

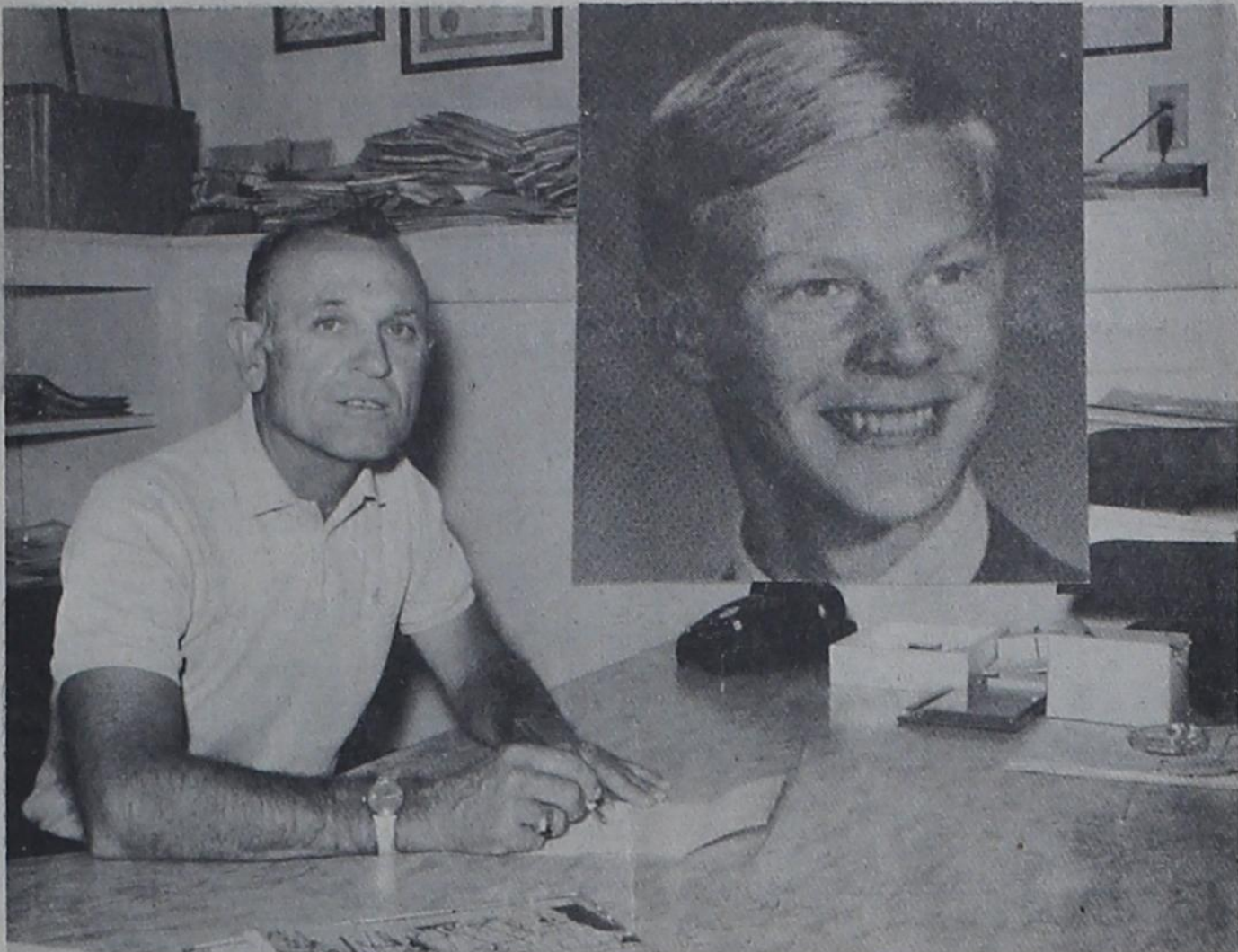

PROCLAIMS STEN WESTERBERG DAY -- Mayor Elmer Hargrove has proclaimed June 24 as "Sten Westerberg Day" in Farwell. Ah, for the perils of a columnist -- especially when he writes about the High Plains weather. Last week we wrote our column on Monday morning and commented on how nice it was following a small shower on Sunday evening. We couldn't let well enough alone and had to venture how nice it would be if by Thursday, publication day, we had had some more rain. Well, on Thursday as the local readers were getting their papers, we were in the midst of the worst June sandstorm in history.

So we can't win them all, but would like to win one -- occasionally.

On June 27, Lubbock will be host to the annual Coaches All-America football game. Many of the nation's leading luminaries of the gridiron will be there to show their wares and gather a little incidental glory.

Probably the most widely known individual on the All-American roster will come as a player, but is better known for his personal bravery in standing off a mob of 150 chanting radicals bent on lowering the American flag. Bill Pierson, the 6'3", 250-pound center from San Diego State, is this patriotic personality. The statement Bill had made that day at the flagpole was: "I was born under that flag . . . I fought under that flag . . . I'm going to college because of what it represents."

In addition to taking personal and physical action to insure Old Glory's rightful place on the flagpole, Bill is a good thinker and speaker. We think that the following quotation by Bill Pierson is very eloquent and timely.

Speaking of hippies, Bill said, "I had never bothered them any -- at least, I hadn't been running around insulting them. But, at this point (the flagpole incident) I was getting tired of it. We have people who haven't served their country, who haven't done anything to improve it, running around trying to tear it down."

"Personally, I don't know where people get the idea that kids between 18 and 20 need to be appeased. They haven't worked; they haven't been involved in what America is all about. Why bend over backward to discuss the issues with them?"

Jones Stadium should have 50,000 people there just to applaud this one young American, and incidentally see what promises to be a great football game.

Even though preliminary census figures indicate that Texas will not have as many people as had been estimated, we do know that Texas has more miles of Interstate Highways now open to driving than any other state when the system is finally completed.

According to the State Highway department, Texas now has 2,238.84 miles open to traffic. This is 2.84 miles more than California will have when their project is completed. Texas will boast of 3,170 miles of interstate roads -- more than any other state, naturally, when its system is finished. The completion date for the interstate system is set for the mid 1970s. That is, and provided, the politicians can keep their fingers off the project.

As is known, we have been paying special taxes for this project, with the accrued money going into a special trust fund. If this trust fund is subject to as much political boondoggling as the social security trust fund, we may never get through paying these "special" taxes.

So, the Interstate Highway System for Texas shapes up this way: We have more, will get more, and will probably pay more than any other state in the union. Another "Texas First."

Texico-Farwell Area --

Wheat Harvest Begins

Wheat harvest in the Texico-Farwell area began in earnest this week with all of the local elevators receiving at least one load of the golden grain by middle of the week.

First load of wheat received in Farwell was at Worley Grain. The grain was brought in from the Gilbert Kaltwasser farm last Saturday, June 13, according to Herb Potts, manager of the elevator. The grain brought in by Kaltwasser was a little too damp, therefore, harvest was delayed until Tuesday.

On Sunday, June 14, Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Elevator in Farwell received its first load of wheat from the Arthur Mitzefelt farm, east of town. The

wheat which is being harvested by Lawrence Cooper had a test weight of 60 pounds per bushel, 13.5 per cent moisture content and is making some 55-60 bushels per acre.

Ray Pritchett at Golden West Seed in Texico received his first load of wheat from the Dee Brown farm Tuesday afternoon. However, Pritchett states that Golden West had received barley and rye on June 11. The barley was brought in from the Joe McWilliams farm while the rye was from the Verney Towns farm.

State Line Grain received its first load of irrigated wheat on June 15 from Ray Castleberry, according to Mike Landrum,

employee of the elevator. The first load of dryland wheat received at the elevator was received on June 8 from the Verney Towns farm in the Rhea area.

All of the local elevator men agree that wheat harvest will be in full swing by end of the present week and should be completed (barring bad weather) within ten days to two weeks.

The price of wheat this year is variable with the local price early this week standing at \$1.22.

Total acreage to be harvested this year is down approximately 40 per cent from that harvested in 1969, according to the local elevator men.

Harvest of dryland wheat in the Rhea area is nearing completion according to reports from that area. The dryland wheat is averaging around 20 bushels per acre, however, some of the dryland wheat had made as much as 28-30 bushels per acre. Average yield estimated for the irrigated wheat is 60-70 bushels per acre.

Langford Families In Separate Accidents

The Langford family is beginning to wonder "What next?" -- following two accidents to family members in the same week. No one was seriously injured in either of the accidents, however, the feminine members of the family suffered the most injuries.

The series of events began on Thursday evening when the

Leon Langford family was returning home from Farwell. Dense smoke from a hay fire at the Texico Feed Lots dimmed the view of persons traveling through the area.

The Leon Langford vehicle, traveling north on Highway 108, came into collision with a vehicle driven by Doyle Green traveling south. Langford, his wife, Julia, and son, Mac, suffered only minor injuries; however, daughter Annette suffered a cut to the head which had to be closed with several stitches. After treatment at the hospital all family members returned home and are recuperating satisfactorily.

On Saturday Delvin Langford was in Clovis taking his small daughter, Lisa, to the doctor for treatment of a virus infection when his vehicle came in collision with the back end of another vehicle. Lisa suffered a cut to her head which had to be closed by several stitches. Lisa is recuperating at home and is also in satisfactory condition.

The fireworks display, which will climax the evening's festivities, will be arranged by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. The display is slated to be even "bigger and better" than the one last year.

Texico Town Council Passes Ordinance

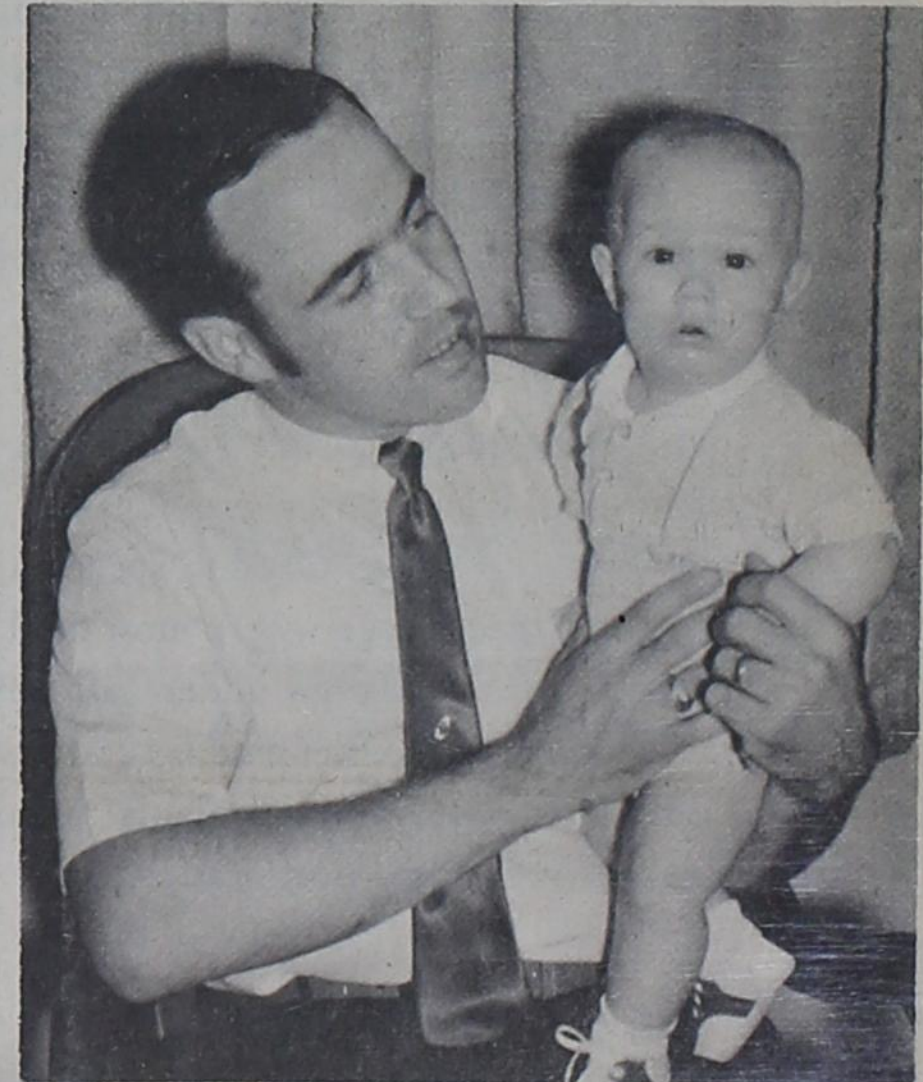
Parmer Unit Water Inc. Calls Meet

SWPS Notes Fallacy Of Blackouts Here

"Don't hold back. Use all the electric power you want whenever and wherever you want in the 45,000 square mile area that we serve. There is no electric power shortage in this part of the country," Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company, says.

The statement of the electric company president was made as a result of frequent articles in national magazines and other media which leave the impression that the whole nation faces a power shortage not only this year but "in the decade ahead," as one publication put it.

"At the end of last year, when we announced our plans to invest \$25,000,000 in new plant and equipment this year, I said, 'there'll be no blackouts in our service area in 1970.' That still goes. I'll add at this time that there won't be any in the future, either, as long as we have the right to plan our own future without outside interference. We have a responsibility to meet the electric service needs of this area and we have done the planning required to carry out that responsibility," Tolk continued.

Southwestern Public Service Company has generating capacity reserves that are 18 percent greater than the peak load which has been predicted for 1970.

"That's like saying you have \$118 put aside to pay a \$100 bill that you owe," Tolk pointed out.

Adequate reserves are normally considered to be generating capability that is equal to the largest single generating unit on your system. Southwestern's reserve capability for 1970 exceeds that margin of safety by nearly 100,000 kilowatts.

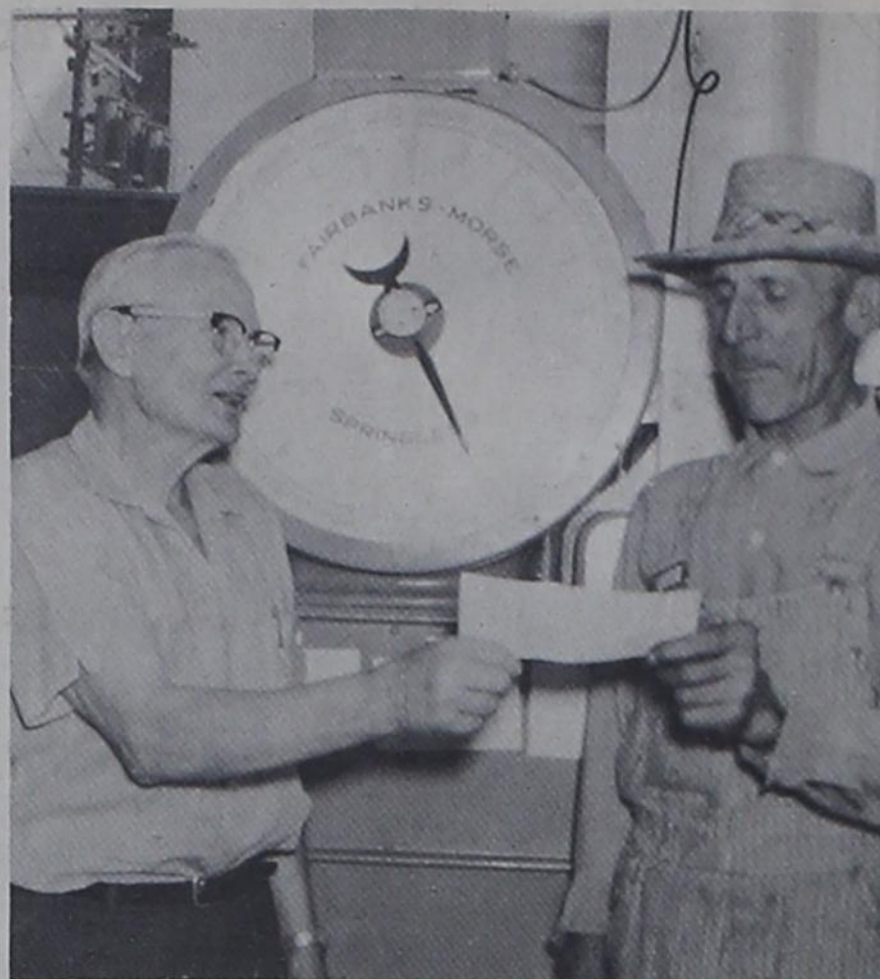
Southwestern is already looking down the line at its next 500,000 kilowatts of electric generating capability. At the present time, a 210,000 kilowatt unit, the first in a new facility southeast of Lubbock, is under construction and is scheduled to go into service in mid-1971. Projected units of 289,000 kilowatts of capability are in the planning stage for 1973 and beyond.

With the help of our area development department and in cooperation with other local industrial development groups, I have started to write to presidents of some companies and to telephone others whose organizations are interested in expansion to tell them of the availability of electric power and other resources in this area. We have outstanding people, lots of space for expansion, a superb climate and energy reserves. Not many areas can say that these days and all of us should work to benefit from these advantages," Tolk concluded.

Kaltwasser Boys Place In State Competition

This announcement was made in last week's issue of The Tribune. Deborah Harding, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hurschel Harding, competed in the Foods and Nutrition division.

All of the local youngsters had been district winners and had competed in county and district contests before entering state competition against other district winners from over the state of Texas.

R. Mack Heald, county agricultural agent, and Miss Janice Miller, county extension agent, commended the quartet on their efforts and said, "We are extremely proud of this group. They did well at state and had a wonderful time on the trip to and from College Station."

Grain Sorghum Research Continues

Forty-three investigators from nine departments of Texas Tech University are conducting research into production and use of grain sorghum.

They and former researchers no longer with the university have completed 197 reports of their findings regarding the crop, which continues to increase in economic importance to Texas.

These reports and the names of researchers have been catalogued by ICASALS Special Report No. 34 entitled "Grain Sorghum Research" by the colleges of Agricultural Sciences and Home Economics - available upon request.

Most reports are available in reprint form to persons interested in the crop research. The publication reports the 1969 grain sorghum output in Texas was approximately 310 million bushels, with more than half of it being produced in the High Plains of Texas.

The local supply "has been a prime factor in the tremendous growth" of cattle feeding, and the rapid development of the swine industry in West Texas

"is also largely attributable to the region's production of sorghum grain," it says.

A 1966-67 survey showed grain sorghum represented 83 per cent of all concentrates fed in Texas feedlots.

"As the dynamic billion dollar High Plains livestock feeding industry expands," the bulletin says, "the grain sorghum industry must continue its growth at an accelerated rate."

Grain sorghum is expected to become more important year-by-year as a source of food for human consumption.

It can provide "inexpensive, palatable and nutritionally complete food for humans when properly supplemented," the report says. "Several types of satisfactory food products have been developed but the manufacture of acceptable food from grain sorghum requires continued exploration."

Tech faculty and investigators agree that "new knowledge gained through research and education holds the key to future economic growth of the grain sorghum industry" and that Texas Tech "is in a better position than any other organization to make this contribution to the West Texas portion of the industry."

Surplus Goods Center Slated

The building formerly occupied by O. W. Rhinehart at the corner of Main and Third Streets is being set up for surplus commodities for low-income families, according to county officials.

Its expenses are being footed by the Federal government and

dispensed through county government.

Mrs. Helen Blalock has been employed to operate the facility.

It has no connection with the Bovina Neighborhood Center, according to Mrs. Pearl Cervantez.

Commodities have not arrived here as yet. Mrs. Blalock is this week attending a workshop in Hereford concerning its operation, according to C. F. Jefferson, county commissioner.

Federal government is paying for the commodities to be sent here, and is also paying all bills, including salaries. Low-income people needing surplus commodities will be required to apply for them. Only those who qualify will be dispensed the items, Jefferson said.

Drivers License Office Sets New Hours

New office hours will become effective at the driver's license office in Friona on July 1, according to Mrs. Carolyn Vaughn. The office will be open on Monday from 1-5 p.m. and on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8-12 a.m. and from 1-5 p.m.

New clerk at the office replacing Mrs. Vaughn will be Mrs. H. A. (JoAnna) Oden. Although the office will be temporarily closed from June 18 until July 1, the examiner will be in the office all day 9-5 p.m. on June 24 to give tests and for license renewals.

Big "D" (Dallas) is just a little different from Texico-Farwell, but nonetheless, Mrs. Marie Cox prefers life in this community of only a few thousand to life in the big city where she was born.

Marie is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Wilson, who live in the Friona area for many years. She is also a sister of Elroy Wilson, who makes his home in Friona. The Wilson family moved to Farmer County when Marie was a freshman in high school. However, Marie relates the story of her high school years in these words, "I would attend school in Friona until I made life miserable for everyone and then I'd go back to Dallas, where my young friends lived and go to school for awhile." However, she did graduate from Friona High School and later was employed at the Friona Post Office as an assistant clerk.

She later returned to Dallas and worked for several years at F&W Grand Silver, in the Wilson Building. However, the big city had lost much of its attraction for Marie when she met Ralph Cox, a cowboy from Farmer County. They were married in Dallas in 1935 and returned to Farmer County to make their home.

They set up housekeeping on a ranch in the Lazbuddie area and made their home in that vicinity until Ralph's death some four and one half years ago, except for a short while when they lived in Texico. Marie moved into Farwell two years ago and bought a home at 906 Second Street where she now lives.

Marie is the mother of three children, any of whom she will tell about "if prompted" (like any mother). Her children are Dr. Ralph H. Cox, Jr., who is living in Dallas while working at Baylor Hospital; Mrs. Gary (Patsy) Shankles, whose husband is on the staff at the Pentagon; and Leroy, a student at West Texas State University. In addition, Marie has three grandchildren.

When questioned about her hobbies, Marie answered, "Oh, I like to cook, sew and work in the yard." Through the years Marie has had many a chance to prove her culinary arts by cooking for cowboys and other hands about the ranch and also by always having a snack ready for family and friends who might drop by for a visit. She quipped, "I'm always running around town with a cake for someone." The Tribune staff can testify to her ability as a cook since she graciously brought a cake in for us to sample. . . Um-um delicious!

Although Marie does not sew as much as she did when her children were all at home, she still makes most of her clothing and confides that she does miss sewing for her daughter and granddaughter, for whom she made many articles when they lived in this vicinity.

This year is no different to other years as Marie has reserved a small space in her back yard for growing an assortment of vegetables. Included in the small garden are beans, peas, okra, onions, spinach, radish and several other vegetables of which she is especially fond. "Yes," she says, she still cans a few jars of food for winter use, (can't let them go to waste), but confines this activity primarily to fruits, jams and jellies.

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GARDENING IS A hobby of Mrs. Marie Cox and this snowball bush is one of the results of many hours of work spent in her yard each day. Flowers are her favorites, but she reserves a corner of the back yard for growing vegetables which she shares with neighbors.

Marie, who won first place on some of her art work as a child, is making plans to take some art classes in the future. She plays the piano for her own enjoyment and sings as she goes about her work since "life is just what we make it," she says. Marie is a member of the First Baptist Church in Farwell, where she serves as president of the Friendship Sunday School Class. For many years she taught an adult Sunday School class at Lazbuddie and also worked with the junior department.

Since cooking is Marie's favorite pastime she is sharing some of her family's favorite recipes with our readers.

CHOCOLATE CAKE

3/4 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
Cream well:
Add:
2 eggs
1/2 cup cocoa
2 teaspoons soda
2 1/2 cups flour
salt (a pinch)
1 cup sour milk
Lastly add 1 cup boiling water and 1 teaspoon vanilla.
Mix well. Pour into greased and floured pans and bake in moderate oven until firm to the touch. Ice with favorite icing.

PINEAPPLE SALAD

1 can (14 oz.) crushed pineapple
1 cup pineapple juice
2 pkgs. lemon gelatin
1 cup water
2 mashed bananas
1 pint whipping cream
Drain pineapple -- keep juice; combine 1 cup juice and 1 cup water -- heat; dissolve gelatin in juice and water. Mix well, cook until slightly congealed; add pineapple, bananas and whipped cream and chill. Keeps well for several days in refrigerator.

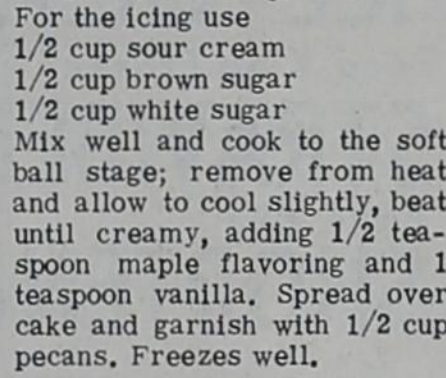
BARBECUED SPARERIBS

2 lbs. spareribs
salt and pepper to taste
SAUCE
3/4 cup catsup

3/4 cup water
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. chili powder
1/4 tsp. cayenne
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
2 onions, sliced
1 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
Cook sauce for a few minutes to blend ingredients; brown spareribs on both sides in a small amount of fat; pour sauce over ribs; cover and cook for 1 1/2 hours in a 300 degree oven.

BANANA CAKE

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
2 eggs
1 cup mashed bananas
1 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
4 tablespoons sour milk
1 cup pecans
Cream sugar and shortening, add other ingredients and mix well. Bake at 350 degrees in layer pans, loaf pans or in Serve-A-Cake pan which has been greased and floured, until firm to the touch. Vanilla and maple extract may be added to cake for variation.
Remove from oven and allow to cool before icing.
For the icing use
1/2 cup sour cream
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup white sugar
Mix well and cook to the soft ball stage; remove from heat and allow to cool slightly, beat until creamy, adding 1/2 teaspoon maple flavoring and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Spread over cake and garnish with 1/2 cup pecans. Freezes well.

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Day Gift

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On The Farm In Parmer County

By R. MACK HEALD
County Agent

Horn flies are beginning to increase rapidly on cattle on the Texas High Plains as warmer weather continues to be the order of the day.

"These pests live on animals continuously and feed as much as 20 times a day," explains Dr. Bill Clymer, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "A moderately heavy infestation of 5,000 flies can extract one-half pint of blood or about one percent of the blood value of a 1,000-pound animal."

In addition to the blood loss, the flies constantly irritate animals thereby causing a loss of energy. Digestive upsets are

common and feed utilization and consumption decreases.

"Some authorities say that uncontrolled infestations of horn flies can cause a loss of one-half pound of flesh or one quart of milk per day," points out Clymer.

To combat horn flies during periods of peak populations, insecticides may have to be applied on a two-to-four week basis, he adds. In addition to spraying, other methods that are effective are dusting, dipping, self-treatment dust bags, back rubbers and mineral treated salt blocks.

Numerous insecticides are available for controlling horn flies. Information on these can be obtained from the "Texas Guide for Control of External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" available at the local county extension office.
