Rather than endorse candidates, we will attempt to comment on the 16 Texas Constitutional Amendments as they will appear on the ballot next week. Really, constitutional amendments are as important to our welfare as the candidates who will represent us.

I dare say 99 and 44/100 per cent of our voters know which candidate they will vote for, but only a very few know how they will mark the amendments.

No. 1 - This amendment provides a method whereby a natural person (but not a corporation) who uses or develops land for agricultural purposes may have assessment for ad valorem taxes based alone on the land's value for these purposes.

Looks like a steal on somebody's part. Will vote against it.

No. 2 - Authorizes creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties. Sounds good, will support it.

No. 3 - Withdraws Arlington State College from participation in permanent university fund.

Don't really understand, but will vote for.

No. 4 - Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validates present statutory terms of such officials.

Against all long terms for any office holder, from the Whitehouse to the henhouse.

No. 5 - Authorizes the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability, and death benefits for county officials, employees, and others.

This could be a real political grab bag, will vote no.

No. 6 - Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections, and full-paid firemen.

Idea excellent, approach wrong.

No. 7 - Repealing the constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite for voting and requiring the legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters. Might as well get it out for good. The great white father already has outlawed it.

No. 8 - Authorizes the legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the U.S. without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for these officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of Texas, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president.

Think a person ought to be in a locality for a reasonable time before voting.

No. 9 - Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court. Sounds good and probably is.

No. 10 - Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school or junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy after such change without further election. A debt should be honored, so will support this one.

No. 11 - Authorizes the issuance of an additional \$200 million in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds vote of the legislature and expands the uses to which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put. All of West Texas needs water, so will wet my whistle and vote for this.

No. 12 - Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts. If we create something, we ought to be able to dissolve it a political rarity.

No. 13 - Authorizes the legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government in a county having 1.2 million or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

It will be a long time before Parmer County has 1.2 million inhabitants, so will let Harris County express itself and sit this one out.

No. 14 - Allows members of the Armed Forces to vote in (Continued on Page 2)

Between 2500 and 3000 people are qualified to vote in the 1966 general election, according to figures released from the office of Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor-collector.

Of that number, 2224 became eligible to vote by paying their poll taxes before the tax was nullified by a federal court decision. In the county, 279 later registered to vote, bringing this total to 2503. However, an undetermined number of adults may vote who are 21 years of age or over 65 years of age.

In the 1964 general election, a presidential election year, 2910 Parmer County voters went to the polls.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. Tuesday and close at 7 p.m.

Polling places and the election judges have been announced for the general election: Black, Precinct 1, Community Center, Mrs. Glen Robertson, judge;

Lakeview, Precinct 8, Otho Whitefield home, Otho Whitefield, judge.

The county commissioners will pay the election judges \$12.50 for 10 hours and \$1.25 per hour for each hour over 10.

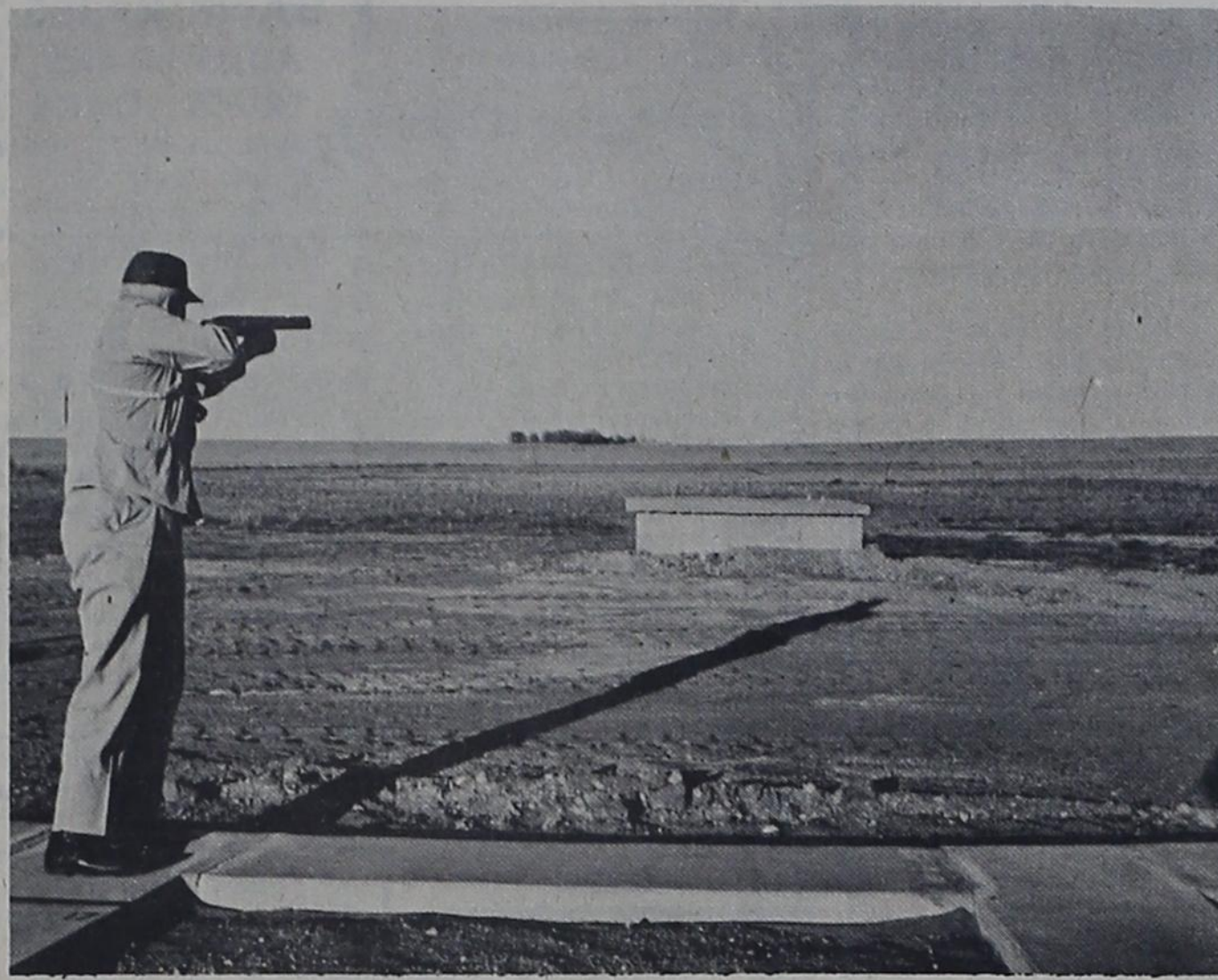

## Steers, Mustangs Battle Tonight

In what will be a fight to the finish on the part of both teams, arch rivals Bovina Mustangs and Farwell Steers will collide tonight at Steer Stadium. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Although the

two teams have played in former years this game will be different, in that this is the first time the teams have met since Bovina was elevated to Class A. The Steer squad defeated the Friona Chiefs in the first game of the season and the Mustangs were defeated by the Chiefs later.

Coach Toby Booth says Bovina has two good running backs in Charles Harris, a junior; and Dean Stanberry, senior. Size of the Mustang team is "about the same as the Steers."

The Steer squad is all in good physical condition with Al Phillips, absent from the last game due to an injury which required surgery, back in the lineup. "Mental attitude of the Steers is wonderful and the boys are hungry for a win," said Coach Booth.

As always when the two teams, who are longstanding rivals, meet "we are expecting a hard game and much effort from both teams," indicated the Farwell coach.

Both the Mustangs and the Steers have had rigid schedules this season, but coaches say that both teams are much better than the record would indicate. Both the Mustangs and Steers have been beaten by district teams, Springlake and Kress; and rival Plains. Season record for the Steers is one win-six losses, while the Mustang record shows two wins, five losses.

Parmer County voters go to the polls Tuesday in a statewide general election with the office of U. S. Senator and that of Congressman of the 18th District stealing the spotlight in this area.

Other state offices with Democratic incumbents find opposition from the Republican and Conservative parties, however, but all precinct candidates are unopposed.

Also on the long ballot appear 16 amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Seeking the U. S. Senate post are Republican John Tower, incumbent, and Texas' current attorney general, Waggoner Carr, who is running on the Democratic ticket. Also appearing on the ballot is James Barker Holland of the Constitution Party.

Dee Miller of Amarillo is seeking the Congressional seat of the Democratic Party, vacated by Representative Walter Rogers, who did not seek re-election. Bob Price of Pampa is the Republican candidate.

Other state-wide elections include that of governor.

Governor John Connally is opposed by Republican T. E. Kennerly, Tommie Gillespie of the Constitution Party and Bard A. Logan of the Conservative Party. The latter is the Conservative Party's only candidate appearing on the ballot in the general election.

For Lieutenant Governor is Democratic candidate for re-election, Preston Smith; Kellis Dibrell, Republican; and William A. (Bill) Johnson, Constitution.

A brief description of the 16 amendments to be passed or rejected by the voters follow.

Crawford C. Martin is the Democratic nominee running for Attorney General of Texas to replace Waggoner Carr. He is opposed by Robb Stewart, Republican, and John C. Williams, Constitution.

For Commissioner of Agriculture are Democratic incumbent, John C. White, Republican Jack Garrett; and Derek C. Bownds of the Constitution Party.

Democrat Jerry Sadler seeks re-election as Commissioner of General Land Office. Also seeking the office are Albert Fay, Republican, and Joseph L. Tiller, Constitution.

State Treasurer Jesse James, a Democrat, is opposed for re-election to the office by Republican Lawrence Daffan Gilmer and by Constitution Party member Jesse Lee James.

Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell has only one opponent, David R. Clark of the Constitution Party.

Parmer County precinct elections include two commissioner posts and three justices of the peace positions.

In Precinct 4, Lazbuddie, Raymond Treider, Jr. is seeking election as commissioner. He was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill out the term of George Crane, deceased. He was named as the Demo candidate for the office by the County Democratic executive committee.

Precinct 2, Bovina, has the lone name of C. H. Jefferson for commissioner.

In Justice of the Peace Precinct 1, Farwell, J.R. Thornton is asking re-election, Jim Roberts seeks election to Justice of the Peace Precinct 2, Friona, and Wilbur Charles of Precinct 3, Bovina.

Numbers 7 and 11 have created the greatest interest.

No. 1. Exempt agricultural lands in urban areas from full-value taxation.

No. 2. Create airport authorities.

No. 3. Remove Arlington State College from the permanent university fund.

No. 4. Set terms of conservation (Continued on Page 2)

**Beggars Can't Be Choosers**

Gerald P. Martin who resided in Ann Arbor, Michigan, has sent me a clipping from The Ann Arbor News dated October 20, 1966 which serves to illustrate what will happen if our present philosophy of government is carried to its logical conclusion. The almost unbelievable content of the clipping is to the effect that a group of local recipients (Ann Arbor) of Aid to Dependent Children and welfare grants have presented a list of "basic demands for humanizing existing welfare" to the Washtenaw County Department of Social Services.

According to the clipping, the group has declared its intention to organize as a "Welfare Union" in order to represent local recipients of welfare checks in their dealings with the county department.

HEW which stands for "Humanizing Existing Welfare," contends that "unless these demands are met, welfare people will never become a part of the local community, and will never be able to make their contribution to community life."

Among other things, HEW demands that the director of social services be available to meet with its grievance committee, "on any matter concerning the welfare of a client."

Alleging that "for the past three months, the majority of checks have arrived late, causing great hardships," HEW demands that all welfare checks be delivered on time. They also demand that school fees for their children be included in the recipient's budget, rather than merely arranging for waiver of fees at the school, so that their children will not be singled out as welfare children.

The final, and most absurd demand is entitled "Human Rights." It, in effect, states that the welfare recipients of Washtenaw County will not tolerate being treated with contempt by their case workers and the community.

Quoting from the Ann Arbor News, "We are not asking for special consideration, but only for the full measure of constitutional rights and protections which are granted other citizens of Washtenaw County, Mich., and our nation."

Now I don't know how the taxpaying citizens of Washtenaw County feel about it, but to me, the idea that recipients of welfare, living off the toil of others and making DEMANDS of those who provide clothing for their backs because they are either unable or unwilling to work, is a bit ridiculous. If they are so concerned about making a contribution to community life, I suggest that they remove those among them, who are capable of working, from the welfare rolls; thereby relieving the community of having to provide support for them.

If they wish the same treatment and privileges as other citizens, then perhaps they should try bearing the same responsibilities as other citizens, which includes working when able. Making demands of those who provide food for your table is like visiting a friend and demanding that breakfast be served in bed, very rude behavior.

No. 5, Provide a statewide retirement system for employees of counties and subdivisions.

No. 6, Permit benefit payments to survivors of law officers, prison guards and firemen killed on duty.

No. 7, Would repeal the poll tax (already nullified by federal court decision) and substitute annual voter registration.

No. 8, Authorize the Legislature to pass laws to ease voting restrictions for those who have recently moved.

No. 9, Increase elected judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals from three to five.

No. 10, Provide that taxes or bonds voted by school district will not be invalidated by changes in boundaries.

No. 11, Would double the Texas Water Development Fund from \$200,000,000 to \$400,000,000 and broaden its use to include water filtration, treatment and transportation facilities.

No. 12, Authorize the Legislature to pass laws to provide for dissolving hospital districts.

No. 13, Authorize the Legislature to pass laws to permit major counties to consolidate some governmental functions and make contract with each other for services.

No. 14, Remove limitations on voting by armed services personnel (already invalidated by federal court).

No. 15, Authorize the Legis-

lature to pass laws to authorize acceptance of private or federal funds for aid to physically and mentally handicapped.

No. 16, Set legislator's term beginning on opening day of regular lawmaking sessions.

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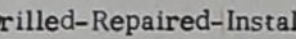

Approximately 50 persons were in attendance at the recent meeting of the Texico PTA, according to Mrs. Howard Leavell, president.

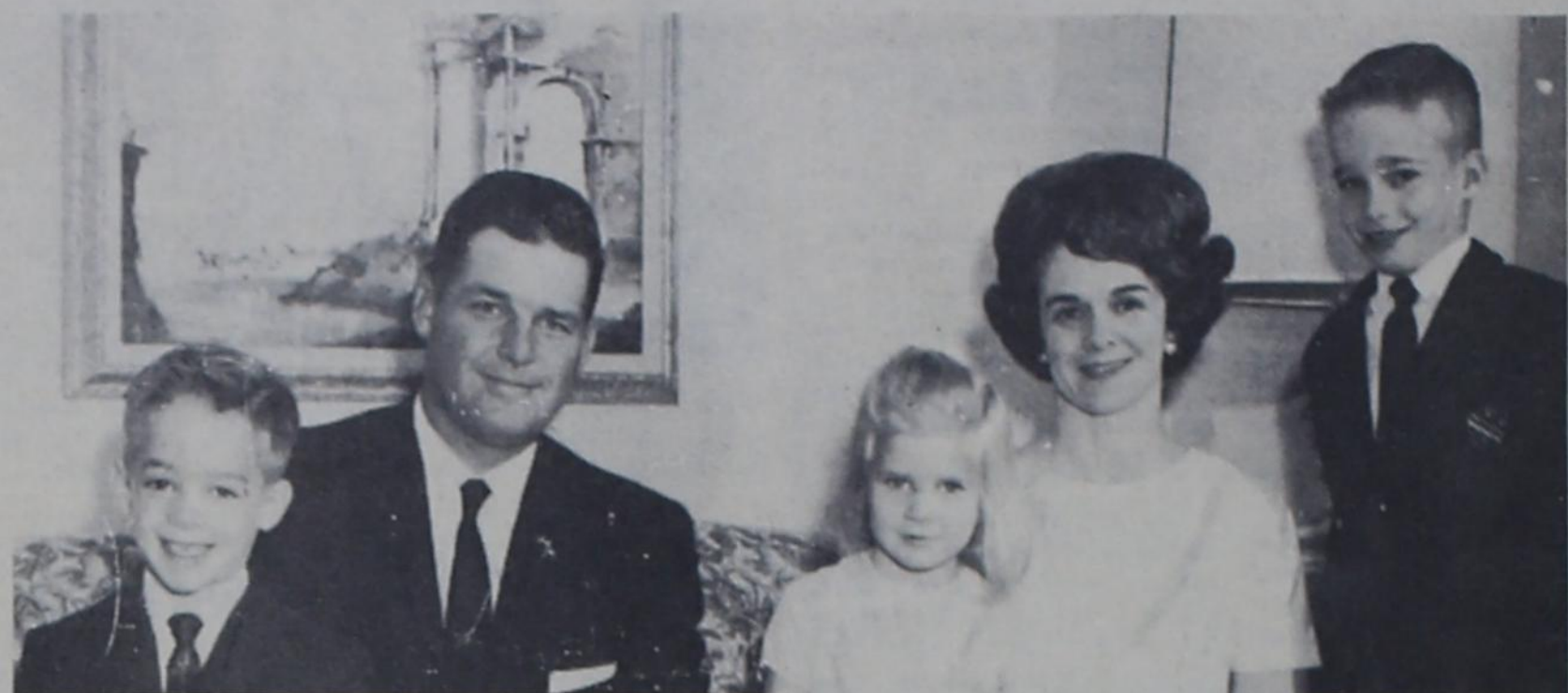

Dean Stovall rushed for 145 yards in the game followed by Craig Phillips who had 87 yards. Mike Doshier was third rusher with 57 yards. The Yearlings were able to garner only one touchdown in the first half,

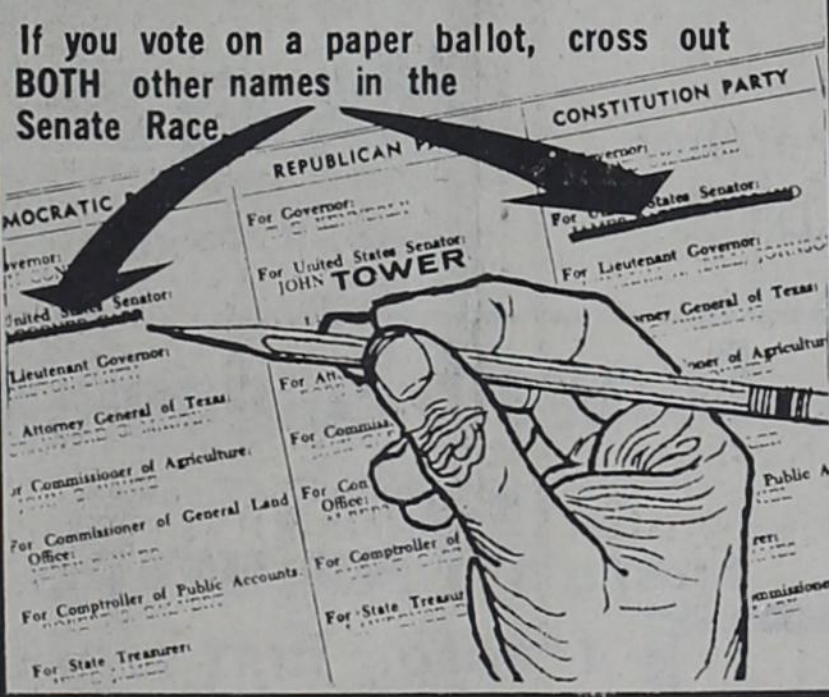
