Blaming the farmer for the increased cost of food is akin to accusing weather wizard Dan True of causing floods and sandstorms.

When the government demands more in the way of taxes, the retailer must charge more for goods in order to maintain the precarious balance of income vs. expenditures.

Now some people may remark, "But it isn't Mr. Johnson's fault, he even turns out the lights in the White House at night."

My heart is literally torn from its moorings when I see our poor president pleading with the housewife to buy only the cheaper cuts of meat and explaining that even Lady Bird has given up buying the expensive foodstuffs.

Perhaps the next economy measure announced by the President will be that Mrs. Johnson has taken up using wax paper to wrap the left over casserole in instead of using Baggies.

Now all this would make extremely good propaganda items but unfortunately would do little to alleviate the burden placed on John Q. Public.

What it all boils down to is that the only way to decrease the cost of living is to decrease the cost of government.

A perfect example of frivolous waste of public funds was disclosed this week when the House Administration Committee cancelled Adam Clayton Powell's airline credit card.

Likewise it is interesting to note that the honorable Senator Robert Kennedy has the largest staff of any person in Congress, some 88 people, all on government salaries.

The United States is also the only country I can think of that spends 50 billion dollars a year for defense, and then appropriates millions more to maintain an expensive Arms Control and Disarmament Agency to think of ways of getting rid of all of the valuable weapons.

I also find it absurd that poverty war generals are getting larger salaries than Viet Nam war generals.

Confucius once said, "High cost of living not affect its popularity much," but unless government spending is reduced in areas where it should be reduced, the only thing left on this continent capable of earning a living will be the pack rats which will be able to exchange a pair of taxpayers ears for a 50 dollar bounty paid by the Committee on Dead Waste disposal.

The office hours of the Clovis office are 8:30 to 5, Monday through Friday (except National Holidays). On Thursdays, the office is open until 9 p.m. These hours are all Mountain Standard Time.

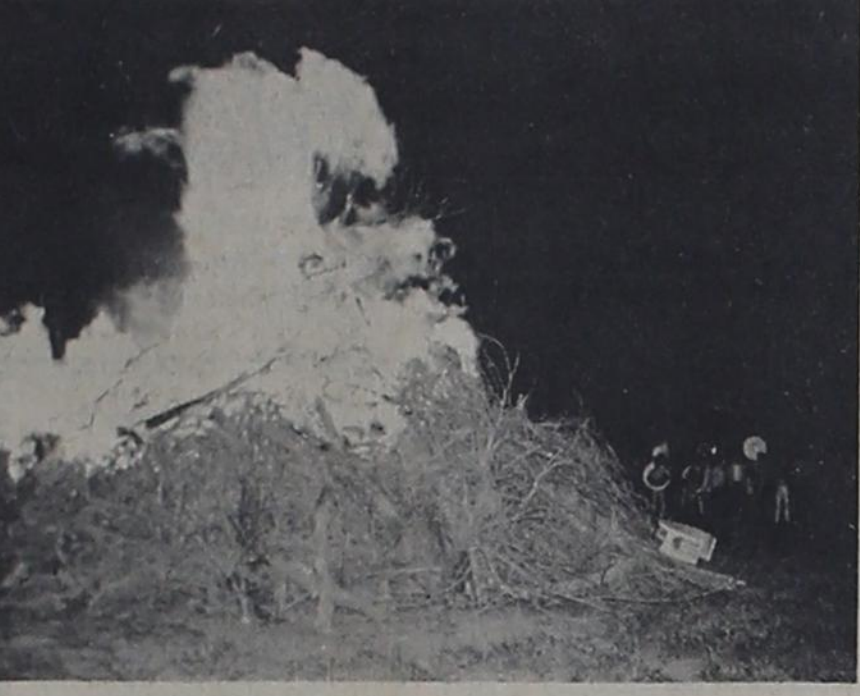
A program on "Personal Development" will be given this month to all Home Demonstration Clubs and homemakers are invited to attend these meetings; just contact some club member in your community.

#### COOKING CUES

Keep the lid on - your family's food will retain more nutrients if cooking is done in a pan with a tight-fitting lid. ## No Major Dietary Changes

There is a great deal of discussion these days about fat in the American diet. There is also a lot of unsound advice given by unqualified people. With heart disease on the top list of killers in the nation, where can one go for sound information?

The best source of information comes from research. The Food & Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences is the best authoritative source. Here is what they say:

Moderate reduction in total fat intake and some substitution of polyunsaturated for saturated may be indicated for many Americans. So says the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences. This recommendation was made in spite of the fact that present evidence on the connection between dietary fat and car-

diovascular diseases is not sufficient to justify radical dietary changes. This was a major conclusion in a report which reviews the role of dietary fat both in human nutrition and as a factor in atherosclerosis and its complications, particularly coronary artery disease.

Any adjustments in the amount and kind of fat consumed must be judged on an individual basis, the report indicates, taking into consideration consequent changes in caloric and nutrient intake.

Besides contributing to palatability and satiety, researchers say that fats play a vital role

in nutrition. They provide energy, important vitamins, and fatty acids essential for growth and reproduction. Any drastic reduction in fat consumption would alter the body metabolism in unpredictable and possibly hazardous ways.

Until more is learned about which fats are desirable nutritionally, the Board recommends that the American consumer partake of the foods that make up a varied, adequate and not overly rich diet and maintain a normal body weight by controlling calorie intake and by daily exercising.

will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient and on-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks."

After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post Office personnel will add the proper ZIP Codes and return the cards to the sender.

President Johnson has proclaimed October 10-15 as "ZIP Code Week" to promote greater usage of ZIP Code.

Postmaster General O'Brien announced May 19 that steps were being taken to make ZIP Codes more accessible to the mailing public. The present

program resulted from a search for the most effective method to get the codes in the hands of private mailers.

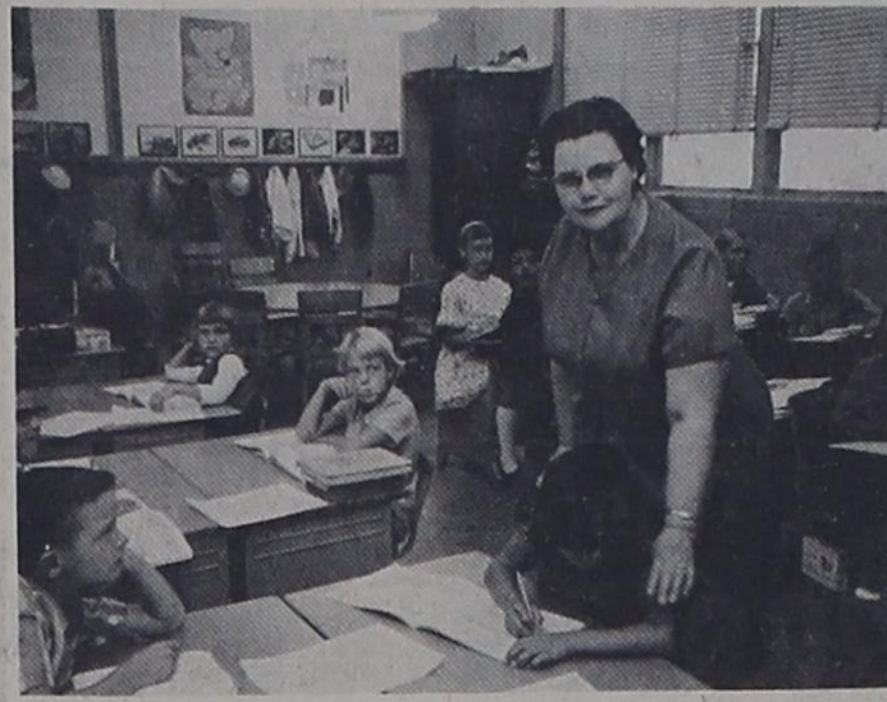

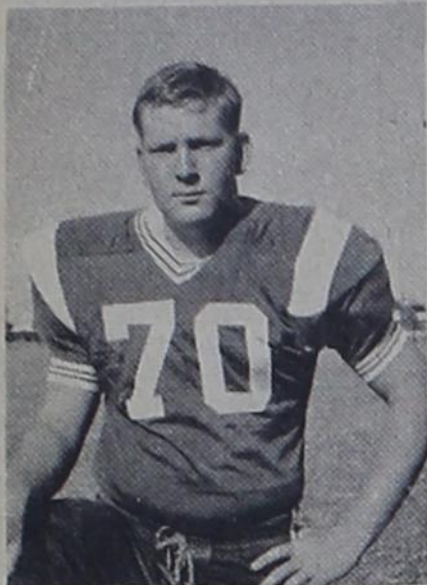

# Steers Of The Week Tucumcari Rattles Steers

Singled out as Steers of the Week for the Rattler-Steer game have been Bobby Field, quarterback, and Charles Bowery, tackle. They were singled out for the honor on the basis of their performance.

A large and determined band of Rattlers from Tucumcari uncoiled and struck twice to ruin Farwell's homecoming. The Rattlers stung the Steers to the tune of 14-7 in Steer Stadium last Friday night and won the homecoming game.

Farwell's defense was again plagued by a hard running, hard driving back. This week it was No. 44, Bobby Cates, who provided the big punch in the Tucumcari offense. Cates continually broke away for good yardage when it looked like the Blue and White defense was about to regain possession of the ball.

Farwell opened the game by kicking to Tucumcari and Cates carried the ball three of the first four times for the Rattlers.

This put the ball on the Steer 45-yard stripe, but a five-yard penalty gave the Rattlers a first and 15. The next play netted only two yards and with a Tucumcari fumble, that they recovered, it looked good for the Blue and White. But on the next play, little Ray Nunn uncorked a 40-yard scoring jaunt and with a successful conversion, Tucumcari led 7-0 before the Steers ever got the ball.

The Steers took the kickoff but in the face of a 15-yard penalty, couldn't move the ball and had to punt. Tucumcari was not able to mount a drive and in turn kicked to the Farwell 12-yard stripe where the ball rolled dead.

The Blue and White then put together an 88-yard drive with only three plays. Bobby Field shot a 30-yard pass to Bruce Dollar, a 13-yarder to Bobby Chadwick, and a 45-yard pass and run to Johnny Schell, who went over for the touchdown. Al Phillips kicked the conversion and it was a new ball game at 7-7.

The quarter ended with Tucumcari in possession of the ball. The teams settled down to marching up and down the field in the second quarter. Neither team could muster another score and the half ended still at the 7-7 deadlock.

Farwell took the second half opening kickoff and moved the ball for one first down before punting to the Rattler six-yard line. The boys from Tucumcari were unable to crack the stout Steer defense until after eight minutes of the third quarter had ticked off the clock.

The Rattlers then started a drive from their own 13 featuring the power running of Cates. The drive terminated when a pass from 16 yards out to Billy Bogard spelled doom for the Steers. Tucumcari again converted and led by the final score of 14-7.

The fourth quarter was inconclusive and the game ended with the Steers in possession of the ball deep in their own territory. Again it was a case of a band

of hard fighting Steers being outmanned by a bigger and more experienced team. The boys from Tucumcari were a big and experienced team that made their breaks and finally rolled over a thin but stout Farwell defense.

Coach Toby Booth commented that the Tucumcari squad was a good bunch of boys, especially the fullback, Bobby Cates. "Our boys were much improved over the week before", he added.

Coach Booth indicates that the game with Seagraves tonight (Friday) should be a good one. "We are in much better shape than in previous weeks and all of the squad members should be in condition to play." The Seagraves team is good and they are strong offensively. They outweigh the Steer squad. Seagraves has a 3-1 record for this season while the Steers have a 1-3 record. The Steers will be out in force to defeat Seagraves.

The girls tournament is scheduled this Saturday, on the local Lions Club diamond.

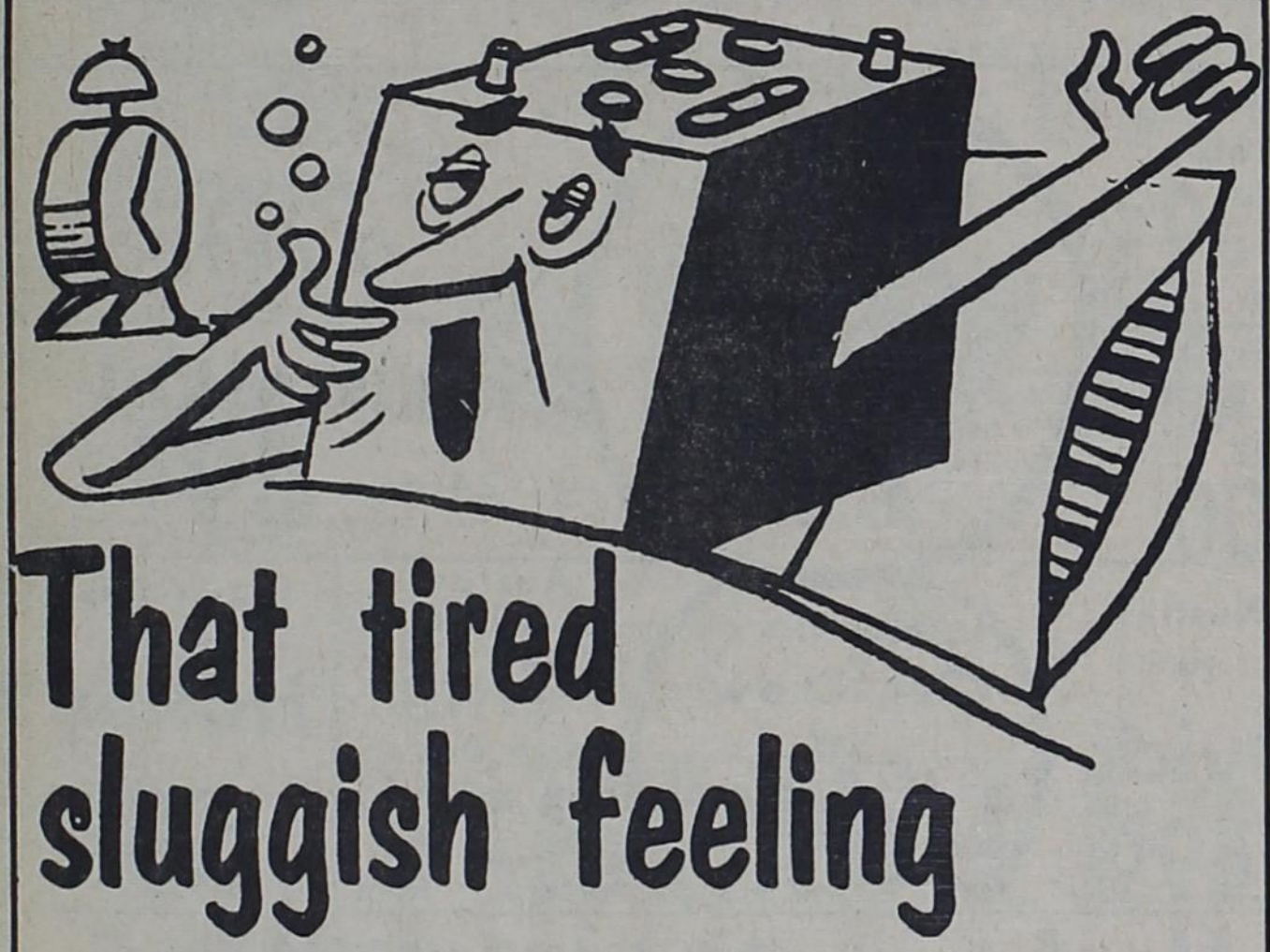

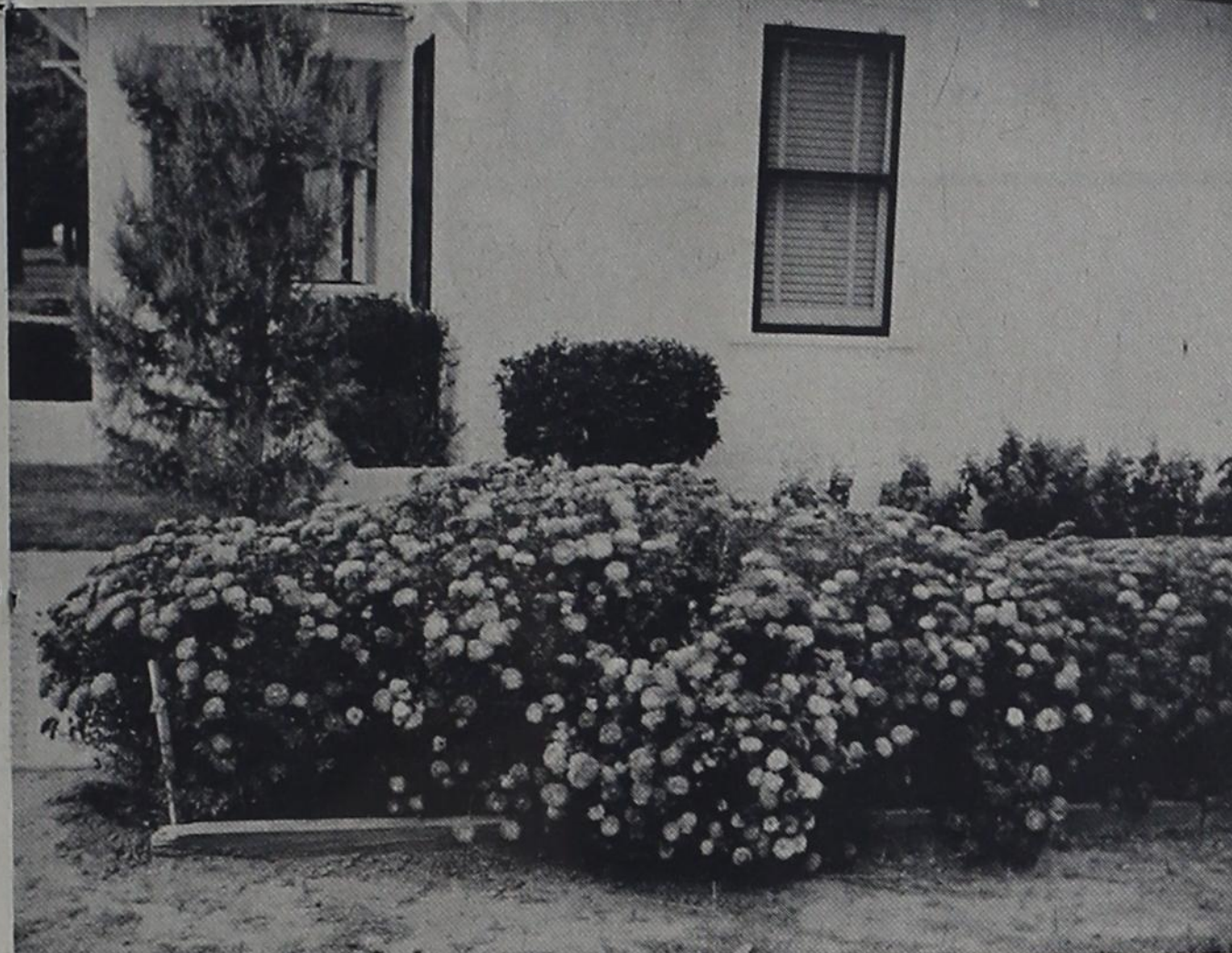
