Hitchhiker Suffers Injury After Being Hit By Pickup On Amarillo Hwy.

An out-of-town hitchhiker was seriously injured Tuesday morning when struck by a pickup when he was walking across the Amarillo Highway about one tenth of a mile east of the State Line Road.

Johnny Meyers, 19, of Kings-

ton, Ariz., was walking along the highway with a hitchhiking companion, John Huntington, 21, of Corona, Calif.

As they were hitchhiking at the outskirts of town, a semitractor trailer stopped to give them a lift. According to of the Texas Department of Public Safety Highway Patrol Division, Meyers crossed to the north side of the highway to

ask the truck driver for a lift. While still talking to the driver, after it had apparently

investigating officer Art Lopez been agreed that he and his friend could get a ride with the trucker, Meyers stepped backwards onto the highway and was hit by an oncoming pickup driven by Johnny Brownlow of Box 471, Texico.

Meyers was immediately

transferred by ambulance to Clovis High Plains Hospital for treatment of a broken pelvis and internal bleeding. He was scheduled to undergo surgery for these injuries, according to officer Lopez.

The investigating officer said

that no one was being charged in the incident and said that Brownlow had no way of seeing Meyers as the victim was in a "blind spot."



Parmer County Land Surveyed For Oil

Seismic Surveys, Inc., to begin a Vibroseic survey on Parmer's three leagues of school land located in Andrews and Gaines Counties.

Porter Roberts, the surveying company will be searching for explains that the Parmer land currently has one or two producing oil wells that generate approximately \$4,000 in county revenue that goes to Parmer schools.

The survey is to be at no cost to the county and if by chance the company does discover more oil, then Roberts says the county will "try and lease it to someone for drilling.'

At their recent meeting members of the commissioners court voted unanimously to grant permission to the survey company to begin its search.
