A country soaked with rain-- this is our best description of Central Illinois. The publisher and his wife spent last week in his original town of birth, Peoria, Illinois. It was a week of some surprises and also a repetition of old events.

We were surprised at the great change in the physical aspect of the city. Up until our last visit only a little over two years ago, the same old buildings were much in evidence and there didn't seem to be much added in the way of new structures. Today it is quite different. It is a vastly changed skyline that greets the visitor. New skyscrapers, new office buildings, new thoroughfares, and almost a whole new generation of people. From our observations, two years did more to change the old town than the previous twenty.

One thing that did not change, and only recently played the local inhabitants an encore, was the broad Illinois river. It flooded the lowlands this year. As far back as the early 1930's it was a dream of the people to dam and retain the river waters. Much effort was expended over the next three decades for this purpose. Recently we recall a glowing report to the effect that all the flood control projects were completed and that it was impossible for the river to again flood low lying homes and businesses.

Well again it was no contest in the battle between man and Mother Nature. The river rose to its second highest level on record and flooded great areas of buildings and houses.

One thing we can be certain about, somebody will want to spend more money this time to absolutely guarantee that this derved old river just cannot ever again flood -- until the next time.

Are we wiser today than our ancestors were 200 years ago? We know more facts, know more "things" -- yet how wise are we? Does knowledge begat wisdom? At what age does knowledge translate into wisdom? The answers to questions of this nature have been part of the generation gap from the age of Adam to the age of Aquarius.

As a practical means, some arbitrary limits have been set as to what age most people's knowledge begins to be translated into wisdom. Our forefathers set 21 as a voting age in our great American Constitution. Now admittedly there is a fine line between wisdom at 21 and wisdom at 20, or 19 or 18 or ---.

Well, be that as it may, recently our Congress in all its great wisdom lowered the age of voting to 18. The President after some half-hearted murmurs signed the bill into law. We now await a Supreme Court decision on the legality of this action.

We think Congress was remiss in not lowering the voting age to 12 or 13. If wisdom is no longer a criteria of voting privileges, why not select some physical determination such as puberty, or say the loss of baby teeth.

If Congress is going to be idiotic, as they are, they might just as well go whole hog and remove all age barriers to voting. Then they could court the kindergarten vote, where they would at least encounter compatible mental processes.

Sten Returns To Sweden

"I definitely have mixed emotions about leaving Farwell," said Sten as he related some of his experiences and observations about the small town in which he has made his home while living in the United States. "The only thing that gives me some comfort as I prepare to return to Sweden is the thought that I will be able to return to America and Farwell some day," he said, adding as an afterthought, "who knows, by then I may be rich or famous!"

Sten arrived in Farwell August 8, 1969, after having been selected to participate in the exchange student program earlier in the year. His first remark upon stepping off the plane which had brought him from New York to Amarillo was "Oh no, it can't be this hot anywhere except in Africa." However after living in Farwell for ten months he says, "I like the weather fine, that is except for the wind and dust storms." He was brought to Farwell through the efforts of the American Field Service, a national organization whose local chapter was organized in 1969 after the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club spearheaded a drive to obtain an exchange student for Farwell School.

Sten has made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wiman and son, Bob. He reiterated again and again, "It is great to have two sets of parents and a brother...they have done so much for me and have spent untold hours in entertaining me, much money in seeing that I had op-

portunities to see other areas of the country, and most of all much patience with me and my friends who were always around. Truly, the Wiman home has been my home in America and I shall always treasure the memories of the year spent in their home."

Sten stated that he was much impressed with the American school system which has such a friendly atmosphere, athletics

Although Sten was graduated with the 1970 senior class at Farwell he will be enrolled for his senior year in high school following his return home. Following high school graduation in Sweden, Sten plans to enroll in a Swedish university to study civil engineering.

Halts Wheat Harvest --

Life-Giving Rains Fall On Area Croplands

General rains over the area during the weekend have brought total rainfall for the month of June to well over four inches in most areas surrounding Texico-Farwell and have brought smiles to the faces of most farmers. The rains have delayed the completion of wheat harvest by several days but farmers in general are gleeful about the life-giving moisture. At least, it has permitted the irrigation wells to be turned off for a period of time on other crops including grain sorghum, cotton and sugar beets.

Overcast skies on Wednesday morning brought promise of still more rains before the week is over. Weather prognosticators also indicate that the rains are not over yet,

so July may prove to bring more of the life-giving manna than did June.

Varying reports of from 1 1/2 inches to 2 inches of rain were reported in Texico and Farwell on Tuesday night. Mrs. Elwanda Wagner at the fire station in Farwell reported 2 inches of rain for Tuesday and Tuesday night while Gil Patschke reports only 1 1/2 inches at his home several blocks away, in the south part of town.

The Sterling Lockmillers, three miles west of Texico, report 2.10 inches of rainfall for Tuesday night and 4.65 inches for the past two weeks. At Worley Grain Elevator at Pleasant Hill one inch of moisture was reported on Tuesday while further to the east, north of Texico, the Leon Langfords

report 1.20 and Elmer Langford, one mile north of Leon Langford, reports 1.10 for the same period. Willie Hester, eight miles northeast of Farwell, reports 2.30 inches of rainfall on Tuesday. At Lariat no moisture was reported late Tuesday afternoon following the heavy deluge which drenched Texico and Farwell. However, on Wednesday morning, Asa Smith at the Sherley Grain Company in Lariat reports 2.6 inches for the early part of the week. On Tuesday night well over an inch of moisture was received at Lariat, according to Smith.

At the Claude Coffey farm, two miles east of Farwell on the Amarillo highway, 2.4

inches of moisture was received Tuesday night bringing the total at the Coffey farm to well over four inches for the past few days.

At Oklahoma Lane, Sterling Donaldson reports 1.1 inches of moisture for Tuesday night and an additional 2.1 for the week. At the John Hadley farm, five miles southwest of Texico, 2 1/2 inches of rain was reported through Tuesday night. Ted Magness, who farms five miles southeast of Farwell, reports the lightest rainfall in the area for Tuesday night with only 3/4 of an inch. This brings the total at the Magness farm to around 1 3/4 inches for the week.

Border Town Days --

Chamber Makes Celebration Plans

At the noon meeting of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture on Tuesday, plans were begun for the fourth annual Border Towns Days Celebration. The event is slated to be held on July 30, 31 and August 1.

Tentative plans call for the celebration to be kicked off with a parade in downtown Texico-Farwell on Thursday, July 30, at 4:30 p.m. All local business firms are encouraged to enter floats in the parade and area riding clubs and bands are also encouraged to participate.

Following the parade, the first performance of the Junior AJRA rodeo will be held at the Farwell Roping arena at 8 p.m.

Farwell Arena --

Junior Rodeo Slated July 30, 31, August 1

The annual Farwell Junior Rodeo is slated for July 30, 31 and August 1 according to information released this week. The rodeo is AJRA approved and is for boys and girls up to and including 19 years of age.

Contestants are divided into three age groups for the events, with the 12 and under group in one division; the 13 through 15 in a second division; and those 16-19 in the third division.

A rodeo queen will be chosen for the event, according to Frank Doshier, Jr., treasurer of the Rodeo Association. The queen contestants will ride in the grand entry each night prior to the rodeo performance and on the final night of the rodeo, a queen will be crowned. Celia Trimble, 1969 rodeo queen, will reign as queen of the rodeo and also of the Border Towns Day celebration, which will be held in conjunction with the rodeo.

According to Doshier, all boys and girls, who wish to enter in the rodeo events may contact him at his home by letter or phone or they may pick up entry forms at Rips Western Wear or from Delbert Garner, president of the Association.

The rodeo this year will feature a one go-around instead of the usual two go-arounds as in the past. Events in which the contestants will participate include steer riding, bareback bronc riding, steer wrestling, tiedown roping, ribbon roping, break-away roping, barrel racing, pole bending and flag races.

On Friday, a second rodeo performance is slated and the final performance of the rodeo will be held on Saturday evening.

Prior to the final rodeo performance, a barbecue meal will be served at the Farwell City Park at 5 p.m. Henry and Adolph Haseloff will prepare the beef for the meal and the meal will be served by members of the Chamber of Commerce. Also tentatively planned for the celebration is a member-guest golf tournament. The tourney is slated for August 1 and 2.

According to Jim Berr, vice-president of the Farwell Chamber, the governors of Texas and New Mexico and the state senators and representatives are being invited to attend the celebration.

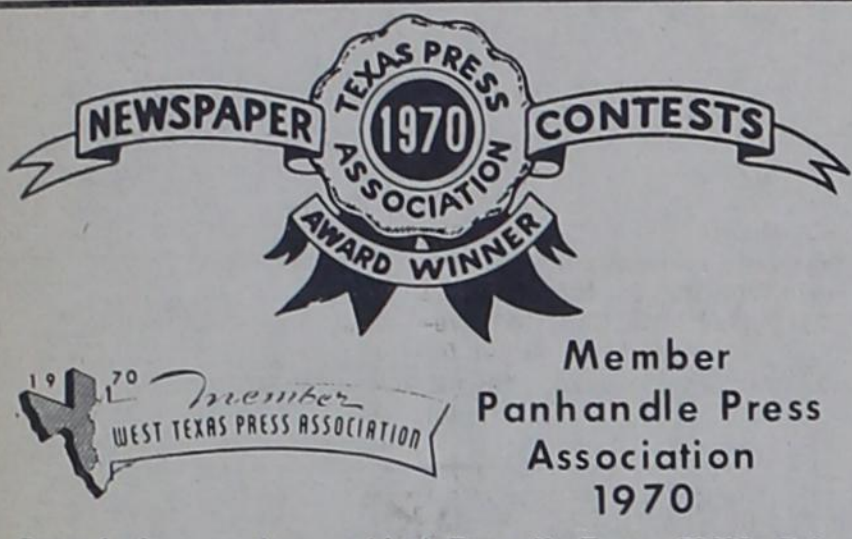
Billy Graham Film Set At Farwell Church

has participated in special programs at St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat and has also spoken to groups at other local churches.

During the year Sten has been recipient of several gifts from friends in the area and from the students at Farwell High School. The gifts included a letter jacket presented by the high school student body, a class ring presented by the student council, and cowboy boots from the student body. He was also able to make a trip to the state capitol at Austin with the student council.

In summing up his feelings about the year in Farwell Sten stated, "It has been exciting, rewarding, and has had few disappointments. . . the entire year has been filled with blessings and many happy moments and I am so happy to have had the opportunity to live here." He also said, "I believe that I know a part of the basic problem in the United States at this time; however, I know of no basic solution to her problems."

Wednesday, June 24, was proclaimed by Mayor Elmer Hargrove as "Sten Westerberg Day" in Farwell. On Wednesday evening, approximately 100 friends gathered at the city park for a farewell social and program, honoring Sten.

Appearing on the program were Gil Patschke, from the American Field Service, as master of ceremonies; Rev. J. L. Bass, vice president of the American Field Service, who gave the invocation and also spoke briefly; Don Williams, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Mayor Elmer Hargrove; Steve Blair; and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wiman.

Williams, representing the Chamber of Commerce, presented Sten with blue jeans. He also presented him a Texas flag from the American Field Service. Mayor Elmer Hargrove, representing the city, presented Sten with a plaque inscribed with the words, "Sten Westerberg from the City of Farwell for enriching our lives."

Steve Blair paid a tribute to Sten as a friend and exchange student, telling many humorous incidents which have occurred during the year. He then introduced Sten who spoke briefly expressing his sincere thanks for all of the blessings he has received since becoming a part of the community. Jim Wiman expressed his family's thanks for having Sten in their home.

Finale of the evening was a tape recording made for the occasion by Eddie Horn of KZOL in which a salute was made to Sten and concluding with the words "Bon Voyage . . . we will remember you forever and ever and ever and ever."

Census Figures Show Farwell 16% Increase

Assuming that the unofficial figures are correct on county population of the three major towns they have grown a total of 1,583 persons, while the county has shown only an increase of 791. The result then would mean that the rural areas have declined during the past ten years.

According to figures released last week by Percy Millard, regional census director from Dallas, the population in Farwell has risen during the past ten years from a total of 1009 to the present figure of 1170. This is an increase of 16 per cent for the ten-year period.

The other two major towns in Parmer County, Friona and Bovina, show substantial increases during the same period, with Friona showing an increase of 50.5 per cent and Bovina showing a 38.5 per cent increase.

Official figures on the county-wide population in Parmer County with a total population of 10,374 or approximately 800 more than 1960. At that time the official count was 9,583.

Surplus Commodity Office Opens In Bovina

An office was opened in Bovina last week by the Parmer County Commodity Distribution Program. Dispensing of surplus food was also begun from the office last week.

Bob Carter, from the State Department of Public Welfare, said about 300 Parmer County residents are expected to be assisted by the program. Mrs. Helen Blalock has been employed by the county to supervise the office under direction of the state agency.

All persons drawing public assistance, Old Age Assistance,

Aid to the Blind, Aid to Families of Dependent Children, and Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled Persons are automatically eligible for the surplus commodities and should contact the office in Bovina. All other persons who feel that they are eligible and are not now receiving public assistance should contact Mrs. Blalock at the Bovina office.

The value of commodities received are expected to be about \$15 per person per month, depending on the commodities available any given month.

About 25 items of surplus food are usually available.

The commodity distribution program has been instituted in Parmer County as a less expensive method than the food stamp program. The latter program was rejected by Parmer County Commissioners Court earlier this year due to the expense of administering it, said Carter. Most small communities find the commodity program route the better one; while in densely populated areas, the food stamp program is considered better, he stated.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Another short season for cotton looms ahead due to considerable replanting and poor growth from cool weather. "This means that close attention must be given to irrigation to make maximum use of this short season," points out Leon New, area irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Since much of this year's crop is late, the first summer irrigation should be applied no earlier than at the first white bloom. Sub-soil moisture is generally adequate in most areas, so June planted cotton will likely already have suffi-

cient moisture to reach its yield potential.

"Let's review some points concerning cotton growth with respect to moisture usage. First, we must remember that cotton actually uses relatively small amounts of moisture during early stages of growth, followed by increased usage as the crop enters the fruiting stage. So, the critical need for moisture occurs later during the fruiting and boll development stages," says New.

Irrigating young cotton before the white bloom appears can be harmful in several ways, adds New. First, it tends to

delay fruiting and encourages vegetative growth which is especially serious in a season that is already shortened. "We don't need a large plant to realize maximum yield potential,"

Often overlooked is the fact that early irrigation tends to encourage shallow root growth in the upper part of the soil which may dry out later in the season. Deep root development is important to extract the stored moisture which is generally adequate over the area due to good fall rains. "Soil moisture is most critical during the fruiting period when water use requirements are highest, and it's difficult to get over fast enough with an irrigation," points out New. "From the profit standpoint, in most cases early irrigations may best be used on grain sorghum that is now nearing the boot stage of growth in many areas rather than on young cotton. Let's get maximum returns from irrigating cotton and not reduce yields and fiber quality by watering too early," emphasizes New.

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
