

Contest Starts Today!

Today is the day for all area armchair quarterbacks and gridiron prognosticators to sharpen their pencils and wits and get set to enter the 12th annual Merchants Football Contest which begins its 12-week run in this issue of the Tribune.

The yearly-guessing game attracts entries from almost every home in the area with some families having as many as four and five entrants. First time guessers are as apt to win the top prize as an old "pro", if past performances are any indication.

Ten games are listed in the contest each week, including a

combination of high school, college and professional meets. A winner must be circled or otherwise indicated for each game. A score for the Farwell-Opponent game will be necessary, but will be used only to award prizes in the event a tie results in the amount of other games called right. This score will also be used in breaking a tie at the end of the 12-week contest. Greg Hargrove was named last year's Grand Prize winner on the basis of being closer to the actual scores of the tie-breaker games than was Champ Porter who had called correctly the same number of games as Hargrove. Porter

was awarded the second place prize. A person must be 12 years of age or over to enter the contest and the entry blank must be in the Tribune office by 5 p.m. Friday. Entries postmarked before that time will also be accepted. Tribune employees and their families will not be eligible.

Winners of the first three places each week will be awarded prizes of \$5, \$3 and \$1, respectively. Grand prize winner will be awarded two tickets

to the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas on New Year's Day, plus \$50 expense money. Two tickets to the Sun Bowl game in El Paso, plus \$25 expense money will go to the second place winner.

Beats Portales B, 13-12 --

Texico Tastes First Victory

A stunning first victory opened the Texico Wolverines' second season of football after a three-decade layoff. The heady taste of victory was in the air as the clock ticked off the final seconds with the Wolverines defending a one-point advantage over the more experienced squad, the Portales Rams B team from Roosevelt County. As time vanished on the scoreboard clock, fans and team members swarmed on the field to celebrate the 13-12 win for the Green and White.

The game opened with Mitch Turnbough of Texico receiving the Rams' kickoff. Turnbough returned the ball to the Wolverine 40 where the offensive action of the evening began. Texico was recipient of two offside penalties by Portales and pushed the ball into Ram territory in three plays. Opening game jitters was evident as a Texico fumble was recovered by the alert Rams on the Texico 49-yard stripe. In 12 plays, the Portales team scored on a pass play. An attempt by

the Rams to pass for two points on the PAT went awry, leaving the score 6-0, Portales.

On the Ram kickoff out of bounds, the Texico team elected to take the ball in play at their 40, a New Mexico rule. The Wolverines were unable to secure the first down and punted. A bad bounce of the ball put the Rams in good field position on Texico's 42-yard line. In three plays, Ram quarterback Sammy Cook scrambled for the second touchdown. Again, the PAT pass fell incomplete, and

the Ram points for the evening were on the scoreboard.

On receiving the Ram kickoff, the Green and White offense settled down and reeled off three first downs with Albert Steward and Monty Lambert supplying the muscle. The Wolverines then tried a field goal from the 35, but it fell way short and the ball was put in play by the Rams on their 28. The Wolverine defense began to click and allowed the Red and White only two first downs before shutting off the Rams on Portales' 45-yard marker.

The Texico offense under the direction of quarterback Terry Yell took only eight plays to notch the first Texico touchdown. The scoring play was a pass from Yell to end Ricky Pace in the end zone. The Wolverine PAT kick was blocked and the score stood 12-6, Portales.

The Wolverines had time for only one play after stopping the Rams in four downs to take over the ball. Halftime score remained at the 12-6 mark.

The fired-up Wolverines opened the second half by kicking to Portales and seeing the ball returned to their 38. With the Wolverine line doing some hard charging and alert plays by Lambert, Pace and Steward, the Rams were forced back to the Texico 44 where they punted on fourth down.

The Green and White took the ball with a first and ten on their own 20-yard line. The shock troops of Steward and Lambert brought the ball down field where a Texico pass from quarterback Mike Casey to Johnny Dane netted 30 yards and good position deep in Ram territory. Another long Casey to Dane pass ended with the fleet end scampering into the end

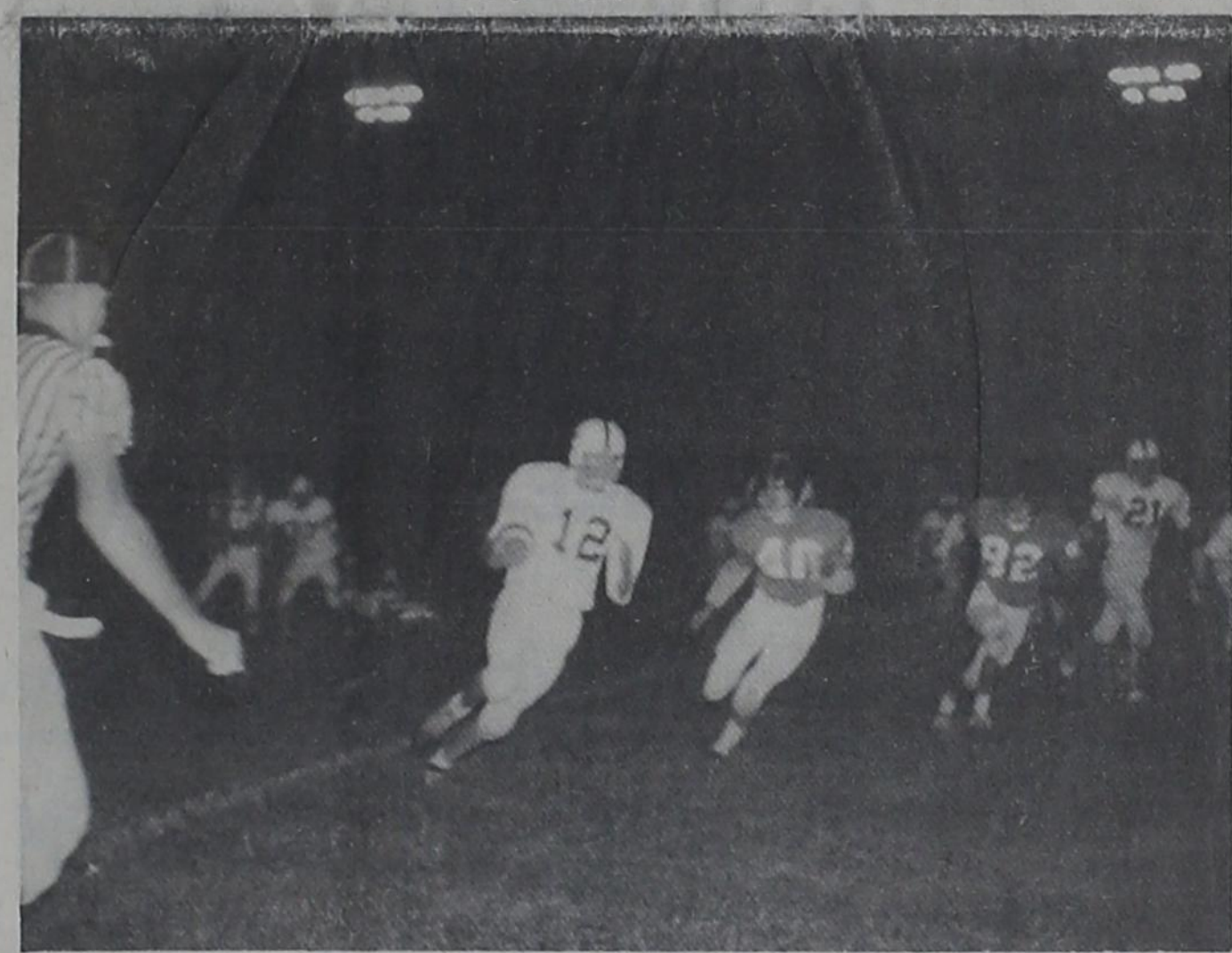
The Chiefs, who wound up last year's play with a 4-6 record, return a few more lettermen to the team than do the Steers.

Farwell's inexperience and lack of size are the things going against them; however, team effort has been good and the Steers have shown much improvement in the past two weeks. Their performance in the Friday night scrimmage with Hereford Junior Varsity was good.

Tonight's probable starters for the backfield include Gene Sheets at quarterback, Gary Erwin at tailback, Randy Chandler at halfback, and Barry Williams at fullback.

Johnny Franse and Larry Erwin will play ends; tackle positions will be manned by Mike Haseloff and Clint Deeds; Terry Craft, Larry Jones and Mickey Lunsford are vying for the guard slots; and Jackie Gilliam will start at center.

A total of 21 boys are out for the varsity this year.

Farwell School --

Drivers Urged To Watch For Children

School officials at Farwell are asking parents and other drivers who are in the vicinity of the school grounds during loading and unloading of the buses to be extra cautious while in the area.

Buses are loading and unloading at a different site this

year, and since it is in an area that cannot be roped off, drivers are urged to stay away from this area or proceed according to rules which apply to bus traffic.

Buses now come in from their routes and enter to load or un-

load behind the gymnasium, junior high building and cafeteria. High school students leave the bus at the west end of the high school building; junior high students disembark at the walk south of the junior high building, and elementary, kindergarten and special educa-

tion students get off the buses at the back of the cafeteria.

Persons bringing their children to school and picking them up in the afternoons are asked to please be careful and watch for children entering or leaving the buses.

Home Game Admission By Ticket Only

Cars may be parked inside the stadium fence as in the past, with gates being opened at 6:30 for this purpose. A fee of 50 cents will be charged for each vehicle parking inside.

Work on obtaining an emergency vehicle for the Farwell community is continuing. Bids or price estimates were obtained from three truck dealerships and turned over to the city commission for their study.

However, with the first home Farwell football game tonight (Friday), it is doubtful if the town comes up with anything before the Dimmitt game.

There are complications to owning and operating a vehicle such as this, and these things must be satisfactorily resolved before the final City okay can be given on the project.

The future of West Texas depends on the ability of this area to develop, fund and actively begin a water importation plan within the next decade. The ten years from the official implementation of the 1970 census results until the same time in 1980 will very well mean the difference in whether or not the Pandale continues to bloom into an agricultural garden or fades as a distant memory.

This is, as I read it, the main thrust of the 1970 census review by Stanley A. Arbingast, director of Texas University's Bureau of Business Research. This review is contained in the current issue of The Cross Section, the monthly publication of the High Plains Undergraduate Water Conservation District No. 1. Along with the article is a county map showing the population gains and losses for Texas on a county basis. The following is the important conclusion in his article:

"Several significant population-distribution trends in Texas worth studying during the seventies can be identified on the map on page 4. They include:

"1. Far more counties served by Interstate Highways 35 (Dallas-Fort Worth to San Antonio) and 45 (Houston to Dallas) gained than lost. This development tends to confirm the forecast that the Dallas and Fort Worth - San Antonio - Houston triangle is where a high proportion of the economic growth in the state will take place during the next few decades.

"2. More coastal counties gained than lost. The coastal area is attractive not only to investors in industrial activities but also to the investors in recreational facilities. These counties will continue to grow rapidly during the seventies.

"3. Construction of new reservoirs and development of residential resort, and recreational facilities along shorelines of inland lakes is contributing to growth in several areas, particularly in the Hill Country west of Austin and San Antonio, where all counties except Blanco increased in population.

"4. Deficiencies in water would seem to be affecting the growth potential of West Texas adversely. The area to the east of Fort Worth and San Antonio contains most of the counties which gained residents; this is the portion of the state which has the most rainfall and the most dependable water supply.

"5. Texans are continuing to crowd into the state's major urban centers -- Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth, El Paso, and Austin -- at the expense of other parts of the state. Among these six urban areas Austin had the largest percentage gain -- 32.3 per cent. Three standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA) -- Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth -- account for almost 40 per cent of the population. If the population of the San Antonio SMSA is added to that of these three, the total approaches 50 per cent. Some suburban communities, such as Pasadena in the Houston SMSA, Irving and Garland in the Dallas SMSA, and Arlington in the Fort Worth SMSA, are now larger than the central cities of some SMSA's -- for example, Odessa, Laredo, San Angelo, Midland and Tyler. Forecasters for the four largest cities didn't realize that the rate of growth of their suburbs is outstripping the growth rate of the central city. By 1980 or 1990 population in the largest of the central cities may even decline.

"It is clear that by 1980 the statistically larger standard metropolitan areas will have much stronger influence on politics, on decision making relative to social problems, and on the economy than they have had in the past."

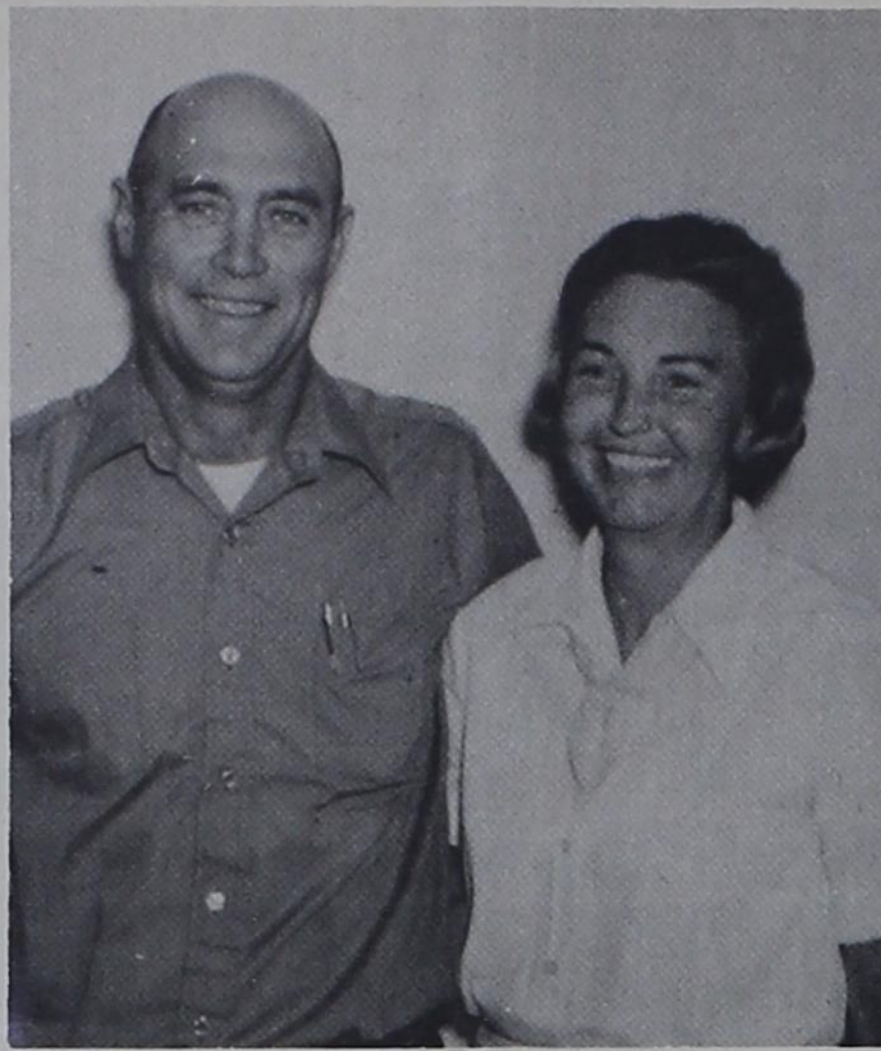

the 13-12 lead which they never surrendered.
The Wolverine defense again rose to the occasion of maintaining the hard-fought lead and concentrated on throwing the Ram backs for substantial losses. Albert Steward crashed through the Rams' line repeatedly and set them back for long losses.
Jerry Askew leaped high in the air and deflected a pass that seemed destined for a sure Ram score. The defensive heroics continued with Dane intercepting another Ram pass attempt in the waning seconds of the game -- assuring the jubilant Green and White of their first gridiron victory in over 30 years.

In commenting on the game, Coach Jim Wynne had praise for all the boys and expressed pleasure at the way they settled down in the first game of the season. Wynne said that although the boys were somewhat shaky at the start and made some defensive mistakes during the first half that they came back strong and fought hard for the win.

Coach Wynne says the entire team was to be lauded for a fine team effort and a great job. Monty Lambert and Albert Steward were complimented on their ability to pound out consistent yardage when the Wolverines needed it.

The Wolverines will travel to Whiteface, Tex., tonight (Friday) in search of their second victory. Game time is 8:30 p.m. Coach Wynne says that the Whiteface team, which returns 22 lettermen from last year's squad, will average over 180 pounds in the line. This will be the biggest team the Wolverines will face all year, Wynne says, adding that he expects them to be "real tough."

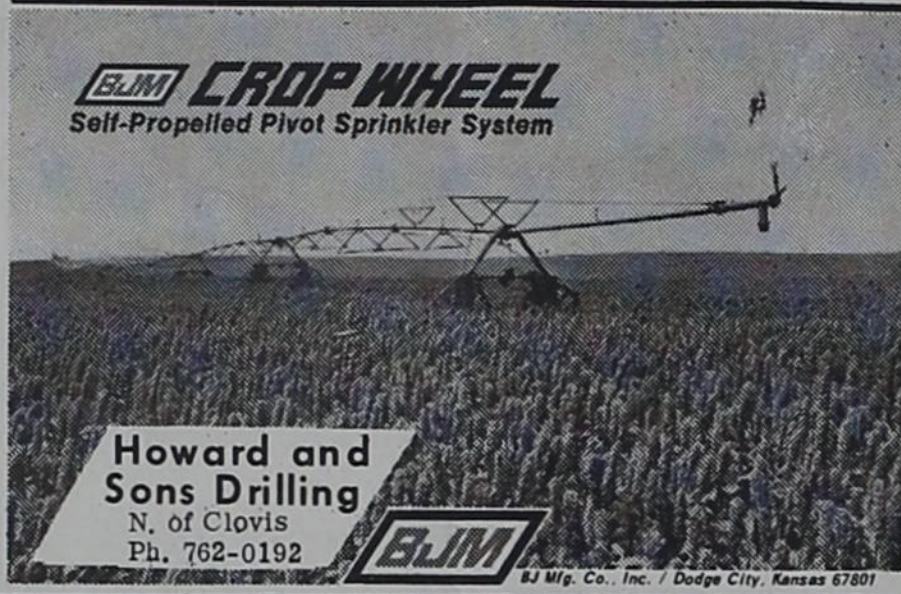

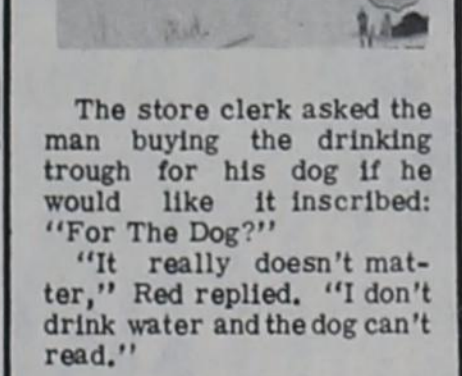

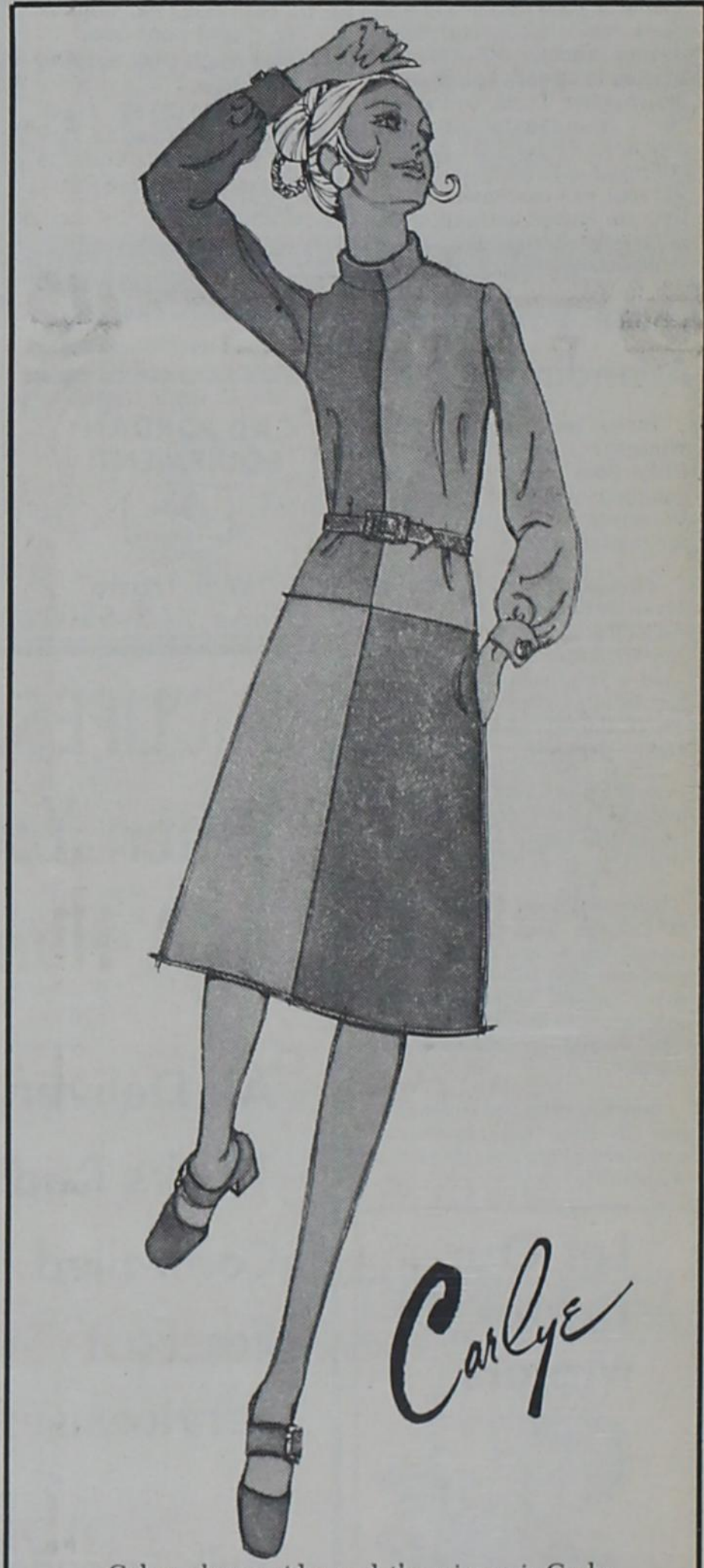

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On The Farm In Farmer County

By R. MACK HEALD
County Agent

In traveling over the county and observing the crops in general, I believe a good grain crop is going to be made in spite of everything that has hit it. This has certainly been a bad year for both insects and diseases to invade the grain sorghum over the entire area.

There are still a few spider mites in the county, but the danger has past for them doing a large amount of damage. However, producers should continue to watch young milo in order to avoid further damage.

Recently, I have noticed some signs of charcoal rot in matured plants. This is a soil-borne fungus that invades the plant causing lodging and weakening of the lower stalks. When the stalk is cut into, a "black pepper" appearing dust will be noticed in the pith area of the lower stalk. Usually the grain is not fully developed and filled.

This fungus develops in a plant when the available soil moisture is less than 80 percent for a period of four days and soil temperature is in excess of 95 degrees F. The plant must be in the early-milk-to-late-dough stage for fungus development to occur. Presence of a diseased crop and incorporation of infected crop residue increases fungus population in the soil.

If sorghum is grown again the following year and conditions favor disease development, likelihood of heavy disease losses increases.

Best control can be achieved by maintaining available moisture at or above 80 percent during the period of maturity. Cultural practices which tend to conserve soil moisture are helpful in preventing the disease. Avoid excessively thick stands since added competition occurs as the crop matures.

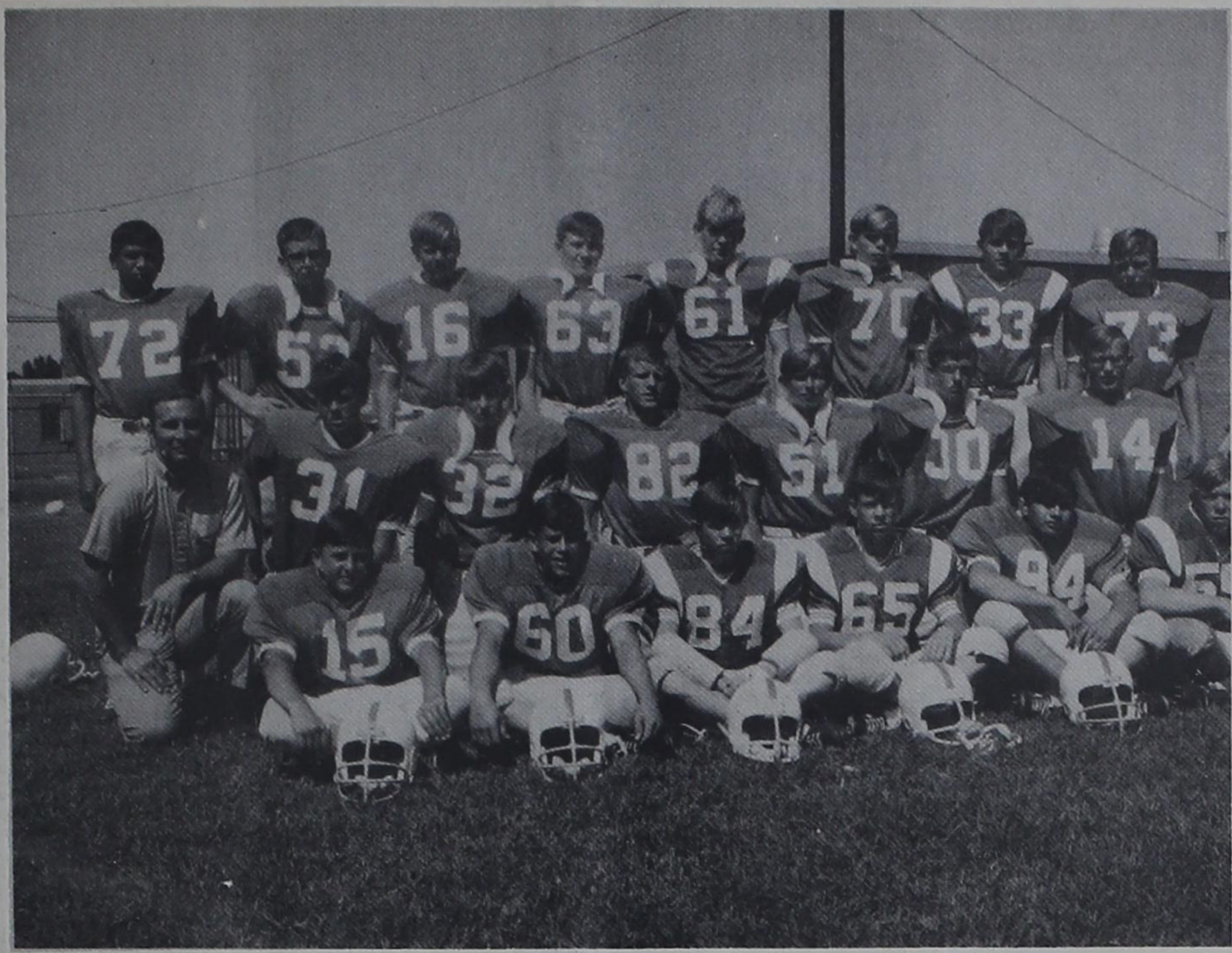

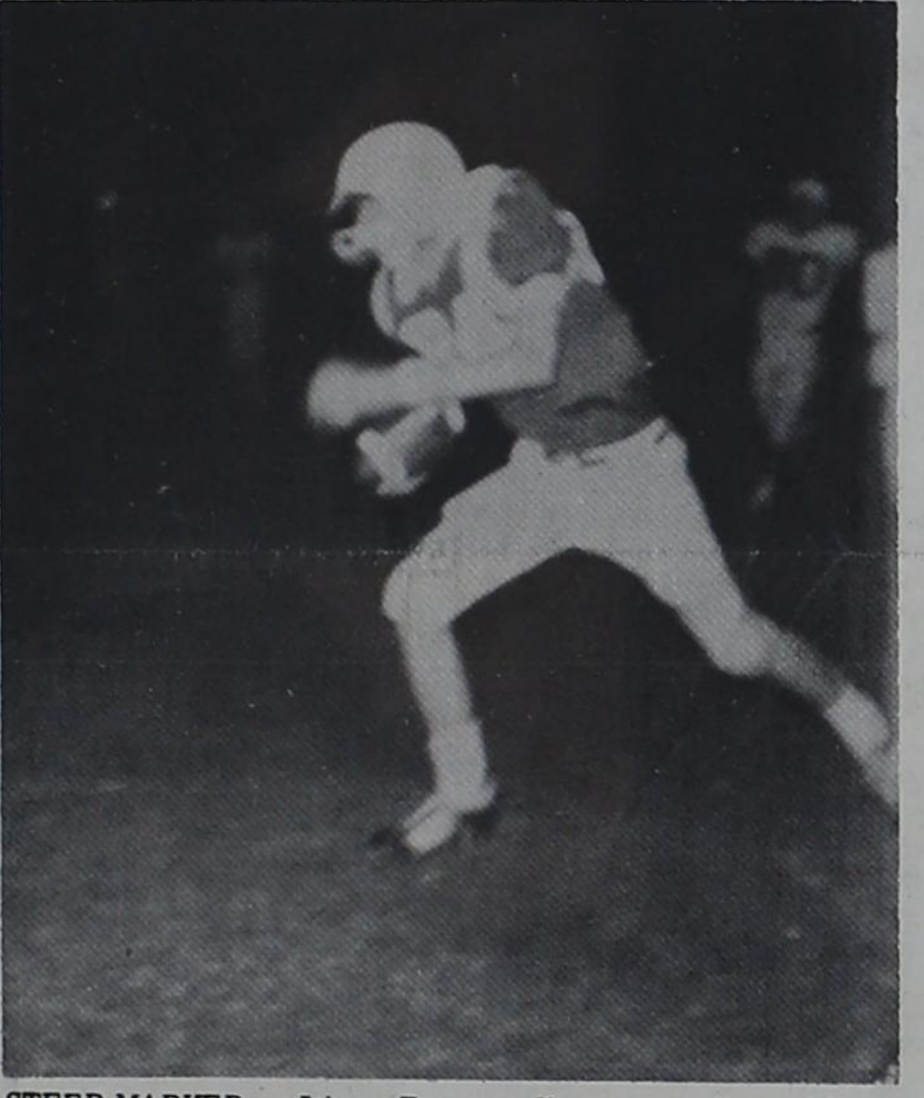

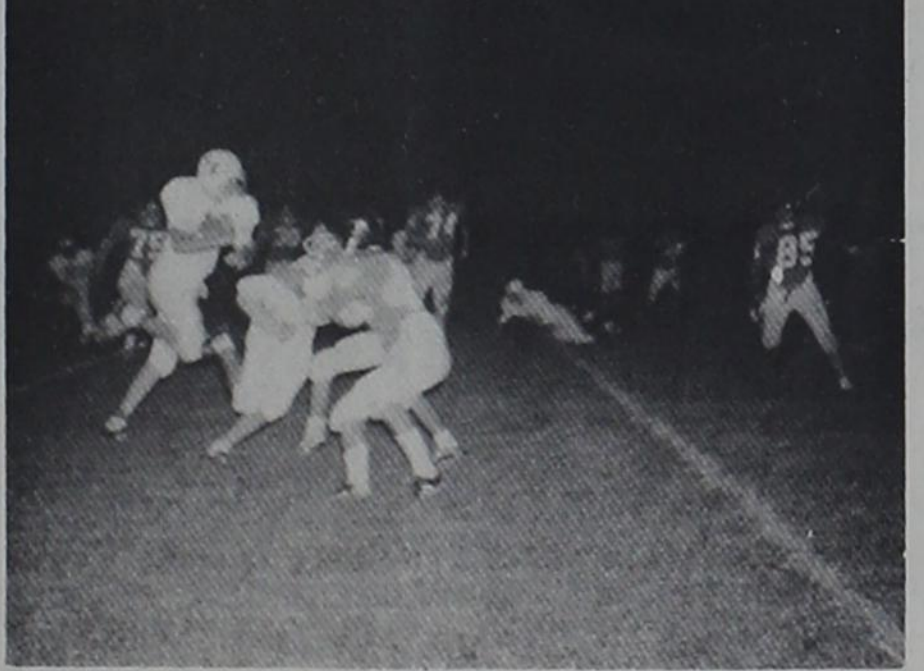
Farwell Junior High Schedule Posted

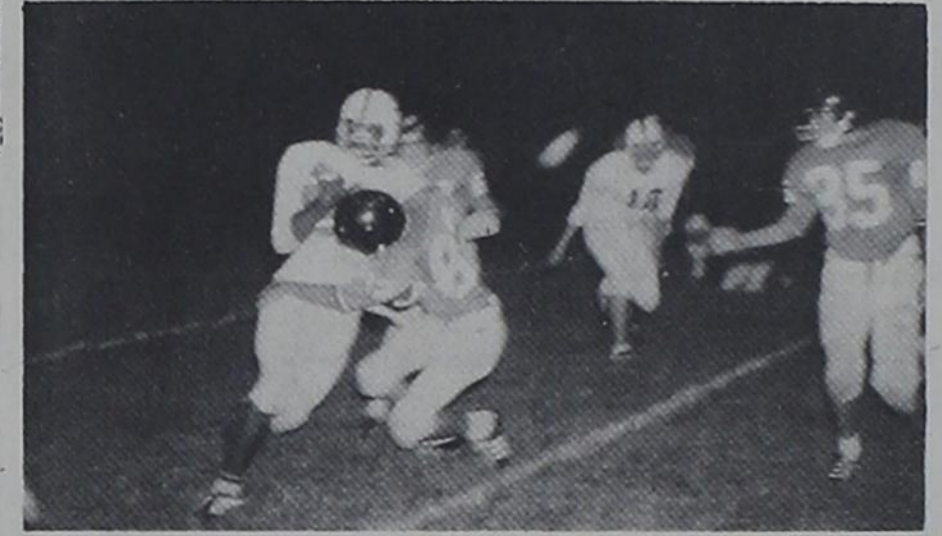

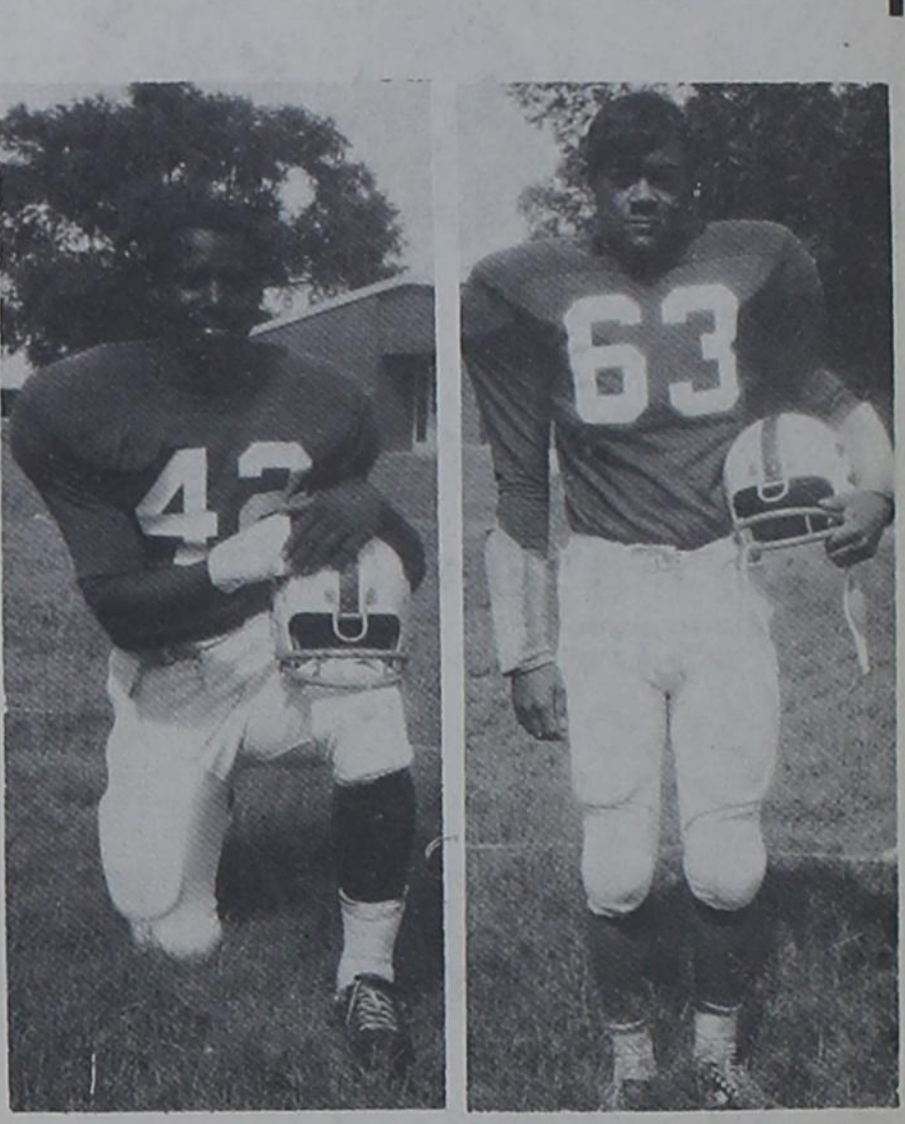
