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## Water Dist. Election Scheduled January 17

Parmer County residents within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's service area will go to the polls on January 17 to elect four representatives, including a District Director for Precinct Three (in Bailey, Castro and Parmer Counties) and three Parmer County Committeemen.

Parmer County's District Secretary, Pat Kunselman, is now accepting Application-Affidavits at the district office in Bovina from candidates who are eligible to serve as District Committeemen. Any individual who is 18 years of age and who has resided within the district's election boundaries for six months preceding the January 17, 1981 election date, is eligible to serve.

A committeeman may serve two consecutive four-year

terms under the by-laws of the District. Directors are not restricted in the number of terms they may serve.

Three Parmer County committeemen's terms expire in January. Men currently serving in those positions are Ronald Elliott, elected to his first four-year term in 1977, and Troy Christian and Dalton Caffey who were both elected to their first terms in 1973 and again in 1977. Both are now ineligible for re-election.

Two additional Parmer County Committeemen whose current terms will expire in 1983 are Floyd Reeve of Friona and Ralph Roming of Bovina. District Director A.W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell is currently serving as a member of the Board. He was elected to his first term in 1973 and is

eligible for re-election.

Any interested candidate must sign an Application-Affidavit by December 28 to have his or her name placed on the ballot. Affidavits received by December 11 will be presented at the December Board of Directors meeting, and these qualified applicant's names

will be included in the legal notice to be published prior to the election.

Candidates are encouraged to submit their Application-Affidavits soon. Forms are available at the Parmer County secretary's office at Bovina City Hall, for your convenience.

Candidates must be a resident of New Mexico and the Texico School District.

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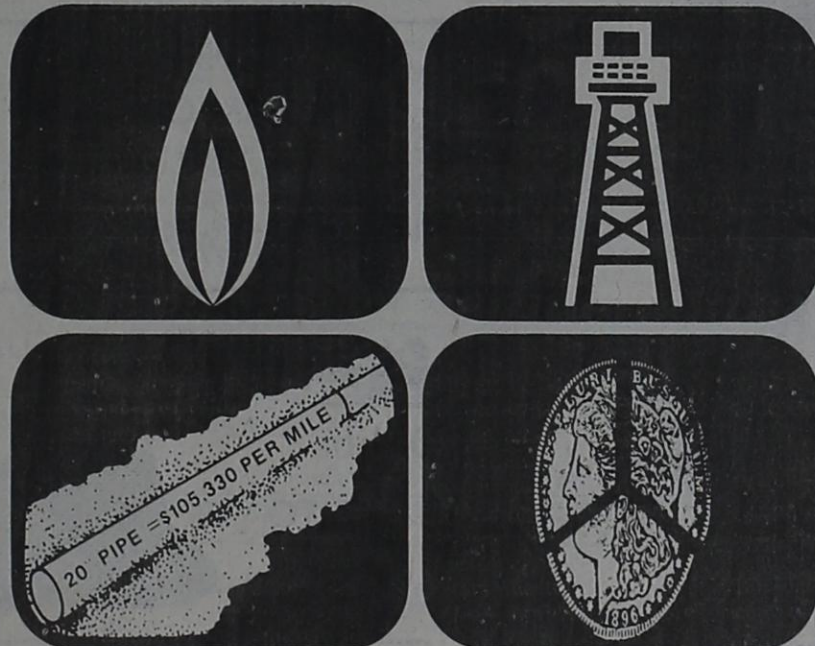

**Steers Win Third In Lazbuddie Tourney**

Farwell's varsity Steers captured the third place trophy at the recent Lazbuddie tournament, winning two out of three games.

Their first win came in their match with the Lazbuddie junior varsity. "Playing against a JV team we got to play a lot of people and got some good experience," said coach Mike Martin following his team's third place win.

The Steers captured an early first quarter lead and pushed on to defeat the young Lazbuddie team, 54-19.

Richard May was high scorer for the Steers with 19 points. Dwayne Winter had 10; Boyd White and Roger Costillo, 6 each; David Daniel and Alan Eubank, 4 each; Phillip Hagler and Lawrence Gobble, 2 each; and Waverly Coates, 1.

May was also leading rebounder with 10. Winter grabbed 8 and Eubank had 4.

Also rebounding for the Steers were White, Daniel and Coates, 3 each; Costillo and Hagler, 2 each; and Gobble and Gary White, 1 each.

In their game against Adrian, the boys fell 61-34 after Adrian grabbed an early first quarter lead of 23-8. "We played poorly. It seemed like

we just could not get going," said a regretful coach Martin following the match. "We were playing a good team and could not afford to be so sluggish."

The boys trailed 35-16 at the half and even though they scored an additional 18 points during the second half, the Steers could not overcome the prowess of the Adrian team.

Leading scorer in this game was Winter with 13 points. Daniel had 7 and May, Carpenter and Eubank each had 4; and White had 2.

Winter was leading rebounder with 10. May and Carpenter each had 5. Eubank had 3; Coates and Phil Hagler, 2 each; White, and Daniel, 1 each.

To capture the third place crown, the Steers defeated the Lazbuddie varsity, 55-48. It was a close game and the Farwell boys had to come from behind more than once to win the trophy.

"We played sloppy at first, but played pretty well down the stretch to win the third place," said Martin.

Farwell took the lead in the first quarter 12-8, but were trailing by one point at the half. The third quarter ended with the Steers on the losing

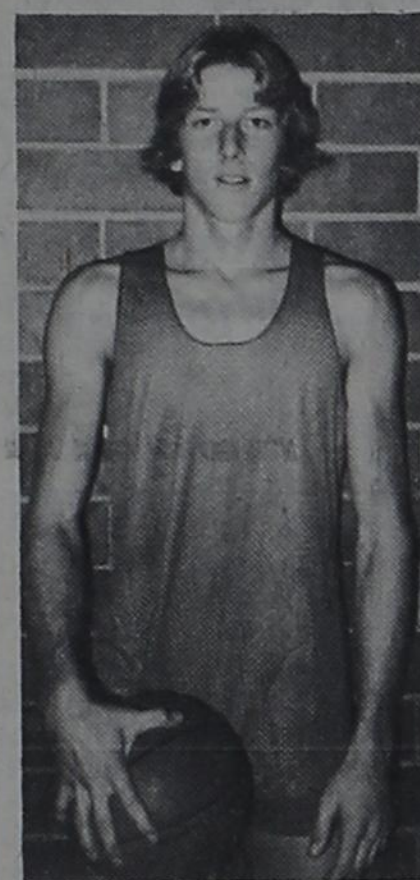

Their first tourney match was against the Lazbuddie JV, and the Steerettes clobbered them. A winning score of 62-13 sent the Farwell team to the playoff bracket.

The girls had the winning edge throughout the entire Lazbuddie JV game, leading at the half 24-10. A 44-12 lead in the third quarter showed just how overpowering the girls were, and in the fourth quarter the Steerettes pumped in an extra 18 points while holding their opponents to only one.

High scorer for the game was Janene Berry with 14 followed by Ginger Ellison with 12. Hooping more Steerette points were Jennifer Williams and Lari Curtis with 8 each; Tracy Williams, 6; Donna Meeks, Kay Geuther and Sandra Coates with 4 each; and Judith Schilling with 2.

The girls came from behind at each quarter to tie 13-13 the first quarter and 21-21 at the half. "Adrian ran a stall the first half and just kept passing the ball back and forth," said

the coach, "But in the second half our girls did a great job to come from behind and take the lead."

Ginger Ellison was leading Steerette scorer in the Adrian game with 16 and Janene Berry dunked for 13. Others adding to the Farwell score were Karen Magness for 6; and Donna Meeks and Jennifer Williams, 2 each.

The coach said his team's problem during the Adrian competition was a poor shooting percentage during the first quarter, and said, "We were very cold the entire first half."

Phillips was pleased with his team's win but said that he feels the girls "still need to be more consistent."

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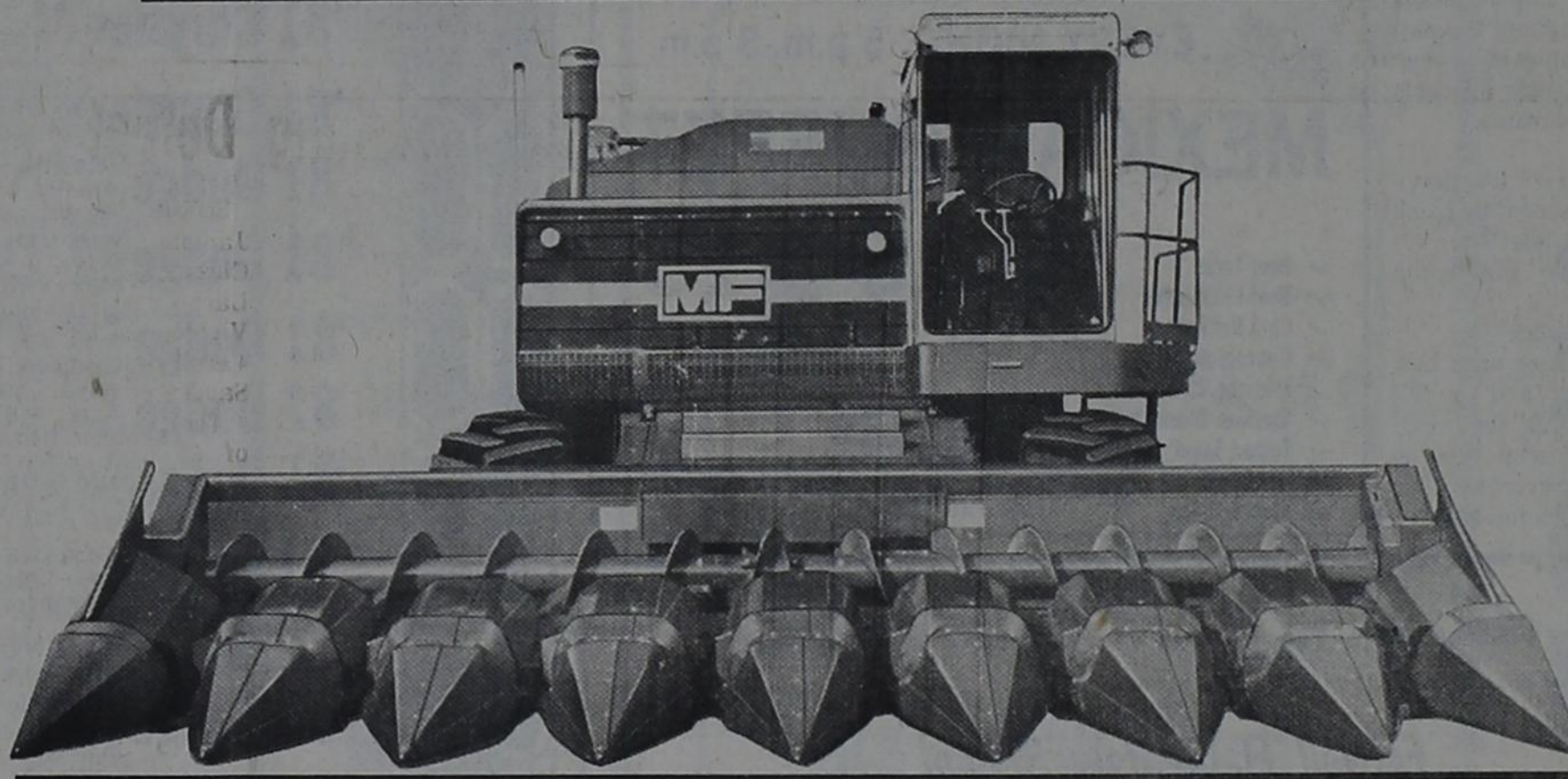
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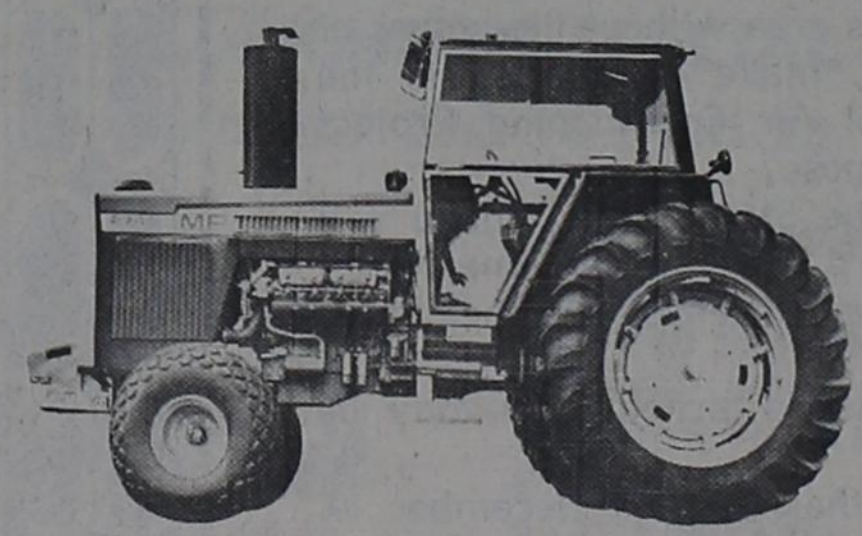
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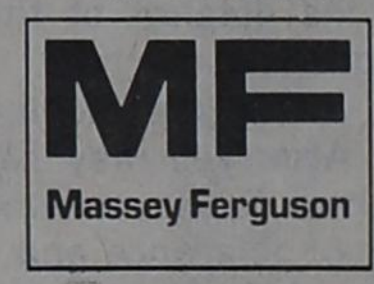
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# Gridiron Wolverines Receive All-District, State Honors

Eight Texico Wolverines were chosen for All-District honors last week and five were named to the class 2-A All-State team.

Coach David Lynn said he was extremely pleased and proud of the boys and felt each one chosen deserved the honor received.

The Wolverines chosen to receive All-District honors were Jeff Dunsworth, first team offensive lineman; Kent Harding, first team offensive end; Gary Mitchell, first team defensive lineman; James Robinson, first team defensive lineman; and Jimmy Love, first team defensive lineman.

Chosen as honorable mention All-District were Jimmy Love, second team offensive lineman; Todd Gerles, second team offensive back; Rodney Wilson, second team defensive lineman; Todd Gerles, second team linebacker; and James Kelley, second team defensive back.

The five selected for All-State were Jeff Dunsworth, second team offensive center; James Robinson, honorable mention, line; Kent Harding, first team offensive end; Jimmy Love, first team linebacker, defense; and Gary Mitchell, first team defensive end.

Coach Lynn remarked on each of these players, saying:

**JEFF DUNSWORTH:** "It was the consensus of all the coaches that he was the best center in the district. From day one to the end of the season he improved more than anyone on the offensive line. Jeff was a very big part of our running ball success. He was

selected as most consistent lineman in five out of eight games. I feel he deserves a lot of credit in the Reserve ball game as he played with a broken hand. That just shows how much he wanted to play."

The 175-pound junior was named first team offensive lineman in All-District in addition to his All-State title.

**KENT HARDING:** "Kent was our leading receiver catching 28 passes for 240 yards this year. As a tight end he can block and catch the ball extremely well."

The 165-pound junior was named to first team as a tight end in All-District in addition to his All-State title.

**GARY MITCHELL:** "This was the first year he ever played defensive end and he was our leading tackler in four different ball games. Gary was in on 103 tackles during the season and recovered one fumble. Offensively he played quarterback and did very well."

Mitchell was selected as first team defensive lineman for All-District in addition to being chosen for All-State.

**JIMMY LOVE:** "Jimmy led the team in tackles five out of nine games. He had a season total of 92 tackles and was our team captain." Love was selected as first team linebacker for All-District as well as being chosen for All-State.

**JAMES ROBINSON:** "He was probably one of our most important players. He played a very important part in our last four ball games. He was in on 72 tackles this year, playing as nose guard for the team. He's

also one of our strongest players and is real quick."

In addition to his state honorable mention, Robinson was named to first team defensive lineman in district.

The five other Wolverines chosen for all-district honors were as follows with comments by Coach Lynn.

**TODD GERLES:** "Todd was named to both offensive and defensive teams in All-District as honorable mentions. During our season he was leading tackler in six out of nine ball games. He had two pass interceptions. I consider him to be one of our team leaders this year. He didn't get to run the ball a whole lot, we mainly used him as a blocking back in our scheme of things and he did very well. He scored four touchdowns and was our second leading receiver."

**RODNEY WILSON:** "Rodney was selected for honorable mention as district defensive lineman. During our season Rodney had 63 tackles and was our leading tackler in two ball games. He received our weekly Big Lick Award once."

**JAMES KELLY:** "Our best secondary man, he did the job more than anybody. James had three pass interceptions and recovered one fumble. He was our leading tackler during the Lubbock Christian High School game and made crucial plays against Hagerman and Tatum to help us win those games." Kelly was selected for honorable mention as district defensive back.

Texico completed their football season as number two in the State of New Mexico class 2-A.

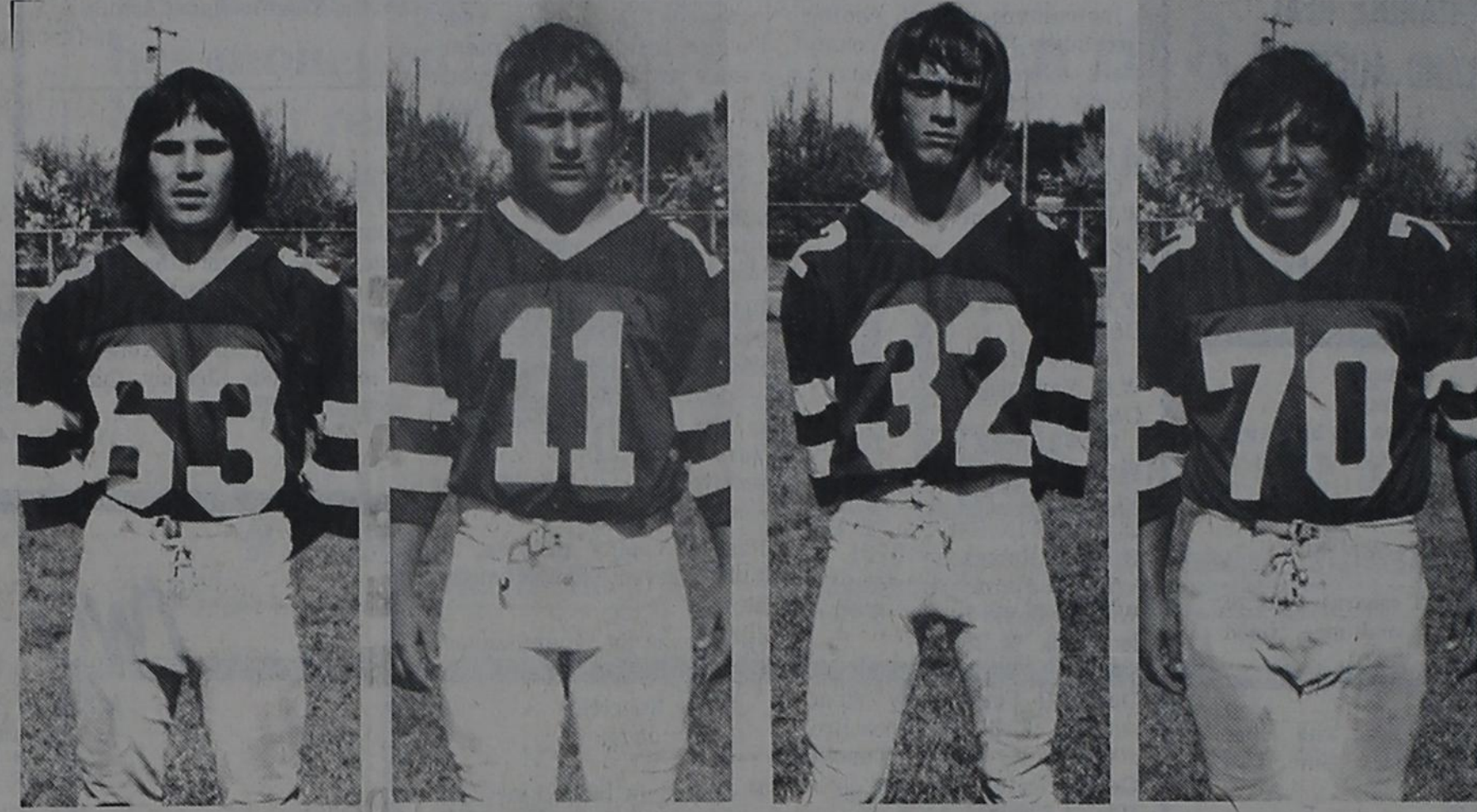

## Texico Varsity Girls Win Second At Friona Basketball Tournament

Texico's varsity basketball girls returned home from the Friona tournament as second place champions, winning two out of three games there.

Coach Roy King feels that the entire tournament was excellent experience for his team as all teams there played a man-to-man defense rather than the more familiar zone defense. "I was pleased with the tournament because we learned how to play against the man-to-man. We got our shots, we just couldn't hit them," said the coach following the tournament.

The Green and White first tackled the Friona team winning the game by only one point. "We were down by three points with one minute and half a second to go in the game," recalls the coach. "Tracy Dobbs then scored two points with a basket shot. We were given the chance at a

couple of bonus free throws but missed. Finally, with 4 seconds left and we're down by 1 point, Elyese Moody fouled and she sank both ends of the bonus shots to win the game for us."

It was a close game throughout as the girls were in the lead at the end of all four quarters, but only by extremely slim margins.

Ruth Scott was leading scorer for the Wolverines with 12 points. Tracy Dobbs followed with 11, and Lisa Coffey and Elyese Moody each had 6. Rebounding for the lady Wolverines were Moody with 13; Scott with 9 and Coffey for 7. Dobbs and Schree Rucker each had 2 rebounds, and Carletta Fitz and Tammy Landis had one each.

"Tracy and Elyese played outstanding this game," said the coach. "They really played exceptionally well."

The team rallied to win their

next match against Roswell High. "Roswell couldn't shoot that well so we took away the inside and made them shoot from the outside. Our team was leading 18-0 at one time," recalled King.

Texico held their opponent scoreless in the first quarter and allowed Roswell only 8 points in the second quarter to end the half 26-8. Each of the teams scored an additional 8 points in the third quarter and then Texico pushed on to win by 16 points, 42-26.

"We had a good defense in the first half, and we let everyone play during the game," said the girls' mentor. "Lisa played a real good game as did Ruth and Schree," he said.

Tracy Dobbs sprained her ankle during the Friona game and didn't play against Roswell. "She handles the ball a lot for us. We did miss her during that Roswell game," said King.

Ruth Scott was high scorer for the team during this game with 14 points. Moddy followed with 10, and Coffey and Rucker each had 6. Also scoring for the Wolverines were Tammy Landis, Jill Jesko and Becky McDonald with 2 points each.

Coffey's main contribution to the game was her 13 rebounds and 6 assists. Scott totaled 8 rebounds, and Rucker and Moody each had 4. Pam Hoyl rebounded 3 times and Landis and McDonald had 2 while Jesko rebounded once.

After their win over Roswell the girls advanced to the finals against Canadian. "We'll never face any team as good as Canadian the rest of the year," said the coach. "This game was good experience for us."

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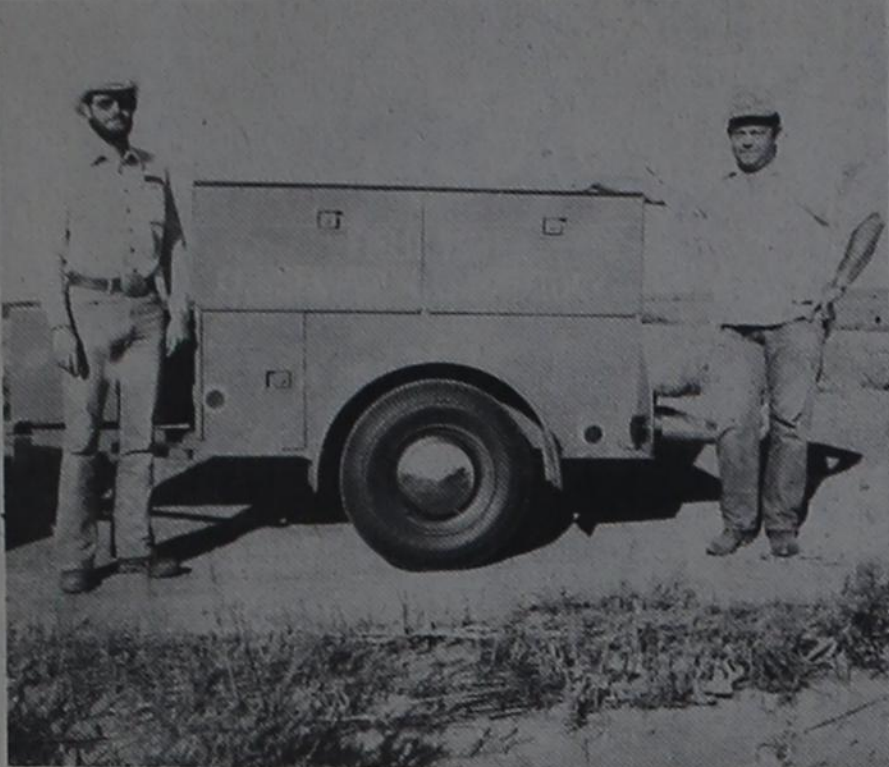
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### Field Laboratory

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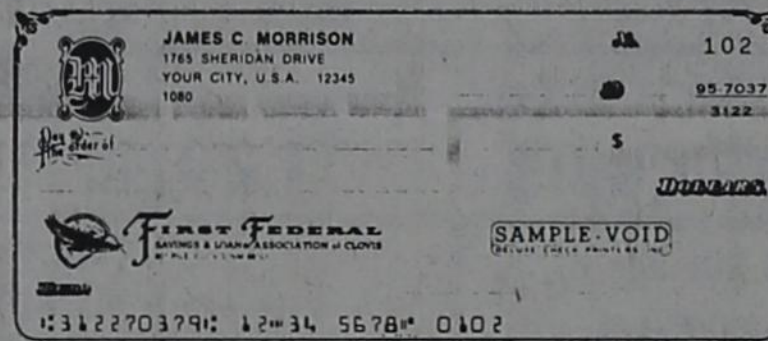
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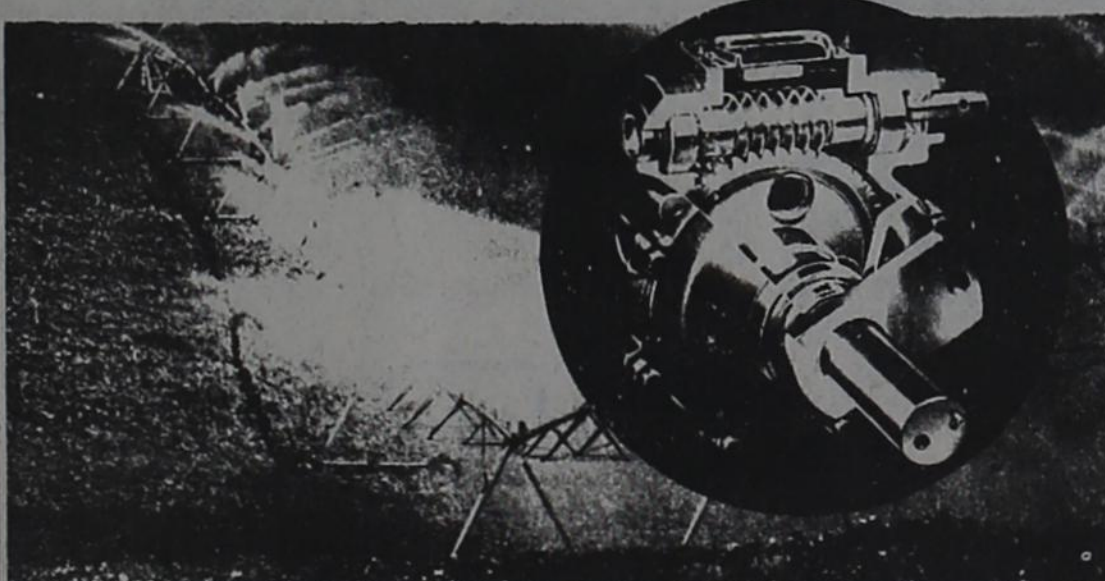
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
