

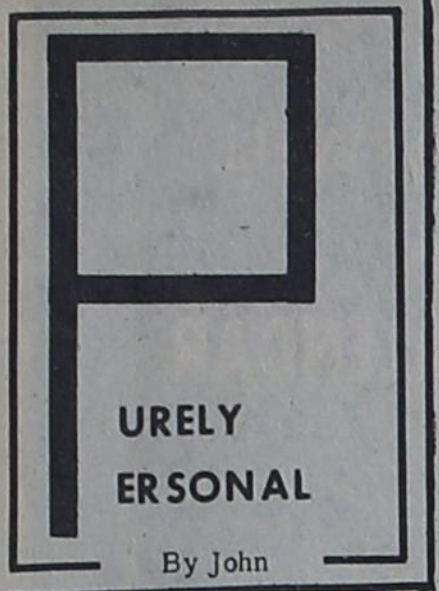

## General Election --

# Tower, Price Carry County

A total of 1817 Parmer County voters went to the polls Tuesday in the 1966 general election, endorsing Republican Bob Price of Pampa as U. S. Congressman from the 18th District and Republican incumbent John Tower as U. S. Senator from Texas.

Seven out of eight boxes in the county voted Republican in the two races, the only precinct favoring Democratic candidates Dee Miller for Congressman and Waggoner Carr for Senator being Oklahoma Lane, Precinct 6. Voting by precincts appear in the above chart.

Parmer County cast 1161 votes for Price and 569 for Miller for Congressman. Tower received 1084 while Carr garnered 651.

Generally, Parmer County voted with the state of Texas, except for some amendments.

Heaviest turnout at the polls Tuesday, percentage-wise, was Lazbuddie, who reported 252 votes cast.

All state incumbents and county candidates appearing on the ballot were given the approval of Parmer voters, although write-ins were counted in two races.

Raymond Treider, Jr. was elected commissioner of Precinct 4, Lazbuddie with 138 votes. His name was the only one on the ballot but 76 write-in votes were cast for D. B. Ivy and 34 for Leon Smith, Jr.

In Bovina, Wilbur Charles received 265 votes and the nod for Justice of the Peace Precinct 3, although Lucille Kilough received 39 write-in votes.

Others elected to office who had no opponents were C. H. Jefferson, commissioner Precinct 2, Bovina; J. R. Thornton, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Farwell; and Jim Roberts, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, Friona.

In state races, this is the way the Parmer votes were cast.

In Bovina 344 voters turned out; Rhea, 46; Lazbuddie, 252; Friona 679; Lakeview, 47; Farwell, 290; Black, 43; Oklahoma Lane, 96; and absentee, 20.

Lazbuddie's vote total of 252 came from a voting potential of approximately 280, according to a political observer in that community.

The sweep of Parmer County came as a surprise to some citizens. As a rule, the county votes in favor of Democratic candidates.

## Chamber Elects, Installs Officers

Election and installation of officers of the Texico Chamber of Commerce was held on Monday night with Bill Christian presiding. Christian was retained as chairman of the group.

Serving as vice-chairman in 1967 will be James Pierce; secretary is Olan Schlueter. Other members of the board of directors are A.D. McDonald, Bill Thigpen, Johnny Green and Leroy Faville.

After the election and installation of officers, committees for the coming year were named. Serving on the membership committee, of which A.D. McDonald is chairman, will be Johnny Green, Truman Kittrell and Elmer Teel. Heading the community improvement committee is James Pierce. Other members of the committee are Frank and Silas Jones, Morgan Billington and David Axe.

Leroy Faville heads the business development committee. Other members of the committee are Roy Harvey Snodgrass, John Adams and Bill Thigpen. A discussion session was held with members of the

committees instructed in their functions.

A report was heard from the street sign committee, with the report given that the street signs are in the process of being built. Meeting date of the Chamber was changed from the first Monday night in each month to the third Monday night in each month. Meeting time is 7 p.m. in the community room at Citizen's Bank-Texico Branch.

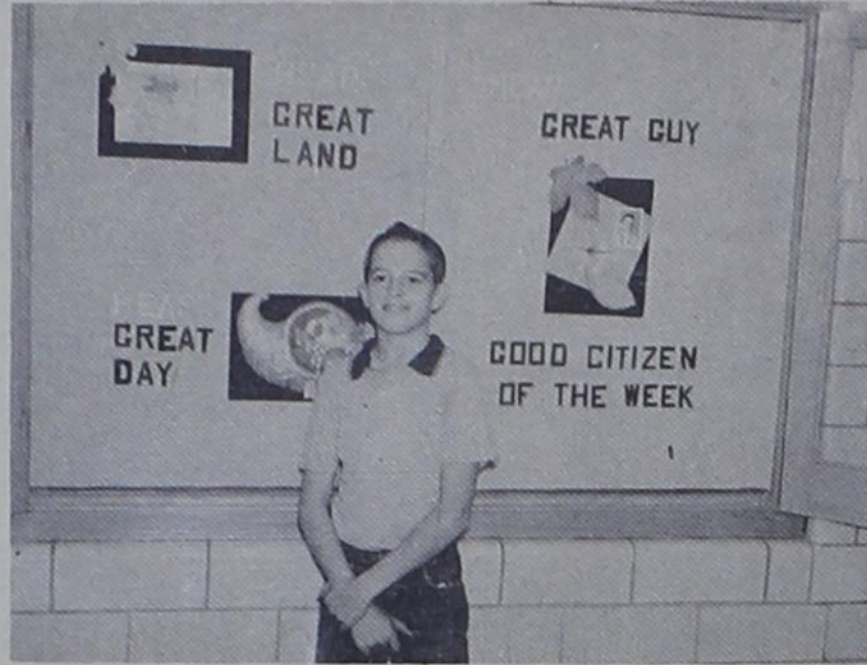

## In Lubbock --

### Cotton Meeting Set November 15

The continuing decline in domestic and foreign markets for U. S. Cotton had resulted in the largest cotton carryover on record -- 16.5 million bales on August 1, 1966.

Concern over this situation was a primary consideration in passage by the U. S. Congress of the 1966 Cotton Research and Promotion Act. Stated purpose of the Act is: "To enable cotton growers to establish, finance, and carry out a coordinated program of research and promotion to improve the competitive position of, and to expand markets for, cotton."

In order for cotton growers of this area to get information on the legislation, County Agent Ronny McNutt said an educational meeting will be held on November 15, beginning at 2 p.m. in the Plains Cotton Coop Oil Mill, Board Room, 2109 Ave. A, Lubbock.

A team of specialists from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, he said, will be on hand to explain details and answer questions relating to the proposed program. He emphasized the meeting would be educational and both the pros and cons, as established from four regional hearings and the legislation itself, would be discussed.

The cotton meeting is being held for the purpose of presenting information of assistance to cotton producers in making their decision on whether or not to accept the program.

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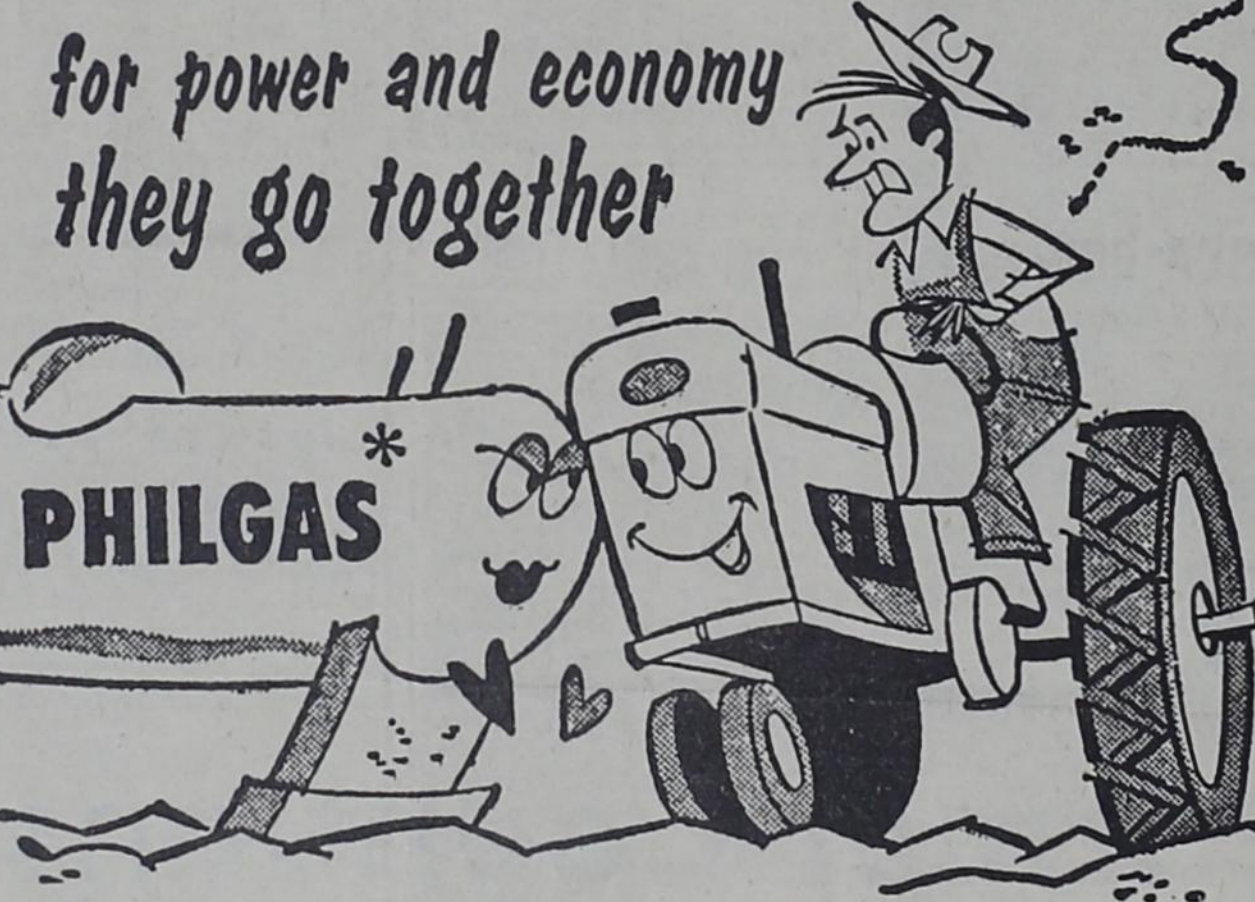

# Steers Gore Mustangs

Taking charge of the game from the opening kickoff, the Farwell Steers beat the Bovina Mustangs last week by a score of 28-12 at Steer Stadium.

Farwell received the kickoff and began a downfield march that ended with Larry Suttle bulging over from the two-yard stripe. Al Phillips kicked the extra point and the Blue and White led 7-0 before the visitors ever gained possession of the ball.

The Mustang attack could not seem to click against a determined Steer rush and Farwell was again presented with a scoring opportunity. This time Al Phillips plunged from the two and kicked his extra point to give Farwell a 14-0 lead.

The Maroon and White's Dean Stanberry with some fancy running took off from the Steer 40-yard stripe to score a Bovina touchdown. The Bovina PAT failed and the Blue and White took a 14-6 lead to the dressing room at halftime.

Bovina received the second half kickoff, but their attack stalled and they were forced to relinquish the ball on the Steer 49-yard line.

A pass from Field to Bradshaw and a 30-yard jaunt by Bradshaw put another TD on the board for the Steers. Al Phillips again added his kick and it was 21-6 in the local's favor.

The game settled down to a midfield marching contest until the last quarter. With 1:12 left in the game, the Mustangs recovered a Steer miscue and

gobbled up the ball for a quick TD that left the score 21-12.

With 40 seconds left on the clock, the Mustangs kicked off. Al Phillips took the ball to the Bovina 44-yard marker and a fired up herd of Steers rushed the ball over with only 16 seconds left on the clock. Al Phillips again added the point after and the Steers sacked up a 28-12 ball game.

Coach Toby Booth comment-

ed that the Steer passing, catching and running in the game was "good." He also said, "the boys played good ball and -- winning is a lot better than losing."

In speaking of the coming game with Sudan, one of the district contenders, set for tonight (Friday), Coach Booth said, "Sudan was hurt in the game with Kress by the absence of their fullback Beller." Beller

is expected to be back in the lineup tonight. "Sudan has a good team with lots of speed, and they had given up only 14 points this season prior to the Kress game," stated Coach Booth.

All of the Farwell players are expected to be in condition to play tonight. They will be looking for a win to end their season. Game time is 7:30 p.m. with the game in Sudan.

## Yearlings Tame Ponies

Farwell Yearlings "B" team set the scene for the Friday night game between the Steers and Mustangs on Thursday when they defeated the Bovina "B" team 52-18 on the Bovina field.

First touchdown of the day was made by Mike Doshier on a three-yard run. Doshier also accounted for another touchdown during the evening and rushed for 105 yards during the game.

Leading rusher, with 209 yards, was Dean Stovall who also scored a TD for the Yearling squad.

Robin Mahaney scored a TD on a quarterback sneak and also scored an extra point in the same way. Mahaney also passed to Dennis Ensor for 20 yards and a TD. Greg Meeks kicked for a 20-yard field goal and also scored one extra point.

Greg Hargrove passed to Doug Harriman for two of the extra points and Danny Prince pushed extra points over from the five yard line.

Coach Bill Adams said, "The entire team worked well with the defensive and offensive groups well coordinated. The all-out effort was a fine job, well done," he stated.

Coach Adams added that he would like to commend the entire team for their all-out effort. The seventh and eighth grade teams and the Yearlings will wind up their football season this week when they meet Sudan.

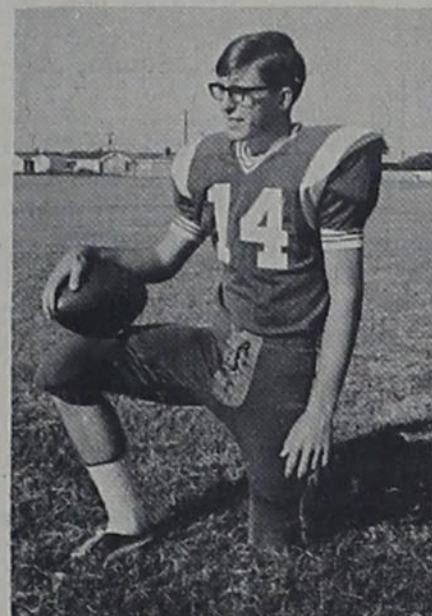

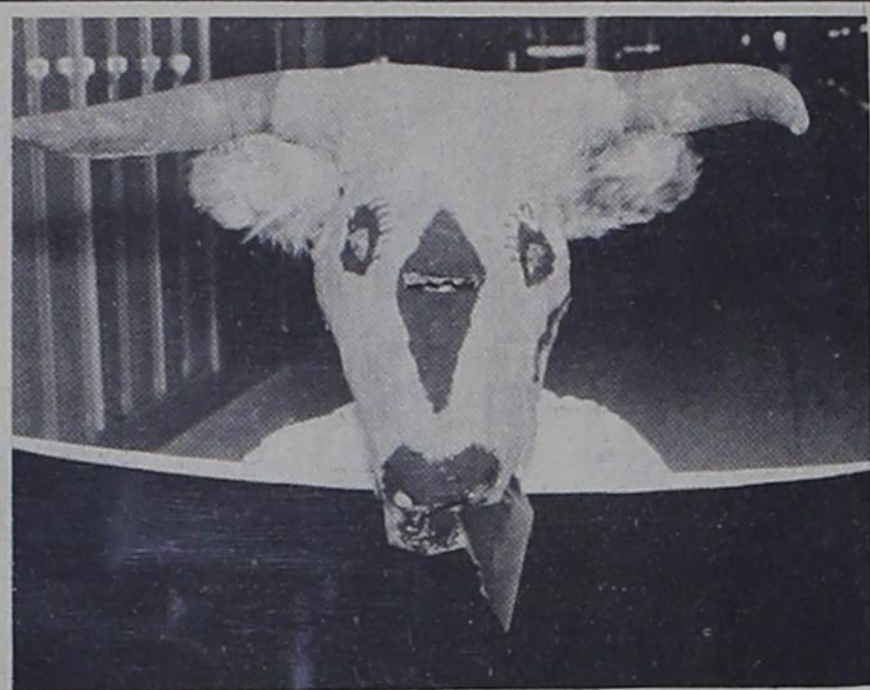
