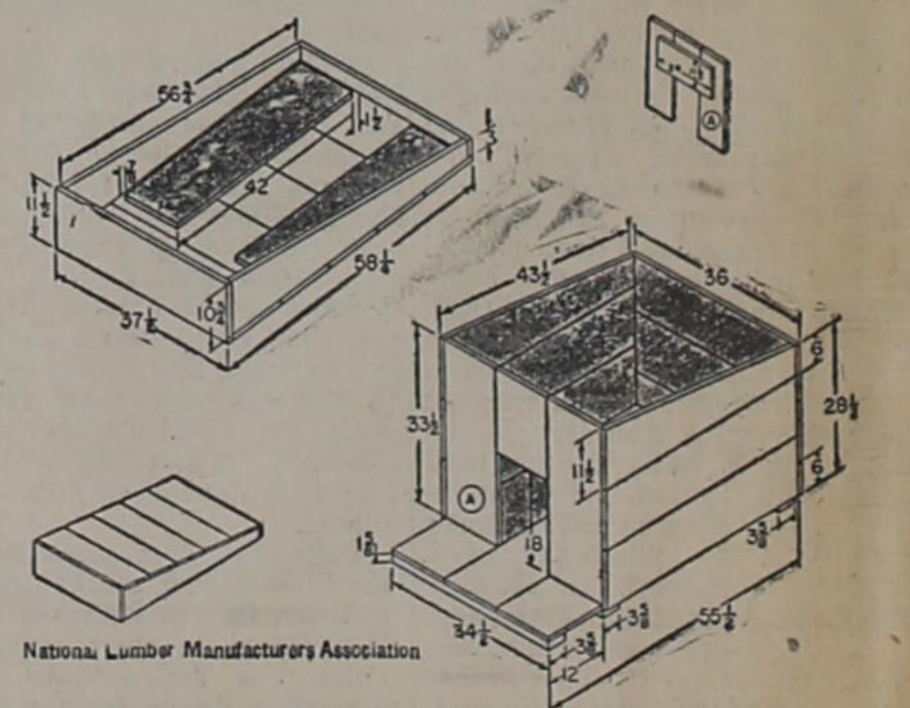
Three 2 by 4-inch sills, treated with preservative, raise the floor above the ground. The rest of the lumber is 1-inch stock.
