However, since it is too late to replant cotton, most farmers who lost their cotton crops in the Sunday hail storm will plant soy beans. Some farmers in the area will reap a 50% harvest on their wheat which is in the ripening stages and should be ready for harvest within the next ten days to two weeks.

This particular area of Farmer County seems to be the "hard luck area" since damaging hails have fallen in the same vicinity for the past two or three years.

# Building Progress In Farwell

## Rose Drug and Gift Undergoes Face-Lifting

The front of Rose Drug and Gift Shop is undergoing a face-lifting this week, according to Claude Rose, Jr., manager of the store.

When the job is completed the store will have an entirely new look, says Rose, who indicates that a double-entry is planned. The outside door will open into a small vestibule, thus eliminating wind and rain from whipping into the store when the door is open. The entry way will open on the west into the store.

The store will have a brick front with 54-inch plate glass windows at either side of the door. Instead of the display windows which the store originally had, last major remodeling job at the store was in 1946.

Through the summer the remodeling will continue with new display cases, an enlarged pharmacy, an office, and various display areas for ladies and men's cosmetics and other merchandise planned.

Danish walnut paneling, red velvet and delicate greens and white will be featured in the decorations at the store.

When the remodeling is completed, Rose says that three people will be able to handle all of the customers at the store with ease due to the more modern arrangement of the merchandise.



Rose Drug and Gift Shop will be one of the most modern drug stores in the area when the remodeling and repair work is completed. The project is under direction of Charlie Hromas, local building contractor. The front of the store is undergoing a complete face lifting and the interior will also be remodeled.

## Houses Near Completion

Building progress in Farwell continues at a rapid pace as two of the houses being constructed on Eighth Street near the Farwell School are nearing completion. Two of the houses are expected to be ready for occupancy by June 21, according to Bill Nance, building contractor who is erecting the houses for sale to low to moderate income families. The other two houses included in the present project should be ready for occupancy by middle of the summer.

The homes, of brick veneer exterior and sheetrock-textured painted interior, have three and four bedrooms and have from 1100 to 1400 feet of floor space. Included in the houses are a living room, kitchen-dining room combination, bath or bath and half-bath (depending on size of house), plus the bedrooms. The houses have complete central heating and are constructed so that air conditioning can be added with-

out much additional expense. They are plumbed for a washer and dryer, have mahogany kitchen cabinets, vinyl floor covering and ceramic tile baths. Also included is a single car garage.

Approximate cost of the houses is \$13,000 to \$15,000. Financing is available for buying the houses from the Farmers Home Administration, at a reduced interest rate.

Nance says the houses can be bought with a small amount of money down and payments worked out by the FHA and the buyer, depending upon income and number of people in the family of the purchaser.

Two of the houses in the present project are sold and the other two are for sale. When this project is completed several other houses will be built in the same area by Nance who hopes to continue the building project to provide housing for some 12-15 families by the end of this year.



The four houses on Eighth Street being constructed by Bill Nance, building contractor, are nearing completion and should be ready for occupancy by middle of the summer. They are three and four bedroom houses of brick veneer, and may be bought by securing loans through Farmers Home Administration office in Farwell.

## Capitol Food Store Adds Floor Space

"When the job is completed we will have the most modern grocery store in Farmer County," is the way Benny Haney, manager of Capitol Foods, describes the remodeling and additional floor space project which is underway at the store.

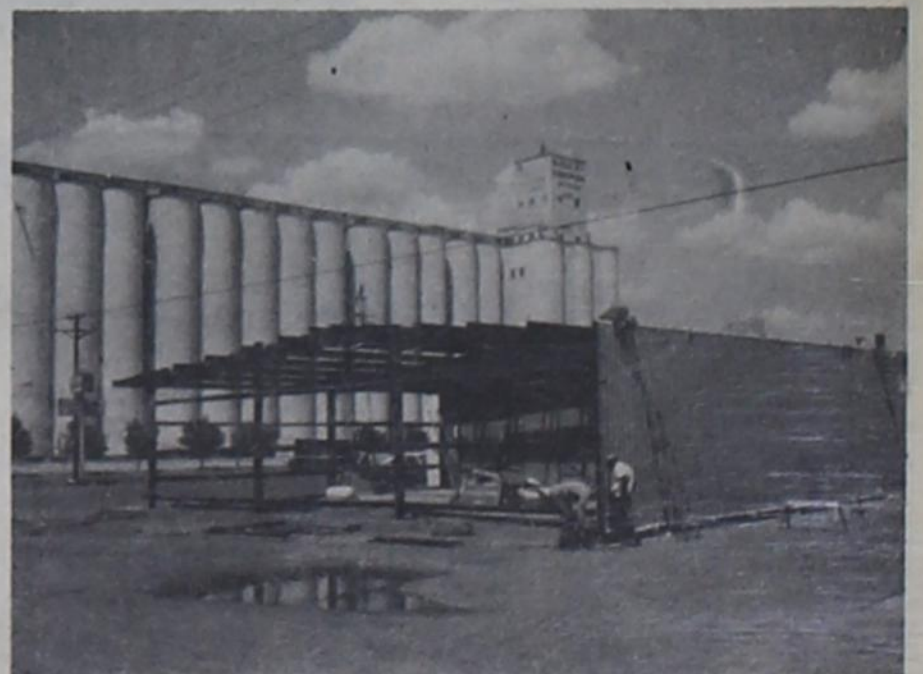
The project, which will add floor space of 36'x50' to the interior of the building when completed, was begun some four weeks ago. At that time a refrigerated air conditioning unit was installed and work was begun.

According to Haney, the enlarged space will house shelving for additional merchandise.


The present meat market will be converted into a self-service unit, with one additional person employed to assist with keeping the freezers stocked with all of the choice cuts of meat and other items. The produce counters will be rearranged and various items added to the stock.

The store is open six days a week from 8:30 a.m. until 9 p.m. and on Sundays from 12 noon until 9 p.m. for the convenience of its customers.

The new addition at the store should be completed by July 1, according to Haney.

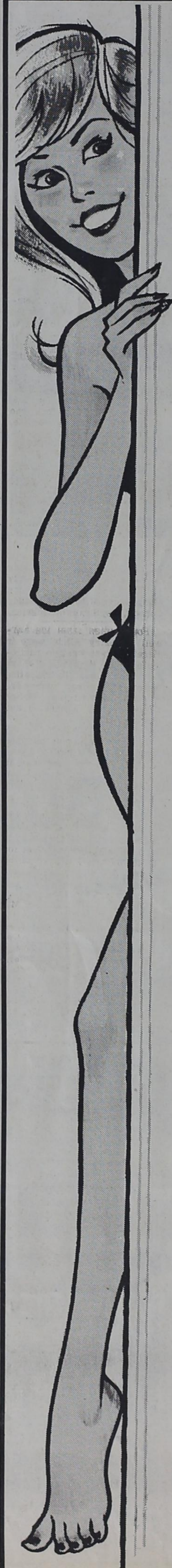

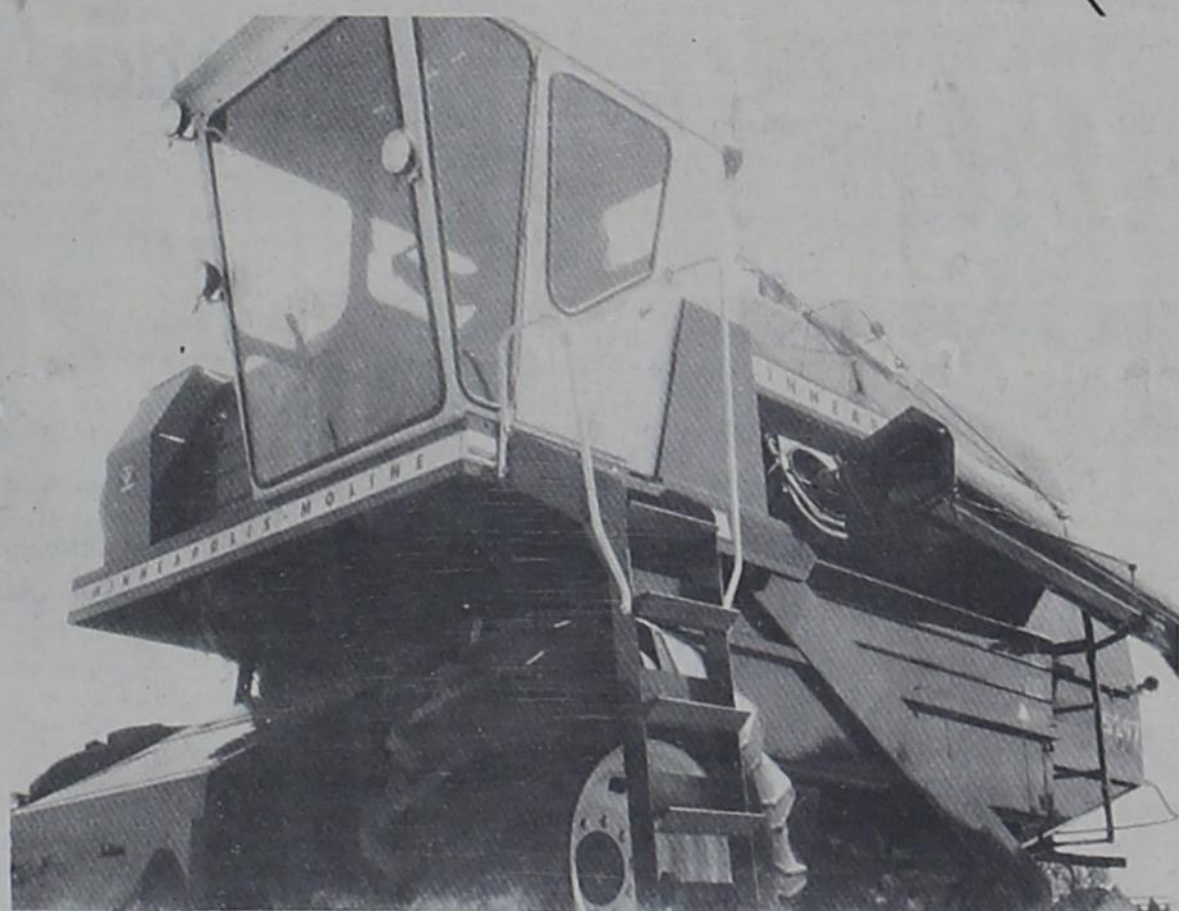

# Troop 200 Expedition Visits Alamo, Houston, Galveston

Texico-Farwell Boy Scouts traveled 1,716 miles and not once left the State of Texas, May 28-June 1, on a five-day expedition financed by profits from the troop's current candy sale, which is also earning money for an expedition to Alaska scheduled for June, 1972.

Departing from the "Twin-Cities" on a Thursday afternoon, Troop 200 spent its first camping night near Post. Second day's journey took the group to Montgomery, Tex., where the Scouts were guests of the Larry Friederichs, former Farwell residents who live at Lake Lorraine. After hamburgers and other treats the boys went fishing at the lake and played games before spending the night.

Troop 200 crossed the Houston Ship Channel by ferry Saturday morning and traveled to Webster, to visit another former Scout, Tom Comstock. The entire group totaled 15 as Tom, David, and Jeff Friederich joined the troop for a visit to Sea-Arama at Galveston. There they viewed all types of marine life and were treated to a water show featuring trained seals, dolphins, and penguins. This

was followed by a water ski show. Camping and cooking Saturday night was on the beach at Port Bolivar, reached across a 13-mile expanse of water by ferry.

Sunday the troop and guests visited the NASA Manned Spacecraft Center, went atop the 570-foot San Jacinto Monument, and toured the Battleship Texas.

After camping Sunday night near Houston, Troop 200 then traveled to San Antonio where they rode by elevator to the top of HemisFair's Tower of the Americas. Visiting the Alamo, the boys were given special permission to fly the troop's

Texas flag above the mission, scene of the 13-day battle between 5,000 Mexican troops and fewer than 200 Texans in 1836.

Patrol Method cooking was used on all troop-prepared meals, giving individual members a chance to work toward their cooking merit badges. Scoutmaster Bitner complimented the boys on their excellent behavior and troop spirit during the expedition, longest to date for the troop. He also said, "We want to especially thank Mr. and Mrs. Friederich and Mr. and Mrs. Comstock who really gave us a warm welcome, and especially to Mr. Friederich, who paid our way into Sea-Arama at Galveston."

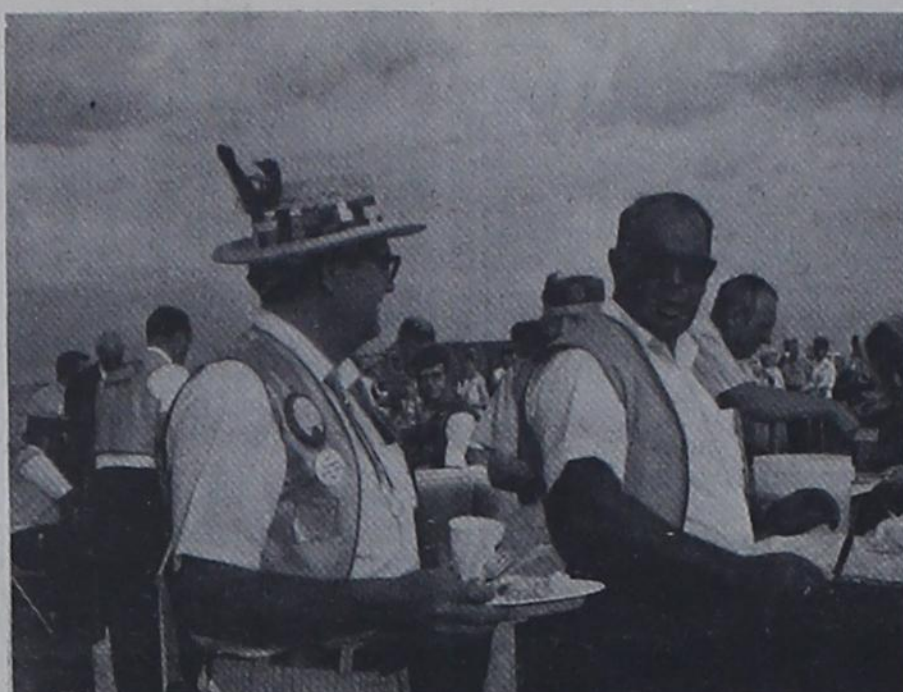

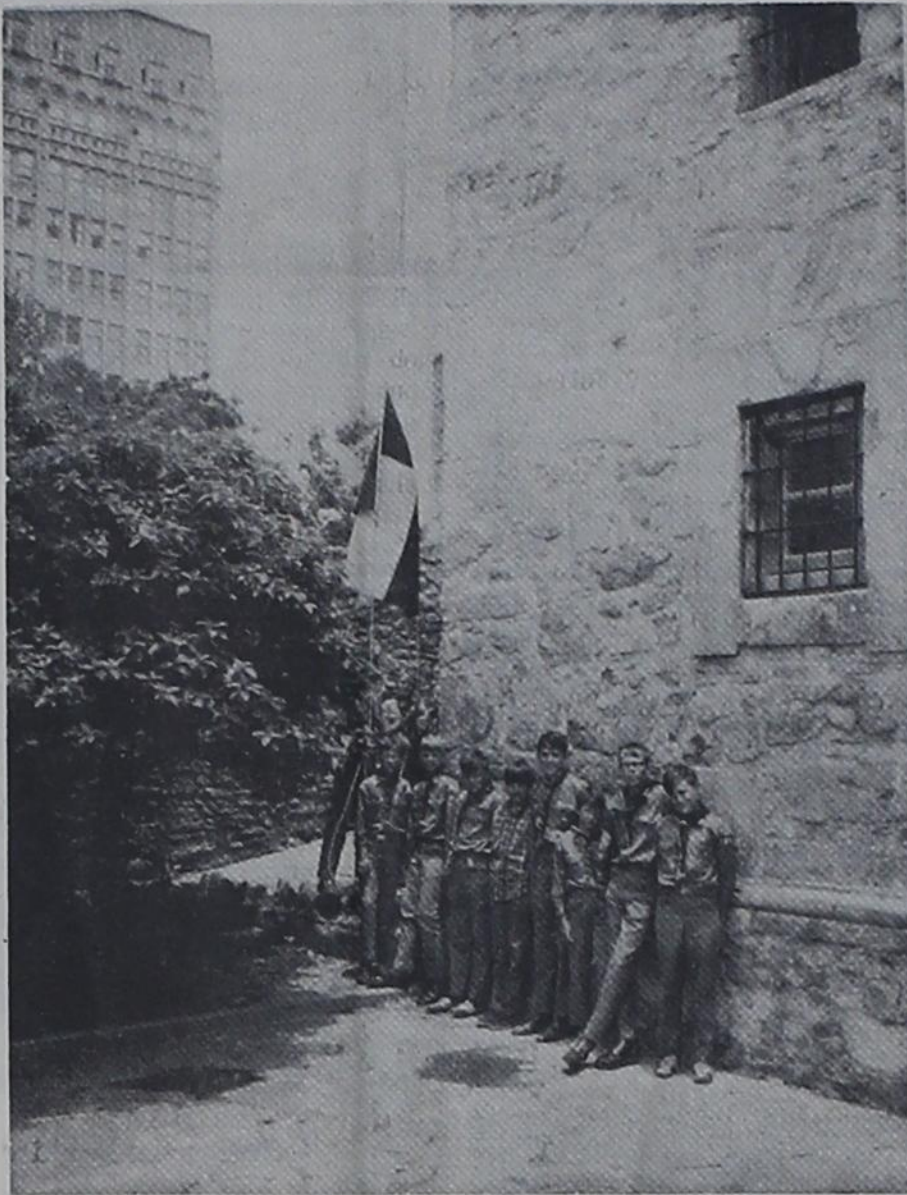
