

# Weekend Celebration Brings Large Crowds To Community



Last week the community was treated to another wonderful Border Town Days celebration. The opening parade on Thursday brought a large throng of people into town from all over the area. Main Street, through Texico and Farwell, was well lined with eager spectators and they were rewarded with an excellent parade that had eye pleasers for both young and old.

On Saturday afternoon, Hasehoff and Company produced excellent barbecue for over 500 persons. We noted that several families took the occasion to have reunions. They could not have chosen a better occasion. This activity always brings many folks together for a short while and strengthens community relations and friendships. One of the joys of small town life is the good fellowship and close relations that permeate such gatherings. There are no wild-eyed groups to create disturbances, and there are no thoughts of muggings or fights or other threats of violence -- just peace and good will. We wonder if our city cousins can feel the same when they attend a large civic gathering?

The AJRA rodeo always impresses us, especially the Grand Entry parade. The flashing of horses, the swirl of the banners and the dash of colors are inspiring sights. The posting of the colors and the opening prayer are evidence of a deep-seated religious and patriotic background. Other activities in other parts of the country would do well to emulate the impressive opening of a rodeo.

This year, the rodeo featured more local boys and girls from Texico and Farwell than in the past and this added to the interest of the large crowds. The many, many hours of preparatory work done by the members of the Roping Association was well-rewarded by another outstanding and spectacular performance.

The Tribune and the other two newspapers in the county are presently carrying legal notices of the constitutional amendments that are now proposed and will be voted on by Texans in November. It is the practice to split the proposed amendments up among the newspapers of a county for publication and hence we are carrying only the first two proposals. The following is a short run-down of the proposals as they will appear on the ballot:

1. Enlarge the powers of the Judicial Qualifications Commission to censure or remove lower court judges and justices of the peace as well as district and appellate judges.
  2. Authorize the legislature to enact a law on the sale of mixed drinks.
  3. Provide for legislative establishment of a uniform method of tax assessment on ranch, farm and forest lands based on the capability of the land to support the raising of livestock or production of farm or forest crops.
  4. Make the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.
  5. Permit counties to issue road bonds up to one-fourth of their assessed real property valuation on a majority vote.
  6. Make town or city home-steads of \$10,000 and less exempt from forced sale (presently set at \$5,000).
  7. Allow the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between the political subdivisions and any county.
- We hope to give more on the constitutional amendments proposals later on, as the election draws nearer.

Texas voters have adopted 195 amendments to the 1876 constitution and rejected 125 proposals, over the intervening years.

Fred Chandler served as parade marshal again this year. Parade entry judges were Mrs. Mabel Reynolds, B. V. Hughes, and Hugh Preston. Cash prizes went to the winners.

The riding club entries were judged by Torrence Reid of Clovis; Mack Heald, Farmer County agent; and Wendol Christian of Oklahoma Lane. Senior division riding club winners were Bovina Riding Club, first place, and Farwell Senior Riding Club, second place. Junior division riding clubs winners were Y-L Riding Club, first place, and Farwell Riding Club, second place.

The American Junior Rodeo Association championship saddles went to Lisa Voss of Syn-

der, All-Around cowgirl, and Richard Thompson of Pearsall, All-Around cowboy. In order to win the saddles, the boy or girl had to be entered in three events in his age category. Lisa Voss placed first in barrel racing, first in breakaway roping, and sixth in pole bending. Richard placed second in tiedown roping, third in steer wrestling, and did not place in ribbon roping. Lisa Voss was entered in the age 12 and under girls category and Richard was entered in the boys 16 to 19 age category.

## Schools Prepare For Beginning Of New Year

Parents who would like to discuss student enrollment prior to Enrollment Day should check with the elementary office on August 14, between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.

The regular enrollment for students in grades 1 through 5 will be held on Friday, Aug. 21, between 9 and 12. Busses will run on Aug. 21, but the

lunch room at school will not be open since the buses will return home before the lunch hour.

The lunch room will be open on the first day of school which is August 24. Lunch tickets will be on sale on Enrollment Day and on the first day of school. The price for lunch tickets will be 40 cents daily, \$2 weekly,

or \$8 per month. All checks for lunches should be made payable to the Farwell School Lunch.

Kindergarten and Head Start students will have their enrollment on Tuesday, Aug. 18, in the elementary school. If anyone interested in these programs has not been contacted in regard to this, they should contact the school on this date.

School insurance will also be available this school year. The cost for students kindergarten through grade 6 is \$10 for the school plan and \$20 for the 24-hour plan. Prices for other grades will be on a different scale. Checks for school insurance should be made payable to the Farwell Activity Fund and marked "enrollment fee" (workbooks and supplies).

First graders will need the following items on the first day of school: 2 pencils, 1 Big Chief

Tablet, one box crayons (8-16), eraser, Elmer's Glue or paste, scissors (blunt end), Kleenex (medium size), cigar box, and a large beach towel or medium size rug for taking naps.

Second graders will need 2 pencils, eraser, box crayons (16), tablet, Kleenex (medium), 2 red checking pencils, scissors (sharp end), and a cigar box.

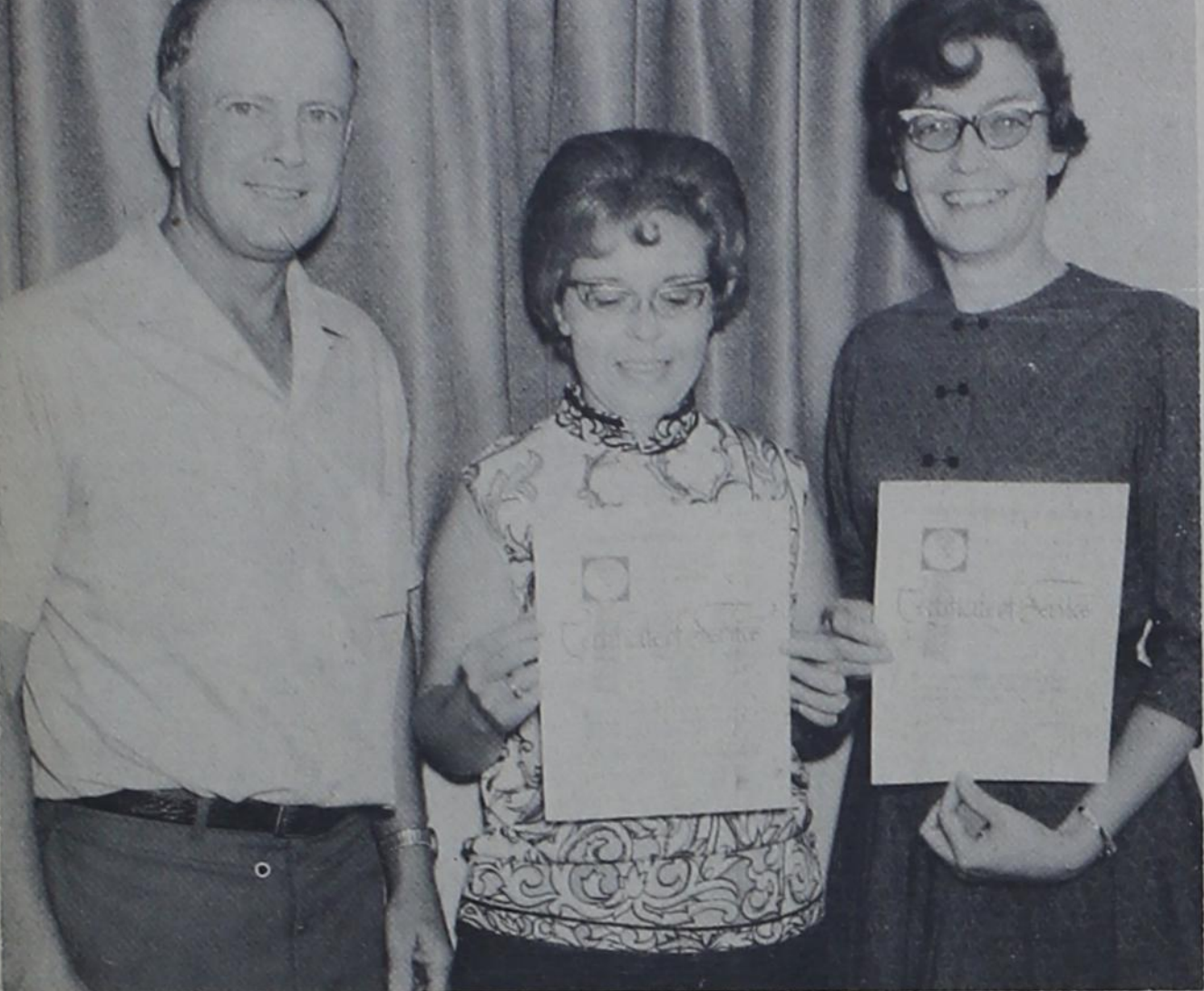

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
“(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.”

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
“(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.  
“(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice or Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.  
“B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.  
“(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.  
“(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.  
“(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

**Car, Pickup Collide On 60**

Four Parmer Countians were involved in a two-vehicle accident late Friday afternoon at the intersection of Highways 60 and 86 west of Bovina.

All four apparently escaped serious injury.

A '67 Chevrolet pickup driven by Rev. A. C. Hardin, pastor of First Baptist Church of Bovina, collided with a 1970 Chevrolet coupe driven by Everett Christian of Farwell. Passengers in the Christian car were his son-in-law, John McFarland, and his grandson, Lonnie McFarland.

Christian and the McFarlands were taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona for treatment by Claborn ambulance, but their injuries were not serious, according to Highway Patrolman Mike Greer, who assisted in the investigation.

Rev. Hardin was driving onto Highway 60 from Highway 86 at the time of the accident. The Christian car was going west on 60 when the pickup struck the left side of the car. After the collision, the automobile knocked down nearby highway signs.

Rev. Hardin was uninjured.

**Local Student To Attend International Convention**

Doyle L. Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Johnson of Route 1, Farwell, will represent his chapter at the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity International convention to be held at the Grand Bahama Hotel, Grand Bahama Island, August 30 to September 2.

Johnson is a senior student at West Texas State University and a graduate of Farwell High School. He will graduate from WTSU at mid-term with a major in agri-business. He will join a group and leave by plane from Lubbock for the trip.

More than 600 undergraduate and alumni delegates will represent the 191 college and university campuses on which Lambda Chi Alpha is located. The convention combines a recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

“(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

“(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.  
“(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution.”

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: “The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances.”

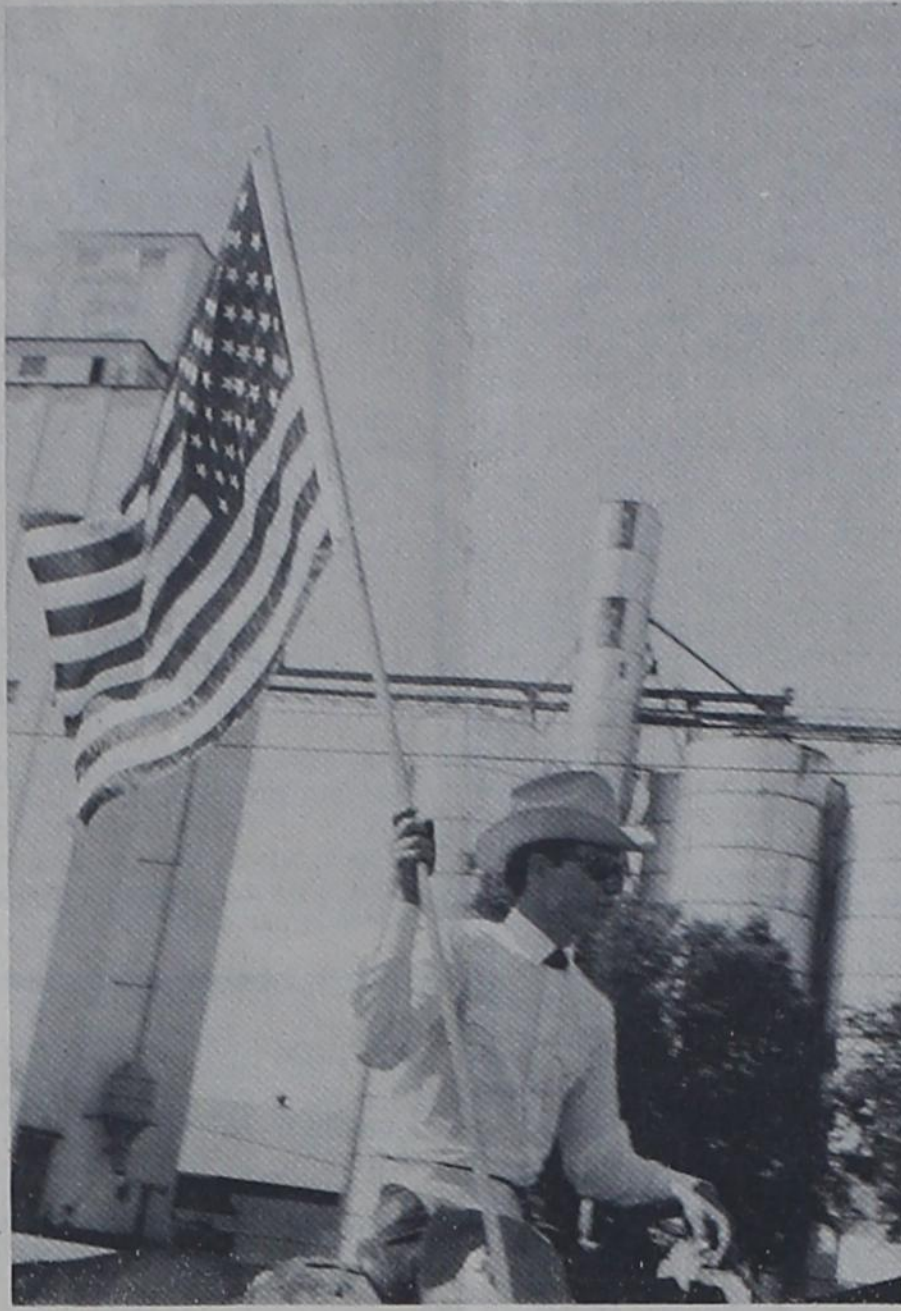
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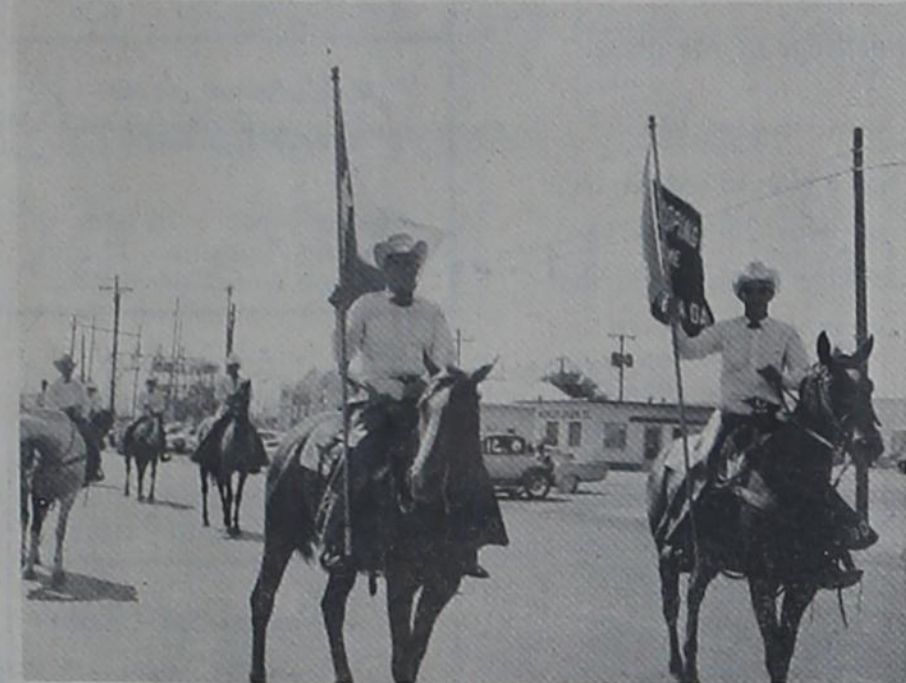

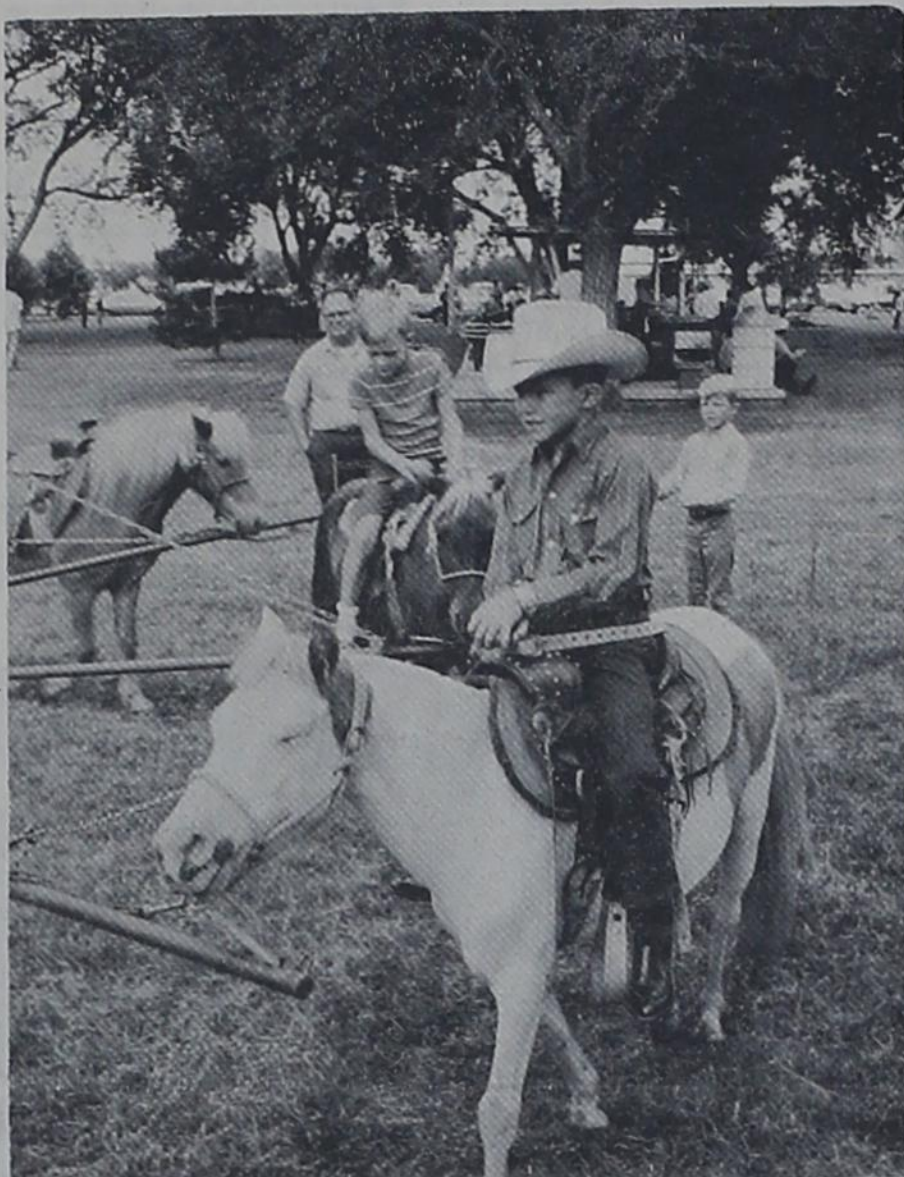

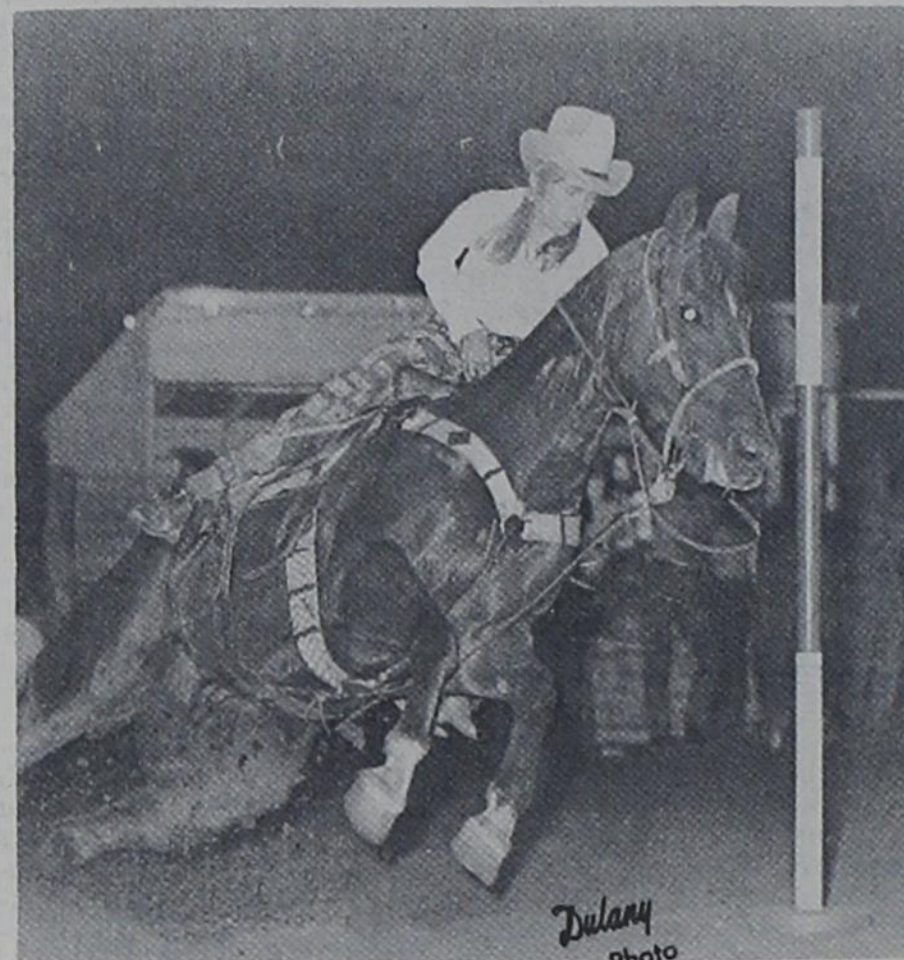

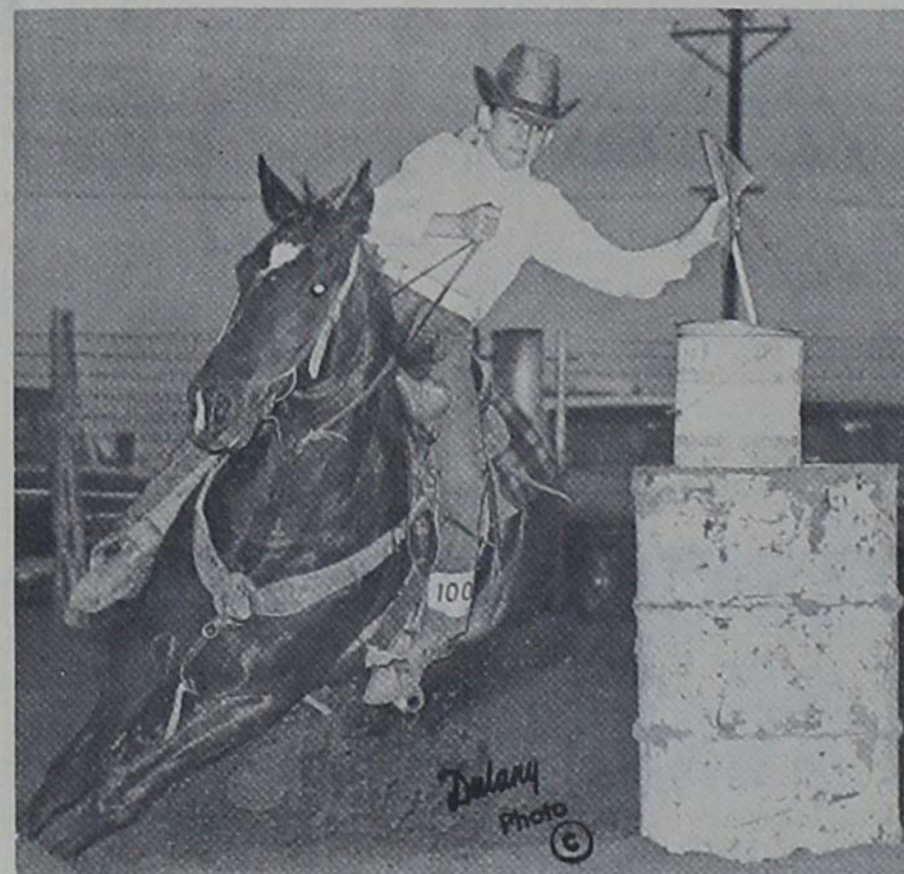

5:00 p.m. on the date of the election. The polling place for Parmer County will be Meeting Room, Security State Bank Farwell, Texas. Voting will be conducted on September 26.

Any person within the area described above engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, soybeans for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by written application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person who wishes to vote absentee may obtain a ballot at his local County Agent's office on or after September 12, 1970. Such ballots must be completed and returned to the Texas Soybean Association, Drawer Q, Plainview, Texas prior to midnight on the election date.

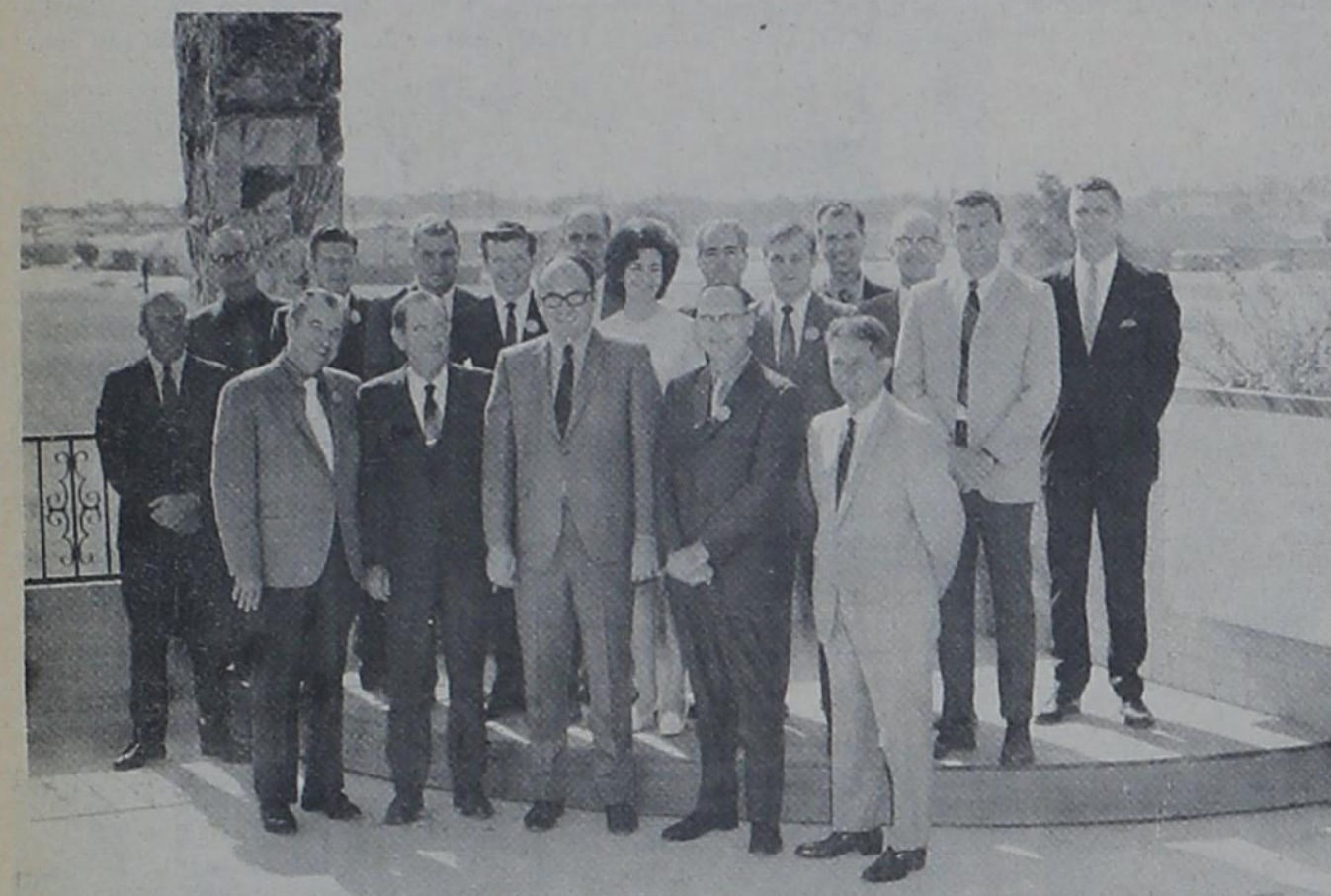

# English Visitor Enjoys 'Land Of Wide Horizons'

"A land of wide horizons and warmhearted people" is the way Frances Williams of Offenham, near Evesham, Worcestershire, England, describes this part of the United States on her first visit here.

Mrs. Williams is visiting in Farwell with Mr. and Mrs. Archie Tarter. She and Mrs. Tarter have been friends for 34 years. They once worked together as assistants in a clothing store. Mrs. Tarter came to the United States 24 years ago from England.

"I love the warmheartedness of the people here," Mrs. Williams said. She also said that she likes the local climate. It is much damper and cooler in England; she likes all the sunshine here. "I shall miss the sunshine very much, when I leave," said Mrs. Williams, "only second to the people."

While here, Mrs. Williams visited Carlsbad Caverns and attended "Texas" summer musical in the large amphitheater at Palo Duro Canyon. "Texas" is superb," she said. "Every visitor here should see it."

Attending the Border Town Days rodeo is an experience that Mrs. Williams said she wouldn't want to have missed. "We have nothing like that in England," she added.

Mrs. Williams said that she likes American foods very much. "The only thing I didn't like is squash," she quipped. She described the ice cream as "beautiful" and likes the sweet corn. There is some sweet corn grown in England, but not as much as here. "Your beef is superb," she stated. She went on to say that there is not as much beef grown in England, and that the American beef seems much better fed.

The diet is generally plainer in England, but there are more fish and seafoods in the diet since England is an island with so many seaports. Fish and chips is a favorite dish there and more meat pies are served, Mrs. Williams said.

According to Mrs. Williams, there are a wider variety of food stuffs available in the United States. American foods are more "exotic" than English, said the visitor. "There are a greater variety of fruits here due to the climate."

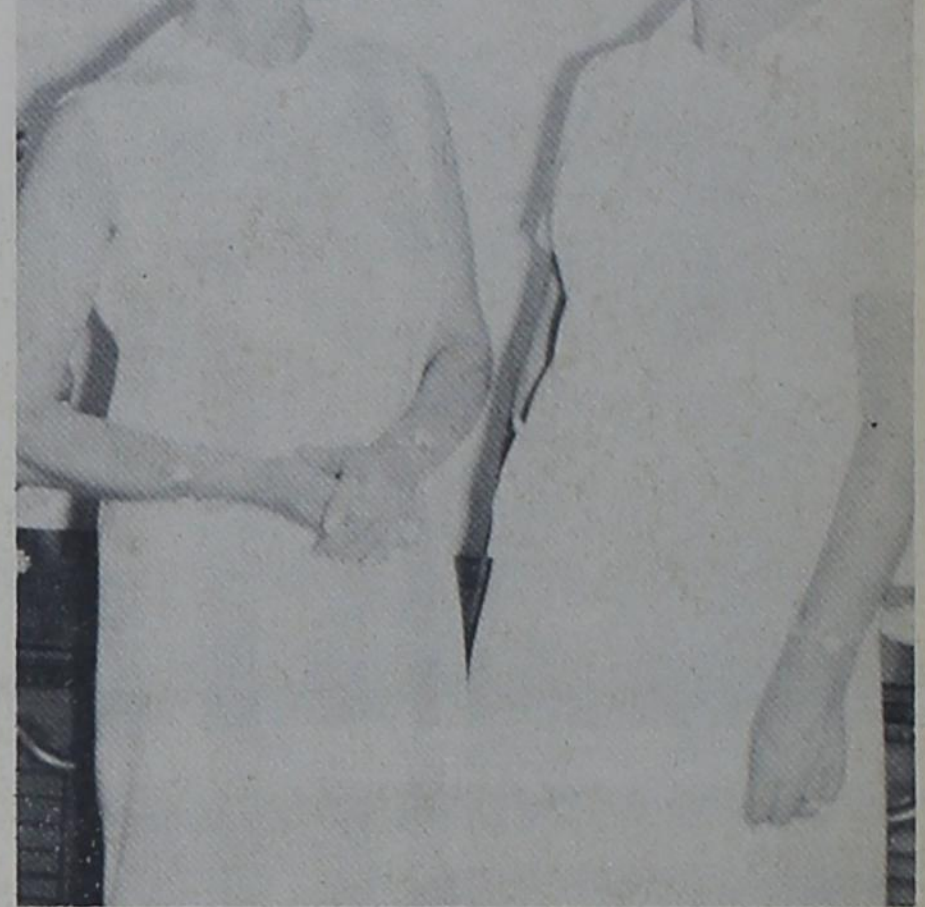
There is also a slight difference in terminology. Cookies are called biscuits in Britain and biscuits are called scones.

In telling some of the differences between the United States and England, Mrs. Williams said that there are fewer

cars in England. "People rely more on public transport." People seem to walk more in England she reports, and there are no drive-in cafes or motels in England and very few motels. "Your homes are far more spacious," Mrs. Williams said. The one-story homes that are common here are called bungalows in England. Mrs. Williams said that bungalows are just beginning to become popular there. Most of the homes there

are two-story. The homes in America are lighter with more windows, according to Mrs. Williams.

Mrs. Williams will leave to fly back to England on Saturday. The Tarters will drive her to Dallas to catch the plane. Mrs. Williams said that she has really enjoyed her visit here and hopes "to return as soon and as often as possible." In England, Mrs. Williams is a solicitors (lawyers) secretary.

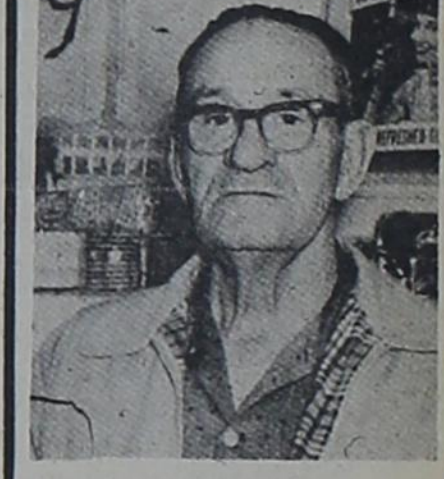

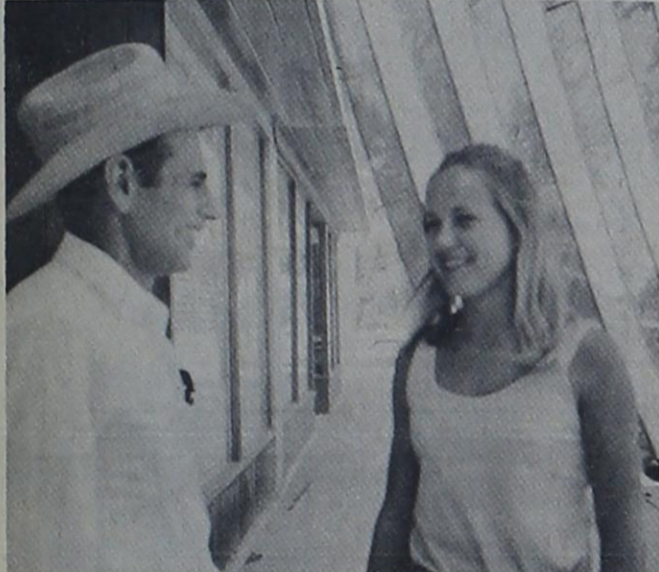
