Last week we attended a dinner given by the Jaycees of Clovis. The occasion was the "Respect for Law" week that they were sponsoring. The speaker was an inmate from the State Penitentiary at Santa Fe. When I first heard of the program I was very dubious about its effectiveness. I had visions of a shifty-eyed character who would cry for sympathy and exhortate himself as a horrible example of humanity. None of this proved true and we had a very rewarding evening.

The convict that was presented to the public that evening was a very handsome young man of about 25 who spoke with great facility and with an excellent delivery. He presented a very factual account of his fall to the criminal estate. Some of his remarks were so worthwhile I will pass them along for your consideration and reflection.

His first remarks were that this was the most worthwhile thing he had ever done, to be an example to others. He felt that as a youth he had been too well protected from his errors and consequently did not develop a respect for the rights of others. I dare say that many of us today are too prone to think of our desires and pleasures without giving due regard for the other person's rights. Selfishness to a greater or lesser extent is a trait too many people exhibit nowadays.

Another observation that struck me forcefully was his statement, "There is no freedom without responsibility." He pointed out that while he was free he did not accept his responsibilities in life. Now he has no responsibilities, but he also has no freedom. This occurred to me as being quite applicable today. Many of our citizens apparently are ready to relinquish their freedom if a big and omnipotent government can take over their responsibilities.

This convict pointed out that he had perfect security. In fact he knew where and how he would spend Christmas 1970. All his decisions were made for him, all his physical needs were provided for, and he had nothing to do but follow the prescribed routine.

Ah, isn't this the siren call of the Big Brother politicians? They say, let us make your decisions, let us manage your life and we will provide for you, and we will make life easy for you. Yes, but what they do not say is we will also take away your freedom of choice, your freedom to act as you see fit to accomplish the ends you desire. We think that prison life is the end product of the socialistic scheme of government being embraced by so many of our so-called intellectuals today.

The close confines of the prison did not matter to this person--what he missed most was his individuality. Therefore, it matters not if the prison extends from the Atlantic to the Pacific, it will be a prison no less if we as persons lose our individuality.

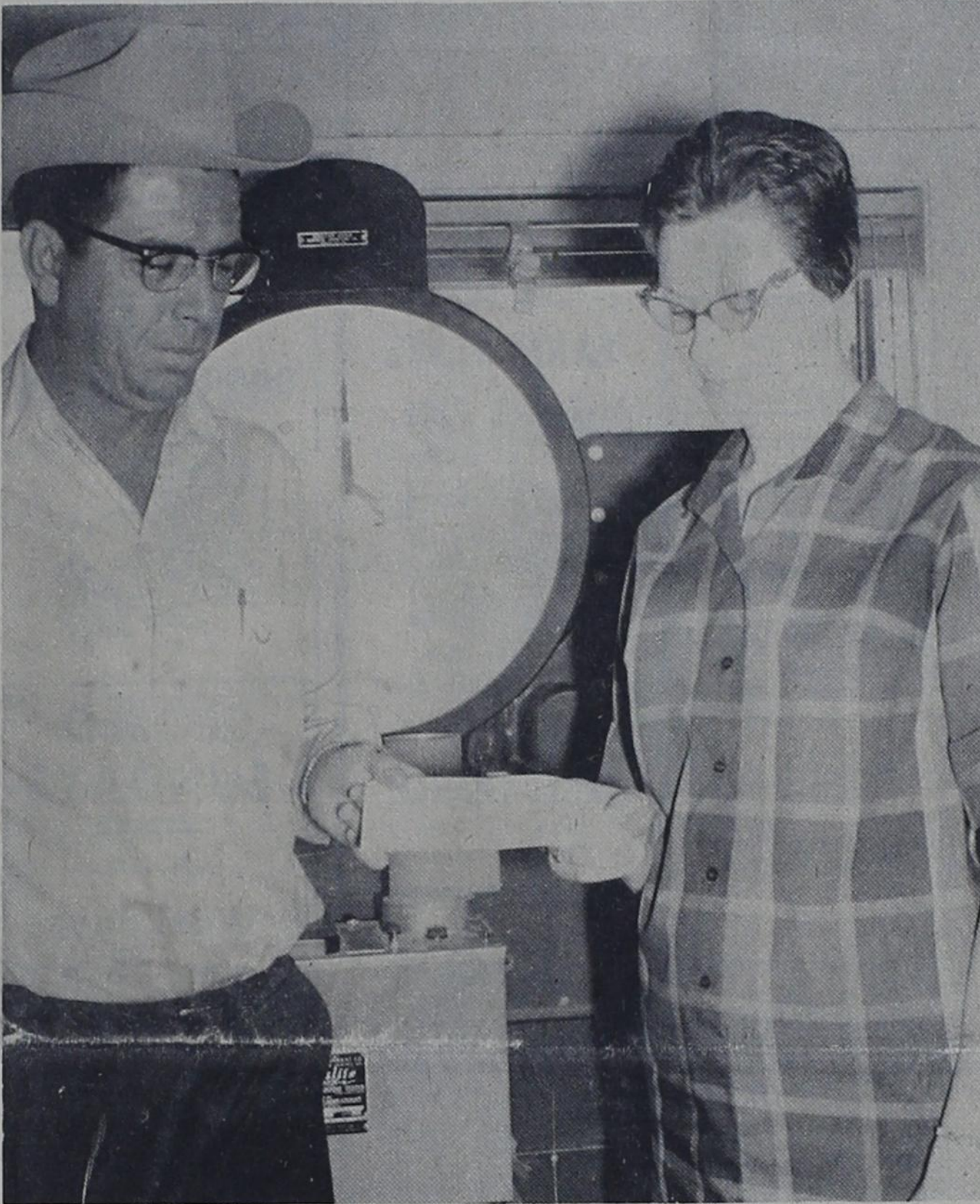

## School Lunch Prices Change

Superintendent A. D. McDonald of the Texico school announces a change in the price of school lunches, effective Wednesday, Nov. 23.

Student lunches will be 30¢ per single meal or \$6.00 for a meal ticket for 20 days, while adult tickets will now be 40¢ per single meal or \$8.00 for a 20-day meal ticket.

Lunches in the school for the past several years have been 25¢ per meal for students and 35¢ for adults or \$5.00 and \$7.00 respectively for a 20-day meal ticket.

"The price change has been necessitated by the fact that the government is providing less and less commodities and food prices are rising daily," stated Supt. McDonald. However, the state requires that a class A meal be served before the state will supply any commodities. With the rising

food prices and fewer commodities, meals could not meet this standard without the change in the price of the meals, stated the superintendent.

## 600 Take TB Tests

Approximately 600 students in the Farwell school were given the TB test on Monday of last week. While the test was given, free of charge, to any student in the school who had his or her parents' permission to take the test, it was primarily aimed at first and seventh grade students.

All first and seventh grade students are required to take the tests which was begun for the first time on a local level last year. Approximately 120 of the students taking the test were from the two grades.

# Progress Report On Country Club

In response to inquiries from many members of the area, the State Line Tribune is publishing this report on the progress being made toward final approval of the Farwell Country Club. On Oct. 24th, the office of Bill Boling received a letter from William E. Lawson, Chief of the Communities Services of the Farm Home Administration,

Lawson stated, "It will be necessary that the Farwell Country Club be organized as a completely separate unit from the Farwell Junior Chamber of Commerce. They will have to incorporate under the state laws of Texas which can be done

after tentative commitment is given."

In compliance with this request, the Farwell Jaycees along with other interested individuals are preparing the papers for incorporation of the Club. The plan is to have the charter ready for submission to the Secretary of State in Austin immediately after the tentative commitment is received by the local FHA office.

A meeting is planned next Tuesday, Nov. 22, at 5 p.m. in the Community Room at Security State Bank to decide on the initial board of directors and other necessary officers for the Club, until the first annual

meeting. An invitation is issued to all those who are interested to attend this meeting.

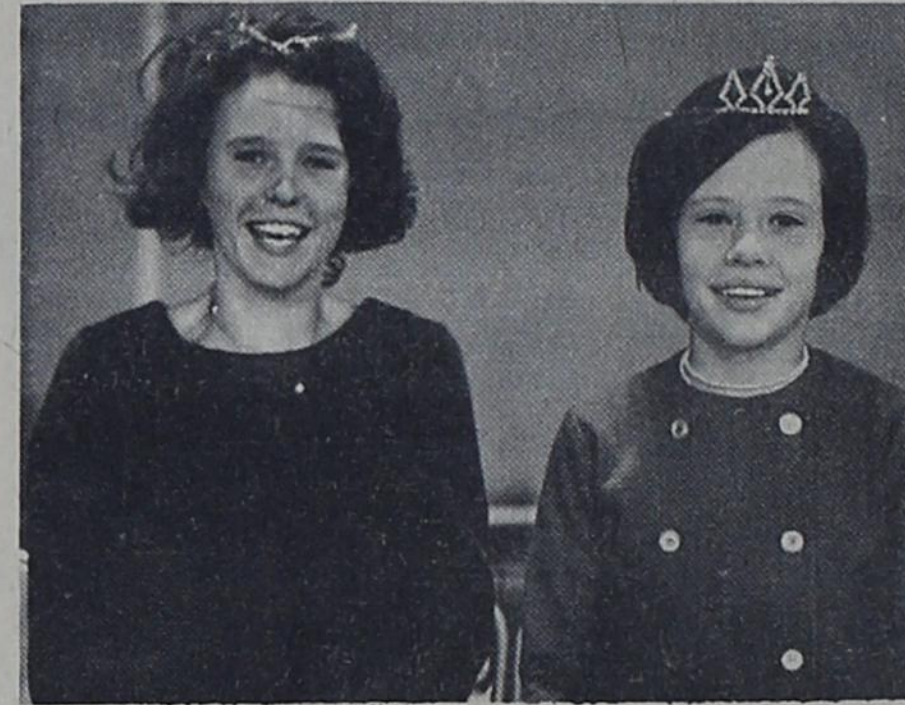

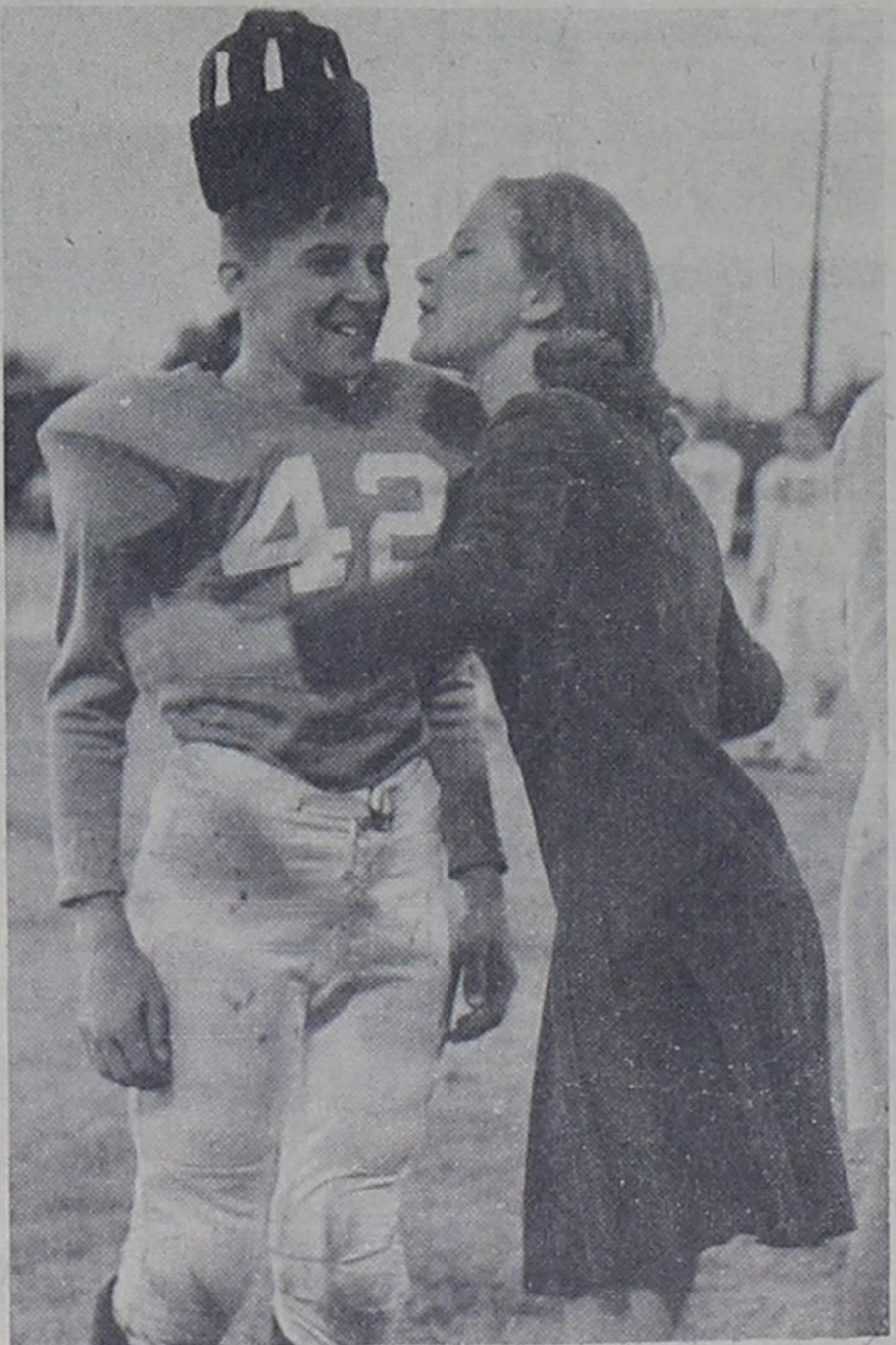

## Pioneer Resident, Services Held

Funeral services were conducted from the Farwell Church of Christ Monday morning at 10 a.m. for Charlie E. Crume, 86, pioneer resident of Texico-Farwell. Burial was in Mission Garden of Memories in Clovis.

Paul Wilkinson, minister of the Farwell Church of Christ, and Van McCormick, minister of Eastside Church of Christ in Clovis, officiated at the funeral services. Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe was in charge of arrangements.

C. E. Crume was born in Carrollton, Ark., Nov. 16, 1879 and passed away in Clovis Memorial Hospital on Nov. 10, 1966 following an illness of several months.

Mr. Crume and his wife, Jessie Bell, whom he married in 1911 first came to Farwell in 1921, but after a short stay decided to move on to Colorado. However, while making the trip by covered wagon they decided to return to Arkansas. In 1923 the family returned to Farwell from their home in Alpena, Ark. He had lived in Texico-Farwell since that time. For several years he hauled freight in Texico-Farwell and supplied all town residents with water, prior to the time the Farwell Waterworks was put into use.

For a seven year period he was custodian at the Farmer County Courthouse and for 25 years he served as mail messenger for the Texico and Farwell post offices. He had retired from active service a few years ago following an auto accident in which he was seriously injured. Charlie and Jessie Crume were parents of nine children, all of whom survive. Mrs. Crume passed away in 1936.

Mr. Crume was married to Eunice Humphrey, who survives, in 1950. Survivors in addition to the widow are eight sons, Paul, Dallas; Joe, Farwell; Buster, Fremont, Calif.; Van Kirtland, Albuquerque; Vance DeKater, Hereford; Dick, Lubbock; Charlie Jr., Orlando, Fla.; and Bill Lubbock; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Lou Cason, Friona. Also two brothers, Clifford, Bakersfield, Calif.; and Sethel, Kernville, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. B. M. Temple and Mrs. Bertha Miller, both of Clovis; 19 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Sons of Mr. Crume served as pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers listed were W. W. **LBJ Prestige Bites The Dust**

Now that the excitement over recent elections has calmed a bit, a few observations are in order.

Many people will undoubtedly see many different meanings in the results, all the way from white backlash to a repudiation of President Johnson, but I think the most significant meaning that can be interpreted from the results is the fact that the people of this country are just a little bit tired of having their pocketbooks drained dry in order to support Great Society spending programs. This I believe is the focal point of the matter. Although "white backlash," (a term coined by the Democrats to explain away their defeats), may have been evident to some extent in isolated regions of the country, I certainly don't believe that it played a major role in the outcome of the elections. People were simply beginning to feel the squeeze when they tried to stretch their pay checks, and finally realized the cause of it.

Although the Democrats retained a sizeable majority in both houses of Congress, Republicans made enough gains to throw a monkey wrench into much of the President's legislative program in the upcoming 90th Congress. Don't forget that there is always a group of southern Democrats who will be most happy to join into a coalition with Republicans in order to block the President.

One of the most significant races was decided here in Texas, where Senator John Tower won re-election, turning back the bid of his Democratic opponent, Waggoner Carr. The prestige of President Johnson was riding on the outcome, and the defeat of Carr meant that it received a big lump on the head. Carr campaigned entirely on the premise that he, as a Democrat, could give Texas better representation in a Democratic dominated Congress. What he failed to consider, and what the people of Texas did consider, was the fact that unless he knuckled under to the President's spending programs, he wouldn't be half as effective as he thought. Texans simply decided that they preferred fiscal responsibility to the government handouts which Carr could possibly have secured by becoming one of President Johnson's rubber stamps.

Dee Miller's defeat can also be attributed to much the same reason. He too campaigned on the platform of better representation, simply because he was a Democrat. What Carr and Miller both failed to realize was the fallacy of their arguments. By the logic of their own points, if a Republican majority existed in Congress, then they would have had to advocate the election of their Republican opponents, simply because they belonged to the majority party. I doubt if either one could have brought himself to do this.

Perhaps the brightest new Republican personality appeared in California where Ronald Reagan won a landslide victory over his Democratic opponent, incumbent Gov. Pat Brown. Here, as in other regions, the Democrats tried to obscure the issues. Gov. Brown never missed the opportunity to give reference to Reagan's acting career, as if being an actor automatically disqualified someone from serving in public office. The usual attempt to pin the label of extremist on anyone opposing a Democrat was also made. Brown repeatedly lashed out at Reagan for refusing to repudiate the support of the John Birch Society. I didn't however, notice Brown rejecting the votes of the American Civil Liberties Union, which can be considered a far greater danger than the John Birch Society.

I don't believe that the Democrats will ever succeed in smearing Reagan as they did Goldwater, and Reagan will certainly have to be reckoned with as a future force in presidential politics.

All factors considered, I believe that the election results will prove highly beneficial to the country. The people in effect, said "Hold on there, slow down a bit," in regard to the Great Society. Upcoming legislation will have to be fairly good to get by Congress, and this can't help but improve the state of the nation.

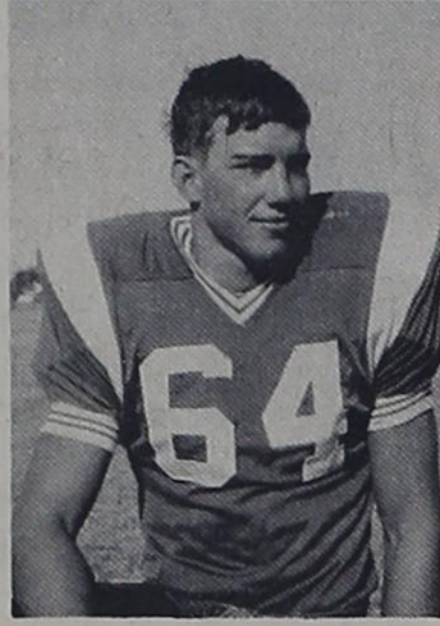

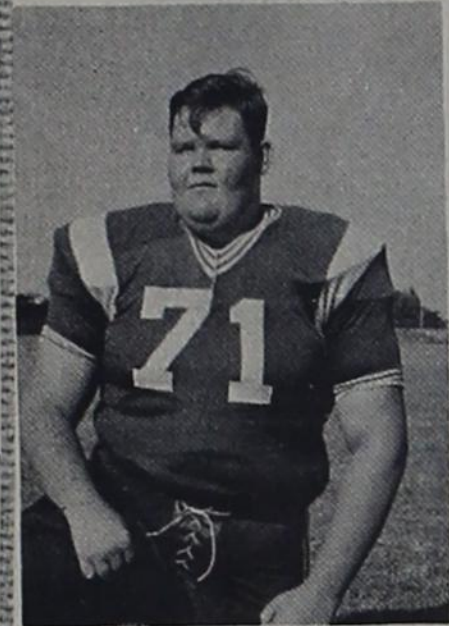

### COMMISSIONERS CANVASS ELECTION RETURNS

Meeting in a lengthy session on Monday, Parmer County Commissioners canvassed the general election returns making minor changes in some of the totals for various candidates, but approving the final results as indicated in earlier reports.

The Farwell Steers were forced to close out the 1966 season on a losing note, as the Sudan Hornets utilized a powerful rushing attack to subdue the Steers 21-14 at Sudan.

Jerry Bellar and Larry Morgan provided most of the offensive punch for the Sudan ground attack which picked up a total of 230 yards for the evening and was responsible for all three of the Hornets' scores.

Farwell yardage came on mixtures of passing and running with the passing game gaining 121 yards and the ground game picking up 141 for a total offensive gain of 262 yards, seven more yards than the Hornets managed as they only gained 25 in the air.

The first half proved to be exceedingly close as both teams scored once in the second quarter and gained the same number of first downs and penetrations.

The first quarter was scoreless as both teams battled up and down the field. The Steers won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. Johnny Schell provided excitement for the local fans as he

took a handoff from Bobby Field on the first play from scrimmage and raced 26 yards to give the Steers a first down on the Sudan 40 yard line. Field gained three on the next play, but two successive passes fell incomplete, setting up a fourth and seven situation on the Hornet 37. The Steers elected to go for the first but Schell failed to pick up the needed yardage and the ball went over to Sudan on their 36.

An illegal procedure against the Hornets aided the Steer cause, as Sudan was unable to gain the first down, and was forced to punt from their own 43 yard line.

With two minutes and twenty seconds remaining in the first quarter, the Hornets began their first touchdown drive. A high, short punt by Field set up a first down for Sudan on the Hornet 36. A 15 yard penalty against the Steers for a personal foul following a good run by Morgan moved the ball to the Steer 40. Five more plays gave the Hornets a second and three situation on the Farwell five yard line and the first quarter

ended. Morgan rammed to the two for the first down and Bellar crashed over three plays later for the touchdown. The extra point was good and Sudan held a 7-0 lead.

Farwell bounced right back following the kickoff. Three running plays by Schell and a completed pass to Lewey Bradshaw gave the Steers a first down on the Farwell 47. Following an incomplete pass, Larry Suttle bulled his way to the Sudan 43 for another first down. Two plays later, Bradshaw hauled in a strike from Field on the 12 and raced in for the first Farwell score. Al Phillips kicked the extra point to end the first half scoring with the game tied at 7-7.

Sudan added another tally late in the third quarter when the Hornets utilized ten plays to drive 47 yards for the score with Morgan picking up the last two. The extra point attempt failed, and with 14 seconds left to play in the third quarter, the score stood 13-7 in favor of Sudan.

The Steers tried to even things up on their next series of

plays but an illegal receiver penalty following a completed fourth down pass to Schell halted that drive.

Sudan began their final touchdown drive with 7:16 left in the ball game. Morgan climaxed the march with a three yard burst for the touchdown. A fake kick and a pass led to a two point conversion to make the score 21-7 in favor of the Hornets.

The final Farwell touchdown came with only 30 seconds showing on the clock when Field fired a strike to Bobby Chadwick which resulted in a 61 yard touchdown play. Phillips try for point was good, and the final score was 21-14 in favor of the Hornets.

In commenting on the football season as a whole Coach Toby Booth said, "The boys played good football, much better than the record would indicate. Unfortunately we made mistakes and many times had bad breaks, but the boys never gave up. I want to praise them for their fine effort during the entire season."
