Next week is the start of another new year. In the lives of many of our readers, this is just another week in another month in another year. To a large group, this is the beginning of a year that is one of only a few that they have experienced. To my generation, another year is such an old hat that it does not evoke much response except maybe an "O Hum," but to a larger group, larger than I had realized, it is an event of major proportions. The basis for these philosophical observations is a piece contained in a current issue of "Tomorrow through Research" published through the Southwest Research Institute.

As a person engaged in the business of communicating with people, I was quite interested to see with what type of person I may have to communicate in the next five to ten years. As an individual, I was interested to see with what kind of a people world I would have to exist by the mid 1970's. I do not believe that anybody over the age of 40 can read this article and not experience a twinge of fear at the prospects of being ruled by a generation of people so considerably younger than those of us currently in the habit of providing leadership and, incidentally, having things our own way.

The above mentioned article is quoted as follows:

"We have been invaded and conquered by the little people. Personnel expert Peter Drucker gives us the background facts --

He says that the age group which is now moving into the 20 to 25 year old bracket is about 60% larger than the age group ahead of it. In the meantime, the people in the 35 to 55 year old group are getting fewer, not only in total percentages but in work force and population, but in actual numbers. For the next 15 years we will have fewer people in what we consider the prime of life than we do today.

Within the next three years, one-half of the population will be under 25 years of age.

By the mid 1970's at least two-thirds and perhaps three-fourths of the population will be under 35.

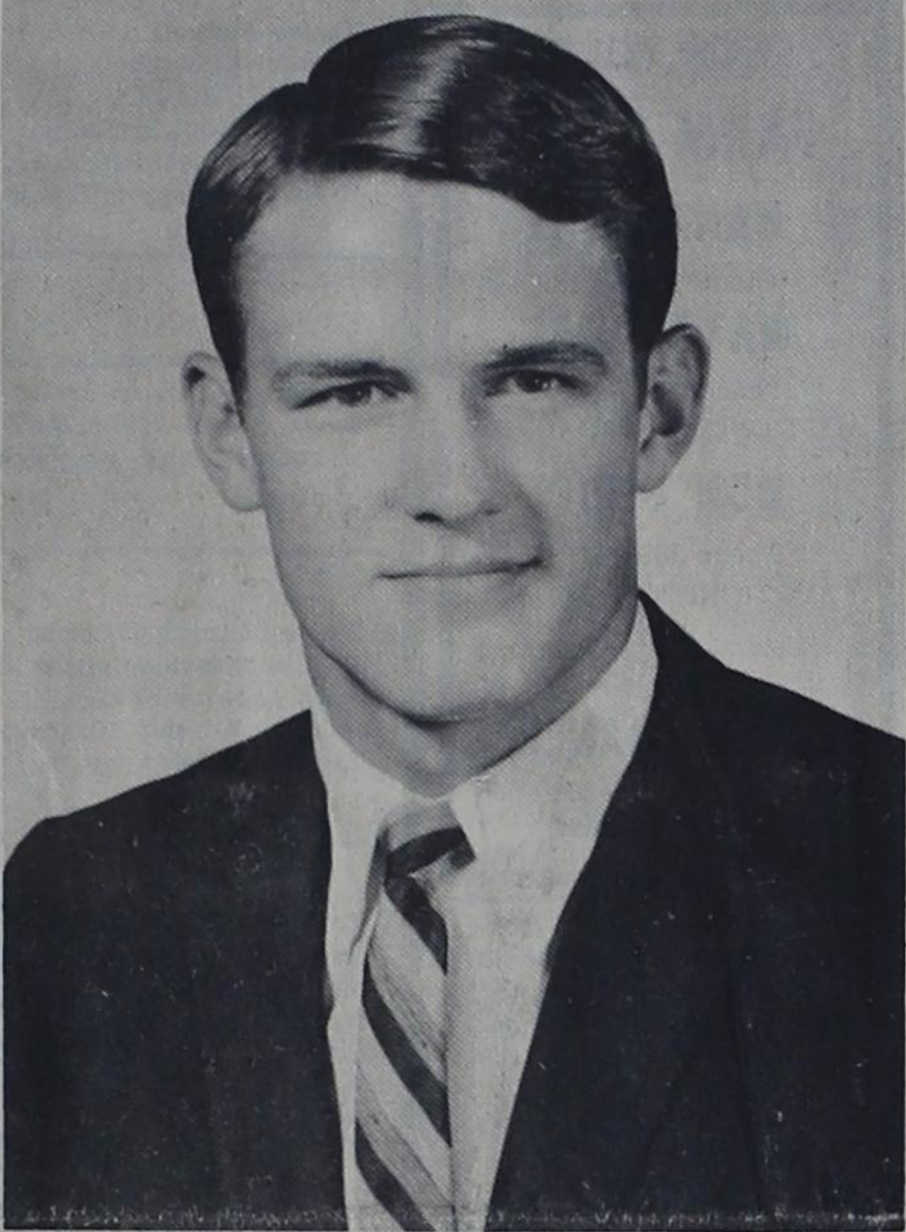
(Editor's note: For comparison, youthful Bobby Kennedy is now 41).

What does this mean to you? It means that soon you will have difficulty communicating with as much as 3/4 of our population.

Communication is largely concerned with common places, ideas and experiences which are communicable because they are common to all. In 1975, we will have a population whose only knowledge of the depression was garnered from childhood remembrances of their parents or from history books. Few of them will have seen a streetcar and almost none a double decker bus. None will remember a world which was not threatened by atomic disintegration. Most of their lives will have been spent in open although undeclared war.

Few will have known the joy of swimming in a cold stream naked. If they did it would have been on a public beach in protest. Not many will remember a stream they could drink from. They will not remember the thrill of going to the office with Dad and playing with the cash register and mechanical adding machine. This generation was just entering kindergarten when the first electronic computer was built in 1946. This deprived group will make up three-fourths of the U.S. by 1975.

Myrtle Steinbock of Lazbuddie is a very versatile artist doing not only landscapes and portraits but also still life, seascapes, and collages in both the realistic and modernistic tones. Myrtle started dabbling in the arts in 1949 by painting ceramics. Then she started china painting and in 1959 she entered a portrait painting class at Cloudcroft, N.M., under Raymond Froman of Dallas. Later that year she was in a class on landscaping, studying under Harold Roney of San Antonio. Besides these two widely acclaimed artists she has studied under internationally known Fredrick Taubes of New York who uses oil glazes like the old masters which is Myrtle's preferred way of painting.

Myrtle paints with oils, watercolors, tempera, and the new acrylic paints.

She has done hundreds of paintings. She uses canvass, masonite, burlap, velvet, and other materials to paint on. She has had several showings of her paintings and has won two awards. Her shows included three in Clovis, two in Paul's Cafe of Muleshoe, three in the Muleshoe State Bank, three on the courthouse lawn in Muleshoe, one in Kress, and two at the Lubbock Garden and Arts Center.

Truck-Train Wreck Leaves Two Dead

Two Lubbock men were killed instantly at 12:20 p.m. Wednesday of last week when the 1960 Chevrolet pickup truck in which they were riding was struck at the east crossing in Bovina by a west-bound through freight train.

Dead at the scene were William Wesley Gholson, 28, of 5232 40th Street, Lubbock, and Leroy Clifford Shelton, 31, of P. O. Box 1176, Lubbock.

The men were enroute to lay new carpet in the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Johnston, who live some five miles north of Bovina.

The pickup had turned north off Main Street toward Highway 60. The main track, running through the middle of the block, was blocked from view by box cars standing on sidings.

The bodies of the victims were thrown about 200 feet from point of impact, according to Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter,

who investigated the accident along with highway patrolmen.

Struck by Train No. 914, wreckage of the pickup was scattered over a wide area, parts of it being wrapped around a signal light at the west crossing five or six blocks away. Other parts had to be taken loose from the engine of the freight train by a wrecker crew. The train was travelling approximately 60 miles per hour, according to reports.

The accident marked the second such train-vehicle wreck within the past few weeks in downtown Bovina. The first at the west crossing completely demolished an automobile, leaving five passengers uninjured.

The victims of last week's accident were employed by Myres Carpet Specialty Shop in Lubbock and were driving a pickup truck belonging to the firm.

Several non-stop trains pass through Bovina daily, some passenger and some freight, signal lights and bells at the crossings announce approaching trains.

Engineer of the freight train involved in the accident was R. K. Renegar of Amarillo and the conductor was Claude Rea of Canyon, Minter said.

Gholson is survived by his wife; two daughters, Vickie and Becky, and one son, Wes, all of the home; two brothers, James of Lubbock and Lee of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. Shirley Tracy of Lubbock; his mother, Mrs. Helen Gholson of Lubbock, and grandparents, Mrs. Ida Gholson and Mr. and Mrs. Ed Halen all of Lubbock.

Shelton is survived by his mother, Mrs. Allis Shelton of Lubbock; one sister, Mrs. Ruby Gann of Lubbock; and a niece, Judy Noland of Cisco.

Funeral services for the victims were held in Lubbock.

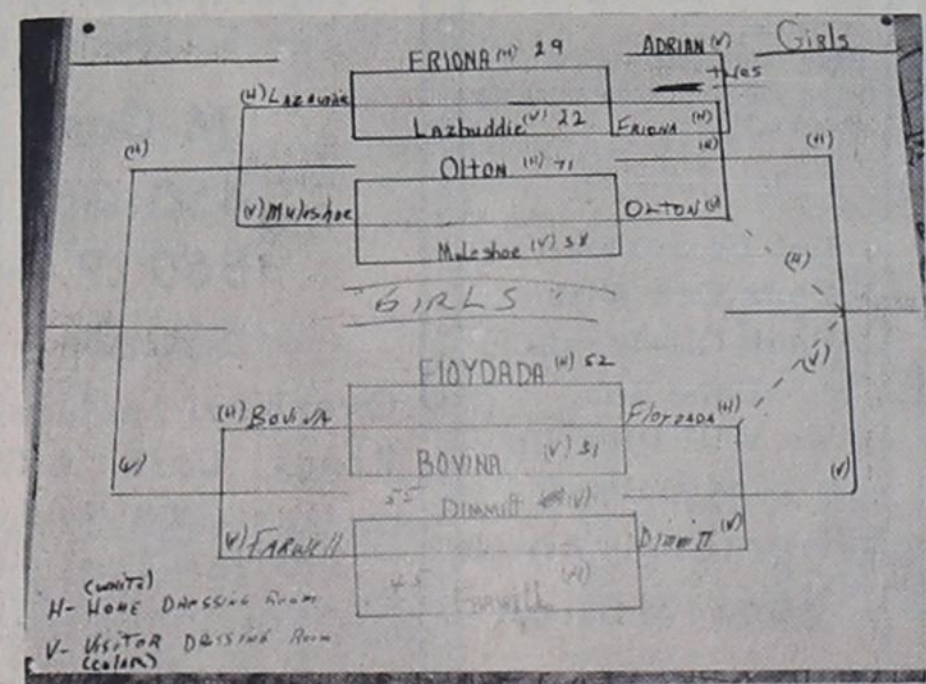
Okl. Lane Baptist Church -- Souls In Conflict To Show

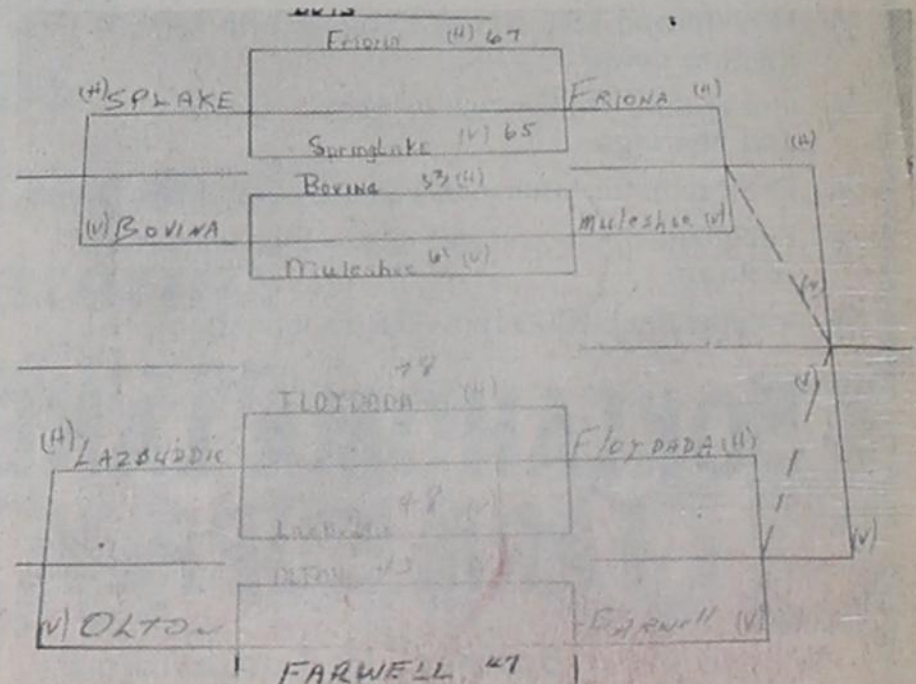
Baldwin, pastor of the church.

Rhodesia Strangled—U.N. In Action!

Sleep in peace tonight citizens, your United States is alert! Have no fear that while you sleep, a sneak nuclear attack may be launched by that terrible aggressor of aggressors - Rhodesia, for the U. N. with the blessing of the United States has fixed her wagon, but good, no longer will world peace be threatened by the bigoted white minority regime of Ian Smith. Of course it will still be threatened by Russia, Red China, North Viet Nam, Cuba, North Korea, East Germany, and the United Arab Republic but that's beside the point; it's the tiny African nation of Rhodesia, population four million, that U. Have we so soon forgotten that we were once a "rebel white minority regime", as we certainly didn't allow the Indians to participate in our government.

Why has President Johnson issued an executive order barring American trades with Rhodesia, while we are frantically trying to "build bridges" to our real enemy, Russia? Is it possible that LBJ considers Rhodesia a greater threat to our security than the Soviet Union? Why do we support Britain's economic aggression against this tiny nation, when Britain refuses time and time again to support our bombing of North Viet Nam, which surely must be considered to be a greater threat to world peace than infantile Rhodesia.

The answer is that once again we have been caught up in the hysteria of racial politics. We have decided that since we now have "solved" our racial problems, we can add another halo to our head by destroying a nation which hasn't. 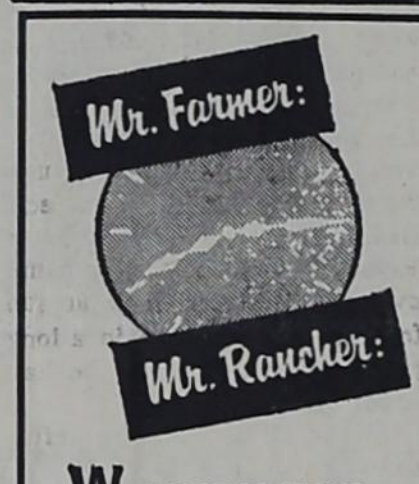

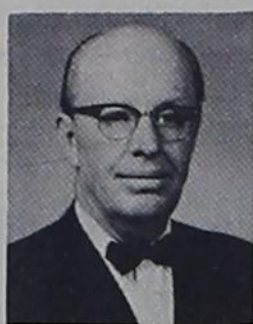
