

Our neighboring towns have had such committees in operation for quite some time and they have been responsible for some spectacular developments for their cities. The latest coup in the County is the packing plant scheduled to begin building in Friona. The Friona Industrial Development Committee raised over \$100,000 in a ten-day drive. They are purchasing the site for this plant to occupy.

We cannot cavil, we cannot procrastinate, we cannot alibi, The hard and indisputable fact is clear for all to see. Industry ·is going where the local communities bid for them. If we do not form such an organization soon, it will be admitting that we, as a community, are not interested in growth and development. This tacit admission will have a very discouraging effect on future prospects, as well as becoming a real mental factor in the conduct of present businesses. Few entrepreneurs of small businesses are willing to continue in a community that says by its actions, "We are not interested in future growth."

By the year 2000, it is estimated that two-thirds of the present small towns will disappear. It is possible that we as a community entity will disappear and become in effect a suburb of Clovis. Make no mistake about it, people are going where they can get goods and services, conveniently. The day of the completely agriculturally-oriented town is past. With the farm population now accounting for only about six to seven per cent of our total population, this is inevitable. Those who currently have accumulated sufficient capitol and resources cannot expect this status quo to continue from generation to generation. Not too many years ago, the clothesline rope manufacturer had a vast market. Today you can hardly find old fashion clothesline, Technology, inventiveness, and population growth are inevitably changing the ways of this country and no community is an island unto itself. We must progress or we will regress. There is no middle ground in this enexorable march of time.







Where Are Our Allies?

Regardless of the outcome in the Middle East, one thing should be readily apparent - unless our allies can be persuaded to carry their load, the United States is vastly overextended in our commitments to other nations. No less than forty nations now enjoy the comfort of knowing that if they are attacked by anybody, for any reason, the United States is committed to come to their defense, with American soldiers if necessary.

This is not to say that alliances are not vital to our defense, for they surely are, but alliances such as the United States has today certainly leaves something to be desired, to say the least. Since the United Nations is obviously powerless to keep the peace, alliances appear to be our second best bet. The only trouble is, our so-called allies seem quite willing to sit back on their well-padded posteriors and let the United States carry 99% of the work load.

Consider this for a moment. Why shoud the Russians even think about starting World War III, when they can instigate brush fire wars all over the world, thereby tying us down in a dozen different places if they so choose? From the looks of things, this is precisely what the Russians have in mind, and needless to say, this puts the United States in quite a quandary. The type of wars that we are talking about are highly unpopular with a country such as ours. We simply are not the kind of people to resign ourselves to a ten-year war. On the other hand, the United States cannot afford to sit back and let the Communists take over the world piece by piece and not raise a finger to stop them.

So what do we do? From the looks of things, we intend to attempt to single handedly police the world, whilst our allies go about their merry way, with all their young men safely at home.

This simply cannot work, for a number of reasons. First of these, is that the United States does not have a large enough population to rush in a half million troops at every trouble spot that might develop. To attempt to do so would be utter folly, if one were speaking of only a half dozen or so of the type of wars in which we are now engaged in Vietnam, let alone the possible forty which we would be committed to enter if the Communists choose to start them.

The second reason, is that even if we were numerically able to muster the required number of troops, the citizenry would tire of the endless winless wars and would soon boot the administration in power out on its ear. An isolationist attitude could very easily develop in the country that would hand the Commun-
