Our life on these beautiful High Plains is one of peace, quiet and serenity. We seldom come into contact with many of the problems of the world. Oft times, we withdraw into our snug little world and become so engrossed with the trivia of everyday life that we fail to be aware of many of the tragedies surrounding us in our own country.

We think that indifference and concern for our own little spot is one of the debilitating diseases sapping the moral strength of our country. It is way past time for us to take a more active role in influencing the world in which we live. For far too long we have abandoned this role to the kooks, crazies, and the communists. The results of this indifference is all too apparent and so completely repugnant to our moral principles.

We suggest one course of action that should be taken by every American citizen. That course is for each of us to be vitally concerned with the fate of our United States prisoners of war in Southeast Asia and the procurement of more information concerning the men listed as missing in action -- POW's and MIA's.

Two weeks ago we attended a convention of the West Texas Press Association. On the program was a talk and report by Major Fred A. Meurer of the United States Air Force. It was one of the most compelling and soul searching talks we have heard for a long time.

Among the room of thick-skinned newspaper people, there was hardly a dry eye at the conclusion of this presentation. We do not have the space to dwell at length on this sad state of affairs except to say that as a moral nation if we do not take immediate and INDIVIDUAL action to effect a release of our POW's and to procure some information on the some 1500 men listed as MIA, it is too late. The bell has tolled for us.

We brought back a complete suggested course of action that every individual in this area could do to help this tragic situation. This material is contained in a story elsewhere in this issue. One thing we are convinced of is the fact that the actions of just one person is not ineffective but on the contrary; each person is vitally important to this program. YOU must help.

Bureaucracy surely strangles us. One strand in the web is the method adopted by the Texas Department of Public Safety in regard to procuring and renewing drivers licenses. Two years ago we castigated the new system and now we can only say it is still one of the most stupid, time-consuming operations we have encountered in a long time. Not only must we go to a separate office in Friona for this service, but the office is open only from 1-5 p.m. on Mondays and from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on only Tuesdays and Wednesdays. It is closed on Thursdays and Fridays, which we discovered after making a special trip there.

Why can't this office be coordinated with our other county offices which are open five days each week. Neighbor, you go to the Friona office at these appointed hours, regardless of the inconvenience, time lost or money involved to get your plastic permit to earn a living, or starve. We are calling this stupid state of affairs to the attention of Rep. Bill Clayton, Sen. Jack Hightower, Gov. Preston Smith and Dir. Wilson E. Speir. We do not expect much sympathy or changing of the asinine system but at least we will be on record of protesting this outrage. To be imposed upon by officialdom in such a manner would have caused our forefathers to have screamed with rage and grabbed the blunderbuss and initiated personal action. Today we only sigh with resignation and add another layer of callouses to our already indifferent hide.

Lest you think we are against drivers licenses, we hasten to assure you that we firmly think the strict licensing of individuals to operate motor vehicles is necessary. We are only inveighing against the gross bureaucratic stupidity that has brought about this insult to the citizens.

Ugh, we must desist from further comment as we feel an attack of hyperacidity creeping upon us for which we will take one of the big tablets, not one of the smaller kind so persistently foisted off on the dumb public by old what's her name.

ning their work for the coming year.

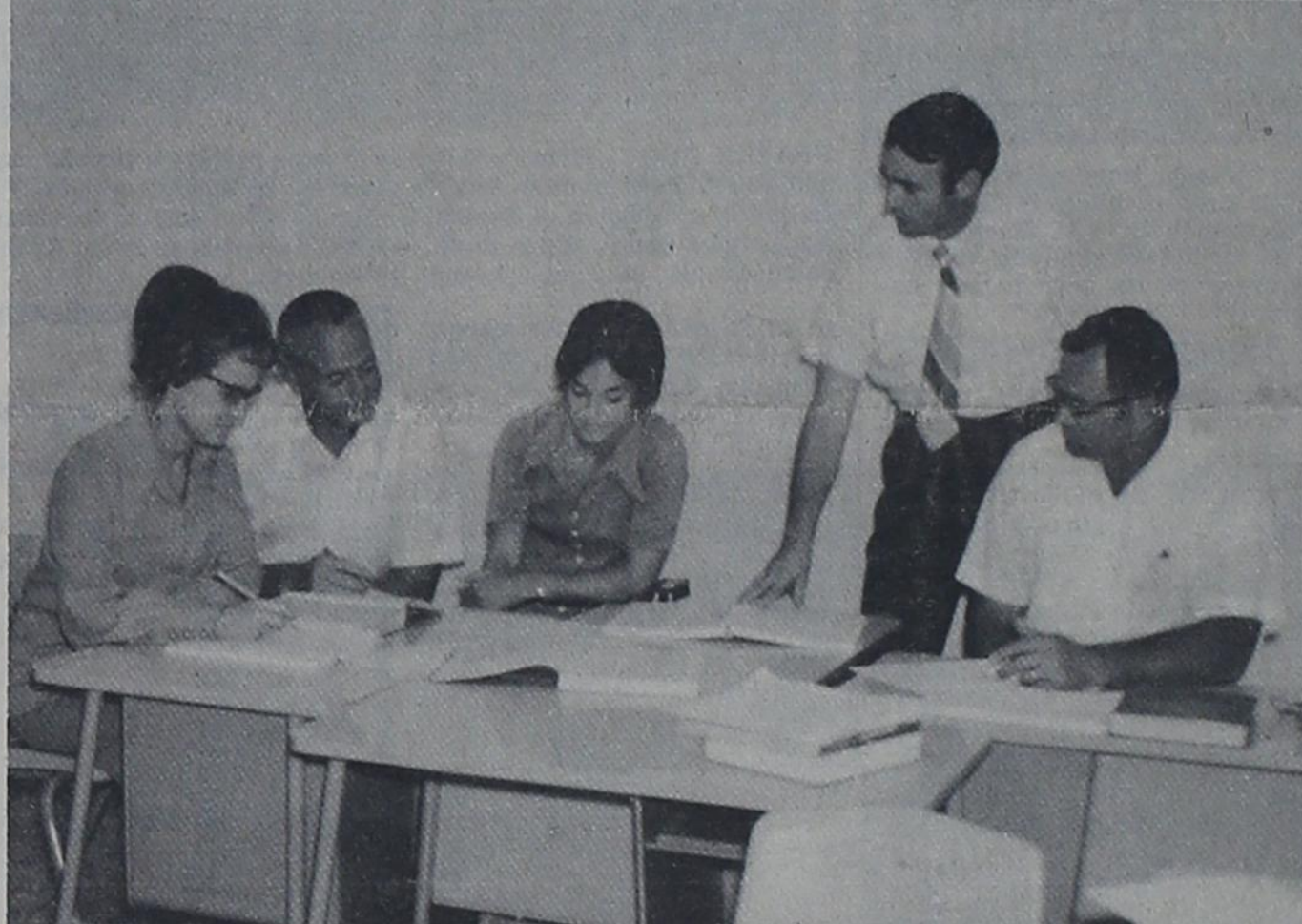
W. M. Roberts, Farwell school superintendent, states that an error was made in last week's story on the prices of

Teachers Prepare For Beginning Of School

In-Service training sessions started this week for Farwell teachers, according to W. M. Roberts, superintendent of schools.

On Monday, the high school and junior high teachers met with Dr. Keith Turkett, head of the education department of West Texas State University at Canyon. Dr. Turkett gave instruction and helped the teachers in planning curriculum guides for use in the future.

On Tuesday, the secondary teachers heard a group from TANE (Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education) from Dallas. A course on alcohol and narcotic education will be incorporated into the school curriculum soon.

On Wednesday, all teachers met for a general faculty meeting and the high school and junior high teachers continued work on their curriculum guides in the afternoon.

An orientation period for Farwell Elementary School teachers also began Monday with a discussion of language arts in the elementary school by Mrs. Allegra Bush and a discussion of instruction planning led by Virgil Young.

Tuesday, the math teachers met in Plainview with representatives from Houghton Mifflin Co. so the teachers will be able to discuss their new textbooks with the authors. For non-math teachers, Tuesday was a day of discussing use of the elementary library and use of visual machines, the proper check out texts, and room preparation.

Mrs. James Craig discussed identifying children with learning differences from 8:30 to 9:45 a.m. Wednesday. After the general faculty meeting, the discussion on children with learning differences continued and music in the elementary school was discussed by Bill Wood and Lynn Burton.

Women's Rights Limited In Saudi Arabia

Saudi Arabia is a country where Moslemism is the state religion and the weekend is taken on Thursday and Friday, says Mrs. Anita Weems, daughter of Dallas Brown of Texico, in contrasting life in Saudi Arabia with life in the United States.

Mrs. Weems is in Texico recently visiting her father and preparing to put her two oldest children, Erma, 15, and Kerry, 13, in school at San Marcos Baptist Academy in San Marcos, Tex.

Mr. and Mrs. Weems and their five children have been living in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, for the past 20 months. Mrs. Weems and three of her children -- Matt, 12; Charleese, 9; and Lyndon, 7 -- will return to Saudi Arabia in September.

Weems is a mechanics tech-

theon company compound in Saudi Arabia. There are about 114 houses in the compound. Around 2700 or 2800 Americans live in Jeddah, near Jordan on the Red Sea. One of the favorite pastimes is going snorkling on the Red Sea, the Weemses said. The town where they live is only about 50 miles from Mecca, but non-Moslems are not allowed to go there.

People believe that Adam and Eve are buried in the town of Jeddah. Temperatures there get up to 120 degrees in the summer and the climate is very humid, Mrs. Weems said that the temperature is usually about 90 degrees even in the winter. Her children find only three or four mornings during the year when it is cool enough to wear a sweater to school.

The school for Americans in

Jeddah only goes through the eighth grade. Kerry said that the schools there have much higher academic standards than most American schools, however the Jeddah school where the children go has around 500 students in grades kindergarten through eighth grade. He said that the curriculum and class schedules there are very similar to the American schools in this country.

Erma, however, went to a school in Geneva, Switzerland, last year. College du Le Man where she went to school is run more like European schools. It is compulsory that the students there have training in French.

The Arabian people are not Westernized to the point of wearing much European or American clothing, Mrs. Weems

said. The women wear long dresses and their heads and faces are always covered. Some of the women have the face masks built into their dresses. The Nomadic people wear separate face masks. A girl's dowry is often worn on her face mask.

When the American women leave the compound, they are asked to wear longer dresses with at least short sleeves and scarves to cover their heads.

Shopping in Jeddah is very different from shopping in the

United States, Mrs. Weems commented. She makes most of the clothes there for herself and her daughters because the clothes sold there are mostly European clothes that are made differently and do not fit Americans as well.

In Saudi Arabia, vegetables are bought at an open market. One has to go to a bread store to buy bread and the so-called grocery stores are small and sell mostly canned goods. Mrs. Weems said that when the store runs out of something, they have to wait until a ship comes in to get more. She said that groceries are very expensive in Saudi Arabia, but that other

things such as gasoline are very cheap.

Since Moslemism is the only religion that is allowed in Saudi Arabia, the Christians have to meet in the American embassy for church services. Christians are not allowed to build their own churches.

The customs in the country are very different. "The wives are bought usually sight unseen," Mrs. Weems said. "One of the Arab boys was telling my husband that he wanted to get married. His wife would cost him around \$3,000 in American money. He had talked to the father, but it had been ten years since he had seen the girl," she added.

Air mail takes six or seven days to get to Saudi Arabia, Mrs. Weems said, but regular mail takes around three months to arrive. She said that it is not unusual for Americans in Saudi Arabia to get their mail around March or April.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

er for Saudi Air Defense School, working for Raytheon Service Company. He worked for Raytheon at White Sands Missile Range in Las Cruces before going to Saudi Arabia.

Life in Jeddah is a "more peaceful life" than here, she said. "You don't have to do this and that all the time." Then she added, "You just don't have anywhere to go." Women don't drive in the country; it's against the law.

The Weemses live in a Ray-

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal of the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

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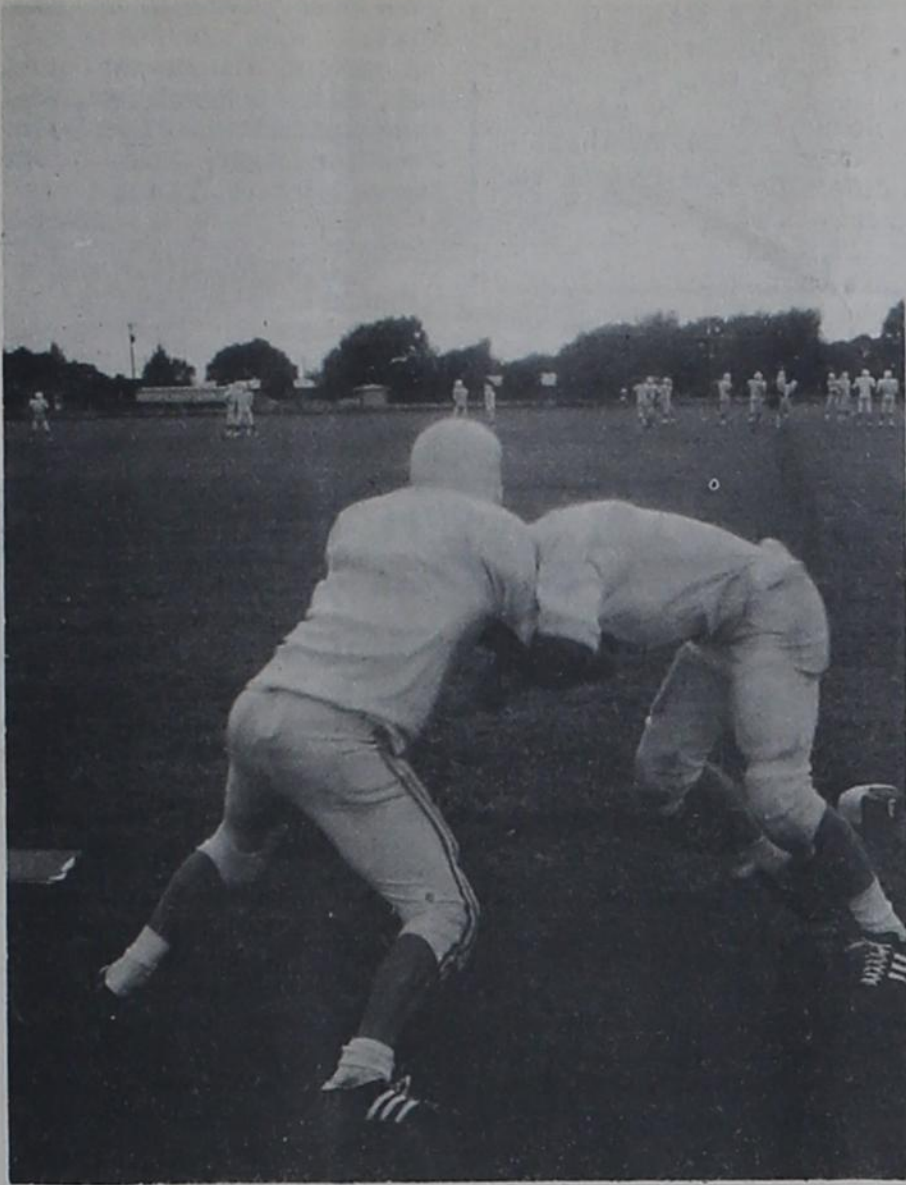

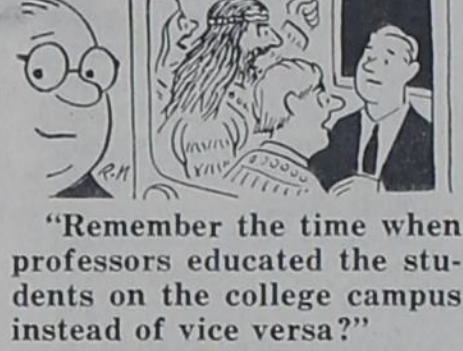
Boy Scouts Camp In Manzano Mountains

The polling place for Parmer County will be Meeting Room, Security State Bank Farwell, Texas. Voting will be conducted on September 26.

Any person within the area described above engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, soybeans for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by written application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person who wishes to vote absentee may obtain a ballot at his local County Agent's office on or after September 12, 1970. Such ballots must be completed and returned to the Texas Soybean Association, Drawer Q, Plainview, Texas prior to midnight on the election date.

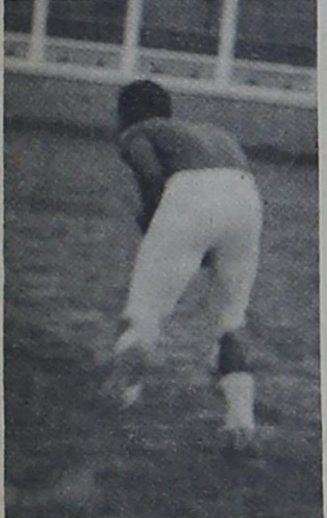
"The boys are working hard and their enthusiasm is great," he said. Wynne added that the team is going to have good
