

Olin Hinkle, University of Texas column critic who knows his business so well he has written books on the subject, and is the co-author of a weekly column in Publishers' Auxiliary, the nationwide publication for community publishers, was looking us straight in the eye at Amarillo last week.

He says that we column writers are in a rut. We talk about drab, uninteresting things like politics, farm problems, international undercurrents, and the like.

If we know what "grass roots" thinking is, our readers couldn't tell by reading our columns, he charged in an address given at the Panhandle Press Association.

The place to be drab and dull (if we must) he says, is on the editorial page. We ought to confine our opinions there, and not let them occupy such a dominating position in our personal columns.

He pointed to the work of such men as our own Paul Crume, who authors Big D of the Dallas Morning News. Crume gets down to earth every single time he wrestles with his typewriter, which is something a lot of we small town column writers are forgetting how to do.

By Joe, the old boy is right. We are going to try to mend our ways. One of the things he said we ought to do more is to use stories in our columns that ordinarily wouldn't find their way into print.

And we received noble inspiration a few moments after hearing Hinkle when we bumped into that old scalawag, J. Claud Wells of the Memphis Democrat. This old time printer can remember the color of this part of the country 50 years ago better than anyone we know.

Claud was a printer for the Texico Trumpet about 1910, when Texico was a rip-roaring border town full of saloons and lusty living. Business must have been pretty good, too, because the Trumpet, if we remember, was a daily.

The editor of The Trumpet was one of the fearless type-of which y a few can be found today. He called a spade a spade and one day after he had made a particularly scurrilous attack on one of the village scoundrels, the target of the verbal harpoons in a terrible temper. Brandishing a loaded and cocked six-gun, the man entered the office, seized Wells and admonished "I'm going to kill you." Claud, only a printer, explained as best he could that the editor was out of town that day, and suggested that the man return some other time. 





THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

And You Don't Pay For Federal Aid to Education?

One of the reasons why federal aid for school construction seems so attractive is that it looks like something for nothing, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

But, of course, says the Chamber, this is a fallacy. Actually, you pay twice, and more, for federal aid.

First, every federal tax dollar comes from your pocket, the Chamber points out. Under the present school construction bill, (H.R. 7535), you also would pay an equal amount in added state taxes because the bill says that every federal tax dollar must be matched by a state tax dollar. In addition, you would pay the costs of sending your money to Washington and back. And every dollar loses weight Counties \$4.00 per year; elsewhere \$5.00 per year. though Corinne had the opportuin the round trip to Washington.

But there is another cost-even more damaging-the Chamber warns. This is the very probable loss of control over school construction in your community. For the bill provides that a federal administrator would have control over priority of construction projects, standards for planning and building schools and wage and hour standards of labor. What's more, says the Chamber, you'll pay the administrator for telling you what to do.

Is this the way American parents want their schools built? Our entire history refutes this view.

The pictures accompanying this story were taken on the farm of Nelson Coon south of Black, where about 25 acres are now being bench levelled.

Coon intends to seed alfalfa, a legume which will enrich his soil with nitrogen, and follow that with the usual grain sorghum crops.

Of this project, about four acres are included in a unique waterway, which will be grassed in to prevent erosion, and this waterway will transport surplus water from the upper parts of the field safely and efficiently. The waterway will drain about 1000 acres.

Technicians from the SCS office furnished engineering details on the Coon project, and the contracting was done by Western Dirt Service of Friona.

Work was started about a week ago, and it is expected to be concluded this week. The average cost of bench levelling is around \$35 per acre, estimates Floyd Crume, work unit conservationist. Some other farmers who are using this practice (which is eligible for government participation under the ACP program) include Earl Drake, three miles east of Friona, 34 acres; H. C. Wells, east of Friona, 20 acres; John Underwood, southwest of Friona, 20 acres; George Haskins, 3 miles west of Lazbuddie, 36 acres; and Clifton Wariner, Lazbuddie, 15 acres.
