

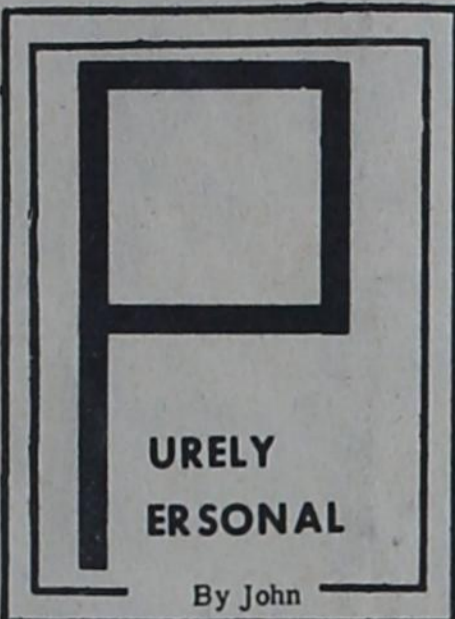

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce's latest bulletin contained an item of importance to this locality. It stated that the WTCC had taken a firm stand against the importation of Egyptian-type cotton into the United States. George Hall of Abilene, a member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce board, appeared at a hearing before the House Agricultural Committee in Washington, Hall pointed out that the United States has been purchasing over 50% of its extra long staple cotton from Egypt and that this country had recently broken diplomatic relations with the U. S. It is the WTCC position, Hall stated, that it seems absurd to continue spending good currency for commodities we can produce in this country.

Extra-long staple cotton is grown in West Texas but our acreage is severely limited by law. This area could produce more of this extra-long staple cotton if acreage restrictions were removed and importations from Egypt eliminated.

The WTCC gave five reasons for recommending the elimination of quotas of Egyptian cotton:

1. It will help the agricultural economy in this country.
2. It will not hurt or compete with upland cotton.
3. It will improve our balance of payments problem.
4. It will encourage a better seed-breeding and quality improvement in extra-long staple cotton.
5. There is no more logic for importing over 50% of extra-long staple cotton than there is for other agricultural commodities.

To this bit of pocketbook patriotism by the WTCC, we can only say, Amen. It is about time our administration quits making the American farmer the goat for the world's bully boy dictators. We get no thanks from these countries for this bit of charity and we certainly do not hurt our home grown agriculture.

I remember some 15 or so years ago that D. J. Brown, who lives south of Texico, used to grow long staple cotton and he did quite a good job of it. I do not know whether or not he still does, but I will bet he, for one, can grow anything in the way of cotton that this country might need. I have enough faith in our local farmers to know if we would let the market alone, our commodities could compete anywhere in the world. To make the American farmer suffer as a scapegoat for a weirdly unrealistic foreign policy is the height of folly and stupidity.

Our editorial hats off to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for their forthright stand. May other organizations follow their lead in demanding justice in the world markets for the American farmer, the world's best.

# July 23-29 Proclaimed Farm Safety Week

County Judge Loyde A. Brewer has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1967 as FARMSAFETY WEEK in Parmer County, according to Harry Hamilton, President of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The County farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Hamilton continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today. He also said that farm and ranch families can reduce these costly farm accidents by using some of the tools of safety, such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, and SMV emblems.

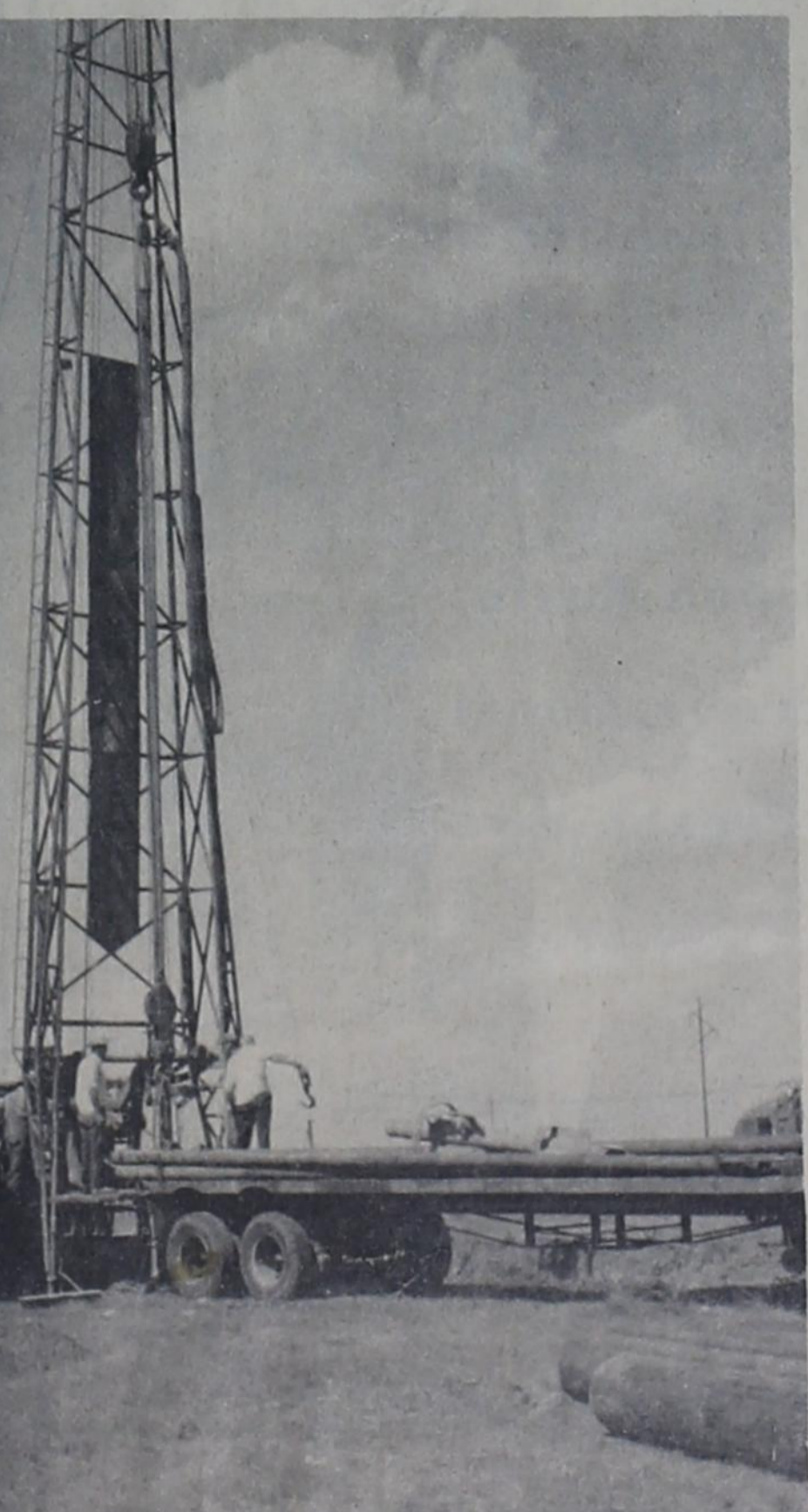
# Plans In Final Stages

Plans are in the final stages for the first AJRA rodeo ever to be held locally. First performance of the rodeo will get underway at the local arena in east Farwell at 8 p.m. on August 3 and will continue the two following nights at the same time. Some fifteen events will be featured in the rodeo including pole bending, roping (tie-down, ribbon and break-away), bareback riding, bull riding and steer wrestling.

There will be three divisions: age 12 and under; 13-15, and 16-19. Buckles will be given to the high individual (boy and girl) in each division and in addition two saddles will be given. Saddles will be presented to the best all-around cowgirl and best all-around cowboy.

"During this past week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm

and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, 4-H Clubs, the Texas Safety Association, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Parmer County Farm Bureau, with the theme "Think and Act Safely."

## Rain Measures One Inch In Texico-Farwell

Rainfall on Tuesday night in Texico-Farwell measured one inch while at Lariat, rainfall was only .3 inches.

In Bovina the rainfall was reported to be one and one-half inch and eight miles north of Texico, 1.20 inches fell. On the E.E. Routon farm in the Ok-

lahoma Lane Community .8 inch was reported, and on the John Hadley farm, five miles south of Texico-Farwell, .40 inches fell.

According to a lawyer with whom this reporter talked, a land owner does not have the right to deny a natural gas line, water line, or other public facility the right to cross his land for such purpose; however he must be paid for the damage

to his land. Prices set for damage vary accordingly to the value of the land, crop, and how it affects the farmer in various ways (accessibility to well, roadways, etc.); in short, how much damage the farmer receives.

**Where Is The President?**

Negroes are on the rampage again! The toll of dead in Newark, N.J., and surrounding area had risen to 25 as of Monday morning. For the fifth consecutive night, heathen savages, under the guise of underprivileged Negroes, made an attempt at reducing the New Jersey city to rubble. Pictures of the riot area revealed almost unbelievable damage. Hardly a store in the riot area had escaped burning or looting. The streets were strewn with litter and rubble, the scene generally being one of total war.

Now I have but one question, just what does the Johnson administration intend to do about this lawlessness and complete disrespect for human decency? The answer will probably be absolutely nothing! The administration seems quite content to sit on their well-padded voting boxes and pretend that riots such as these are not really riots at all, but are just harmless venting of emotions by poor underprivileged and discriminated against Negroes. Try telling that to patrolman John Gleason who was brutally murdered when a mob of 30 Negroes disarmed him, beat him severely, and killed him with his own revolver! Ask the three children of Detective Fred Toto what they think about it. Their father fell victim to a sniper as he was helping to stem the rising tide of violence in Newark.

Yes, what indeed does the President intend to do about it? Will he go on television to assure the families of the dead that their murders will be caught, as he did several years ago when three civil rights workers were killed in Mississippi, or does he do this only when the incident happens in the South and the victims are civil rights workers? The truth is that in all probability, these brutal murders will go unpunished and the incredible double standard of the Johnson administration will go on as usual.

Perhaps if the President does do anything, he will probably appoint another commission to study the problem and figure out more ways to distribute our tax dollars among these professional non-workers. Maybe if the administration gets really riled up, they may even introduce a new civil rights bill in Congress. Glory be!

Insurrections such as this one and the previous ones in Watts, Chicago, Cincinnati and other locals all point to just one thing - the Great Society program of catering to the civil rights movement is a complete and dismal failure. What is needed now is a policy of planned policy brutality, at least as far as the perpetrators of riots such as these go. The mental pigmies who take part in these massive civil insurrections should receive swift and sure punishment, as an example of what may happen to others who are riot prone. Snipers who take the lives of others while hiding in the dark should be caught and publically hanged! Uncivilized? Perhaps. But public hangings would not be nearly so uncivilized as allowing these murderers to go unpunished, so they may kill again.

It is high time that the Johnson administration stop trying to create the super-equal Negro and concentrate on restoring law and order to the nation. President Johnson may be surprised to learn that if he doesn't, he may be booted out of office in 1968 by an awakened and enraged American public. There are far more responsible citizens in this country than there are riot prone insurrectionists.

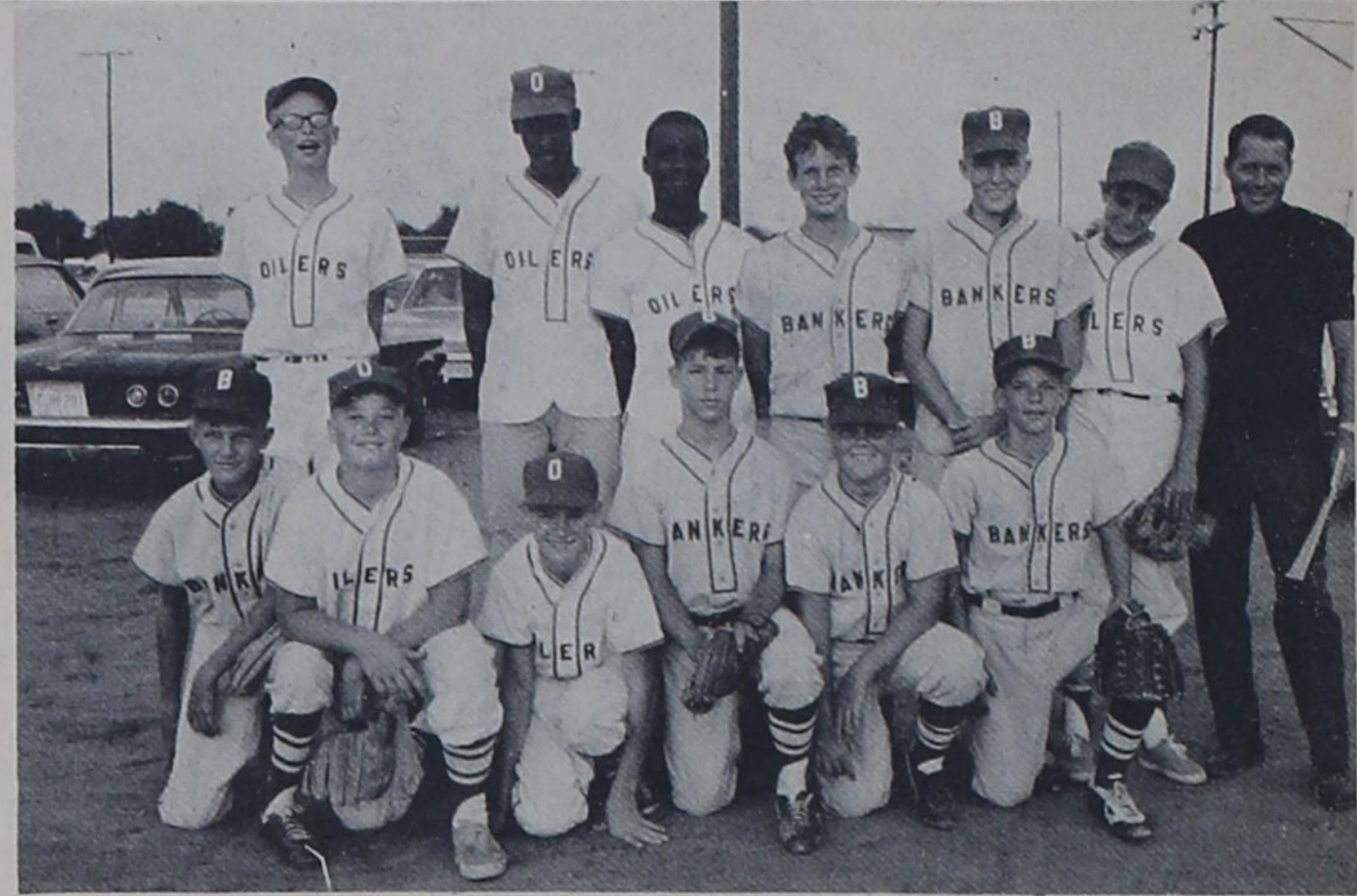
