Farwell Teams Take From Wins **Amherst**


Farwell basketball teams took three wins from Amherst on Tuesday night when the two schools collided on the local


The Steers, led by Johnny Schell who had 18 points, out-

Only In America!

Only in America could one man murder another with 60 million witnesses watching and still escape statute justice. We should indeed be so lucky. Fortunately though, Jack Ruby did not escape justice, but it was the hand of cancer that dealt the punishment, and not the hand of the law. Disease took the life of Ruby before he could be brought before another court for retrial, since his Dallas trial was overturned because of technicalities.

Although disease prevented one killer from escaping the ultimate justice, it does not prevent literally hundreds of others from being set free on small technicalities such as the presence of television cameras in the courtroom or the detail of whether a confession was obtained before a suspect was warned of his rights, or after. How many psychopaths will perhaps be set free to commit another crime because of technicalities or legal red tape? There will undoubtedly be many.

All this serves to illustrate the one greatfailing of the American system of justice - the overriding preoccupation with the rights of the criminal and the underconcern with the rights of the 10th. All Parmer County resilaw abiding public.

Now this is not to say that safeguards against the wrong man free of charge. being punished are not desirable, for they surely are. Far better for ten guilty men to escape justice, than for one innocent man to be punished for a crime he did not commit. As usual though, there can be too much of a good thing, and we have indeed crossed into the area of excess in our dealing with the criminal element. We have allowed mis-guided philanthropic groups such as the American Civil Liberties Union and many others to cloud our judgment with respect to the so caled "rights" of a criminal.

Case in point - Richard Speck, accused mass murderer of eight student nurses in Chicago has been granted a change of venue because he allegedly could not be given a "fair" trial in Chicago. Now I wonder just what is meant by a fair trial in this SMALL GRAIN case. Speck has admitted to the brutal knife slaying of the eight young nurses - what more need be said?
