

# Hear Lies Tom Taxpayer -Rest In Debt

I was aware that the cost of living was on the rise, but the last straw occurred Sunday when I went to purchase a copy of the Sunday paper and was informed that the price had risen to twenty cents. Now some people may be inclined to blame the evil newspaper publisher just as they blame the blackhearted auto manufacturers for the rise in the cost of new cars and the greed-ridden farmers for the price of groceries, but as a wise old philosopher once remarked, "It just ain't so,"

Blaming the farmer for the increased cost of food is akin to accusing weather wizard Dan True of causing floods and sandstorms. That's just not the way it works. There are certain things in this life that are inevitable; life, death, wind, rain, and under the present philosophy of government, taxes and rising costs. It is a basic law of economics that a person's income must at least match his expenditure if he is to long survive.

When the government demands more in the way of taxes, the retailer must charge more for goods in order to maintain the precarious balance of income vs. expenditures. When labor unions demand unreasonable salaries and benefits, manufacturers must raise the cost of their products in order to survive. When social security takes more out of our salary in order to provide "free" services, we must find a means of increasing our salary. In the ultimate analysis, it is a philosophy of government, supported by the majority of the people, that must bear the burden of blame for the increased difficulty of maintaining an existence in

Now some people may remark, "But it isn't Mr. Johnson's fault, he even turns out the lights in the White House at night," Big deal! Lyndon saves this country seven dollars a month by turning off lights while he generously passes out millions of dollars to the undeserving ingrates who run down the streets screaming "Burn baby, burn."

My heart is literally torn from its moorings when I see our poor president pleading with the housewife to buy only the cheaper cuts of meat and explaining that even Lady Bird has given up buying the expensive foodstuffs. Now I'd just bet that the President has given up eating K.C. strips and has gone to eating hamburger. Of course who knows, maybe Luci's 300 pound, 13layer wedding cake was made with that cheap shortening that contains animal fat instead of pure vegetable oil. Possible, but not probable.

Perhaps the next economy measure announced by the President will be that Mrs. Johnson has taken up using wax paper to wrap the left over casserole in instead of using Baggies. In order to add authenticity to the act, Vice-President Humphrey will probably announce that he has switched to a cheaper grade of wax with which to polish his foredome, and Defense Secretary McNamara will disclose that he has given up Brylcream in favor of that greasy kid stuff.

Now all this would make extremely good propaganda items but unfortunately would do little to alleviate the burden placed on John Q. Public. We cannot continue to extract a larger portion of our salary to finance poverty battles and week-end pleasure trips by government officials and still expect the cost of living to go down.

A perfect example of frivolous waste of public funds was disclosed this week when the House Administration Committee cancelled Adam Clayton Powell's airline credit card, Powell as you know is the flamboyant representative from Harlem who sees himself as the savior of Harlem's multitudes. An administration subcommittee disclosed that Powell used Education and Labor Committee funds to pay for 65 trips between New York and Miami and Washington and Miami during the current session of Congress. I wonder what urgent business called Powell to Miami 65 times in one session of congress? If Powell prefers Miami to his job in Washington then perhaps he should take a job as lifeguard on the beach and leave lawmaking to somebody with a sense of responsibility to his constituents, I also wonder how many other congressmen have sim-

Likewise it is interesting to note that the honorable Senator Robert Kennedy has the largest staff of any person in Congress, some 88 people, all on government salaries. Is a Senator's job so tremendously difficult that it requires 88 people to assist him? I rather suspect that it is a case of insuring that hard luck relatives have adequate income at the expense of hard working taxpayers. This is inexcusable and should be grounds for dismissal from the Senate.

The United States is also the only country I can think of that spends 50 billion dollars a year for defense, and then appropriates millions more to maintain an expensive Arms Control and Disarmament Agency to think of ways of getting rid of all of the valuable weapons.

I also find it absurb that poverty war generals are getting larger salaries than Viet Nam war generals, It really must take a lot of brains to figure out ways to waste taxpayers money. Perhaps it would save a lot of salary money if we just loaded B-52's with money and bombarded poverty areas with money

Confucius once say, "High cost of living not affect its popularity much," but unless government spending is reduced in areas where it should be reduced, the only thing left on this continent capable of earning a living will be the pack rats which will be able to exchange a pair of taxpayers ears for a 50 dollar bounty paid by the Committee on Dead Waste disposal.


