Until Next Meeting - -

City Marshal Hiring Decision Postponed

Whether or not to hire a Farwell city marshal, specifically, whether to hire Charles Lovelace for that job, has been postponed by the Farwell City Commission due to the absence of Mayor Walter Kaltwasser at Monday night's regular bi-monthly meeting.

Lovelace, who was in attendance at the meeting, applied for the job as Farwell's city marshal at the commission's last regular session on January 26. He was told at that time that the commissioners would give him an answer at their February 9 meeting.

However, when it was learned that Mayor Kaltwasser was unable to attend the gathering, councilman Fred Chandler made a motion that the decision be postponed "until a

full commission is available." Councilman Johnny Curtis seconded the motion adding that he didn't feel only two commissioners should act on "pending business" and the hiring of personnel.

As it stands now, the matter of hiring a town marshal will be decided at the next regular meeting, slated for February 23.

In other action, the commissioners discussed hiring an outside legal source to take care of delinquent taxes and pavement receipts. "Most are personal property taxes, and a few have been on the books since 1954," city clerk Janie Bowers told the council. "We have to get a judgement of some kind before we can clear it off the books."

Mrs. Bowers added that "we have more delinquent taxes this year than in past years," saying that this year's collection rate is 93 percent as compared to 97 and 98 percent in years past.

It was councilman Curtis who suggested the idea of hiring an outside legal source. "I just feel that if we retain someone who doesn't live in the area that they will have a much easier time bringing judgement against someone with delinquent taxes than someone who has to live next door to that person."

Councilman Chandler agreed and city clerk Bowers has been advised to seek outside legal assistance in the delinquent tax matter.

Also at the meeting, com-

missioners voted to change employee pay days to a bi-weekly basis. As it was, city employees were being paid at every city commission meeting, which meant that sometimes paydays ran into a three-week stretch between checks.

Businessman Gilbert Miller of Farwell appeared before the commission with a trash collection problem.

Attending the Monday night meeting were councilmen Johnny Curtis and Fred Chandler, city clerk Janie Bowers, and city employees Jackie Doshier, John Johnson, Robert Bergner and Dee Hammit. Also in attendance were Charles Lovelace and Gilbert Miller.

membership can provide teenagers with many opportunities for achievement, getting acquainted with other teenagers and adults throughout the state, as well as preparing them to take an active role in their community after graduation," he added.

West stated that when FFA was originally started, the emphasis was strictly on farming. "Today, our emphasis has expanded to all areas of agri-business."

Texico FFA has 40 members this year led by Jeff Dunsworth, president; Neal Snipes, vice-president; Jeff Day, treasurer; Montie Powell, sentinel; Kent Harding, secretary; and James Kelley, reporter. West has been the Texico FFA advisor for 18 years.

Farwell's chapter officers are Gary White, president; Donald Lovelady, vice-presi-

dent; Steve Jones, secretary; Steven Smith, treasurer; Jack Smallwood, reporter and Gary Haseloff, sentinel. The club has 20 members. Chapter advisor is Richard Montgomery.

BACKGROUND

Since the study of FFA is considered to be an integral affiliation of vocational agri-

culture, students who enroll in Vo-Ag I, usually during the freshman year at Texico, are given thorough instruction for the first semester in FFA policies and goals, but enrollment in FFA is not mandatory even though the study of the club is.

Water Improvements - -

Friona Voters Approve \$1 Million Bond Issue

A proposal to issue \$1 million in bonds for financing of improvements and additions to the Friona City water system was approved by Friona voters Tuesday.

Unofficial returns indicate that 172 Friona citizens voted for the water system improvements, with 38 voting against. The improvements are to include a new reservoir, including chlorination and pumping equipment, and a pipeline to connect with Friona's present system, according to city manager Jake Outland.

Friona city officials called for the bond election following six months of studying the present water supply problem. According to Outland, the city's water "fell on June 24th last year when two wells went out at once. It was the following month that the council began studying the water problem."

An independent study was

conducted by High Plains Underground Water District which indicates that the Friona municipal water supply will be depleted within the next 12 years if no improvements are made.

As it stands now, Outland predicts that bond transactions will begin around August 1 of this year, but that the complete installation of the proposed reservoir system will not be completed before 1982.

Approval of the bonds means financing is available for the purchase of a 670-acre tract of land one and a half miles northeast of Friona where the reservoir will be constructed.

The land to be purchased belongs to Glyn Hamilton, D.C. Herring and Glenn Herring. The city manager stated that they have "options to purchase the land from the three men, which will obtain for us the water rights."

Outland stated that it is the hope of the city council to apply to the Farmer's Home Administration (FHA) for the

loan by taking the bonds into escrow.

"There are a lot of finances to be worked out yet," he explained, "but with the FHA we feel we'd get a much more reasonable rate of interest than on the public market."

Friona experienced extreme water shortage due to last summer's heat and drought and, according to Outland, if the summer of 1981 brings the same dryness and heat, "We may have to ration what water we have now."

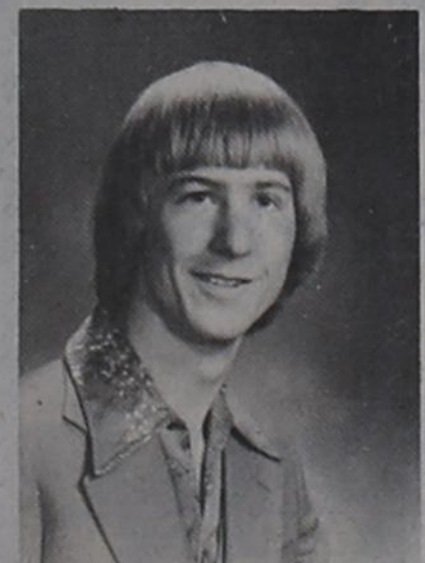

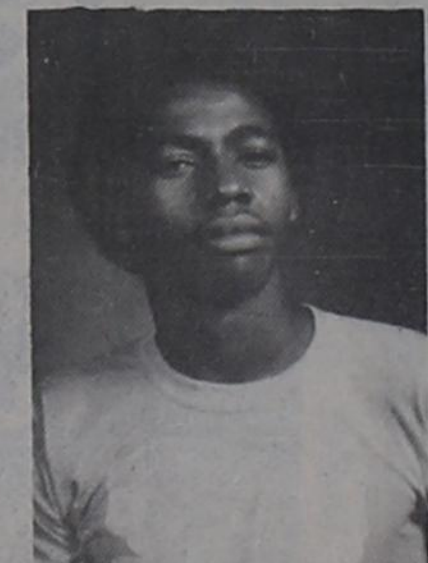
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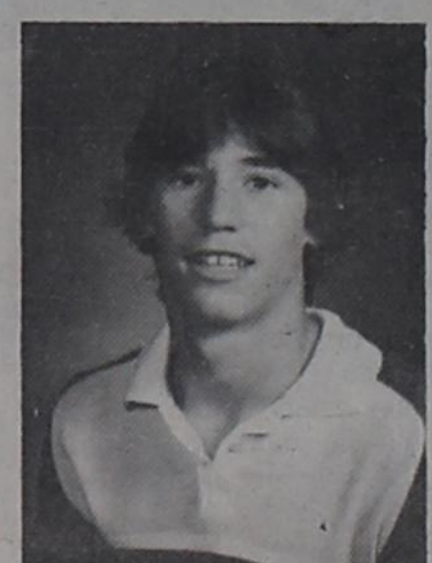

Chief Justice Warren Burger in a speech to the American Bar Association said that too much concern for the rights of criminals may be feeding our growing crime rate. Most people have already recognized this phenomenon but it is heartening to see it being recognized by the nation's number one jurist.

Burger also said that crime and fear of crime have permeated the fabric of American life, damaging the poor and the minorities even more than the affluent. This is an obvious observation but one seldom made by the leaders of the poor and the minorities. If there is any segment of our society that is preyed upon by the common criminal it is the poor, the old and the defenseless.

The slums need police protection more than the high rise condominiums that can afford their own security protection. The rich can prepare against or rise above most common crimes of violence and theft. Not so others. It is time the leaders of these minority groups supported tougher and stiffer crime laws.

It is certainly past time for our many state legislatures along with Congress to get on the ball and overhaul laws that overly protect the criminal at the expense of the law abiding.

An example of a terrible kettle of judicial fish occurred last week when a self-confessed killer was turned loose because his confession to authorities came a measly 12 minutes too late to satisfy some legalistic deadline.

To correct such blatant miscarriages of justice, Congress, state legislature, the judiciary and the legal profession must work hand in glove for the benefit of all our citizenry.

*In a democracy, everybody gets what only the majority deserves.

Students are also given thorough instruction and practice in parliamentary procedure. For those students, or Greenhands, who join FFA, district and statewide competitions are held each year in parliamentary procedure, recitation of the Creed, and a quiz over the entire FFA manual.

The first and second-place winners in the competition then compete at the State FFA convention in the summer.

This year, for the first time in recent history, two Texico Greenhands won first and second place in the FFA Quiz contest.

Ronnie Dunsworth is the district winner and Kevin West is the runner-up.

A Tribune story Feb. 6 concerning the death of James J. Love of Texico, and based on information in a State Police report, incorrectly stated that Mr. Love had indicated to his wife he had chest pains just prior to his driving away from his home in Texico at 7 a.m. Feb. 1.

A daughter, Rebecca Herron, said Mr. Love had mentioned before leaving home that morning that he had a pain in his shoulder, an ailment from which he had suffered for a number of years following back surgery and aggravated by his occupation as a truck driver. There was no reference to chest pains, she said.

As to reports that he was attempting to drive himself to the hospital when stricken by the heart attack, Mrs. Herron said the family had no such indication. He regularly followed the same route - State Road 108 and East 21st Street - when coming to Clovis, she said.

Following the heart attack, Mr. Love's car left the roadway and eventually came to rest against a piece of farm machinery near the intersection of SR 108 and East 21st Street. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

the first time in many years for Texico students to take both first and second places in the same competition," West said.

New Mexico is divided into six districts with approximately ten chapters in each district.

MOVING AHEAD
Members of each chapter can advance in degrees of membership, according "to stringent guidelines" set by the National FFA, West pointed out.

The first degree is Greenhand, then Chapter Farmer, followed by State Farmer, and then finally American Farmer.

"Each chapter may select two of its members annually to receive Star Greenhand or a Star Chapter Farmer degree," explained the advisor. "Beyond the local level, the requirements become much more difficult to receive the state awards and extremely difficult to receive a national award," he added.

West explained further by adding, "For example, only three percent of the state membership is selected to receive state degrees each year. A state degree is required before members can advance to national degrees which is also limited to an even smaller percentage from each state," he said.

AWARDS
Members are given the opportunity to excel and compete in numerous FFA activities other than those offered solely for Greenhands, West said. "They may work toward awards in public speaking, extemporaneous speaking, judging, livestock showing, farm mechanics, which involves construction of farm equipment, and proficiency awards," he detailed.

According to West, his Texico FFA members usually choose to concentrate their activities in four major areas, including livestock or crop projects, judging and Greenhand competition.

This year junior Kent Harding showed the reserve grand champion market hog, out of approximately 200 hogs, at the Curry County Fair.

A graduate member, James Barfield, won the top swine showmanship trophy at the Curry County Fair.

And for the second consecutive year, the FFA members joined with the Texico 4-H Club members to cooperatively earn the traveling Herdsmanship trophy at the county fair.

"Although most members who place an animal high enough in the Curry County Fair usually choose to sell the animal in the Curry County Junior Livestock Sale, some members keep their animals for breeding or for showing in the Eastern New Mexico State Fair at Roswell or the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque," Texico's advisor stated.

According to West, Texico Greenhand Tobin Tate took top honors at the Roswell show this year with the grand champion market hog. "Most Texico FFA members choose to show hogs but a few show calves as their annual projects," he said.

COMPETITIONS
Several Texico members are

currently studying and preparing for judging competitions on the district and state levels.

Teams, usually of four members, concentrate in judging their livestock, farm mechanics, dairy, horses, poultry and meats although other contests such as lands, horticulture, wool, crops and entomology are available for interested members.

"Judging contests usually begin on the district level," said West. "But it is not necessary to place in a district competition before being eligible to compete at the state contests" he said.

LOCALLY
In local activities, the Texico chapter stays busy throughout the year. On the last weekend in August, the club co-sponsors an Achievement Day with members of the Texico 4-H and Pleasant Hill 4-H Clubs.

In Farwell, the members join efforts with the Farwell 4-H club and compete in the Farwell Junior Livestock Show.

"Texico's Achievement Day livestock competition helps the student with final preparations in readying his animal for the Curry County Fair," West said. "Members and 4-H members competed against each other with approximately 80 head of livestock last August."

The Farwell livestock show "gives Farwell youth an opportunity to show their livestock in preparation for the Parmer County Livestock Show," explained Seth Ralston, Parmer County Extension Agent.

Following the New Mexico fairs in September, Texico's Greenhands take the winter spotlight in the club as they prepare for the District Greenhand competition.

Judging activities are usually scheduled in late February through the first week in April.

In late April, FFA members host a chapter Parent-Member banquet usually attended by "75-100 people," said West. "This year the banquet is slated for April 16," West announced. "Rudy Jacobs, the New Mexico State FFA president, will be the guest speaker," he added. A date for Farwell's banquet has not been set.

Numerous trophies and plaques are presented at the banquets to members who have excelled in club activities during the year.

Then in May, those members who plan to show livestock begin to purchase their animals. "Many members attend the Curry County Supreme Pig and Lamb Sale in Clovis," the Texico advisor stated. "For others, buying trips may take them into Texas, Oklahoma and other states."

In June, Texico members who desire to go may attend the State Convention in Las Cruces. Last year the Texico chapter was represented by six members at the convention.

SUMMERTIME
During the summer, members with livestock projects work daily with their animals for the fall fairs and shows, then in August the cycle of activities is ready to begin again.

Two Apprehended For Violation Of Parole

Parmer County sheriff's officials apprehended two men from out-of-state on two separate parole violations, according to sheriff Bill Morgan.

Still in custody is Willie Jackson, age 48 of Montana. According to Morgan, Jackson has signed a waiver of extradition and is in Parmer County custody while awaiting the arrival of Montana authorities to take him back there to face trial.

Calvin Feland, 35, of Floyd, N.M., was also apprehended in Parmer County for violation of parole in New Mexico. Feland was placed in Parmer County custody but has since been extradited to Portales, N.M.

Students Tested On Schooling

Students in the Twin Cities school systems have been being tested this week to find out just how much they have learned in their years of schooling.

Farwell students in 9th grade were given the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) exam yesterday (Thursday), according to high school principal Don Malone. Students in the 3rd and 4th grades will also be administered the tests in the near future.

"Those students passing the test will have an endorsement on their records saying so," Malone stated.

Students at Texico High School were given the Adult Performance Level examinations last week, and those who successfully completed the exam will have an endorsement to this effect on their diplomas, which is a whole new process, according to James Harding, high school

principal. The New Mexico Basic Skills Plan, as adopted by the New Mexico State Board of Education in April of 1977, requires the endorsement to become effective with the graduating class of 1981. "This is the first year that it is required," Harding said.

The tests were administered to all high school students at Texico in grades 10-12 who have not successfully completed the test before. Those taking the test were measured in community resources; consumer economics; government and law; and occupation knowledge.

Harding stated that beginning with this graduating class, diplomas will carry the statement: "The New Mexico State Board of Education wishes to recognize students who have demonstrated a degree of performance in addition to graduation require-

ments. "A 'gold seal' on the front of the diploma identifies students who have so demonstrated by passing a statewide examination. To these students, the State Board of Education extends a special congratulations."

"Information regarding individual student performance and the testing program may be obtained from the school district issuing this diploma."

"For the graduating class of 1981," Harding explained, "the gold seal endorsement will be based solely upon the student's success in achieving a score of 65 percent or better on the Adult Performance Level test portion of the proficiency exam."

Completion of the writing appraisal portion of the examination will be counted toward the endorsement beginning with the graduating class of 1982.

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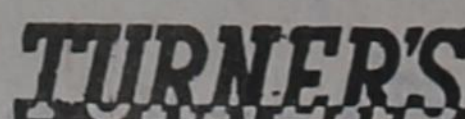
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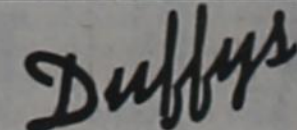
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Texico Jr. Varsity Basketball Results

The fair will feature various science projects made by Texico students, and the gym will be open to the public from 1-5 p.m. MST for viewing of the projects.

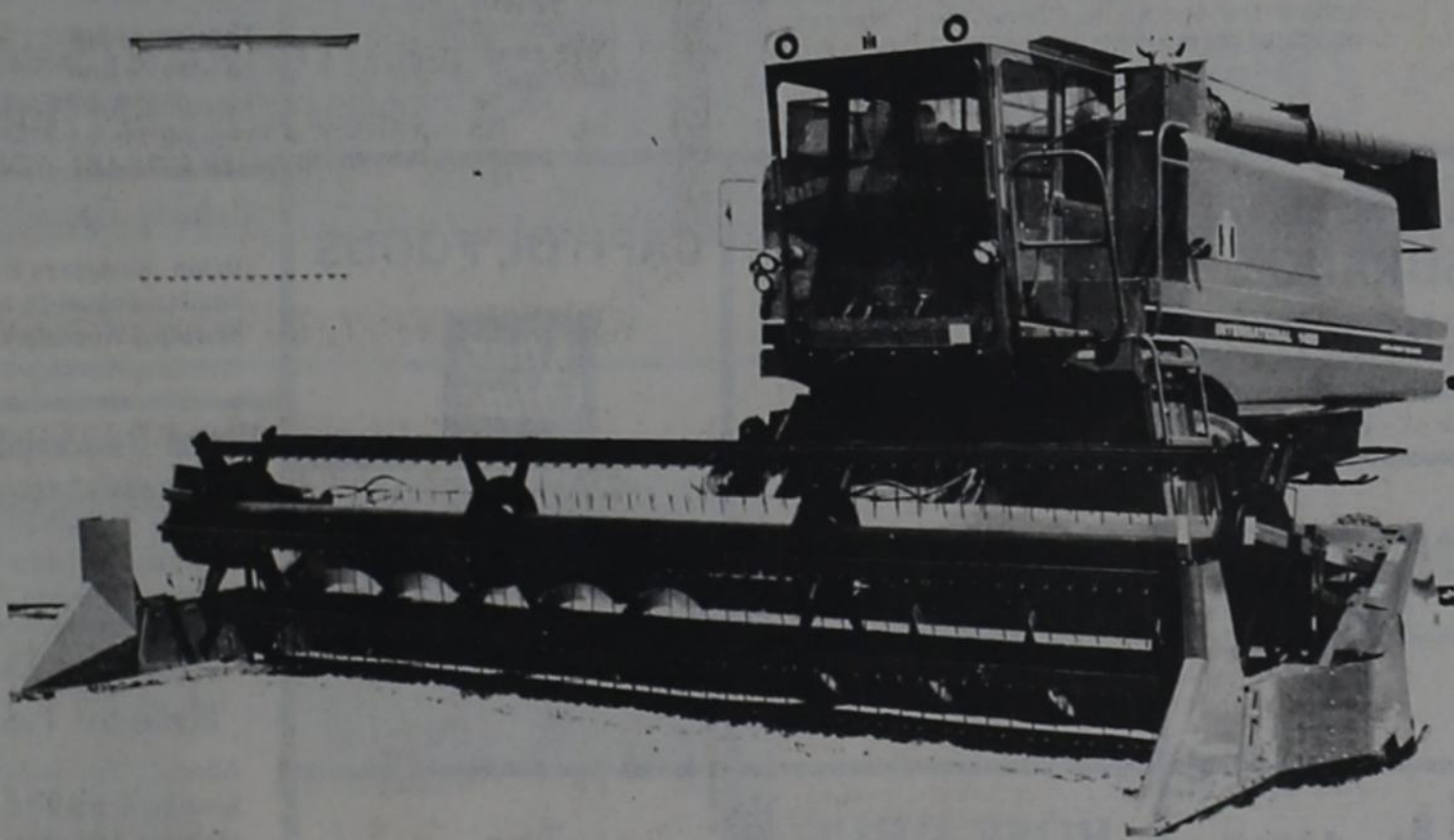
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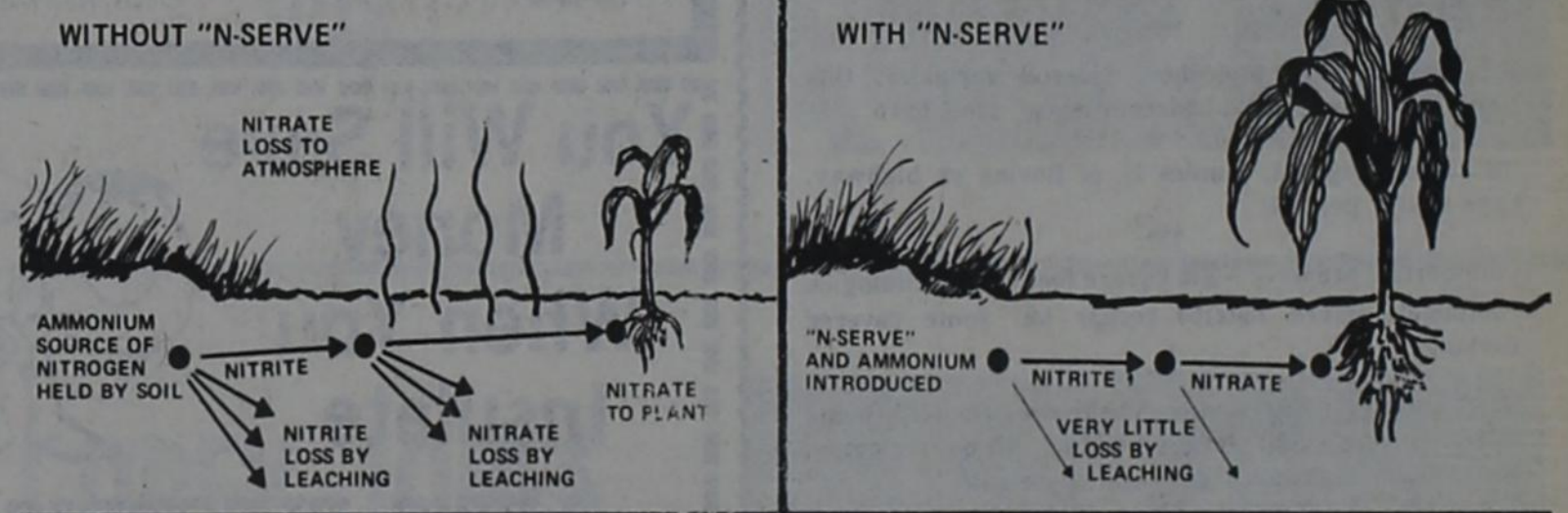

"How To Prevent Lodging in Corn" by Dr. Robert Berry, Plant Pathologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAES); "Computers for the Family Farm" by Marvin Sartin, farm economist, TAES; "Management Tips for a Profit in Cotton in 1981" by Dr. James Supak, cotton specialist, TAES;

Also, "Bollworms and Budworms in Cotton" by Dr. James Leser, entomologist, TAES; and "Mites and Corn Borers" by Dr. Raymond Thompson, entomologist, TAES.

Co-sponsors with the council are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Deaf Smith County Vegetable Crops Committee, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University.

"The program deals with every major concern of Texas vegetable growers, from pre-season market analysis to increasing the demand by consumers for our products," said Dr. Roland T. Roberts, area Extension vegetable specialist.

Research scientists from Texas Tech, Texas A&M University, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and industry will discuss work on such topics as behavior of thrips on onions, effect of drought stress on southern peas, performance of multirow onions, and use of animal tallow as antitranspirants to conserve water on vegetables.

Other research reports will include effects of nitrogen fertilization, seeding rate and irrigation on potatoes in a hot, dry season; potato tuber rot fungus organisms; temperature management during shipment of High Plains potatoes; effects of N-Serve on potatoes,

and a system for harvesting and handling High Plains onions.

Performance of potato breeding lines and Texas grown seed will be reported by Dr. Creighton Miller of Texas A&M and Doug Smallwood, Experiment Station research associate at Lubbock.

Construction of individual production cost budgets will be explained by Marvin Sartin, area Extension economist at Lubbock. Dr. Dale Pennington, area Extension soil chemist in charge of the Extension soil testing laboratory at Lubbock, will discuss the use of infrared photography as a fertility management tool.

The vegetable market situation for 1981 will be analyzed by Dr. Gordon Powell, Extension fruit and vegetable market specialist, College Station.

Consumer promotion efforts will be related by Paul Bailey, marketing specialist with the Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin, and Kelly Hicks, field representative for the National Potato Promotion Board, Denver, Colo.

The panel on labor management will feature experienced growers Charles Wetegrove of Raymondville and Wes Fisher of Hereford, with Bill Weeks, executive vice president of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers Assn., Harlingen.
