



Talk Fails, **Teach Nasser A Lesson**

Despite very high level diplomatic blah blah and assurances less than two weeks ago that Washington felt the Mid-east crises had passed the critical point, war broke out Monday morning between the Israeli and Arab forces.

Almost immediately, the morning news media were expressing hope that the fighting could be terminated by continued diplomatic hocus-pocus. This would seem to be a very vague hope, to say the least, in view of the utter failure of the world's leading diplomats in preventing the outbreak of hostilities in the first place.

Although by the time you read this, considerably more will be known about the course of the war, the lack of reliable reports at this early moment prevents going beyond the point of mere speculation at this time. However, a few observations would seem to be in order.

First, it should be apparent that any time a would-be Napoleon such as Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt becomes intoxicated with his own propaganda, to the point of actually believing it, all the talk in the world will usually do little to prevent him from trying to fulfill his "destiny," which somehow always includes a "holy war" of some sort or another. Delusions of grandeur are always hard to overcome short of kicking the pants of the one suffering the symptoms.

Secondly, if Israel does as well against the Arabs this time as she was doing in 1956, when the major powers talked her into letting Egypt off the hook, we should permit her to teach Nasser a lesson once and for all. About the only way a man such as Nasser will learn to live in peace with his neighbors is to have the golden rule put into his head, with a club if necessary. Israel could have done it easily in 1956, but she may have a little tougher time of it now, since she has to face all of the Arab nations combined. Nevertheless, barring Soviet intervention, Israel has the capacity, I think, to at least give Egypt a bloody nose. If the opportunity develops this time, Ihope we will permit her to do this, and not give Nasser another reprieve, to carry out new aggression at some time in the future.
