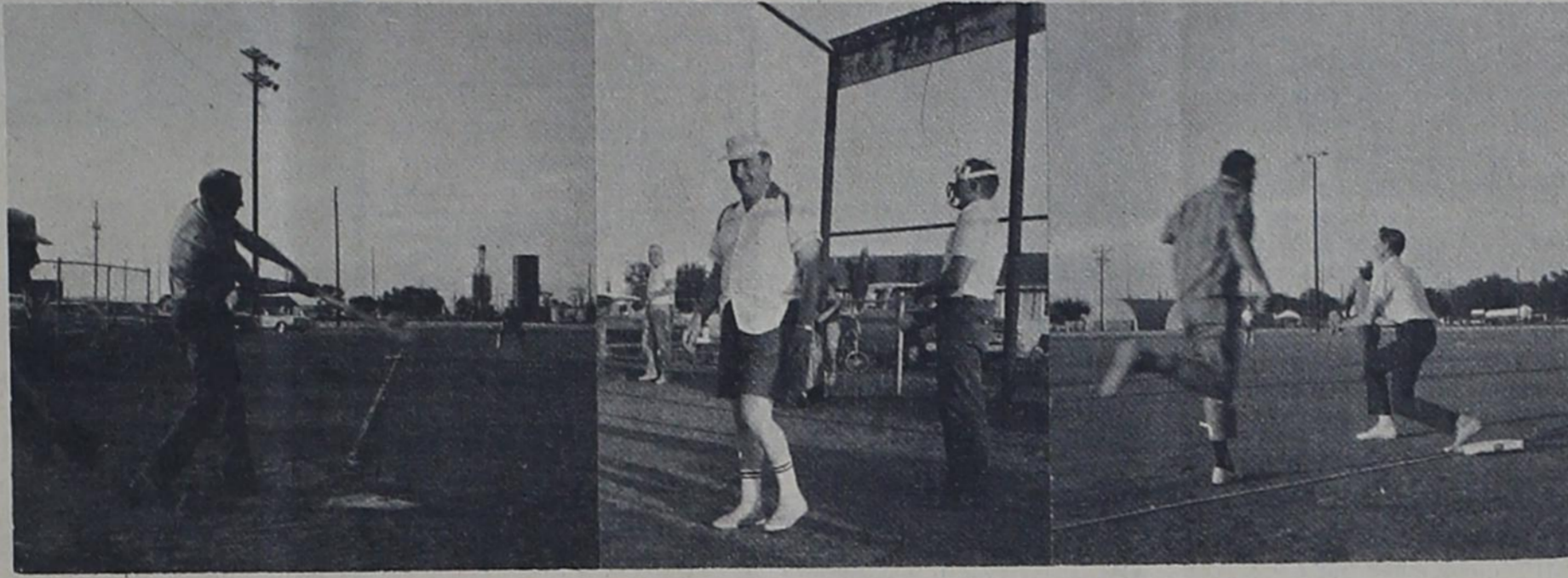

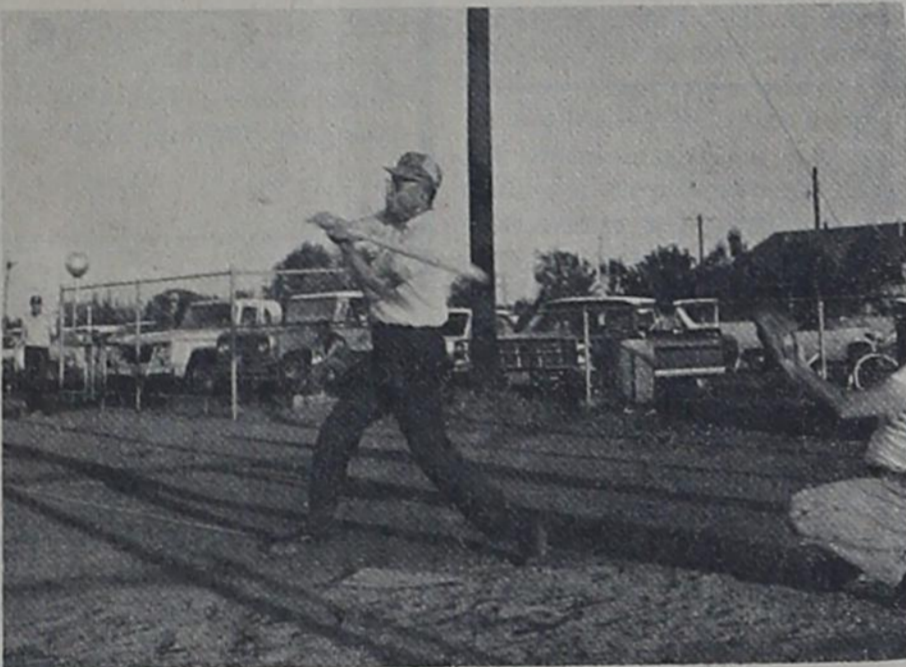

Funeral services were held at the Faith Lutheran Church in Carthage, Mo., on Wednesday, May 24 for Donald Jones, 34, who passed away in Brooks-McCuan hospital in Carthage on May 23 following a brief illness. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage on Friday, May 19.

The body was then brought to Clovis for funeral services at Immanuel Lutheran Church on Saturday, May 27. Burial was in Bailey County Cemetery with Sherwood Mortuary in charge. The Rev. Donald Jones was born on Sept. 16, 1932 in Anton, Tex., the son of Curtis and Jet Jones. He lived in Anton, except for a brief period, until moving to Farwell in 1954. Dates Set For 4-H County Events

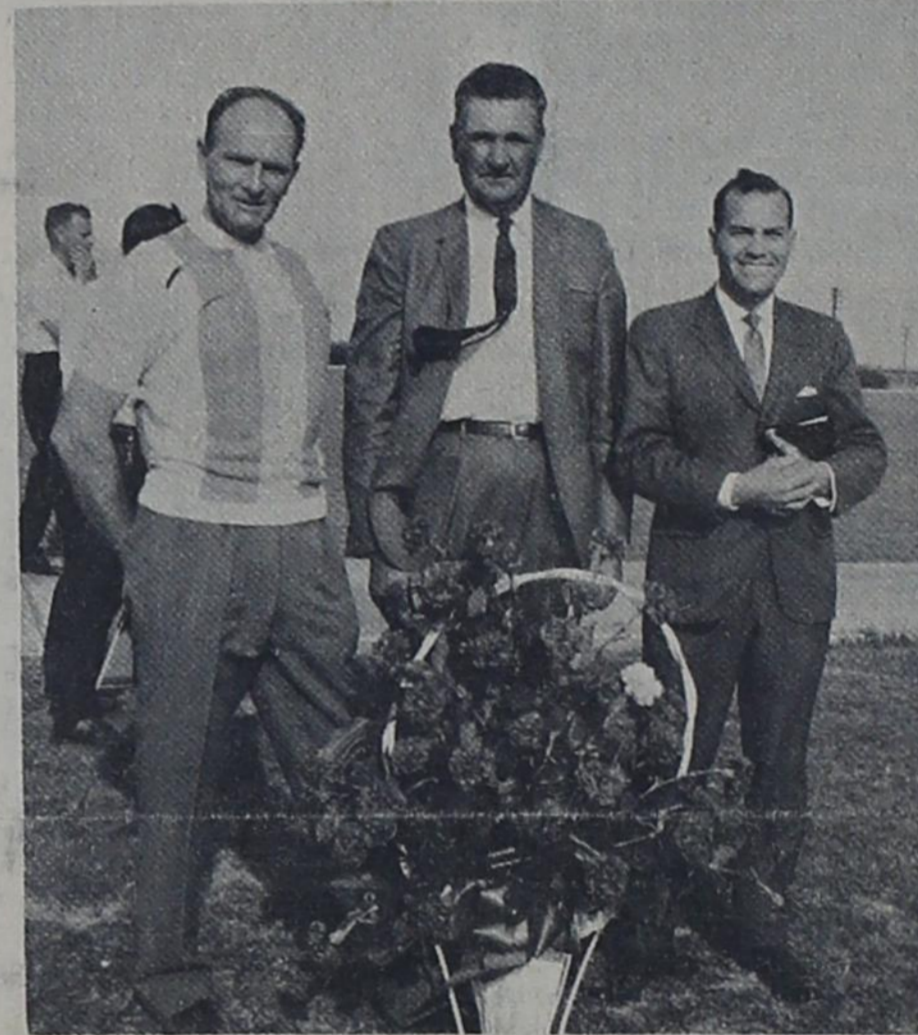

There is a MUST for our community to which we will have to face up, soon. This must is an Industrial Development Committee. Our neighboring towns have had such committees in operation for quite some time and they have been responsible for some spectacular developments for their cities. The latest coup in the County is the packing plant scheduled to begin building in Friona. The Friona Industrial Development Committee raised over \$100,000 in a ten-day drive. They are purchasing the site for this plant to occupy.

We cannot cavil, we cannot procrastinate, we cannot alibi. The hard and indisputable fact is clear for all to see. Industry is going where the local communities bid for them. If we do not form such an organization soon, it will be admitting that we, as a community, are not interested in growth and development. This tacit admission will have a very discouraging effect on future prospects, as well as becoming a real mental factor in the conduct of present businesses. Few entrepreneurs of small businesses are willing to continue in a community that says by its actions, "We are not interested in future growth."

By the year 2000, it is estimated that two-thirds of the present small towns will disappear. It is possible that we as a community entity will disappear and become in effect a suburb of Clovis. Make no mistake about it, people are going where they can get goods and services, conveniently. The day of the completely agriculturally-oriented town is past. With the farm population now accounting for only about six to seven per cent of our total population, this is inevitable.

Those who currently have accumulated sufficient capital and resources cannot expect this status quo to continue from generation to generation. Not too many years ago, the clothes-line rope manufacturer had a vast market. Today you can hardly find old fashion clothes-line. Technology, inventiveness, and population growth are inevitably changing the ways of this country and no community is an island unto itself. We must progress or we will regress. There is no middle ground in this inexorable march of time.

Tuesday evening, there was a moving memorial service held at Sunset Memorial Terrace Cemetery. A full measure of thanks is due one member of our community, Earl Roberts, through his unflinching care and devotion, has made the cemetery a place of beauty. Surely such beauty and tranquility is balm to the souls of those who have loved ones resting there. This has come about because one man "cared". What wonderful things we could accomplish if more of us "cared" for others rather than self.

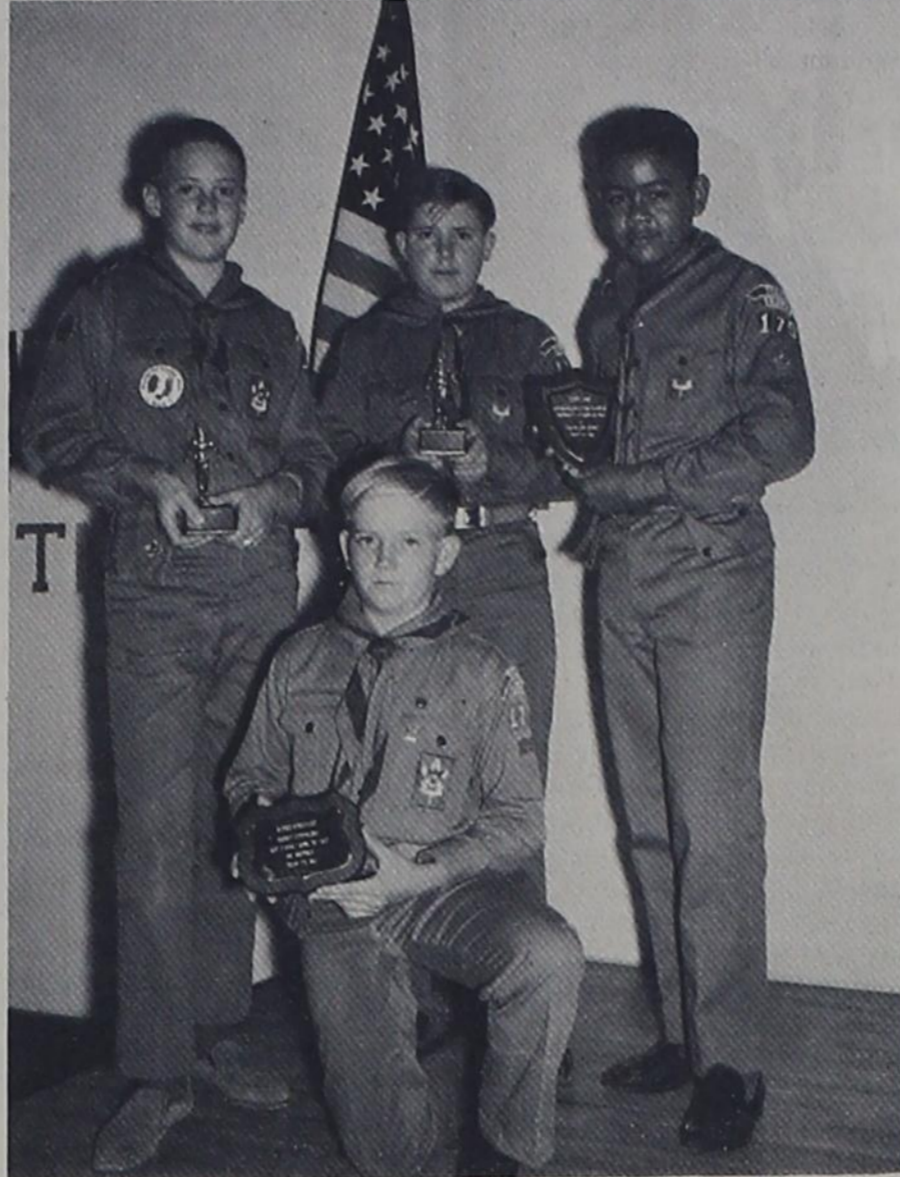

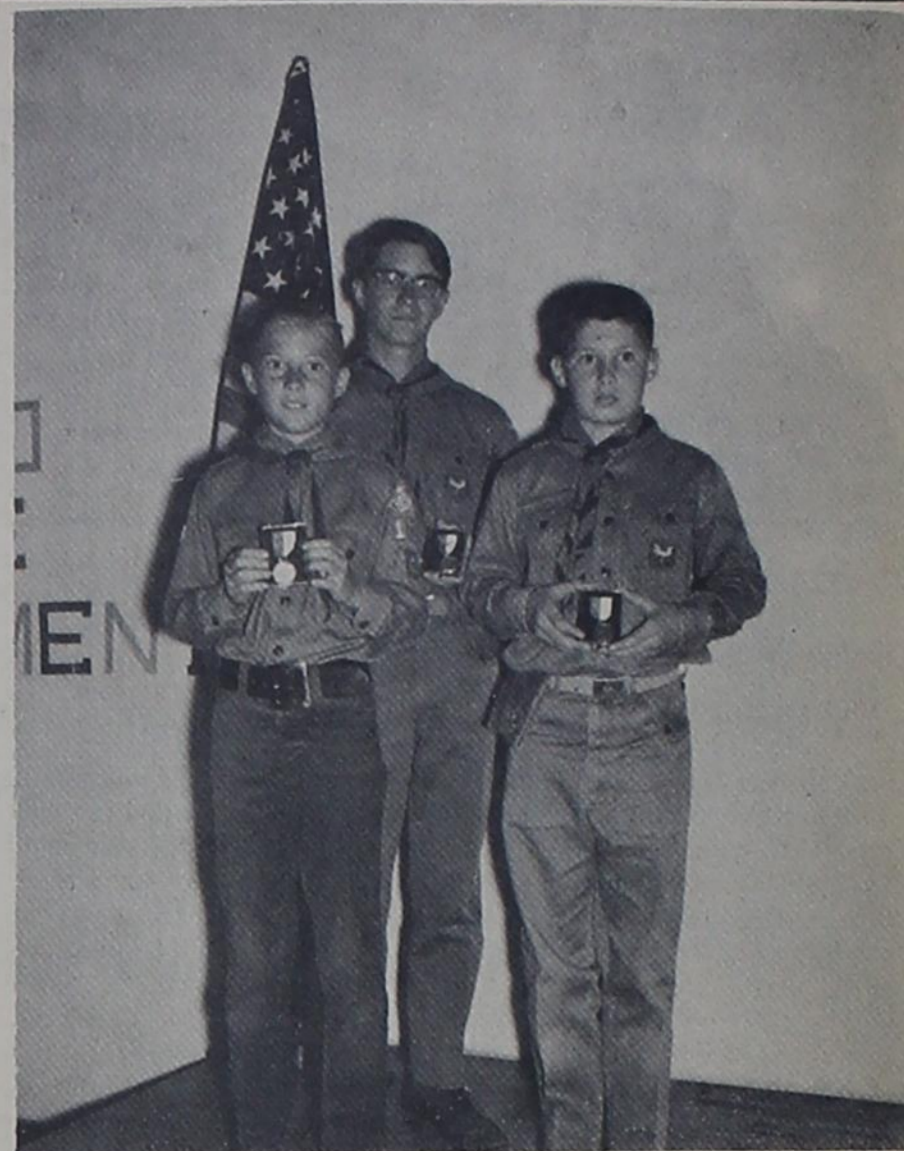
