Also slated to be on the program is Prentice Mills, county ASCS office manager, who will discuss the 1967 farm program as it effects cotton.


Also on the agenda is an election of officers for the countywide organization and the election of two directors from the county on the board of Plains Cotton Growers.

From Mud or Monkey?

The surest way to start an argument among a gathering of friends is to bring up the subject of evolution. In recent years, a rather vivious controversy has raged concerning the origin of man, with our normally disinterested society seemingly split into two opposing factions, each promoting its own extreme view. Interestingly enough, the question has been greatly oversimplified. Among laymen, one side puts forth the man from monkey theory, while the other side sticks with the man from mud idea, with no apparent chance of reconciliation between the two warring groups.


I say the question has been oversimplified for a very good reason. It took Darwin several volumes to put forth his theory on the origin of the species. Many years of hard work and diligent study were to be necessary before his works were ready to be published, so it is not quite correct to restrict argument on the subject to simply whether man came from monkey or otherwise. It's just not that simple.

Somewhere between the two extreme views there has to be a middle ground, a road over which both science and religion may travel without a head-on collision occurring between the two.

In essence, Darwin's theory is that there has been a very gradual modification and change in all forms of life, beginning with the simplest one-celled organism that is believed to have been the original life form on this planet, and continuing on through the creation of the higher forms of life. All change is made for one very good reason, adaptability to a changing environment in order to insure survival.

The theologian's argument is that man is a divine creation, not merely a descendant from an ape.

Now it seems to me that there is really no argument here at all, and if there is one, then it is over the method of divine creation, not whether there was divine creation. In my view, there is no question but that man, as well as all other life forms, is a divine creation. However, the method of creation is still open to question.
