

Celebrate 60 Years Of Marriage

The sixtieth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. N.L. Tharp will be celebrated Sunday afternoon, May 21, from two to four p.m., mountain daylight time, at the Retirement Ranch of Clovis. The children of Mr. and Mrs. Tharp extend an invitation to all their friends to attend. It is requested that there be no gifts.

Nathan Lewis Tharp and Nettie Arlene Maddox were united in marriage on May 18, 1907 in Quanah, Tex. Immediately following the ceremony, the newlyweds left by train for Farwell. They soon established their home on a claim located one mile west and about three and one-half miles north of Pleasant Hill.

Their first home was a half dug-out only twelve by fourteen feet in size. Mr. Tharp states that during the first two or three years the fleas were so bad that it was necessary to build a fire around the house in order to kill them.

The Homestead Act required, among other things, that a couple live on a claim for five years and raise a crop for at least two or three of the five years. The Tharps had not fulfilled this requirement in its entirety by the end of five years. They had a buyer who was ready to pay \$500. for the quarter section as soon as they had a clear deed to it. Some of their well-meaning neighbors wanted time to swear that they had met the requirement but Mr. Tharp quickly told them that he did not consider the land to be worth telling a lie about. It was a bit discourating for them to have to live longer on the claim in order to get it but lar act of honesty made it possible for them to have the success they had in later years.

In 1922, the family moved to Clovis where he established the Rumley (later Oliver) farm equipment dealership which continued in operation until late 1947. He constructed a new building for his business at Fifth and Mitchell Streets where the Barry Hardware Company is now located. He sold more Rumley equipment than any other single Rumley representative in the United States.

N.L. Tharp has been the first ing in the State Line area. He was the first to plant wheat. Again, just as a matter of fulfilling a requirement of the Homestead Act, he planted one whole gallon per acre. But, the venture proved so successful that he started planting wheat in full sincerity the following year. He dug the first deep water irrigation well in 1939 and was the first to irrigate wheat. In 1931, after three years of effort, he invented the first successful cotton picker. He received the grand total of \$150, in royalties for tional Harvester Company.






