PERSONAL

There has been quite a bit of concern in many circles about the ability of small towns to attract industries. To this end, the Federal government has developed a program of assistance and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is asking for a community inventory of the town's assets.

We have long been of the opinion that Farwell has a very excellent area for industrial development. We refer to the area between the triangle formed by the junction of the Santa Fe tracks and Ninth Street. Certainly this is not at all suitable for either a residential or a retail business district, but would offer excellent sites for small manufacturing plants. The only company currently taking advantage of this area now is Gifford-Hill Western.

One thing this part of town needs is access roads, both to the north and to the south. Over the years there has been talk of trying to open Third Street, but this appears to get nowhere; mainly, as we understand it, because of the railroad's understandable reluctance to the extra railroad crossings it would open up to the public. At one time, we hear, the highway department promised to pave Ninth north across the tracks. We have not heard anything of this commitment for sometime and do not know of its current status.

We think that for the future growth of the area both of these projects should be kept constantly before the proper authorities. It would be a long step in the direction of enticing some manufacturing plant to locate in Farwell if we had a well-planned industrial park to offer them. We are ideally located to offer a company good markets to the north, the south, and to the west. Our climate is excellent and does not require the investment in plant capital that a plant located farther north requires. We have access to a world of natural gas and are served by an excellent network of electric facilities. Water can be had in real abundance at very little cost.

I do not know all the tax ramifications but I suspect we would compare favorably tax-wise with most any other area. We are short of skilled labor but have quite a bit of local labor that could be readily trained. We are not now a center of much union activity, but that could change. Our biggest deficit is in knowing what we have and putting it into a form that could be read and understood by prospective business.

We as an area must develop an aggressive attitude in looking for small businesses. We must take steps now to inventory our assets and to strive to complete the things we know we need to do to make our town acceptable to migrating manufacturers. One thing for sure, we need more of our local businessmen to support the Chamber of Commerce; not only with money but with their ideas, their presence, and their time.

Farwell is losing the battle for survival to our area towns, such as Bovina, Friona, and Muleshoe. If you don't think so, read the population figures of the last census, look at the number of ballots cast in the last election, and finally take a Sunday afternoon off and go to these towns and see their growth. It will amaze you.

Progress is never haphazard. It is always the result of careful planning and vigorous action on somebody's part.

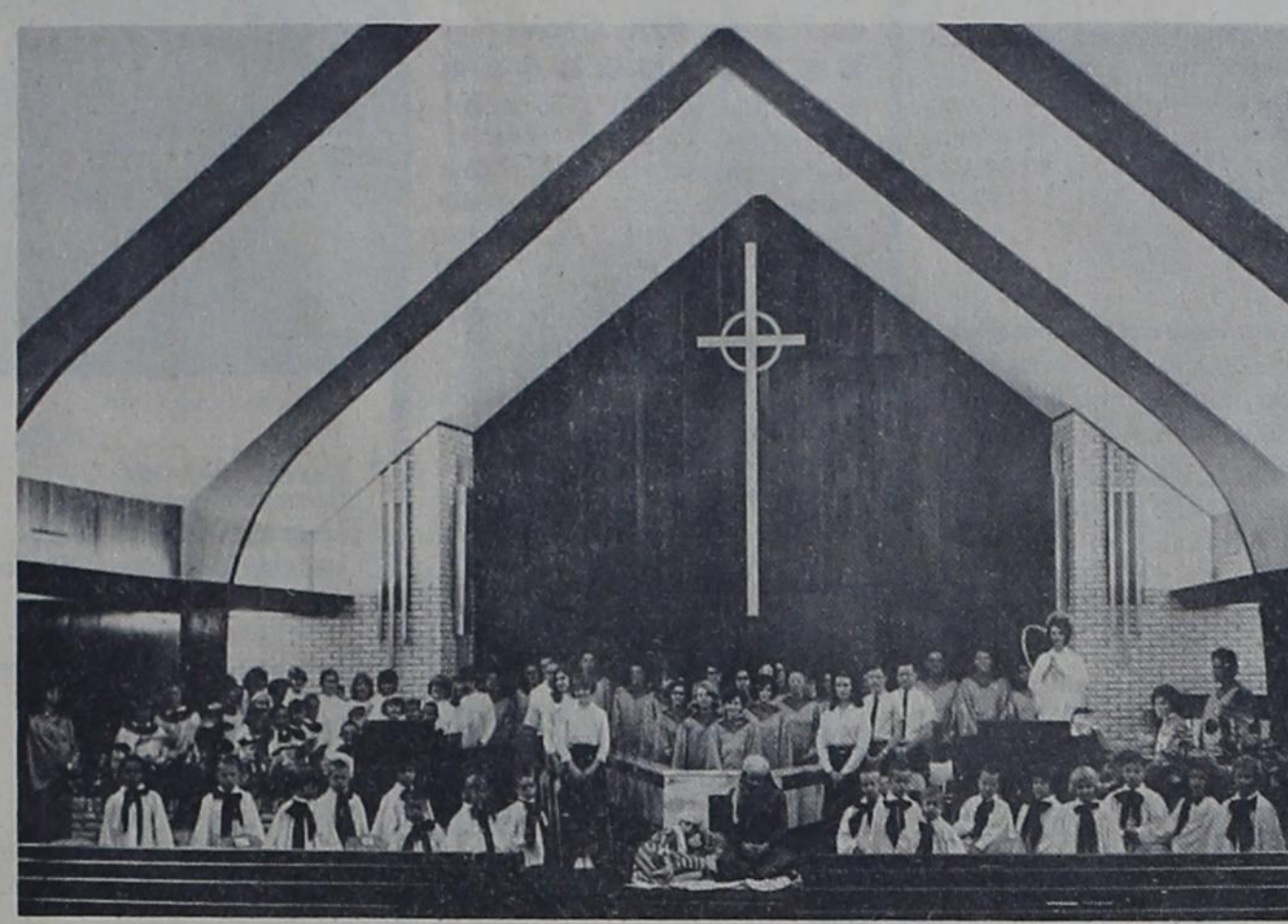

Texico Youth Injured In Farm Accident

Robbie Bradley, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bradley, Rte. 1, Texico, was admitted to Clovis Memorial Hospital on Tuesday afternoon suffering from a fractured skull, head cuts and possible internal injuries following an accident on the family farm, southwest of Texico.

Young Bradley is said to have been riding on the fender of a car driven by his mother and slipped off, with the car passing over him.

Mrs. Bradley told investigating officers that the youth was riding on the fender of the car while pulling tumbleweeds out of a fence to keep from getting in and out of the car. She said she saw the child slipping, but could not stop the vehicle in time to prevent the accident.

Following the accident, Mrs. Bradley put the lad into the hospital; arriving at the highway she flagged another motorist who took the child on to the hospital.

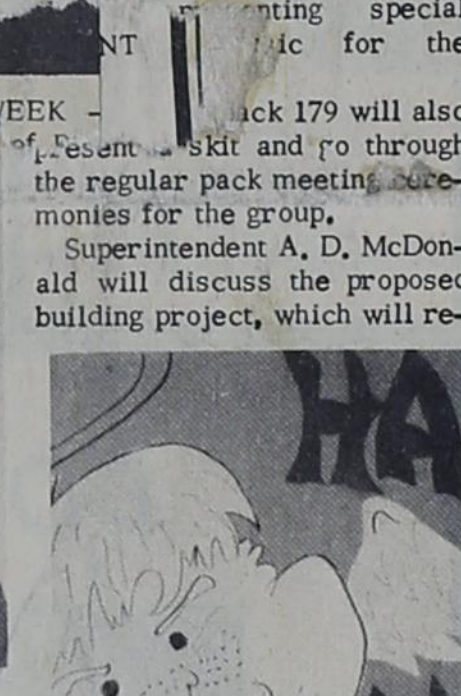
PTA Meeting Set Dec. 20

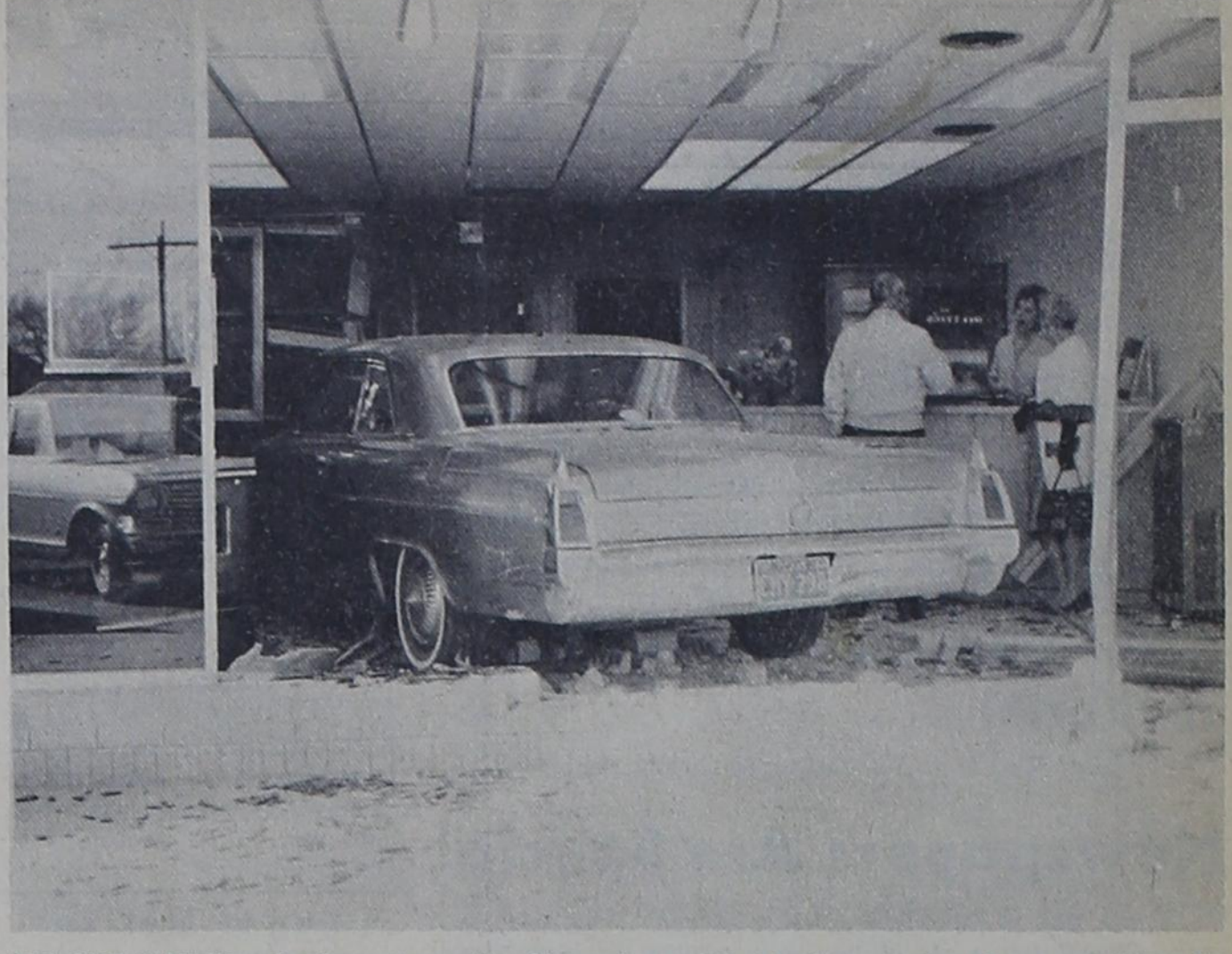
Receives Divinity Degree

Winifred Bradley Cobb of Clovis has written her second volume of verse, SPIN THE GOLDEN THREAD, and her third book. The new book is a companion volume to THE GREENING BRANCH, published in 1964.

BROOKHAVEN, Mrs. Cobb's first book, was a children's story. All three are published by The Naylor Company, San Antonio, Tex.

The reader will find a wide range of subjects in Mrs. Cobb's new volume. She does not hesitate to use the small things of life as well as its great moments. This use of the small experiences, moments, and things of life establishes a reader identification that adds much to the pleasure of reading.

For example, everybody has seen little boys flying kites in the spring, but it is left to the author to say:

Little March boys
Who play with kites,
Mature to men
With satellites.

Mrs. Cobb has a fine talent for expressing beauty succinctly. In "The Pleasure of the Blossom" she has this to say about the red Oriental poppy:

All cerise and tissue paper
crinkled
Are the petals huge and wide
As they frame the link
network
Of the center just inside.

In a good many of her verses she displays a humorous mood. Too, a thread of deeply religious feeling runs through much of her verse. Thus it reveals the character and philosophy of the author, "God is good; life is good; and, all persons are in some way -- good." Further, her poetry reveals the author's belief that good ultimately prevails, in the next world if not in this one.

Mrs. Cobb is a native Texan, who has taught in Texas many years -- including sixteen years in Plainview and eight years in Farwell. She now teaches English in Texico High School. Her husband, Tom Cobb, is a farmer. She has a daughter, Mrs. Norma Bradley Kerley of Dallas, and two grandchildren.

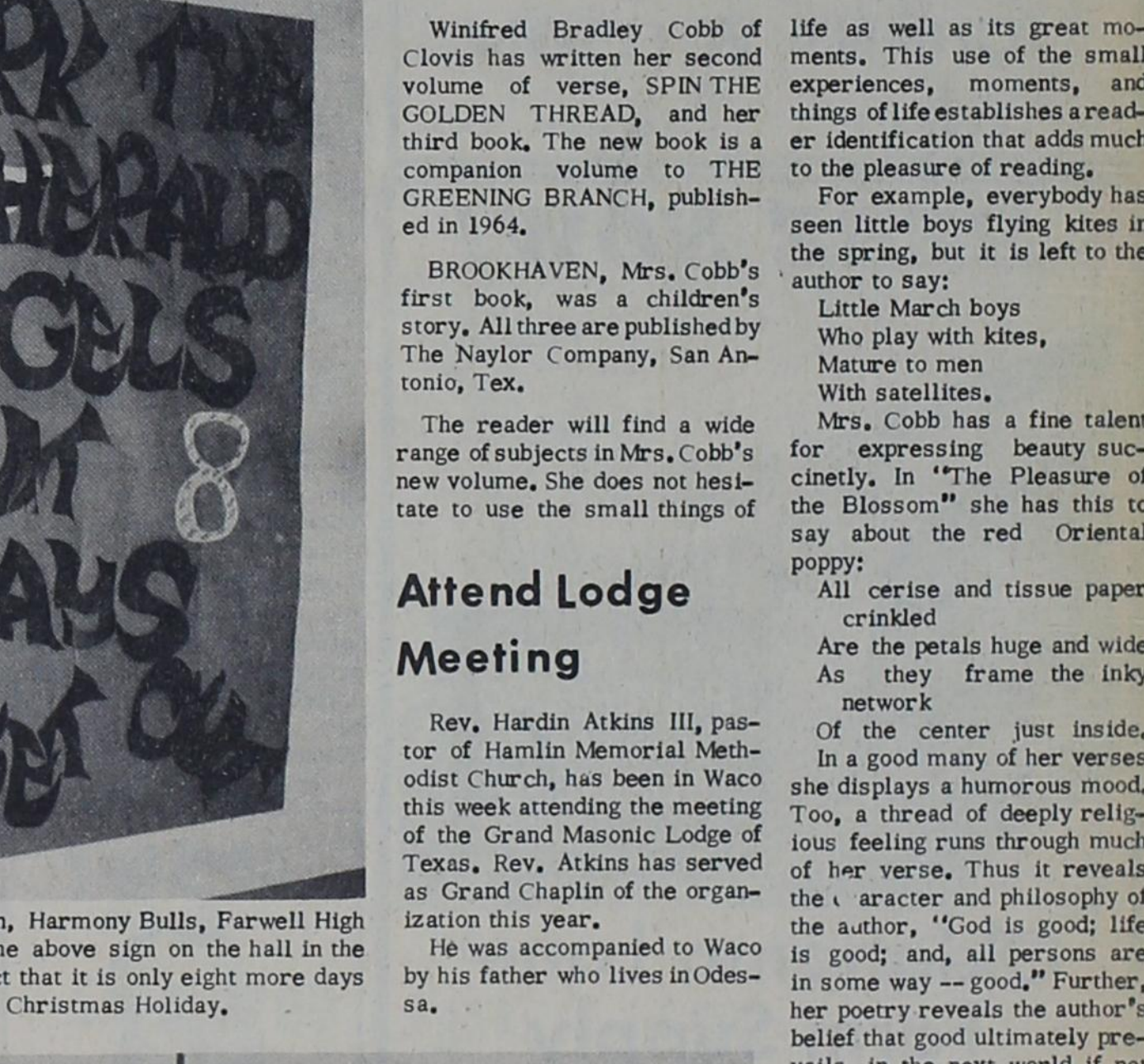
Her father was a teacher who turned farmer. Mrs. Cobb says that she has had a love of words as far back as she can remember. Once she created a quite unfavorable stir in the school room when a piece of doggerel that she wrote about a school authority was traced to her as the small author. Besides her own volumes of poetry, her verse has been published in "America Sings" and in newspapers.

Mrs. Cobb's advanced education was gained at Wayland Baptist College, Texas Technological College, and Eastern New Mexico University. She holds B. A. and M. A. degrees. She is a member of the Poetry Society of Texas, of Phi Sigma Alpha, and Delta Kappa Gamma.

Newspapers Are Special

In this day of more and more government regulation, it is only natural for a lot of people to assume that a newspaper has the same set of controls as radio and television stations, but this is not so.

Television and radio have government controls because of the nature of their operation. Ownership of the airways cannot be vested in private hands because it properly belongs to everyone and the only proper way to control it is through the government.

But the newspaper business is a privately owned business with the freedom to conduct its business in the way it sees fit.

What brings this to mind is a court decision this week in which the Michigan State Court of Appeals ruled that a newspaper is a private business and has the right to accept or refuse advertising as it desires.

Suit had been brought against the Battle Creek Enquirer by a motion picture theater to force the newspaper to accept advertising for "adult" movies. The newspaper turned down the ads because it didn't want to run them, and the theatre owner claimed loss of advertising was costing him business.

But the court held that unlike a telephone company or a hotel, a newspaper is not so "affected with a public interest" that its freedom of contract is impaired.

The First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution declares and safeguards the sanctity of freedom of the press. This freedom extends to the choice of accepting or rejecting news material, or advertisements.

This Michigan decision was the latest in a series of decisions upholding freedom of the press. We hope that the judiciary of this country keeps a record of this precedent and never wavers in its upholding of this fundamental right.



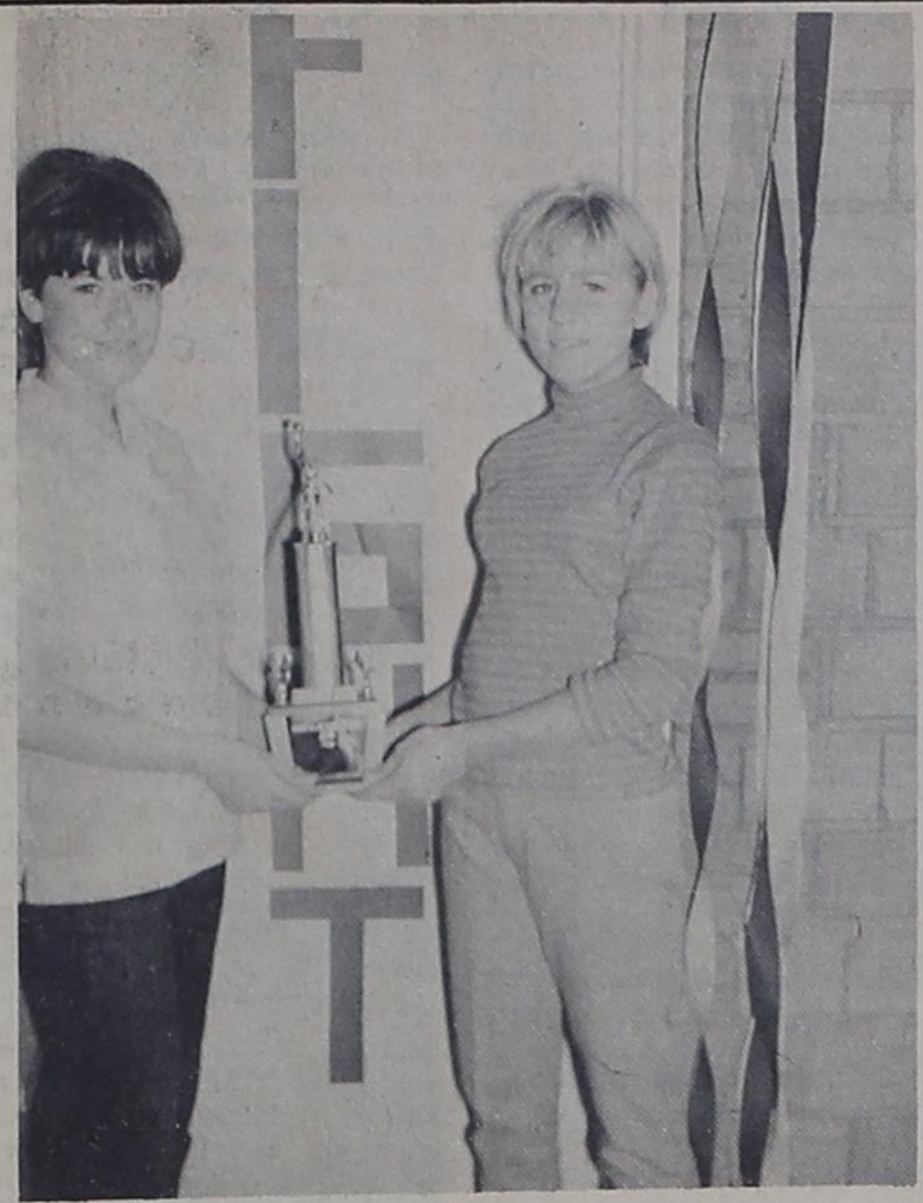

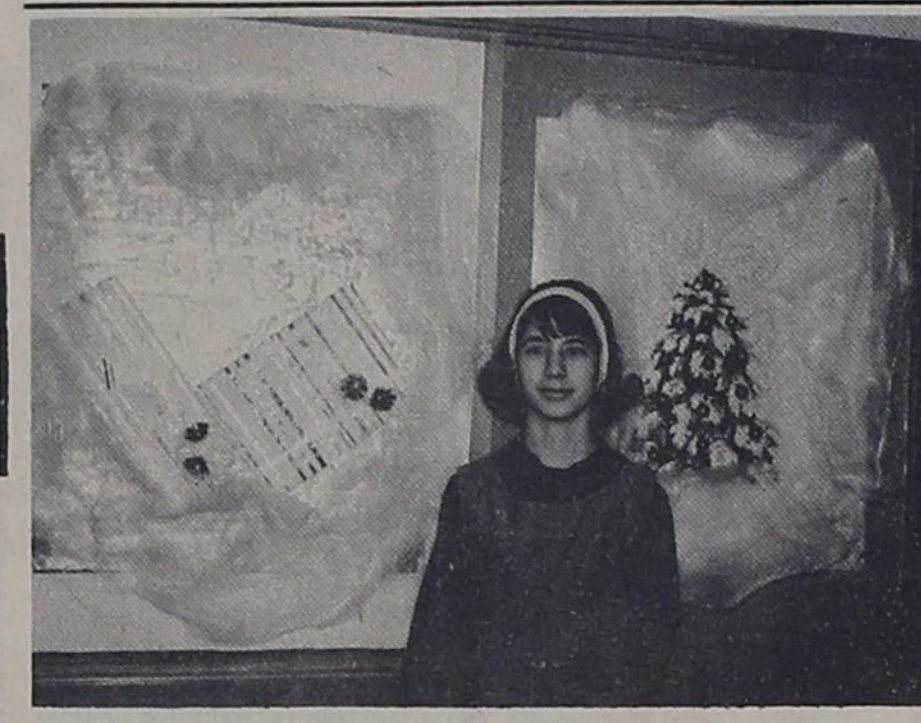
Pfc. Billington Assigned To Philippines

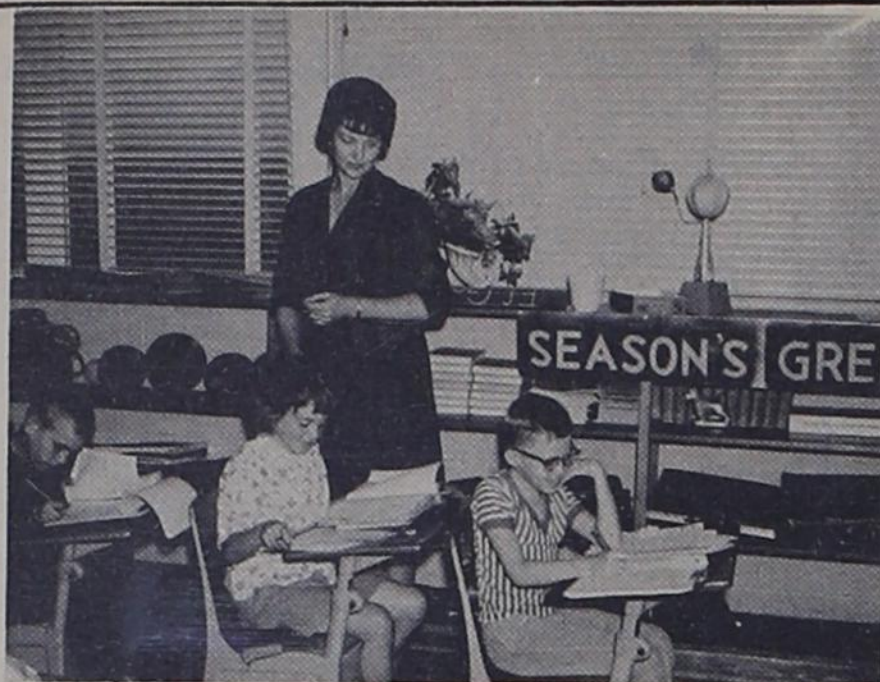

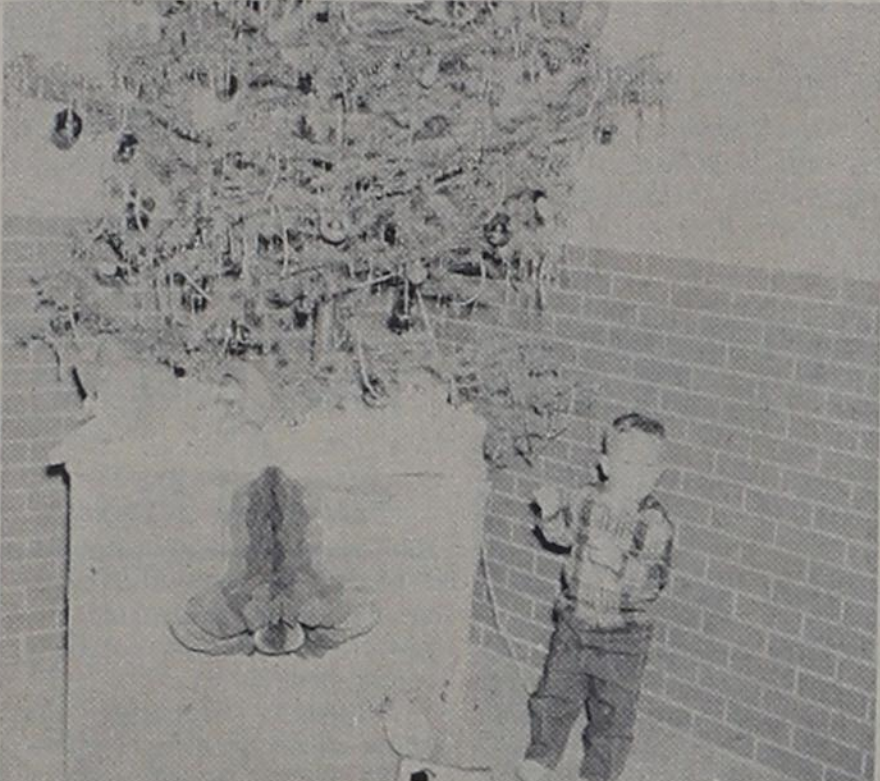
Meet Your Teachers

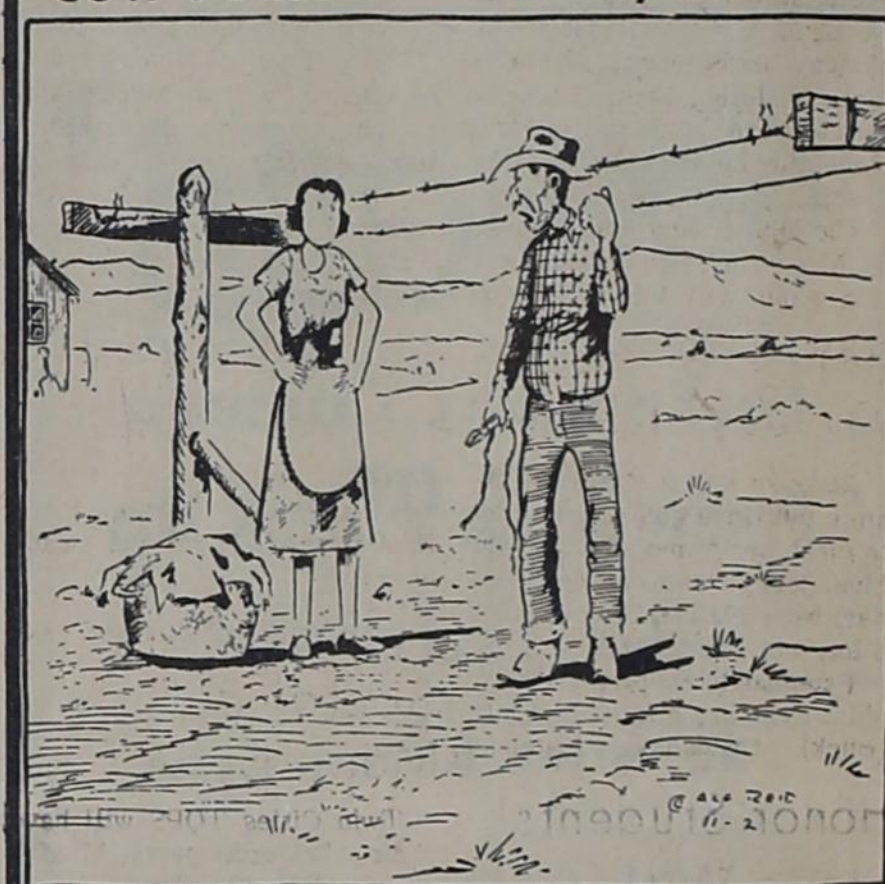

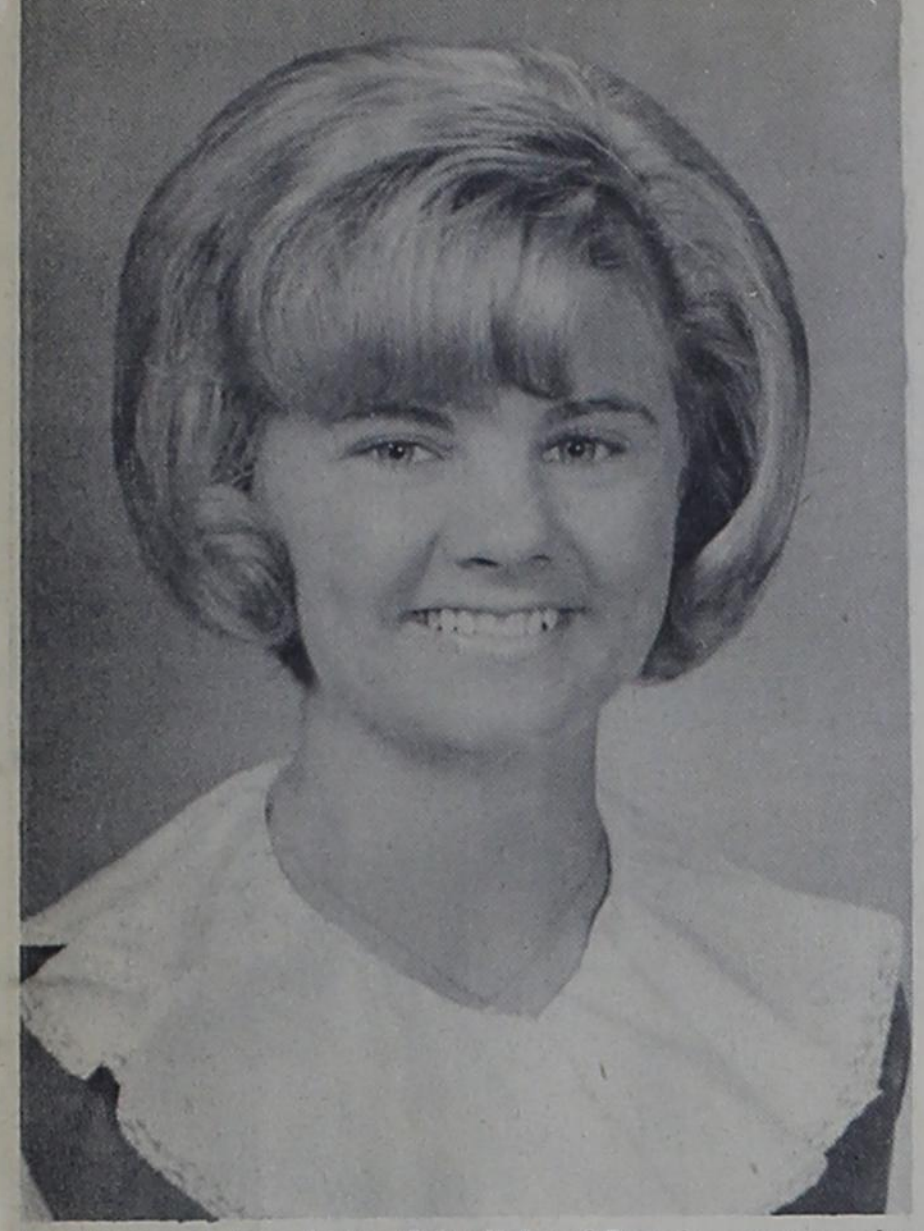

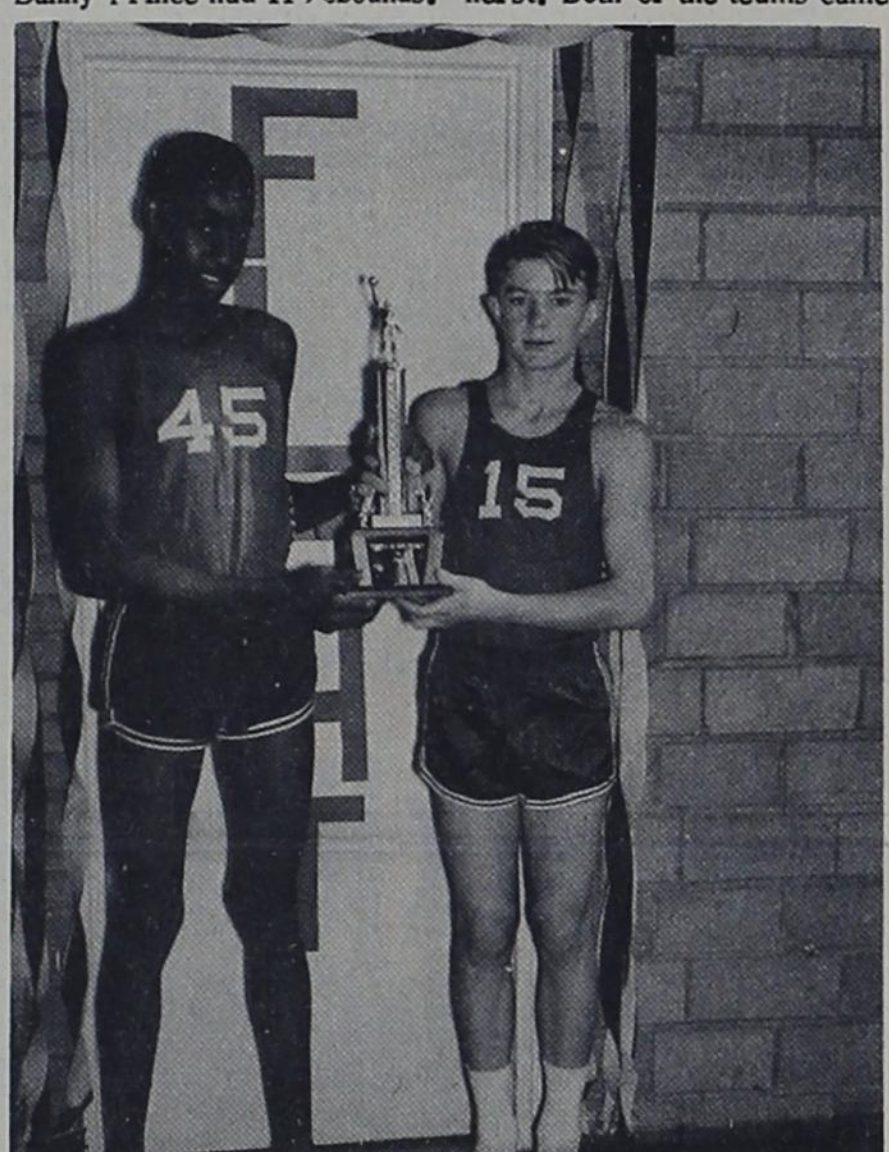
