Citizens Meet With Commissioners --

Bond Election Necessary

THE BRAIN DRAIN is a phrase coined to describe the pull of the United States on the more talented members of other societies and countries. This has the effect of robbing these countries of the services, talents and presence of those for whom they have labored so long to give education and leadership positions. These thoughts have been hazy in my mind for some time, but this year, with our own getting his college degree, this has stuck us with considerably more force and emphasis.

It is true that the small communities have been suffering from a drain of the talents of their young men and women. As one thinks back over the years, our Twin Cities area has produced many young people of outstanding merit and talent. They have had to go elsewhere in pursuit of fame and fortune. It is very definitely a loss to our community when this occurs.

This is a problem for which we do not see any clear solution, either for us or other small communities. Probably the best answer is for a small town to grow large enough to absorb the talents and energies of all its youth, but I am afraid this is indeed wishful thinking. Our area will grow at a respectable pace and in time we will gain in industry and other occupations. But, each year we continue to raise a crop of youngsters that must leave their homes for the furtherance of their ambitions. We miss them, but wish them well in their assault on this wide, wonderful world.

Water, water -- a topic on the lips and minds of most of the residents of the Golden Spread. Meetings, meetings -- on water; here, there, in Lubbock, and everywhere. Yes, the subject of water is all pervasive in this area of the country. I wonder if the subject would be of such universal notice if we were not in the midst of one of the driest years on record.

Right now, we can see that water is making the difference between living and complete economic disaster. This is good from the standpoint of giving the efforts to obtain future water a big push in the right direction. We are firmly convinced of the need for long range years in the future. We feel that right now most thinking folks are ready to seriously evaluate any plan toward this end. Now is the time; so let's go, go -- ahead with plans for future water.

Along this line, one of our local citizens asks why Farwell cannot investigate the possibility of becoming part of the Ute Reservoir project in eastern New Mexico. This is a good question and our local authorities ought to officially ask about the feasibility of Farwell going into this nearby project. This is very logical from Farwell's standpoint and it might help out the Ute project, since we understand several of the southern New Mexico communities have withdrawn.

We will do further inquiring on this point and write about it as we gather additional information.

Parmer County commissioners court has been instructed to call a county-wide bond election to provide funds for paying costs of constructing a dam on Running Water Draw south of Bovina.

The action was taken at a session of the commissioners court Monday afternoon. The meeting was attended by some 60 Parmer Countians who are interested in dams on draws in Parmer County.

The small county courtroom in the courthouse in Farwell was crammed and there was standing room only for the meeting which lasted a couple of hours.

The next procedure will be to present a petition to the court authorizing the governing body to call the bond election.

The cost involved will be to pay for weighting a pipeline owned by Transwestern Natural Gas Co. and to build up FM Road 1731. Cost of weighting the pipeline has been estimated at \$94,000 by the company. This figure could be less, however, it was pointed out at the meeting.

The Road from Bovina south to Oklahoma Lane must be raised approximately eight and one-half feet. Estimated cost of this is \$78,000. The state highway department has agreed to pay \$11,000 of this expense with the remainder, \$67,000, to be paid by the county. There is a total anticipated cost of \$161,000.

The agreed-on site south of Bovina now is on land owned by George Trimble. He has indicated that he would welcome the dam on his land, it was pointed out.

The dam site south of Bovina will not effect two other proposed locations in the county which have been agreed on. These are the McCracken site on Catfish Draw north of Bovina and the Sanderson site at Lazbuddie, on the east side of the county.

The motion to have the court call the bond election was made with the stipulation that these two sites would get dams whether the South Bovina site becomes a reality or not.

Landowners involved at these two locations want the dams and lakes and there are no utility lines or other disadvantages to be concerned with.

During the discussion, it was pointed out that the Trimble site was the better of the two since no condemnation was necessary.

Andy Hurst of Friona, who has served on a committee of county leaders to work with the soil conservation district and the commissioners court, co-sponsors of the project, pointed out that the committee had originally selected the Trimble (South Bovina) site, but hadn't made further recommendation since the cost of weighting the pipeline and raising the road was learned.

He pointed out the committee's recommendation had to be acted on by the court before it was valid.

County Judge Loyde A. Brewer pointed out the commissioners court "wants to know what people of the county want to do."

Leon Grissom, chairman of PCS&WCD board of supervisors, said the board wants to locate the dams where they will do the most good for the county.

Prior to presentation of the eventually-passed motion, Tom Lewellen, commissioner from Friona precinct, asked the group, "How many would be in favor of spending \$161,000 of county money to build a lake on private land?"

Details of calling the bond election are expected to be worked out in the near future.



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
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

Thant Chickens; UN Still A Flop

By the time you read this, the Middle East may or may not be plunged into war. Regardless of what happens however, it should be evident to all, that as a peacekeeping organization, the United Nations is about as effective as an old ladies' knitting society. The latest move by that master of diplomacy, U. Thant, certainly defies attempts to bill the United Nations as mankind's last hope for peace.

At the precise moment when tensions in the Middle East are at their peak, U. Thant chooses to grant the request of Egypt and withdraw the 3,400-man United Nations peace keeping force from its position on the Egyptian-Israeli border. This move certainly clears the way for aggression by either side and can be compared to removing the lock from one's door, just as the burglar is on the front porch. Ironically enough, the removal of the troops was announced on the same day that the General Assembly was to take up discussion on the next order of business -- peacekeeping.

Perhaps U. Thant would like the United States to intervene, thereby removing the hot potato from his lap and leaving him free to assume his usual role of sidewalk superintendent, heaping criticism upon us for our warlike attitude. This is not as far-fetched as it may seem, for in every UN peacekeeping operation in the last decade and a half, it has been the United States which has had to bear the brunt of the burden.

One might also ask where the UN force is in Vietnam? Why is the UN not keeping the peace there? Why is aggression allowed to go unchecked? Why must the United States not only foot the major portion of the UN's expenses, but also supply all of the troops necessary to fight countless brush fire wars all over the world?

For the icing on the cake, U. Thant then has the gall to denounce the United States for its "aggressive" acts.

I suggest that it would be extremely gratifying if our government would tell Mr. Thant to get up off his rear and start trying to keep the peace or stop criticizing the United States for trying to do the same.
