

Sprain Your Brain!

Estimating farm prices in this day of legislated economics is always complicated, but more head scratching than usual is sure to result from the special grain sorghum legislation.

Suppose, for instance, that producers want to figure out what their support price likely will be. To begin with, they already have been assured of a support of 70 percent of parity, which in 1956 will be \$1.80 on a nation-wide average basis.

The freight differential for Parmer County makes our effective support 11 cents less, or \$1.69 this year. And from that price charge (usually averaging about 13 cents per cwt.) in addition to a 'service charge" of one cent,

Now, the Daniel-Chavez amendment would mean that the support price could be based on entirely different figures. Those figures are arrived at by taking the corn support which is 81 percent of parity (in the commercial areas) of \$1.40 per bushel, and figuring 75 percent of that, which is \$1.05 per bushelthe price support for corn in non-commercial areas.

Converting this figure to hundredweight, \$1.87 is arrived at, and then by multiplying times 95 percent, \$1.78 is obtained, which is the amount of support that sorghums would get if they

But since a factor of only 95 percent feeding value to corn is another multiplication times 95 is necessary, and \$1.69 per hundred is the final support

Obviously, a national average of \$1.69 is less than \$1.80, so the original 70 percent of parity formula no doubt will apply.

Don't forget that all sorts of complications can muddle this picture even further, though, and one of the most likely possibilities in this respect would be a revision of the corn support.

If it will be moved from 81 to 86 percent of parity as is supposed in some quarters, all the foregoing figures would undergo some juggling. The thing to keep in mind, however, are the "commercial" and "non-commercial" designations, which in 1956 at least have caused an outright cut of 25 percent on the price that would have been applicable under the Daniel-Chavez amendment.

Feeding nutritionists have long considered grain sorghum to be 95 percent of the equivalent for corn in feed value, depending on how the grain is used. Observers expect

Daniel, Grain Sorghums Will Now Be Inseparable

Price Daniel probably didn't realize to what an extent his recent amendment to the farm bill carrying special provisions for grain sorghum support prices will have on his pending hopes for a stay at the governor's mansion in Austin next

Even politicians sometimes underestimate their own strength, though one would hardly expect to be true when reading their press releases. Deliberate timing of the grain sorghum amendment could have not been more effectively arranged than was when it coincided with Daniel's offer that he "willing" to enter the race for governor this

The announcement itself caused quite a little thir on the High Plains, but the agitation was hardcomparable with the almost electrifying effect the Daniel-Chavez amendment which tied sorsums directly to corn for price support purposes. It would be understandable that some people

would tend to pooh-pooh this vital legislation for reason that it offers little if any hope for an increase in support prices in 1956.

However, Daniel has been instrumental in THE TRIBUNE IS A MEMBER OF: semoving an abuse of long standing that has been clearly discriminatory, and the change is sure to have beneficial and long-lasting effects for grain sorghum producers. It will, in fact, do more to stabilize the farm economy of this part of the Plains more than any other legislation has ever sone, when the full impact of its provisions are

set next year. We have never been able to justify the differcace with which the USDA looked upon grain sorchums when comparing them with corn, especially in the light of the common knowledge that they are roughly equivalent to 95 percent of the feeding walue of corn.

Because in all likelihood the bill will largely outline the administration's flexible price program and soil bank proposals, no difficulty is expected from President Eisenhower.

The grain sorghum amendment, although of paramount importance to the High Plains, is in actuality of small significance to the nation as a whole, and likely will be given little notice by the president, predict observers.

Grain sorghum is a dominating crop in Parmer and Curry counties. There were over 300,000 acres of grain sorghum grown under irrigation in Parmer County last year, and the production amounted to about 14,000,000 bushels.
