The Lions Club will prepare and maintain the field and be in charge of the concession stand. They will also supply officials for the games.

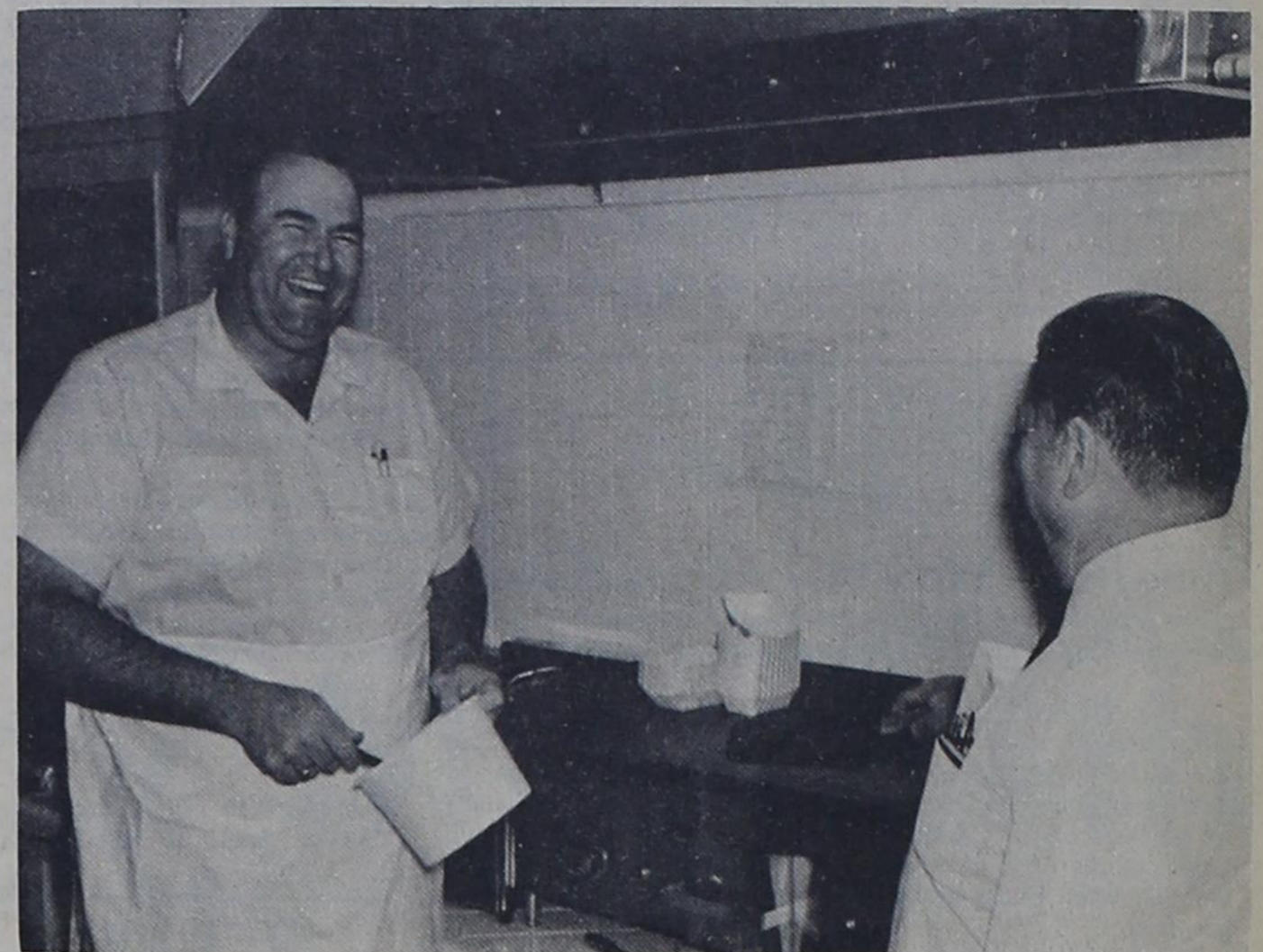

## Packing Plant Locates In County

Announcement was made in Friona last week that a new \$3 million packing plant, largest in the world, is in store for Farmer County. The announcement was made by Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. of Rock Port, Mo., and the Friona Chamber of Commerce Industrial Development committee.

Officials said the plant will have a single-shift slaughter capacity of 10,000 per week and a double-shift potential of 20,000 head.

Melvin Rolf, board chairman of the Missouri packers, said the Friona plant will have the largest capacity of any plant in the world. The plant is to be located on a 203-acre tract of land 3.5 miles southwest of Friona purchased from Sam Rundell of Farwell.

Company executives and about 40 leaders of Panhandle business and industry and the press were on hand for the announcement which was made at the Friona Country Club. "We conducted a survey of

the country and the Midwest and ended up at Friona as the best livestock area in the United States," said Robert E. Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers. He said the grade of cattle produced in Farmer County is tops for the western plant.

The Friona plant will slaughter, chill, quarter and do some boning and breaking, he said. Its market will be the metropolitan areas of the East, Southwest, and West Coast.

Construction of the plant will begin in the near future. Officials hope that the plant will be in operation by April 1, 1968.

W. L. Edelman, Friona mayor, said the plant will employ 250 persons and an additional 250 persons will be required to support and service the new industry.

It has recently been announced that two gigantic feeding operations are locating in Farmer County, one at Bovina and the other near Friona. With these

feeding operations added most of the cattle required for the packing plant will be produced in the county. Frye said the Farmer County area can supply about 650,000 head of fattened cattle per year.

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., an independent firm, was chartered Nov. 15, 1964. In its first year of production, the company slaughtered 302,057 cattle, had gross sales of more than \$84 million and operated at a profit.

Oh, the free clear air of West Texas. Sunshine, wind, and a dash of sand to add body. Whenever we venture off the Caprock and partake of the denser, damper, and more depressing air of our populous centers to the south and east, we always regain an appreciation for living just where we live.

The cause of this particular feeling of satisfaction was our recent trip to the tumultuous tourist trap known as Six Flags Over Texas. This was our second annual safari to this outpost of pleasure and I believe it will be our last for a number of years. I do not mean to cast aspersions on the Six Flags attraction. It is a wonderful experience and well worth the effort to attend, at least once.

All of Texas should be proud of this extravaganza. Its beauty is beyond words. The landscaping and the many parks and plazas of flowers and shrubs are a horticultural masterpiece. The grounds and exhibits are kept spotlessly clean. Such meticulous attention to keeping the grounds clean and free of trash is a radical improvement over many of the carnival-like exhibits we have seen over the years.

The idea of a one price admission covering all the rides, shows, and exhibits is a sheer stroke of genius on someone's part. This guarantees all who attend that they will be able to see and participate in the entire show. The only extra cash required over and above the entry fee is for what food, drink, and souvenirs one may wish to purchase. This allows a person on a limited travel budget to accurately assess how much the family bill may be tilted. We even observed several families eating out of shoe boxes of sandwiches that they obviously brought into the park. The food and beverage, all non-alcoholic, was very tasty, clean and quite well prepared. The cost of these park viands were reasonable considering the circumstances. All in all, we recommend Six Flags as a worthwhile family outing.

But, and there are always hazards to every good thing, let me give you a word of warning about that money-making monster known as The Inn of Six Flags. This palace of an evening's peace and quiet is really posh. And they charge accordingly. A family of four could hardly stay two nights and eat three or four meals there for less than \$100 in hard earned American greenbacks. This we feel is too much for papa just looking for a place to sack the brook between trips to the main attraction. Six Flags is located on the Dallas-Fort Worth turnpike and is readily accessible by auto so that by arriving early enough, a person could consider staying as far as up to fifty miles away without being unduly distressed.

So much for Six Flags. If you haven't been, you ought to plan to go, but plan ahead so you won't have to wire Uncle Charlie to mortgage the home-stead and bale you out of durance vile in the big city.

Last week we had occasion to write one of our public officials, Homer Garrison Jr., by name, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, about coping with the ever increasing tide of forms we are required from time to time to fill out for bureaucratic perusal. I am pleased to say our letter was promptly and courteously answered by Mr. Garrison. ## Receives Research Fellowship

The grant is given by the Robert A. Welch Foundation at Houston to promote fundamental chemical research.

**Editorial**

**American Way Not Appreciated By Clay and Like**

Cassius Clay may have whipped the likes of Sonny Liston and Floyd Patterson but it will be interesting to see if the former world champion can withstand the punch of a fraill 191-year-old gentleman known as Uncle Sam. If Uncle is not unduly influenced by the swarms of "doves" and black power advocates so prevalent on the American scene today, I feel that it will be safe to bet that when Uncle swings, Cassius will go down for the count but good.

The question, of course, is whether or not Uncle will swing. The legal processes necessary to put Clay in the hoosegow are apt to be long and drawn out, with the appeals flying fast and furious. Due to the existence of our somewhat liberalized interpretations of the law, it is not inconceivable that Clay will come out of the fracas with nothing worse than a fine of a few thousand dollars, a pretty insignificant sum to a man of Clay's means. If this indeed comes to pass, a great injustice will have been committed against the thousands of American soldiers in Vietnam, as undoubtedly many of them would gladly give a similar sum just to be home again. But even if they could buy their way out, many would undoubtedly choose to stay because they feel that the American way is worth fighting for, an idea that Clay apparently does not share.

Actually, Cassius Clay is but a product of his environment. He is not the evil in himself, but merely a symbol of the evil, the evil that is exemplified in the black power movement, the anti-war demonstrations, and the countless walking filth factories that claim to be people in search of some fuzzy notion that by singing protest songs and going without baths for prolonged periods of time, they may rid the world of all its evils.

Make no mistake about, this segment of society, Cassius Clay included, poses a real threat to our existence. They will not bomb us off of the earth, but if allowed to grow, their diseased thoughts may spread and so contaminate our thinking that our system will decay at the roots, making us easy prey for those bent on our destruction.

Those parasites of society who justify the burning of American flags behind the veil of "dissent" should be made to realize just what it means to live in America. Those who feel that they are being denied their freedom just because they cannot partake of the reproductive process in the middle of the Los Angeles freeway at high noon if the notion strikes them should be invited to pack up their bags and leave.

I for one am becoming weary of hearing that America is wrong, and that the war we are fighting is unjust. I am sick and tired of the constant whimpering about American murders while the Communist atrocities go unmentioned. I am tired of hearing about how the poor black man is mistreated in America and about how the "hippies" and "teenyboppers" are just "misunderstood."

I for one am in favor of building one more "bridge" to Russia, a bridge over which all the assorted LSD users, black power-niks, misguided humanitarians, Nobel "Peace" prize winners, freedom of profanity advocates, and flag burners could use to cross over. Perhaps after a few years in a society where freedom is truly oppressed, they would learn to appreciate this land known as America. They need to learn the simple truth contained in an old adage: "Democracy is a very poor form of government, but it is so much better than any other form in the world today."

Approximately 65 persons attended the social.

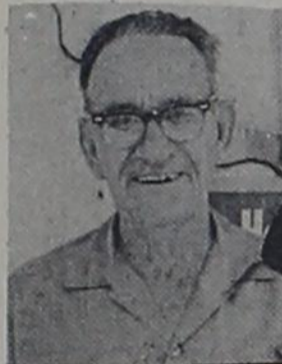
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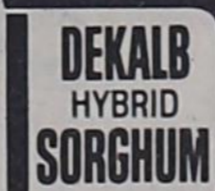
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Citizens Give Opinions --

Charlie Bell, groceryman who operates stores in both Farwell and Clovis, said, "I don't think it will make too much difference locally, but in Clovis it is another matter for it will be hard for the farmers and farmers' wives to accustom themselves to coming to buy groceries before dark, for their work is from sun to sun." However, he went on to say that he believes it will all work out all right.

Mrs. Marcia Leavell, school secretary at Texico, said, "I like it for it will give me more time at home." She expressed the opinion that it will make a big difference in the summer for the

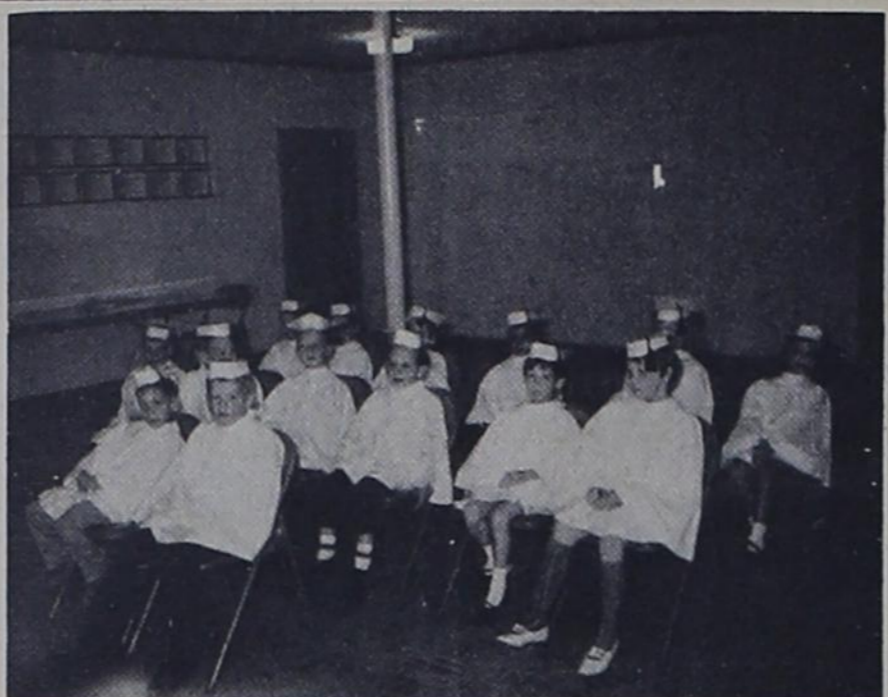
family will get up at the usual time, giving them many more hours of daylight in which to accomplish many things.
